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## SUBSIDIARY SOCIETIES.

Every territorial association, probably, has corners of its area geographically out of touch with its principle centres-spots cut off from its general activities and often, for this reason, a source of weakness rather than of strength. District meetings cone to such towers at infrequent intervals, making these gatherings in themselves quite inadequate to maintain the interest of the ' isolated ' ringers. Those who are better placed near the contres of activity do not always realise the difficulties which face those who, in such areas, try to keep the art of ringing alive and, even if they do, the obstacles to rendering practical aid are usually so great that sustained assistance is impossible. Such a posifion has arisen [rom time to time in many places in the country. In some it is just allowed, or is compelfed by force of circumstances, to drift. In others local enthusiasm finds its own way of salvation, and where that fappens it is for the good of the art, and generally for the benefit of the associations. Local organisations, with limited areas of operation, have in some cases been set up with good results, especially where their object is to supplement the work of the larger associations.

An informal discussion on the advisability of starting a new society for the benefit of towers in the Thames valley; where Middesex, Surrey and Berkshire adjoin, took place at a gathering of ringers at Eghain on Saturday. The towers chiefly concerned are in three diferent dioceses, in each of which there is an active ringers' organisation, but the geographical position of the parishes is such that some of the ringers feel they could unite their local forces to a better purpose in a society of their own. As lung as the object is to advance the art of ringing in the lowers in the area and thereby streng then the parent assoctiations such a step would be commendable-it would be, in .ffect, like establishing a new branch, not of one society, but composed of portions of neighlsouring associations-and only on these lines could it expect to receive unammons support. Nerely to establish an independent organistition, Which would break away pottions of existing county or diocesan guilds, would serve ońly a selfisl purpose, which in all probability would ultimately fail in its object. Even without a local socicty, the main object which it is loped to serve might be adequately met by a littie united effort, for it is not at all certain that beginners would wisit towers other than their own any more readily as members of a new and localised society than they to under existing arrangensents-and in this particular instance it is the advancement of beginners that is the main consideration hehind the suggestion. Where theighbouring towers,

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whether in isolated areas or not, are in the terfitory of different associations, it does not mean that they art in separate watertight compartments. The freer the intercourse between them, the luetter for all concerned. The multiplication of small societies, except as subsidiaries to parent organisations, must lead to disintegration and rivalties which, far from serving a useful purpose, would bea detriment in the long run to the Exercise and the art.

## AN ANCIENT GIFT FOR BELL ROPES.

Dear Sils,-In the course of some work comected witl economic bistrry, 1 came across the following extract from 'The Estale Book of Henry De Brety, of Harleston, Co. Northants, which I thanglat might interest some of yours readers:-

It would be finteresting to krow whether this piese of ground is still called 'Belleropest' Can anyono inforth me? Evidently they had more thinll one bell at ITallestone, even at suefh en early fiate as this.

## THE BELLS OF BOSTON 'STUMP.'

## RING OF TEN FOR FAMOUS LINCOLNSHIRE

 TOWER.The bells in the famous Lincolnshire tower of Boston bave been converted from a peal of eight into a ring of ten and will be reopened to-morrow (Saturday) evening, when the ceremony and the bells will be broadcast, not only in England but to America.

The tower, which is over 300 leet high, has teen restored and Messrs. Taylor \& Co., of Loughborough, have installed a magnificent peal of bells. Previously ringing was carried on with great difficulty, the dome of the interior of the

tower rising in the centre of the ringing room to a height which almost hid the ringers from each other, and with the bells immediately over their heads. At first here were doubts whether this unfortunate arrangement could be overcome, but thanks to modern skill in bell banging it has been found possible to raise the bells several feet, while reducing"the strain on the fabric. This has made possible the raising of the ringing floor four feet, and giving the ningers more head room, with the happy result also of modulating the sound of the bells in the ringing chamber.

Much of the money for the restoration of the tower and bells has come from Boston, U.S.A., and ringers in many parts of England will ' tune in 'to-morrow evening to hear the new peal.

Thoy were a company of septhagenarians wha refise to take the 'Jnock out ' from Father 'T'me, able betwern thent their ages adderl up to mone than 594 years, giving thenan anverage of 74 y years. This is thought to be the oldest hand who have yot rung al peal-and it was a fine peal at that. That, however, was only to be expected when it is roncmbered that as far ns con be ascertained five of the band lave kept no accurate list of their performancest ther have rang 3,718 peals between thena.
'I'he conductor was the ininntable Chatlis Winney, who, we sre tuld on reliablo authority, only apparated to open his eyes when he 'sumety n trip coning and phit it right betore it really lappened. Tllera are few more active brains anomg Fiving stelmati conductors than that of this wonderful septungenarinn.

Atter prayers and the ate of dedication, members of the lacal compatiy, assisted hy soma of the Ultoxeter hand, rang a sliorl tobleh, and thas the parishionets lienml the sound of bells aing oul Erem their tower for the lirst time since Juat last.
Formerly there was at very indifterent ring of six in the tower, three of the bells laving beon cast by T. Itathall, wit the filoncester Fommary, in 1774, the 5th by likward Arnolet, of leceester, in 1796. The tener land been cast by J. Rudiall in 1830. whilst the trohle was by Blows and dated 1871 . With such a mixem lot one could not expect a pertect peal, but the ring of six which formerty hung in Rorester' tower was an axceedingly noor lol inded. 'lhey have now atl hems recast inf the famous Ladghhormagh Foumbry, and sufficiant new buetal added to inctense the weiglat of the peal and to adit $n$

 in F slifu'p. From this comparison it can readily be understood how murb the ' ofw' peal is ampeciated, buil apnet from depth of tone
 from it before, and the fiecision to recast the bells and lave them made tunctul is one which ann never be regredted. The mew treble has heen givela by Mr. Camplsell, of Rocester, ju memory of his mbther, whilst the cost of the new temor was defunged by the Yiens and wirdens from the restamtion fund. The bells were rillg in the afternom, and the Vioar condmeded at spectal service, in the conrse of which thanksgiving was offered for the wark wheh had been completed. Addressing Elic congregation from the words, 'A voice crying in the wilderness' (Mattiow iil., 3), tha" Viche said it was a matior of rejoicing that aiter their silonce the bells had been reopenerl. The sonime of the bells lad been greatly mizsed by many, and to him Sumdy hath not seemed like Sunday. Ho spoke of the wrionts 'woices' of the bolls, and ill at hrief sketch of the history of Eglanm bells said that in tile timo of Eilward VI There were fout hells in the fower, the hrgest being about 12 cwb . ## PEALS OF MINOR AND DOUBLES

## To the Editor

Dear Sir, -Only on courameous man would at any time enter into an argumend with MIr. G. L. Joyce, especially when the sfutject is Minor ringing, aud us I cannol elami such a virtue I hesitate before pieking nip my pen stgain. He does, bowover, ask me a definite question, whicl, mmonis to this: 'Would I, in a peal, ring 1,440 of Spliced Wells and Louden Minor, cousisting of two extents, some rows appearing twice in one extent and some twice in the olher? I say wilhoul hesilation, yes, provided that no row appears more than twice in the whole 1,440 , ol seven times in the peal. Having by the force of logic and events found myself compelled to accept splimed and mized peals of intinor in me method, I see no reason whatever why I shankid rale ontiminer peals in two (or anore) mothods. But why introduce splicod methods into the mater? We are discusseng sploced and mixed pent eomposilions, and it does not seem to me 10 make the least bit of difference whether the composilions aro of freals in one method or two-01 at dazenz.
