## A VALUABLE COMMITTEE.

The Central Council fills many useful purposes, but none more than in the service it is able to render through the Towers and Belfries Committee. This is one of the Committees which is active throughout the year, which is the buttress against the die-hard antiquarians and whose intluence has probably preserved bell engineering from being largely overridden by old-fashioned but powerful opponents of modern bell hanging practice. It was this Committee which, by the technical skill and knowledge of its members, brought about considerable modification in the ' official' 'views of the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings and led to a useful understanding with that body, whose influence, either direct or indirect, carries great weight with ecclesiastical authorities when it comes to dealing with ancient towers, bells and frames. Moreover, the Committee's ability to advise is becoming more and more widely recognised outside the Council and the services which it is rendering in the cause of ringing cannot be too highly valued.

The Council itself gets the benefit of the Committee's labours in the reports which the members make of cases in which they have been specially concerned. For instance, the President's own report at Plymouth was instructive as well as interesting. In the case of Boston Stump he showed how abnormal difficulties coutd be surmounted, even to the extent of raising the bells twelve feet higher in the tower-a procceding which, without the support of Mr. Lewis' expert technical knowledge, would have been looked upon as a step courting disaster. In the other instance cited, he explained in quite simple language what energy is wasted in ringing badly hung bells. It is quite astonishing how much effort, which ought to be unnecessary, has often to be put into the ringers' task, and if the real facts in terms of foot-pounds concerning badly going bells could always be brought to the notice of church authorities, ringers who have cause for complaint might perhaps get a little more practical sympathy.

Since the Towers and Belfries Committee was established technical knowledge of strains and stresses set up by moving bells has been vastly increased, largely through the investigations of Mr. Lewis, and this knowledge is gradually having its effect upon bell restorations. Had it not been for the action of the Council in setting up this Committee and keeping it in being there would have been no really expert authority at the service of the Exercise either to combat the retrograde infuence of antiquarians or to widen the knowledge of ringers on a matter which, after all, is not only vital to their interests, but in many (Continued on page 382.)

## DEATH OF PONTEFRACT'S OLDEST RINGER,

LAS'T IINK WITH FORMER GENPRATION.
3t: John Garler, a fine old Pontefract character, died on Snlurday, Hay 28th, at the age of 76 years. He had been in failing healith for some time.
Ahr. Carter commenced his ringing career at All Saints' Churolz on the old ring of six bells, and joined the Forkshire Association in 1883. Afterward he joined the Pitrish Church ringers, among whorn, for many yemre, le wha a tamitiar and respected ligure. Though age anil failing feallu hegan to tell its tnle, lo was very reluctaat to asisp tilsging, and did not do so until the end of last year. For some Lime it bad been dillicult for him to maunt the sleps to the belfry, much in the regret of his follow-ringers.
During his long carcer Mr. Garter had seen All Saints" bells augmonted from six to eight, and the Paribll Chutch bells frou eight Lo ton
Hi. was a most reliable rimger, and had ring 23 peals from Minor 10 Royal. In is tho last of the Pontefract tingers who rang for Quen Victoria's Jubilen in 1887. His interes it ringing remained to hie and, and hes wata sit with his house door open and listen to the leells of the two churches, and fin the event of any bad striking the hanki concerned would know about it me they passed his hause.
[3: Lrade, Mr. Carter was a markot gardener. He could tell graplac stories of fow, in his carly years, he worked havei ull dey in lus lields as at grower of heorice and vegetabics. After "bodding" his horses, he would go to bed at eleven ocloek, and on three or foul mornings each week he wottd be up cearly to start for Leeds with his horses and waggons at 3.30 or 4 . He trather hemoaned the fact that the present generation wonld net lisye this kind of work as it was too hard for them.

## BELLS OF THE BICESTER DEANERY.

INTERESIING ADDITION TO ANTIQUARIAN RECORDS.
An interesting nddition to bell 'histories' has just been produced by Mr. Frederiek Shitripe, of Litunton, who has written of the church bella is his own deathory of Bicestor, Oxoin, and in daing so has appronched his subject moto from the tingers point of view than lave the authors of sinnlar bodk covering other areas. In Hddition to the antiguarian and historica! details, Mr. Shatp has incorporitod in his work records of peals and other ringing performances, athd alfo the weights of the bells, so that his book is of especial interest to ringers. It is aklmirably produced, with the number of illustrutions, ant as twonty-uine parishes tur the deanery contain berween them good examples of the tounders' art from the thittentis century to the present time, the author had excelfent material to work upon, and has not failed to make full use of the opporturity.
One of tho oldest bells in the country is at Cascrsfield, in the Bicester Deanery. It is an early thirleenflecontury bell, and after something like. 700 years of service hamgs inc an ank frame with all its fittinge, on the ground floor of the belfry. Its shape is very primitive, being extremely long-waisted ant athight-aided. The bell is cracked, due to the clapper having worn a fuge hollow in the soturd bow and to tho neglect of those in wathority in lieving it quarter turned until it was too late. "Dle bell was the giftiof Hugh Gargate, who died some time before the year 1219. This and a number of other ancient bells of antiquarian interest are fully described.

The inteduction to Mr. Slarpe's little volume provides some interesting notes on the carly bell founders who operated in tho district, rud he supplements his work, not only by details of some of the ringing which has been done in the deanery, but also by notes on the uses and customs of bells, a valuable fifila article on the restoration of bells and their jittings, and other general intormation which goes to matre tho volume one of the musi useful as well as interesting books of its kind.

Cook 3, F., Gleaves 4, F. Warrington 5, F. Dencli 6, E. G. Hibbins (enoluctor) 7, J. W. Whad 8. There was excellent ringing for 2 lirs. 40 mins., when an intimation was received from Rev. Father Marshall that the bells must stop owing to illness neal the church. This was a big disappointment, as it would lisve been the first peal of Major ons tho bells. Only ane peal has ever been rung on this very fime ring, the tenor of which is 32 cwt. in C-a peal of Stedman Triples in 1904 conducted by the late Mr. F. l'itstow.

At any rate, they had produced a weport, whet was printed in "Tho Ringing World." Since it was published their attention had been privalely called to tha fact that tho defujtion of a plain lead, in particular, did not exactly cover the cuse of the Litile and Alliance methods. He knew that when the question was liret mentioned these methods were referred to bat he must confoss be thought they were only referred to as as illustration, that apparctily what was really desired was that they should alter the definitions in some form or other to meet the case. The committee ladid considered the maiter since it was brought to their notice, and what they proposed to the Council was not to alter the definitions themgelves those definitions were general statements of the priteiple of thange ringing. If they would laok on page 22 and following pages of ' Rules ithd Decisions' they would Eee there were several "notes" given upon the definitions, and they thought the amondment might be made by an addition to the "notes.' The delinitions were of a more permanent elacacler than the notes, mad the less they altered fhers the better it would be. On page 24 there was a note which dealt with this very point. It gaid: "Methods are formed fronı Principles in iwo ways. This is not to be taken as limiting method builders to the two particular plans here described, lut ns $n$ statument of fact covering all exisling methods, which shomed inst ise Methods Conmitice of those early days had the foreaight to soe that the methods then in existence were cot likely to be the only nelhods that wore ever going to be rung in the Exercise. What lhe comanittec were inclined to suggest was that to that last strtenent in the nole there might bo adued something to meet present developmenf: The committiee suggested the following praliminary form which members could eongider and which could be inaily adopned or turned down, as the case might be, at the neat meeting in London.

An ithustration of this statement is to be found in the Jittle
and Alliance methods, which have come into prominente of lave years. Ir appearance then form places then oulside the deliniion ol Plain und Bob leads given above, but, properly speaking, they are in logical succession of such methots as Hob Major.

Thus a Jittle melhod is one which follows the rule, except in se fine as this is qualified by the restriction of the Hunt to fewer places than the mutmber of bells employed.

An Alliance method is one in which the Hant has a composite path comprising portions of more than one primejple.
The committee's reason for suggesting this procedure, added Mr . Powell, wis that $a$ year or wo lience someone might bring out a methorl involving further differences, and that would mean once more aldering file definitions, which were, or onglat to the, of as permanent. a character as possible. Apparent verbal differencea between mathods could he explained equally well or better by a note such as this. At any rate, the rommittee askeit that it ehould he considered in this way, with a view to its adoption next year.
Mr. J. S. Goldsanith said, as the mover of the resolution weleming the matiter to the committee, he thaught the suggestion of an adifitional mote to the definitions would probably meet the ease, and be supported the committee's recommendation that the mater should be camaidered in that form. With regard to the actual report of the committee, he askerd the Council not to adopt it, buk merely to receive it. While the report containod a good doal wilh which most of those present would prohably ayroe, and was a very inferesting zeview of the position as seen by the committec, it world, in his opinion, the a mistake for the Council to bind thomselvos to it mos their accepted view, when, porhaps, in two or three yearg' tince they might have good reason for changing their opinion all some of the stalements made. Fe adked that he was glad to sec ulat a member of the commitlee, who at the Iambeth meoting isad. Enjd the tulo Which said that onethod should have us many plait lends in the plain course as there wore working bells was a rale which was now hreaking down is view of spliced ringing, whieli was produciag a different plain course altogether,' had changed his mind. He, nud he was sare other menbers of the Cauncil as well welcomed the statement of the committee that it is really an abuse of lungunge to speak of plain efurses when dealing with 5,000 's, of which there are nover moro inan two leads alike in succession, and in which the ienor never gets below sixllis place at a lead end" (lienr, hear).

Mr. J. A. 'I'rollope said the committee were quite prepared to accept the saggestion that the report should be received and not adopted, and that it should not be taken as binding on the Council. The position of the Methods Committee was, and always had been, that it was in adquace of the opiuion of the Excreise-that was ifs

that because he had changed his wiew and he bad changed his vicws-that ereryone was going to change thcir views. He did not think for one moment that the older peonle especially were going to Do as far forward in their views as the committee, and lee was certain that thero were very few in the Exercise who would be prepared to make Lhat report their own exactly as it stood. The commities were Wercfore quite prepared that the report should be received and not aclopted as binding the Council in any shape or form to any par hicular shatement there node.
Rev. E. S. l'owell said he won] go gwen further and say the eomt mittiec would regret it if the Council did lind itself in that way. there was a great deal in the point mado by Mr. Goldsmith.

## PIEFLE'

Mr. J. Hunt said, will regard to the euggeated publication of the book on Triples Hethods, he wanted fitc Conncil to be careful and watch the publicalions of these two gemtlemen (langlater). When Ihe Council at Hereford authoriged the publication of the book uf Minor Mothods the committee asked for authority to iaclude Double Surpriso Minor melliods, and they were given lifat authority. A Chelmgford they asked for authority to inchude Morms and Puman
Doubles and lankes James' Cambinge Minor, and they were given Doubles and Bankes lames Cambridge Minor, and they were given
that aubority. He (the speaker) went, food like (laughter), and bonglit the book for $\mathrm{Sa}_{\mathrm{s}}$, and when he got the thing which these gentlemen published he found they had pat in ton pages of the same kind of piffe (laughter). The Council was not in a position to act cept the Morris or Pitman Doublea or the IJankes James Minor as trae; they could not aceget it, but tley allowed the committee to put thent in at the back of the book ass ant appondix. The rest of the ten pages the comaritteo had no auhhorily whatever to print.
Rev. E. S. Powell said no doubt they lat enjoyed Mr. Eunt's statement, but oli a point of order, was it possible lo bring up this mattor when the Cotnail roted at Chelmstord Hat these things slutuld be placed in the appendix of tite book, with, he thought, is minority of three that they slionld nat be put in?
Mr. C. T. Coles waid he felt certain many members of the council wauld not let Mr. Hunt's statement go by willout a protest. Tlu Commcil passed a resalution givjog fise committec authority to put in certain compositions, and hir. fifunt said they weat beyoad their auddority and put in a lat of pifine. He objocted to the statement that it was piffe, when that Council was aloyost equally divided ns to whether these compositions could be considerwd true. He believed if the question could be put to the vote that day the majority of the Council would be in frvour of these coupositions being con sidered true. The opinion of the Conncil zapidls clanged, but whether they were pifile or not, the connmittee were given authority to publish tiliem as an appendix. He did not think, therefore, that Mr: Hunt's remarks sloould be allowed lo go without a protest.

The Rev. It. Drake, referring to the paragrapla iti the committee's report relatisg to peals in multiple methads, said it was not clear what the committee intended. He submitted that in call multiple Surprise mellods 'compositions,' if not exactly inaccurate, was at uny rate an unusual way of exprasing il. The componitions further an were zeferred to as plain coursez; in fact, the same thing was referred to in four different ways. He saggested that the paragraph should be re-written, but how it was to the done lae was not quite sire, but be blought before they eilher accepted or adopted the. report that paragrapli should be re-written by the compilers.
The President: We are not proposing to adopt it, bnt to receive it
The Rev. H. Drake: We wnat to know what it means.
Mr . Trollope: Composition covers everything. Any arrangement changes put logether, oflier flam a plain courte. That is what it means.
Fhe Rev. F. Drale: Does it include a metinor?
Mr. Trollope: Yes, it methorl is it composition, obviously
Ihe report was then formally received, and Mr. Trollope asked the Council io antlorise the committee to mosed with the printing of the book on I'riples mathods.
Rev, F. Drako seconded, and hoped it would be rome as soon as possible, because, as Mr. Trallope lad told them, it wuld be a help to some bands of beginners.

The Rex. C. W. O. Jenkyin suggester that the question of printing this book should be freld over until they had discussed a later itens wil the agenda with regard to printiug a book on the proper way is handle a bell.

## This suggestion was agreed to.

A COLLECTION OF "JHE MEG'I" COMTPOSI'IONS WANTED
report receiped from the convener of the Variations Comanites iake any sleps in the matter. He was aftaid the other two ment. hers of the commiltee han born waiting afl the time to leat from him. Fe Hought it would be best for the Coumeil lo accept his refirement from the committee and to appoint soneone else, though ho would glady do anything to iselp, if he could, without being responsible.
The President said the Standing Commiltee had bat the report moler consideration, and proposed, in view of Mr. Richardson's resignation, to ask the committee to makr Mr. H. W. Wilde convener of the committee. He thought Mr. Witrle was the person th whom the wark shantd be enimelaml.

Mr. G. R. Newton, out of mikose motion last year the appointment of the committee arose, said that whal he would like to see was a collection of the pery best compositions in all mothads that cauld be got together. He knew the Council had got collections of peals, but Ibese wolicetions did not contain all the best campositions. What they wanted was to find somebody who had got the time, ability and enthusiasm to get together such a collection. Conductows in these days usually went for their figures to the report of some associntion. He would like to see ail the best compositions bronght together into one volume. Some asociations gave the referonces to all tho composidions rung and where they could be obtained, but others did not du so. He would also biko to sce some arrangenent by which the Exercise should know where the figures of every peal rung eould be fomm, An instance of what the value of such it system as this would be was to be found in his own tower. Recentr, when a peal at sheffelif whs recalleri as the fitst peal of Stedman Cinques in the North of England,' he ehallenged il. He was then tolu by a Sheffield riager ihat Mr. Charles Ituttersley had informed him that both the Liverpool peals were false. One was rung in 1828, the otber in $\mathbf{1 8 6 3}$. They were composed by two different men, and yet people years ago said the peals "were false. Had they been su lte did not think they would liave had the records preserved, but they had no figures to prove it. He theught it wouln be a goon thing to lave a collection of the best compositions of all methods, irrespective of wheller they were variations of original peals ar not.

Mr. A. Parkev did not agree that sum a collection was necessary. Fears ago, le said, the old ringers used to lave to collect thein owit compositions. He had a book with 500 peals of Superlatife aud Tonidon Simprise, and if conductorg of tu-day would lonk llorugh some of the old books they would find plenty of compositions to last them

The Presideat eaid that this was nather of a slightly diferent nature to the report before them, and he thought it might be referred to the Peals Collection Commitlee

The receplian of the Varitious Commitien's report was agreed to. CHANGE IN ANATYSES COMDHJTEE.
Arter plie luncheon adjournment, Miss. Fletclam moved, and Mr. Swinfick reconded, the adoption of the report of the Peals Analyses Commillec's report, which, im a slighily abridged form, appeared
'Ihe Ringing World' of May 6tl.
The Presicfent said the former names of the commitee were Sirs. Fletcher, Mr. C. Dean, Mr. G. R. Pve aud Mr. Fletcher. As Mr. Fletcher had becn elected secretary of the Council, it was only fair to allow lim to relive from the committee, and the Standing Committee mommended that Wr. G. J. Grovers name be added.

This was agreed lo, and the report itlopted.

## TOWERS AND BELFRIES

The Rev. C . W. $O$. Jenky as convener presented a report on belatif of the Towers and Belfries Committee. The committee had not lad oceasion ta meot, bui molividanly they had matterg of interest to repord. He would say something aboni a piece of work which, fliough, perhaps, not unique, might be said to come under this heading. If was the hanging of Enells in fhree tiers, each tier being independent. The condtions were an attagonal tower eight feet six inches in diameter, very much cut abaut ta allow of two ala fimber frames which were cansiderably highev in the tower than they shoutd have been, and were in a very hat condition: the tawer could be absurved from outside to rock as the hells were rung ; the bells, a ring of rix, tenor 11 cwt. sthe frames were now constructed of eastiron sections mounted on steel girders. The girders were put in in thonsultation with an architect who had worked in conjunction with one or 1 wo bolf founders in the last few years. He alsc advised as to the repaiss to the dararged masonry. The gindors epara the tower anch why altemately, and the bells are hung in pairs in this order commencing from the botom: Four and fire, temor and treble, second and third. Ald the bells aro swinging considerably lower in the tower finn formerly. The ropes come down ith a porfect circle, and the go ' of the bells is excellent. The second and thitt are a lithe bard to Lenr, hut this contid be rectifed by spouting. The tower is now steaty.
Major Hesse said during the yeer lae had been ealled in at Grayshott. Hands, where he advised that the otd hells shauld be reeast and five now heils added. This had heens done, and the yesult was a good prat of cigtit. He surveyed the tower and satisfied the athorities, with the nssislance of Mr. Lewis, that the lower was safe. He was shorlly making inspections at Croydan, Shalford and Thurstey. wir. A. Young said he had paid one ol two wisits to lowers where he hat ben called in as an arelnitect, but he could not say fries Comnittec.

## 12ELT FANGING PROBLENS.

The President said he Jad made whe or two interesting inspections, the most interesting, perhaps, being Boston Stump. As, possibly, a good nathy of then knew, there was an parl of eight bells hung in that tower. Tho paint of contate of the frane with the tower was the luelievod, 17551 . frost the gratand. Helow blat point the tower land foul very lare windown, and there was a vaulted yoof, whirh projected into the ringing thamber. The helta wern huvg imnet-
diately alove the ringing chamber, and weve very moisy. In additian thero was considerbblo movemont of ithe tower. 'lhe tower was heing repaired mainly from funds sent from Bosten, in America, and hie authorities were very worried as to what to do with the bells. Hu mado an inspection, togethor wilh Mr. Law James, in Octolocy of last yar, They mensured the speed af movement of the iawer, which, compared wilh most chureh towers, was very slew, as mote would expect from its lieight. It took slightily over is second for a complete ascillation, whoreas tha average varied from about, twalitths to three-lifthe of a second. Thero was thorefore, in this case, 110 risk of the cesilation onused by change ringing getting in 1 une with the netural oscilnatian of the tower. So math was to the enord. The existing frame was rathet interesting in that the bells hung round the walls, ane aud two along one wall, three and four ano her, fire and six another, and seven and oight molher, and each pair of bells was roped on the earne side, so that the forees of the individual beils did not add up, but eut each othor out, wheu tha bells wore rung consecutively. After considering the wholo question, he recommencled, in ordor to relievo the fower, that the werghi of the innor shoult be redneed from 28 cwl to aboul 20 cwl "ihe note of the present hell was mot worth its weight, not a moderm bell of ghout a ton would give a bettor result from a musical point of view. Then it order he make ringing easier he suggested that the floor of the prosent ringing clanmber should be raised four fect, which woult earble the ringers, more or less, to see each other. At present thay could only sec hoads and hands above the vatald. The present room was very stufty and dark, and he suggeshed that the ceiling shenuld be raiset 8 it. to give 4 ft . mone hend room. He also suggeated that the bells should be raisch l2fi. ta allow tor a dit chamber between the bell frame and the eeiling of the ringing room, so that the sound could be somewhat deadened. It sounded rather paradoxical to suggest raising the bells $12 f t$. Lkigher in the tower, whon in such eases one wished ss far asi possible fo lower them. They oould mot in this case the lowered, hecause of the raulth but he found that hy reducing the waight of the tenor the actual bending rooment an the lower would be reduced. The mownment of the tower at the point of athachment of the bell frame, 1751t. from the oround, would be reduced by 22 per cent., in spite of raising the level of the bolls, and the movement of the tower at the height af 310 ft . would be reduced by 20 per cetni. Ho had not hearis defintely whether those suggestions had been adoptel, hat he understaod liat the beds were to be rectasi hath a peral of ten, if mot lwelve, as he suggested, with a tenor of 20 cwt. Another Lower which lie liad inspected was Brailes, in Warwickshire, where there was a heary penl of six, with a tenor of athout 31 or 32 cwt., hung very high from the pround. The tower was split in many directions: one of the butivesses was free from the tower for about 301 t , with a crack of f of an inch betwoen the buttress and the tower. It was not possible to measure the movement of the tower, but the lop of the flagslaft was wagging at least 16 meles, or probably mone, when the belle were rung. There were three things that mighitt be done. At dhe present fime the bells swang enst and west, which was moth the stifest way of the tower, so that one conlel not improve matters very much by alterigg the: direction in which they swung. The bells could te slightly tucked up in the headstocks, which would reduce the horizontal forces, and the ropes could be alleved. He suggested that ihe fiftit bell should be roped on the other side of the whed to be on the same side as the tenor. The only other thing was to drop the bells in the towerThat was not very easy, becauso tiero was a clock room in the way, but they eaulu the dropped about 15ft, and it wotld be possible by that means to reduco the movement of the tower at the point where the frame was athelhed by atout, 44 per cent., while at the level of the toof the momemb would he reduced hy 2 per cent. In thats tower thure was a goon deal of movement of the frama as wall as the tower, and fin worked out ono ligure whicls might be of interest as being typical of a good many cases. The horizoninl force dae to the tenor swingug was slightly over thren tons, and if they assumed that the movement of the frame and tower combined was one-quarter of an inch, and it was eertainly all that, the chergy lose in the first half of the revolation of the bell moted be 73 foot-pounds. That, of courte, latd to the prowided by the fitger. It nther words, if la contal only pull hes sallie a foot (he ought to he able to pall it more) the had got to pult 73lus. havder than he meed do if the tower and frame werc stiff. That extra work he did might, or might not, be given hack to the bell in the sccond half of iis revolution. If not, the ringer wonld have to provide another 73 foot-pounds. Or it might he given to another bell, for instance the fifth, aud therefore the work put in by the tonor man might be lighting against that supplicrl hy the ringer of the fifth. The latiter might have to work oqually had to keep his bell up, because the tenop man was knocking t down. He quoled that to show the dasirability of having the nost rigid passible fyme and, if possithle, the mosi rigid tower. The President, in oonclasion, rgferred to a visit he paid to a chureh in one of the subnrbs of Copenhagen, where he inspected the carillonIt was very interesting, lee sad, to see the Danisla idea of bells. These hells had been tuned by turning on the outside of the wrist. Many of them liad also been \#larpened by turning off the lip. The Danes seemed to brve a food deal to learn front this country with regned to the making and tuming of bells (applause).
