SURPRISE METHODS.

Among all that has been written in the way of text books for ringers, very little has been done for the benefit of those who desire to progress beyond the eight bell limit. The reason, probably, is that those who seek to instruct in this way have felt that not only is the demand likely to be cramped by the limited facilities for ten-bell and twelve-bell ringing, but also that ringers, who have reached a standard of competence on eight bells which will qualify them to advance to higher numbers, are not as much in need of assistance as those who are struggling with five, six, seven or eight-bell methods. Until comparatively recent times ringers were content on higher numbers to confine themselves almost entirely to the four 'standard' methods, but the progress of the art has naturally brought with it the introduction of more advanced methods on ten and twelve bells and the practice of these will undoubtedly increase as the number of rings of ten and twelve bells grows and further methods are produced which make perfect extensions. And as this practice expands, so the desirability for aids for those who wish to increase their knowledge of ringing on higher numbers becomes more apparent. The first step in this direction is now being taken, and very shortly, we understand, a pamphlet dealing principally with the extension of Cambridge Surprise, but also including some other methods, is to be issued, the author being Mr. W. A. Cave, of Bristol.

That Cambridge should claim chief attention is only natural, in view of the increasing popularity of the method. It has already ousted the once much vaunted Superlative from pride of place. In the earlier days of Surprise ringing, Superlative was looked upon as the method par excellence for the ringer's attention, as soon as he got away from the Treble Bob or Double Norwich stage. Now, however, it is usually Cambridge to which he turns attention. Superlative, of course, is by no means ignored, but its practice does not expand, if peal ringing is any criterion. Twenty years ago, in a year when a total of 2,329 peals was rung, there were 85 of Last year, when, altogether, 2,082 peals were scored, Superlative Major numbered 86. Compare this with Cambridge. In 1912 there were 36 peals of Major, last year 108, so that the number had increased just three times; while peals of Royal increased in the same period from eight to 20 and Maximus from one to seven. This ignores peals of New Cambridge, which remained stationary in number, being nine in each year. This raises a point to which Mr. Cave refers in the preface to his new pamphlet, Why is it that this variation is not (Continued on page 750.)

rung more often? The answer is generally assumed to be the objection to three bells on the front lying still for two consecutive blows twice in each lead. It is a great blemish and one to which, we think, ringers have shown their objection by declining to ring the method except on rare occasions. New Cambridge has its advantages in the greater scope which it gives for composition and the possibility of avoiding that bete noir of all who have a musical ear, the second behind with the tenor, but apparently Surprise ringers generally do not look upon this as sufficient compensation for the other very undesirable feature.

TWO PART PEAL OF STEDMAN TRIPLES.

AN ANCIENT COMPOSITION REARRANGED. Modern peals of Stedman Triples so completely hold the field among conductors, and have so many obvious advantages, that the very early compositions are unknown except to students of historical peals. Jusper Snowdon did a great service to the Exercise when he preserved in his work on 'Stedman' the work of some of the earliest composers in the method.

composers in the method.

One of the celebrated early peals was that by Henry Gooper, which was first rung on June 5th, 1819, at Shifnal, conducted by its composer from the manuscript. It contained 582 bobs and singles, two of the latter being special ones, called "turning singles," at the part ends. Unfortunately, as reprinted by Snowdon, the composition is false, probably through an error in copying from an indistinct manuscript, but, as Mr. J. W. Parker pointed out in our issue of November 4th, the course-ends give a true peal in two equal parts with ordinary bobs and singles which, he remarks, it may be safely said, no other course-ends will give. Further, the seventh is undisturbed throughout the peal. throughout the peal.

Mr. Parker has rearranged Cooper's peal, retaining the same

course-ends, and this perfect two-part was rung for the first time on November 5th at Gateshead—the first poal of Stedman ever rung in two exactly equal parts with ordinary bobs and singles. Here is the composition as rung at Gateshead:—

PEALS OR PERFORMANCES?

PEALS OR PERFORMANCES?

To the Editor.

Sir,—There appear to be certain of your readers who rather resent the title 'peal' being given to a 5,040 of Minor or Doubles, and who would, if they dared to speak the truth openly, very much like to see the old terms 'Seven 720's' and 'Forty-two 120's' used again. This constant quibbling on the subject is, to my mind, nothing more than an attempt to try to influence the Central Council and ringers in general to bring back the old term which classed these as 'performances.' What are the associations going to do about it? Ringers who are interested in five and six-boll ringing would be well advised to nip the 'bud' in time and prevent this attempt from going any further by showing their disapproval of it when at association meet-

further by showing their disapproval of it when at association meetings the item 'any other business' comes up on the agenda.

According to some an extent and a peal are both the same. Mr. Willson does not say so in actual words, but from the trend of his letters this is the only conclusion one can come to! How many he will get to agree with him that a ringer who has rung 5,040 of Minor has rung seven peals, or 5,040 of Doubles, 42 peals, remains to be found out, but my opinion is very few. How would this argument apply to the band who have rung 5,040 on a number of bells above

apply to the band who have rung 5,040 on a number of bells above seven, where the extent runs into many thousands and even millions? I suppose these 5,040's are only fractions of a peal?

This subject becomes all the more interesting when one comes to find out that the men who are doing all the talking are the 10 and 12-bell men, who never ring a peal on five or six bells, and, if asked to do so, would think they were being insulted. What right then, have they to interfere with what five and six-bell ringers do? These nave they to interfere with what hive and six-bell ringers do? These men have held the roins over a lot of subjects and have driven the Exercise into thinking their way, but let there be no mistake about this Minor and Doubles question. Ringers who are against the old term being brought into use again will be well advised to get up and say so and not be content to sit still and let the 10 and 12-bell men do just what they like with them.—Yours, PEAL RINGER.

IRTHLINGBOROUGH RINGERS.

MAKERS OF NORTHANTS RINGING HISTORY.

Among the bands of ringers who have made local history, and who are still actively engaged in ringing, is the enterprising company at Irthlingborough, Northants.

Some 39 years ago, in September, 1893, the tower and bells of St. Peter's Church, Irthingborough, were reopened after being thoroughly restored. At that time a company of ringers was formed under the tuition of the late Mr. Henry Stubbs, of Raunds, one of the pioneers of change ringing in that neighbourhood. Progress was soon made, and the first peal on the bells was rung in December of that year. Other peals in various methods soon followed, and in 1896 the first peal of Superlative in the county was rung by J. Houghton, sen., J. Houghton, jun. (both of whom are deceased), A. Perkins, W. Pettitt, J. Garratt, J. Martin (deceased), A. Martin and A. Y. Tyler.


in 1897 Mr. J. J. Mawby rang his first peal, the method being Kent Treble Bob Major, and he has since rung many peals in various Surprise methods and Stedman Triples.

Y. Tyler, while on June 11th of this year another new method was successfully rung, and the name of Irthlingborough Surprise Major given to it in honour of the many excellent performances at this tower. Both these compositions were by Mr. E. W. Tipler. Those taking part in the latter peal were: Messrs, C. Newman I, F. Palmer 2, J. Ward 3, J. J. Mawby 4, A. Bigley 5, H. Chambers 6, A. Y. Tyler 7, W. Perkins (conductor) 8.

It is interesting to note that Messrs. A. Perkins, A. Y. Tyler and C. Newman have been members of the belfry during the whole of the 39 years since the restoration, and that Messrs. A. Y. Tyler and W. Perkins have rung 150 peals together. Of these 136 and 133 respectively have been rung on 1rthlingborough bells. Mr. W. Perkins has recently rung his 350th peal.

Unfortunately Mr. A. Perkins is unable to take any active part in ringing at the present time owing to a recent severe operation in Northampton General Hospital, but it is hoped he may be able to do so in the near future.

We who live in this present age can hardly imagine this England of ours without its bells and their music, but perhaps the general public does not realise the amount of practice, patience and perseverance necessary to attain such a high state of efficiency. There

At Christmas, 1902, Mr. W. Perkins removed from the neighbouring township of Finedon to live at Irthlingborough, and on January 10th, 1903, this enthusiastic band scored the first peal of London Surprise Major ever rung in the county of Northants, conducted by Mr. A. Y. Tyler.

Newcomers being necessary to keep the company up to full strength and to replace those who had 'crossed the bourne,' Mr. J. Ward joined the hand, and soon rang his first peal of London Surprise Major. Included in this peal were Mr. W. Y. Newman and Mr. F. Palmer, both of whom have since passed away.

On June 3th, 1912, the first peal of Bristel Surprise Major in this county was rung, and was conducted by Mr. W. Perkins. In 1919 Mr. G. Hewitt joined the company, and later on in 1922 Messrs. H. Chambers, A. Bigley and E. L. Shelton. Some of these have taken part in many peals, including London, Bristol, Cambridge and Superlative Surprise Major and Stedman Triples. In 1928 Mr. F. Palmer came into the band, and before the end of that year had rung the treble through a peal of Cambridge Surprise Major. Since then he has taken part in peals in all the above methods. He is the youngest member of the band.

A BEDFORDSHIRE BELL RESTORATION

PERFECT BLENDING OF OLD AND NEW BELLS AT STAGSDEN. A new Vicar, the Rev. Walter Alexander Limbrick, F.R.Hist.S., was instituted and inducted to the benefice of St. Leonard's Church, Stagsden, Beds, on November 4th, and at the same service the Bishop of St. Albans dedicated a new treble bell which has been placed in the tower as part of an extensive restoration scheme. The impressive service was attended by a crowded congregation, and the

belts were first rung in rounds by six of the Stagsden company: S. Clark, P. L. Baziev, H. Welch, T. Welch, A. Welch and L. Cook.

At the end of the service, while the congregation was dispersing, a representative band of the Bedfordshire Association rang the opening touch on the belts, this being 288 Oxford Treble Bob Minor, and in this the belts were beard to full advantage. The restoration of the bells, the consummation of the efforts of the parishioners during the past two and a half years, has been carried out by Messrs, John Taylor and Co., of Loughborough, and has included the complete reconstruction of the lower portion of the oak cluded the complete reconstruction of the lower portion of the oak bell frame and the providing of a completely new upper frame, the recasting of the second and fifth bells and the addition of a new treble bell. The medieval hells, dated 1652 and 1684, have been preserved, and these have been carefully retuned, and it was the opinion of all who heard them that they blend delightfully with the new belts, the whole peal being most musical. The 'go' of the belts can only be summed up in the one word 'perfect.' They are hung with completely new modern fillings, including cast-iron headstocks and self-aligning ball bearings. A reinforced concrete corbel course carries the bell frame, and this has greatly strengthened the tower. New oak louvres have been fitted to the tower windows, and the tower has been linewashed inside from top to bottom, producing a clean finish. The whole scheme has been supervised by Professor A. E. Richardson, F.R.I.B.A., and has cost about £490. Richardson, F.R.I.B.A., and has cost about £490.

While the needs of the modern ringer have been studied, anti-

quarian interest has also been given a thought by the retention of the 17th century bells in the peal and the reconstruction of the oak bell cage, and it can be said to-day Stagsden Church possesses one

bell cage, and it can be said to-day Stagsden Church possesses one of the best light rings of six in the county. The tener bell weighs 10 cyt. 2 qr. 18 ib. in the key of G.

It is proposed to hold a ringers' festival on Saturday, November 26th, to be followed on Sunday, the 27th, with special thanksgiving services for the restoration of the bells, at which any ringers and others interested will be welcomed. The services will be conducted by the Par W. A. Limbrich. by the Rev. W. A. Limbrick.

SOMERSET RESTORATIONS.

The restoration of the bells at Cheddon Fitzpaine, near Taunton, has just been completed by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank, and the work dedicated by the Bishop of Bath and Wells. PEALS OF MINOR AND DOUBLES.

To the Editor.

Dear Sir,—It is really necessary to ask your correspondents to be careful not to misquote other people. Mr. Wm. Wilson having written that I have stated that you cannot have rounds both at the beginning and end, Mr. G. L. Joyce repeats it, and it is, of course, accepted. Now, I have never said anything of the kind. What I have said is that only one of the rounds is counted, i.e., that at the end. I have repeatedly quoted the Council's decision that 'on all numbers of bells a true peal shall in all cases start from and end with rounds,' and I have said nothing that is a violation of that decision. Now that is clear we can get on.

cision. Now that is clear we can get on,
I am pleased to know that Mr. Severn is doubtful about his Killamarsh peal. Personally I am not. It was quite a legitimate one from the point of view that I am looking at these mixed peals. Now I wish that he would carefully read the first and second sentences of his last letter and see if he can reconcile them. I cannot do so. Then his statement, 'Thus we have four rows of rounds in these 720's' (e.g., three of the Bankes James'). Well, and why not? You have two rows of rounds in one 720, and must do so if you start from and end with rounds. Mr. Severn's trouble is that he has tried to justify the Bankes James Cambridge by counting the initial row 123456 as the first change. It is not a change at all, it is only a row-214365

is the first change.

Mr. Severn now finds himself in the same fix as several other ringers, who, having accepted this composition of Cambridge Minor-it has been rung something about a hundred times—find themselves either (a) forced to accept all other spliced and mixed peals of Minor and Doubles, or (b) finding a reason for justifying that peal and excluding the others. The latter cannot be done. Mr. Willson is at any rate logical enough to want to rule all of them out.

Personally I am also trying to be logical by admitting as true all the peals of Doubles that Messrs. Pitman and Morris have given the

Exercise, as well as Mr. E. M. Atkins' Bob Minor with only two singles, and Mr. Turner's mixed Oxford Treble Bob. The Council must find a new definition for five and six-bell peals, and it must either adopt one that will admit these compositions, or rule them out entirely. If it does the latter, it leaves associations no option but to expunge from their records all the peals already rung under these plans-hundreds of them.

I must thank Mr. Severn for showing his 720 of Oxford Treble Bob Minor in an intelligible way—others besides myself could make nothing at all of his first set of figures—but, as I stated in my last letter, since it does contain 5.6 dodging the wrong way, I fail to see why it is brought in in comparison with Mr. Turner's peal.—Yours faithfully. faithfully.

Mr. A. H. Smith may be interested to learn that the 720's to which he refers were obtained long before Rev. E. B. James produced his peal of Cambridge Minor. I fail to see how a 720 can be true unless rounds is the 720th change, for if it comes earlier on the touch must be false. Furthermore, the rounds at the beginning cannot possibly be the first change, for you cannot have any changes before you start to change.

Five-bell ringers and those who seek to expand the scope of five-bell ringing are constantly lamenting the fact that there are but ten true six-scores of Grandsire Doubles to be obtained, and it is for this reason some ringers have taken to ringing the '240's' composed by Pitman and Morris. These are not true six-scores, but in the course of 240 changes each row appears only twice. It should interest the five-bell men, therefore, to know that at least 52 separate and true 120's of Grandsire are to be obtained with bobs and singles only, and the basis on which half of these are obtainable was revealed by the peal of Triples at Eccleston, Cheshire, when Holt's Tenpart was rung, one-half backward and the other forward. The peal was described as 'Spliced Grandam and Grandsire,' but actually it was the Grandsire method with the leads inverted in the first half, a method which, years ago, was rung and designated 'New Grandsire.' The late Mr. H. W. Wilde investigated this method of ringing Doubles, and it enables six-scores of Grandsire to be rung in 52 different ways. Grandsire Doubles ringers, therefore, have a much wider field opened up to them. For their benefit, let us set out the two versions side by side.

We have given two leads of New Grandsire to show the continuation We have given two leads of New Grandsire to show the continuation of the work. It will be observed that the bell in the hunt is the bell in front of the treble (the 3rd in the plain course) instead of the bell behind the treble (the 2rd in the plain course). The 3rd's place, which in ordinary Grandsire is made when the treble strikes in 2nd's going up, is made in New Grandsire when the treble strikes its first blow at lead coming down.

The bob is made by an extra 3rd's place, but in this case it is made by the bell coming out of the hunt, the bell going into the hunt being the bell double dodging in 4-5 up.

Now a word as to how the additional six-scores are obtained—the secret lies in the use of alternative singles, both in Grandsire and New Grandsire. These singles have the authority of the Central Council's Method Committee, and are given by them for alternative use in the 'Collection.' Here then are the ways of making the calls:—

In the New Grandsire version, it will be noted, the effective part of the call comes immediately after the treble's lead, instead of before it, as in Grandsire; consequently, when making a call in the first lead, the conductor would have to say, 'Go, bob,' or 'single,' as the case

may be.

How then are the 52 six-scores to be got? First there are the well-known ten different callings of Grandsire. By using the 4th's place single, 16 more are obtainable, making 26. In the same way there are 26 with the method rung in the New Grandsire version. The original ten are too well known to need repeating, but here are the other 32 produced by using the alternative single:-


