## AFFILIATION AND ALLEGIANCE.

It is quite certain that almost, if not quite all, the associations and gutilds who send representatives to the Central Council will adopt the suggested rule " loyally to abide by the rules and decisions of the Council." As a matter of fact, this is the only logical course that a society which professes 'membership' of the Council can take. What is the use of supporting an organisation, the object of which is to further the cause of ringing, unless those who join it are prepared to accept its decisions? The Council may, for the most part, be able only to act in an advisory capacity; it may have no powers to enforce any of its decisions, but that does not alter the fact that any association which affiliates to it would place itself in an absurd position if it declined to accept the rulings of the Council and remained a member of it. And yet an effort made some years ago to get this same recognition of the position of the Council failed. The result which is now being achieved las come about by a changed view of the value of the Council. From being looked upon as merely a debating society, the Council now occupies a position of recognised importance in the organisation of ringing. It is a cohesive force, which aims at drawing together into one whole the many associations and guilds which cover the country; it can speak with a collective voice and it is composed of some of the best brains in the Exercise. The Council is what the associations like to make it; and they are making it an organisation of increasing use and greater guidance. Loyalty to its rulings is the first essential to its being? and we are glad to see that all over the country associations gre coming into line and are not merely doing lip service to an ideal, but are definitely accepting the position by adopting, in cases where it had not already been done, a rule governing their relation with the Council.

But while the associations are now prepared to give an undertaking loyally to abide by the rules and decisions of the Council, the Council, on its part, must be prepared to recognise the associations. Hitherto, only the individual representatives of the societies have had recogni-tion-the societies have had none, beyond the right to elect the members and to pay the fees. A society, as a society, has no locus standi with the Council-it cannot even send up a motion in its own name. There has got to be a closer unity between the Council and the associations in future, and it is possible that the Standing Committee may find a way to establish this when they report on the suggested alterations in the constitution of the Council at the next meeting. Affiliation with the Council is often spoken of, but actually there has been no (Continued on parce 242.)

[^0]such thing, and it is not mentioned in the rules. The Council merely consists of a certain number of members, whom associations are entitled to elect; it is not the central organisation of the societies themselves. That, in our opinion, is a distinction with a real diflerence. The Council has now asked the societies to include in their rules a stipulation that they shall be 'aflitated' to the Council; that being so, the Council as a corporate body must provide for effective contact with them. If the societies are to give allegiance to the Council, the Council will owe them something in return.

Drbenhern) was unable to be present owing to irdisposition, bult he wis making satisfactory progress towards recovery- The report showed that the income, which tutalled fig 16 s . 8d., included $£ 18$ 17s. derived from rimging members, 89 18s. from hon, members, and 5s. from lifo members. The expenditure amounted to 84114 s . 11 d. esaring a credte balnuce on the yuarts working of \$18 1s, 9 dd .

## RINGING ON $\perp$ HIGH LEVET,

In presenting his annatil report, Mr. G. W. Cartmel (bon. secre(atr) stated: Another year has passed, aud front our towers, on cvery Suaday, the bells buve calleal the people fo worship in the House of God. It is a point of honour we cherish. Many people rould forget it was Sundap, but for the belis. They hava a messige at all times, whetiner of cheer or sorrow. The slandard of ringing of our association to-day is on a very high level, pobably the highest of any petiod of its existence. Many of us can remember when Squire Proctor's band was the only ove in the counly which could ring Surprise methods. To-lay, we have many hands, scattered broughout the connty, who successfilly practiso such methods, and ere long we can confidently expect records. We congratulate the Luton band upon their peul of London (all servico ringers), atud specially mentioning Mr. Lewis Goodenough, the conductor. Several dew towers have been anded to oul strength. Thirty-six mectings have beall ineld at most of which a service with address has been arranged. The ringers have entered heartily into these services, and they appreciate the reacliness of the various incumbents in making tie arrunfements. Joint association meelings have been continued, and have proved pleasurable and prohtable functions in evers way. Mr. W. H. Lawrence has been inspired to arrange mid-week distriet meetings, which have been very succossful. Hy catering for those who only gel a mid-weel holiday, he has supplied a real want, which the ringers of his district have appreciated. It does not nocessarily follow that the mid-week meeling would be suceessful in every district. Thirty-three peals have been rung on lower bolls and three at handibells, matrine at total of dirtersis, the shma The methods rung range fioun Surprige to Grandsire Doubles. 'lios peads lavo been rung in twenty-tirco diferent towers, distributed throughout the county, and there have been thenty-one different conductors.

## BENEVOLENT FUND SCARTED.

The Bepevoleut Fund was brought into existence by resolution at the last Easter meeting, and in accordance with powers delegated to the treasurer and secralary, rules were drathed am! circulated to the district secretaries, asking for an opinion upan them. This consideration called forth a wide divargence of thought, and it was found useful for the committec's consideration. With the axception of the Western District, the districts were favourable, and, support having since been forthcoming, an account has been opened at the Westminster Bank, at St. Albans. At the anuual commitlee meeting in February last, the rutes werc discussed aud fanlly agreed. Rule 2 was drastically aitered, tho mecting being uranimows in their opinion that only those members who contributed to the fund should be elegible for benefils suother important addition was that towers outside the county, who were afifiliated to the association, were brought within tho scope of beacit. The commidtee do not suggest that the arheme is perfect, experience will decide that, but they do say that the effort is an honest attempt to help an unfortunate boother or sister in distress, and to put to practical test tire reality of the brotilerhood of ringers. I appeal personally to every member to give the scheme a clance, and by so doing to realise that you have a share in the Divine promisc, "Masmuch as ye did unto the least of one of these my brethren, ye did it uato 'Me.' This, and His alone, is the ideal basis of the benerolent scheme.

## INSURANCE AND PRESERVATION OF BELLS

Raferenco was marle to the dicath during the year of Canon Baker, mesident of tho Bedfordshire Association, the Rev. G. Edmonds, of St. Albans, the Rev. C. D. P. Davies, a member of the Herts County Association from its enrliest clnys, Hi. WY. J, Hnzell, of Edmonton, and Mr. J. Flord, of Hemel Fempstead, who was for fordy yoars a ringer at St. Mary's Church. The report then proceeded: The disnstrous firc at Eaton Socon Church draws attention to fhe insurunce of clarch bells. Whilst there may not be any obligation resting upon Chureh authorities to insure their bells, it would be wise
procerlure la do su. At a trifling cost, a polies cond bo proenved which would indemaify against a great loss, in casd of destruction, and ensure restorntion. Wo all know that the bells are nearel Henven than the fittings helow, jet it is common knowloge they are that last to reveive considaration as regards instuance. OF course, ail tingers are on the eltectoral roil, if not on the $\mathrm{l}^{\text {B }}$.C.C., and I would suggest that they ruso the guestion of insurence at the tirst opportumty. Akin to the insurance of bells, is their preservation. It is toubtful whethar church authorilics have any systedatic or compreteni iuspection of belfries, the job is usualiy left't the ringers. A borly mallert the st. Albans Advisory Gommiltee funetion for this Diocesc, and infurmation is sought thom the assessors, who, whilst mossessing acchate knowledge of the fabric, probably know rory lituld about bells and atbings. If this committee would be willing fo co-spt a ringer ar ringers to assist them, I know we could find the men tos render valuable service

After referring to the work done in the varions dijstricts, and expressing thanks to the district sectefaries, for anditor, the frensurer and the libravian, the hon. secretary thanked the Dean of St. Albans for his kindly sympathy and interest in the assogiation's work, and concluded by asking the members to lake an inspiration from that meeting. 'Would it mot be fitting,' he said, "to regard this meeting as an association dedication day, a day on which we dedicabe ont sepvices as bollringers in the House of God for anthener year. Jet us seo to it that our reegnition ns churehworkers is rever forfeitent by any indifierence, and by our Claristian sfanderd of living, and efliciency in our bellringing, prove to the world "that old things have passed away, and all things hawe become new." Lastly, I would add my personal tribute to all those who havo Leaped to uphold the traditions of change ringing in our county. RATAGES OF DEATH WATCH RE1MTLE
The Dean of St. Athans, in moviag the asloplion of the report, said he had noticed that bellringers seemed to live to a great age, and added that he thought that bellainging mast have something to do with it. He referred to the 'gvages which tha dealh watch beotle had done in St. Albuns Cathedral, and arldad that they were fortamate to have dome so lighty ont of such in expensive and anxious (riul us the last six nombins had been. He impressed apon his listeners the irnportance of having their towers inspected without achy to sco wheher old timbere were what they sement to be, or clecrycd pieces of wood, eaten awry by the tretle. Hos added that they lad been fortunate to save in the Calhedmal timbers that were erected when the tower was huit in 1066. Continuing, he said winging had a tremendous educalional vilue. Ringers hnd to possess accuracy, concentration and perseverahee, and what three times malities could they want, lie asked
The cleotion of oficers followed, when MLr. F. J. Genve, of Tring, wha appointed president. The hon. treasurer and hom. secretary were both re-glected as also was Mr. (2. Debenlana as lon. librarian. The district secretaries for the Northern, Eastern, St. Albans, Watford nad Western Divisions wero all re-elected.
The Hon. ## RESTORATION WORK AT SADDLEWORTH.

## BELLS IN A 'NO-MAN'SLAND' GHENE NEF LTEE,

Saddewortlo, a place famons in the duys that are wo more and an ureua for former six-bell contests, was the stene of renewed activity on Suturdny, April Ath, when the restaration of the hells was celelrated in traditional style. The special service was very well atLemied, and the Tural Dean of Oldham, Camon A. R. Mackintosh, dity dedicateri the bells at a setrice conducted by the Vioar, the Rev. W. Hudson.

Despite tho uncertain weather anl tho position of tise caurch, mitny visifor's, including Mir. J. P. Fidler, of Lougloborough, joinet with the Saddleworth wien in the pleasures of the day and enjoyed theuselves to the 'full.

The bells are a peal uf eight, tenor weighing approximately 11 cwt . Flio back six werc cast by Rudlanll in 1781, and these were bugmented by Lwo trebles by Mears in 1884. A wonderful transformation has taken place in their tanal effect and carrying power, the filsenoss in tune daving been corrected by the 'Taylor' syatem of taning. Tho old timber franne was builb in two levets, and for many yenemada stranuote efforts to muke ils eseape from the tower when ihe bells wore rusg. Al iast its wishes thave been realised, but it made a most ignominous descent from the town; whether by design or' accident, if remained in the clurchyatd to witness the triumphant entry of its guccessor, a monster of iron and steel, which now gits sutigly in tho tower, biting it like a glove and all on one level. At the call of the belle the new frame acts as the true geatleman it is, so liat the former, vestilendent in their wew rig out, ean show off at lheir best without fuy andecessary coaxing. Tho ring in the tower is now or treat, the haniling of the tolls is 'it, and their sound in the ringing chamber is ideal-two combinations which mate for nice - Isppilg' -and some of the six-bell 'stuff' denncustrated this jan no mean manner.
The Church tulhorities deserve every praise for the manner in which they have tackled tifis restomation, for, despite heavy financial hurdens in other divections, they krnvely set their shoulders to the wheel and made a joh of it. We believe that Mfr Burridge, one of the waskenf, grontly interested himself in the bell geheme, and hat beon a tower of strength towisrds its fulfilment. Great thagks are due to him ank all thase who assisted in attaining sucin a pplendid result. The proof of the pudding is in the eating of it, and there is no doubt thint Taylors have done this joly "to a turn, and those who ring at Saddlewarth earr do so to their hearts" content.
The original Chureh of Saddleworlli was fanded in 1200 by William do Etapleton, who made it subordinate to the mother church
of St. Ched, Rochdale, but of this nothing now remains, the present building heing a comparatively modern structure, while the tower was rebuilt some time during the midale of last contury.
'Fo reach the church, one must first ent to Uppermill, which can be roached aither by train or bus, then a nice long climh awaits the pilgrim, Like many churches in this locality, that of saldleworth statuds on ath eminance on the western slopes of the Peuniaes, placed well away from the village, whiel, alluougla it is in the county of Yorkshite, is very close to the borders of Lancashire, Cheshire and Derbyshire, thes makiag it a sart of no-man's-land. Yet it retains tho grand virtue of lospitality. A large portion of the surrounding country is in a barren state and mountainotus, which makes it a favourite spot with "hikers." The industrial part of the distrjet it well away from the church, and thus, in its immediate vicintity, the population is rery sparse, and on this further comment is wraecessiry.

Despite this out-of-the-way sifuation, the visito is well catered for, is there is a vers good "rest hotase' quite bandy. Here ibe visiting ringors were enterfained in a most excellent manner, and botween thinty and forty did ampla justice ta a "gradely" neat tea. "Hey by gum, it were champion and cost nowt!" The very best thanks of all the ringers who attended are due to the good people of Saddleworth for the excellent fare provided, and for the manner in which they received the visutors.

To Mr. Jonathan Pilling and his raerry men we extend our very best winhes, and trust they will lave very many years enjoyment with the bells of Saddleworth.

## THE STEDMAN TERCENTENARY. <br> COMMEMORATION FUND OIENED. <br> FIRST GRANTS FROM ASSOCIATIONS.

Although the actual details of the selheme for the restoration of the bells of St. Benediet's Church, Cambridge, in commemoration of the tercentenary of the birth of Fabian Stedman, have not yet been setted and consequently the cost is not yet known, it was felt that, with so many of the annual meetings of associations being held at Easter, the opportunity ought not to be missed of bringing the general idea of the commenoration to elye notice of these gatherings. A tentative appeat was therefore addressed by the editor of 'The Ringing Wold, to those associations who were holding their annand meeting, and, wherever it was discussed, it met with widespread approval.

The circular, in asking for a provisional grant, pointed out that the cost might be in the region of 6350 , so that it would need the fullest support of the Fxercise to catry it to a successful issue. It was added that the general outlines of the restoration proposals hat the support of the Rector of St. Benet's and his churchwardens, and also of the secretary of the Society for the IProtection of Ancient Buildings, and further that the Rector had given his promise that, should the bells be restored, reasonable facilities will be given for their use in the future-

The result of this first tentative appeal has been most gratifying and encouraging, the following sums laving been actually or provisionally voted:-

## BELFRY GOSSIP.

The two treble bolls which are to augneut the riug of aighe at Isleworth, Middlesex, are to be cast to-day at the Whitechapel Foundry. Thte dedication will probably take place next month.

The bells at Ashbourne, Derhyshire, a ring of eighe, are to be tehung in rew framework by Messrs. Mears and Stajnlank, who have retuod the four bells th Kingsone, Somerset, and augmented thent to six.
It is now said flat the peal of Stedman Cutors at Beddington on March Rlst was rung by only aine and a lalf secretaries! Sooner or later, we suppose, we slall get to the truth of this affair.
Twenty years ago to-day the Treble Bob Maximus record was set up at Ashton-under-Lyne, 12,240 being rung in 8 lts .39 mins. Tho tenor was rung lyy Mr. James George.
To-morrow is the anniversary of three long peals, 12,006 Grandsirs Caters at Painswick on April 18ilh, 1737, 13,440 Double Norwich Major at Ronforel in 1894, and 17,824 Oxford Treble Boh Major at Heptonstall, rung in 10 hrs .51 mins., in 1927.

April 22nd is the anniversary of two other memarable peals, 15,227 Grandsire Gaters at Cheltenham in 1889, and, the longest length nver rung by one set of men, 21,363 Stedman Caters at Appleton, which occlpied 12 hiss. 25 mins. in 1922.
Who holds the record for being first out of the belfry after as peal? A West Country ringer was twice beaten in one tay on, Easter Monday, ald atmitled Lhat on only six ocensions had he ever friled to be out of the belfry first. As on three of these oceasions it was by the same ringer, we would suggest ihat the laiter is the record holder. If you want to know who he is, nsk the ringer of the treble in the peal at Puctifast Abbey lnst October.

## THE COLLEGE YOUTHS, 1750-1788.

BY J. ARMIGER TROLLOPE.
II. BENJAMIN ANNABLE.

The story begins about the year 1750 . For more than a hunclred years the Society had been the foremost in London, perthaps in England. Founded. in 1637, at a time when ringing was a fashonable sport, its members comprised the social and intellectual aristocracy of the Exercise. This is not just the exaggerated runour of later ages. Among the two hundred and forty-three members between 1637 and 1700 there are one lord, nine sirs, six esquires, two Doctors of Divinity, two captains, and one colonel.

During the closing years of the sevententit century, method ringing, as we know it now, became common and in the early years of the eighteenth century people began to ring peals. Which band it was that first rang five thousand changes we do not know, but the first true peal was accomplished at St. Peter Mancroft, Norwich, in 1715, and it was quickly followed by others in different parts of the country. In London the first peal was rung by the London Scholars in 1717 -one of Grandsire Caters at St. Britle's, Fleet Street.

The College Youths did not ring their first peal til? January 19th, 1724, but it was one of Grandsire Cinques (Note 4), and they quickly took the lead in peal ringing and held it for several years. This predominance was largely due to one man.

Benjamin Annable was born in $17 \mathrm{O}_{3}$ and joined the Socicty in 172 I in his nineteenth year. He soon made his inlluence felt. He neither composed nor called the first peal, but in the next month he called a peal of Grandsire Caters at St. Magnus', and from that time he was the recognised conductor of the Society. He called the next seventeen peals, and out of a total of sixty-four rung before his death he took part in all but ten, and called all he took part in except four. His ascendancy was dite to his great ability as a ringer and composer and to his masterful personality.

Jasper Snowden prints a letter which throws light on his position and reputation among the College Youths and ringers generally. Dr. Mason, of Cambridge, had written to Norwich asking for subscribers for John Holt's broadsheet, and in reply John Webster says that the Norwich Scholars will not do so because ithat ingenious Ringer Mr. Annable's not Encouraging of it, had he Approved of it, his influence on the Colledge Youths would have been sufficient to have sent it to the Press without any Further Subscription.'

And the following is another rather similar incident. On January 12 th, 1752 , the Easterr Scholars rang at St. Margaret's, Westminster, a peal of a melhod they called Eastern Bob Double. It was the composition of Joseph Prior and is the same method which Shipway printed as Double Court Bob Major, but with second's and seventh's added. Henry Hubbard gives it in his book as Double Yorkhire Court Bob and as his own composition. The Eastern Scholars were very proud of their peal and their method, and claimed -(with reason) that it was very musical.

But underneath the entry in their peal book they added this couplet-

> ' Inparalleled for Musick tho' derided
> By B-n, who tells us-'Tis lopsided.

This is very interesting. Prior anticipated Shipway by sixty years; both in his method and his rule for double methods; and Annable is insisting on the need lor symmetry which has only of late years been aceepted by the Exercise as a whole.

Annable was not elected a Steward of the Society lill he had been a member for sixteen years, and was hot made Master till he had been a Member for twenty-one years; which shows there were many older men who clained precedence at the social meetings and the annual dinner. But in the tower he wats the recognised if unofficial leader.

It is hardly likely, however, that his position was not sometimes challenged. In a/730-1 we find some signs of dissension. John Cundell called three peals and Laughton one, in none of which Annable took part. Annable, however, wąs soon back again as leader, but from that tine there were occasional peals in which either he did not ring, or let someone else call. Probably his masterful manner did not agree with the younger ringers, and Cundell, likely enough, was his rival both as composer and conductor. Evidently, however, he was not big enough a man.

There was only one ringer at that time in London who could be said to be in any way Annable's equal. That was John Holt. Holt was leader of the Lnion Schotars, a man inferior to Annable socially and in education, but probably superior intellectually; and between the two there was kicen rivalry ant no great amount of hove lost. For some reason or other, coolness arose between Holt and the Union Scholars. Osborn suggests it was because they did not book his peal of Grandsire Triples rung at Westminster in 175r. Anyhow, he was invited 10 join the College Youths, probaily by the Cundell party, and as a rival to Annable. He joined them in 1752, and in that year alled two peals of Grandsire Caters for them. Annable rang in nether.

IMPROVEMENTS AL' A LANCASHERE TOWHR
The ring of six bells at St. Gutbbouts Parish Clurch, Falsath, Lanes, hawe heen recsst, wilh the adnlilion of some 4 cwis of rachat, into a most musical ripg perfectly tumen an tha five-tome laminotain principlo, and were redudicated on the day before Eastar. 'The cogt of the bellg las been Lusne by ibo Rectar, the Rev. E. L. Hialhel's in munnoy of luis brother, wha was killed ut Ypres in 1917 . In addition to the belf restuletions the old alouk hous boen ropaireal and augmentod to strike lhe Westminstex quarters, a new tume playing madine installed, und the dial restomed, this being the gith of Sit Wroth and Lady Lothbuidge, tho latter lyeing the deughter of the Inte Cumon Blundell, iou mamy yearg the laved men respected Eectar of the parish. The old elock is almos unique of its kind, laving a pendiulum 15. feet long, suspended ab it distance from the clowk itself and connected by st thin imon ber lo the escaperment.
The rededication of the bells aud clook was pertormed by the van. Abchdeacan Fowson, of Warriugtou, sssistod by the Rector, Rev. E. L. Matler, Rev. 1r, Haycs, of Melling, the curate of Ralsall (Rev. Leslic Hatty, Mr. A, B, Service (licenscd 3ny render), ole. trhas servied commonced at 2.45 p .m., and just before 3 p.m. the thehdeacolt, clorgy and choir proceeded to ibe bower, where tie wardeus reguested tho Arelideneon to dediende the gifts. Tho nctini teremouy was just conplatod whent the thentritul Wratminster chimes wore heard, followed by ho griking of the hout and the glyying of the casillon. Plie origianl dispasition of the rope circle conld not be altered as the existing bell frame í psed again, and its space in the belfry is quite restricted. Tite ringel's, bowever, lape an akeallent circle of ropes, and are mot fin any way lampered by the mochanieal arditions jur the kower.

The anumal report of the nssociation was in circulation on Marelt 13th. ainl it is believed that this constitutes a reard for its appearHate so soon afler the end of the fimancial year.
The Master's report and the secretary's repart were unanimously adopted, as was the hoin. freasurer's statement of accounts. The Iatier was very satisfactory, showing an imerease throughout all sections.
The committec appointed to deal with future affliation to the Central Council gave their report, whicls was refered back. This arose firough the agenda of tho Central Council not having appeated in 'The Ringing World " in accordance with the rules of that hody, viz, approximately eight preeks before the meeting. All the affeials were re-clected for the ensuing ycar, except the hon, secretary, whose duties are temporny until reaffiliation to the Dentral Council has been carried ou
Tin Hon. Secretary, in asking tiat he slould not be re-elected, stated that he had done all in reason to make it possible for reaffliatim, and there was no reasons why any attompt was made that day to diarnuss the question, ay it had atready been deeided, mod probably but for the fact that the Conneit's ageada had not appearod in Acpordance with ile Council's rules, afhliation would have been established before that meeting.
All the olher business was quickly disposed of, and a donation of es 3 s. was voted to the Siedman Jercentenary F'und.

## KIDSGROVE BELLS RECAST.

## ROON FOR T以O TREELFS.

After recasting and rehanging by kessrs. J. Taylor and Co., of Loughbornugh, the six bells of St. 'Mamas' Chureh, Kidsgrove, near Stoke-on-Trent, have been rededicated. The betis were originally instalied soon after the accession of Queen Viclaria. They have now passed ouce more through the furnace, and lave been vehung in a cestiron frame of steel girders, with space left for two trebles. The whole of the money required for the work was raised before the rlerlication service.
'Ihere was a large attendance at the carmony, the service being conducted by the Vicar, the Rev. F. C. Llewrellin, and the rodedinption performed lyy the Rural Dean of Newcastle (Rev. J. H. I. Fdwards). Immediately afterwards, the bells were rung by the locrl ringers, aud the Doxologr follawed. The sem mon was preachedt hy the Rew. E. W. Faclmen (Vicar of Cobridge), who spoke of the important part beits had played in Fnglish Clumerh life from the sixth eentury. Mr. J. P. Fidler rephosented the founders at the service. ## OLD HALESWORTE RINGER'S DEATH.

## A WRINGTON BELL RECAST

PMPROWEMENTS IN A FAMOUS SOMERSET TOWER
The fifit bell in the peal (the treble in the old six) at wrington, Sonerset, had for some time been cracked in the crown, and was very dull in tore compared with the others. The bell has now been recust, ankiug a big improvement in the penl. The new bell is a perfect splice with the others. Visitors to this glorinus lower will recall the excessive volume of sonnd in the ringing chamber, which is immediately below the bells. This has now been cured by titting a readening eeiling and sound absorbent material, while movntule hatehes bave lmen filted in ilie weight shatit. The soumb inlite ringing chamber is now all lhat can be wisheol.
The cost of the work hats been borne by Mrs. B. J. Marshall, of lierce Fay, Wrigton, and her brobloer, Majov J. J. E. Hesse The local ringers atso tade a substantial contribution towurds the cost of the sound deatening.
A bronze inseription plate at the foot of the tower reconds the rechsting as follows:-
"The 5 th bell in the peal of tell was recasi A.n. 1931 as the gift of Rose Ethilend Marshah and John Harley Eridges Kesse to the loved and hononred uemory of Lient. Col Johm Valentine Hesse, J.P., late 58 h Regt. Eoot, and lis wife, Fllen Medilie (Bridges), also Edward Dowell Marshall, M, A., I. E.S., late lum-
cipal, Kangoon College, J3urma, of Pierce Hay, Wrington, and son-in-law of the above. 1890-1927."
On Easter Monday afternoon the hells were reopened by the loeal band, assisted by Major Hesse and Mr. A. A. Hoglics, and the riugers were afterwards very kindly entertainen to tex ats the Golden Lion (of happy memory) by Mis. Marsiall. The loeal ringers are very enthusiastic, and are io be congratulated on the good progiess they have made in change rimging-
