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## RINGERS' MAGNIFICENT EFFORT

After nearly eleven months' work we are approaching the constummation of one of the most interesting events in ringing history. Next week the Exercise will celebrate the tercentenary of the birth of Fabian Stedman, and will mark the commemoration by the dedication of the work carried out at St. Benedict's Church, Cambridge, for which it has so readily and generously provided funds. Never before have ringers collectively attempted so ambitious a scheme. A Saxon tower in danger of disintegration has been restored and rendered safe for, it is hoped, centuries to conme; the bells on which Stedman learned to ring and the frame in which they swung even before his days have been made once more fit for service; indeed, it is not too much to say that never in the whole course of theil history were they so well hung as they now are, with all the modern engineering skill which is to-day employed in the craft of the bell hanger. It is a truly great undertaking that has been carried out, and one that is worthy of the fraternity to which we all belong and of which Stedman has been and will remain one of the most conspicuous figures.

Few of the great worthies among ringers of the past have ever had a tangible memorial raised to them; indeed, except in name, there is little left to remind us of who or what these men were. They lived their day; they made their mark upon the art, and, departing, have been almost if not entirely forgotten. Stedman was among the earliest pioneers of change ringing. What was known of the art before his days was little enouglh, and had it not been for his efforts to preserve and expand the knowledge that then existed, who can say how long its development might have been delayed? Stedman himself, when he wrote 'Tintinnalogia,' tells us that he did so in order that what was known might not be lost and obscured, and but for his labours little might have been donefor quite another century. The advances which grew out of his work for the art began to manifest themselves itr various parts of the country, and while peals, as we know them, were not rung until after Stedman's death, it was the stimulus which he gave to the science and the foundation which he laid and upon which his successors worked, that eventually enabled the carly ringers to set up new landmarks in the art. Despite all this, however, Stedman might have passed out of memory, as many others have done in the passage of time, but for the fact that his name remained associated with onc of the many methods which he produced, a method which, with the exception of Grandisire, has proved the greatest attraction to ringers for generations, and is still regarded as the high-water marle in odd-bell ringing.

Fabian Stedman has, happily, never been entirely forgotten, and is now to be permanenty commemorated at the clurch with which he was for long actively associated, where he was not only a ringer but also parish clerk, and where his interest in ringing developed into an enthusiasm which was fraught with so much benefit to the Exercise. Ringers of Great Britain, Ireland and overseas have risen magnificently to the opportunity which this tercentenary year has provided, and a great scheme of restoration has been carried out. The utifortunate delay, which was no fault of those responsible for the work, may interfere somewhat with the size of the gathering at Cambridge next week-December is not as inviting as September for an excursion-but the national character of the celebration will be in no way impaired, for many who cannot visit Sledman's church will join in the commemoration by special ringing on their own bells, and thus throughout the country Stedman's memory will be fittingly honoured.

The architect was bis nephew, Sir Clristopher Wren.

## PETERIOUSE

Tlue first college founded in Canbridge (1281) still retains some of ite primitive buildigs. It shows by wlat steps the first colleges ardived at their familiar quadrangular arrangement. At first the fonders provided only that which was indispensable, viz., rooms for sleap and work, a charch for prayers, and a hall for meals. Ar ordinary dwelling house supplied the first, n parish church the second, and the third had usually to be buift. The founder of Peterbouse (Hugh of Balgham, Bishop of Ely) first placed his 14 scholars and their anaster in two dwelling houses, and when lie died he bequeathed 300 marks to his scholats, who willa the money bought a piece of ground behind their house and 'built thoreon a handsume hall" and butiery. The norlh side of the quadrangle was noli begur until 1424, no the west until 1431.

## A NATIONAL COMMEMORATION.

In making the commemoration a national one, it is hoped that wherever possible sperial ringing will take place on Saturday afternoon, December 5 th, so that the bells of the whole country will join in the celebration. If the ringing cannot take piace then, it may still be possible to arrange it for some other day, but, whenever it takes place, public emphasis will be given to it, if, as already suggested in these columns, an announcement of the purpose of the ringing can be made in church on the preceding Sunday. To assist ringers in "prompting" their incumbents, the following brief facts can be used. The paragraph might be cut out and handed to them:-

Pahian Sicalman was one of tlie grentest flymes in the early history of change ringing-a purely English mot, practised to-day in thousends of chareh lowtirs in this country. He was the antlor of the first bonks on the subject, and by his labours in this direction laid the foundation upon which ringers in succeading years bave built up the art and developed a highly fascinating scimec.
Stedman is said to have been born in or mear Cambridge in 1631, fund leant te ring at St. Benodict's Charch in that town at a time when clange ringing was in its infancy. In 1668 lie produced the first hook ever written on the subject, and called it "Tintiumalogia." In the few vears which elapsed before his second book-'Campanalogia -was pablished in 1G77, he lad made great advances in his investigations and opened up entirely ncw ground. Change ringint is slome by "mothod,' and some of the methods which Stedman produced are largely practised to this day, one, bearing his own name, being innong the most widely rung of all.
Ort Saturday. December' 5th, the ringars of England will celebrate the tereonfenary of Fahian Stedman's birfl. By firds, amounting to nearly E500, subscribed by the ringers of Great Britain, Ireland and averseas, fle bells ant tower of St. Benedict's Church, Cambridge, have bucn restorcd. The tower was built in pre-Conquest days: five of the six belis are those on whicln Sledman limsolf rang. Ringers from all paris of the country will ashemble at Cambridge for thio comimemoration, and the work will be dedicated and a memorial andet tuveiled at a specint service
At the same or ather convenient time ringers elsewhere will join in the ermmemaration by special ringing an the bells of their own churches.

## GUILDFORD DIOCESAN GUHLD.

## SUGGLSTED DIVISION OF GULLDFORD DISTRICT.

Gabalming Chutch, with its central tower and lofty spire, las a beautilul getting, as it nestles, with the quaint old-fathioned streets of the little Surrey town, in al naxrow valley whero the River Wey runs between the steep sloulder of the hills. For some years unt recently, lowever, the seting of the bells in the tower had been anything but benutiful, and viley had been no altraction to ringers. Ahout a couple of years ago a meeting of the Guildford Liocesan Guild ati Godalming priviled the opportunity for calling alteution to the much neerled restoration, and it is a matier of much gratifieation that this has now lieen carried out. The finme has been strengtlened and the bells quarter-turned and relhung with uew fitlings. The work was done by Mr. IR. White, of Appleton, and the Guild had the first opportunity of ringing on then on Saturday. A board in the tower says the bells were recast by swaine in 1772, but it eould only have heen parl of the ring, for there are still bells in the tower cast hy Thomas Lester in 1740 . The first recorded peal on them was a peai of Grandsire Triples in 1775.
Saturdas's mreting of the Guildford Dislured of the Guildford Diocesan Guitil was well nttended, members being present from Aldersloot, Chiddingtold, Cranleigh, Farnhorough, Godalming, Guildford (Gathedral and S. Nienlas'), Haslemere, Scale, Witley aud Woking. "「ise anstomany service, at whiels the singing was led by organ and choirboys, was held, and afterwards a compuny of ower 30 sat down to teat in the Cluwel Room.
The Viear (Canon G. S. Richards) was thanken ty Anmiral T. P. Wralker for the service and for the use of the hells aind congratulated upon the restoration that had taken place. The Ficar said tho work lad beer minds possible parlly hy a bequest, and they were very glad lhat the hells were now its good order agatin and also that the seventh bell had prownt not to be cracked, as was suggested it might be when attention was called to the condition of the bells when the Guild last net in Godalming.

Admiral Walker presided over the business meting which followed, wher noninalions were received for the officers for mext year. Far Ringing Master two names wore proposed, Messer, W. R. Melville aud C. E. Smitht for district secretary, Mr, G. L. Grover: for district quditor, Mr. C. Hazelden. Thero were no fewer than eight moramations for the two places on the Executive Committee. Mr. S. Marshall was renominated as the hon. meabers' fepresentative. The elections take place at the anmasl meeting in the new year.
It was reported that a sugeseded division of the district lad been butught befort the Exceutive Committee, and would be again digmusted at their mext meeting. The members were asked to give the matter their ronsideration su that some resolution of guidance to The committe might be passed al the annual district mecting.
Ou the molion of Adminal Walker, a manimous resolation was phased expressing the hope that the Mascer of the Guild and the general hon, secuetary would continue to hold office for another year.
A rote of thanks to the chairman concluded the neeting, and further ringing afterwarls look place in the standard and Surprise methods.
