## A GREAT EXAMPLE.

There have been few men in the Exercise who have filled a more useful place in it than he whom we have just lost. The death of the Rev. C. W. O. Jenkyn removes a commanding figure from the ranks of ringers, one whose passing will leave a gap not easily to be filled. It is not only in the Oxford diocese, where his work and his personality have been the mainspring of ringing activity, that the loss will be felt, but in a wider sphere. As Librarian of the Central Council he filled an office of considerable importance, but the value of his services was not so much in what he actually did-although that was no mean contribution to the welfare of the Exercise-but in the influence which he wielded and which he exercised in the highest interests of the art. Mr. Jenkyn believed in nothing but the best, in ringing as in every other thing, and he never ceased to preach that only the best ringing should be given in the service of the Church. And with him the best ringing for this purpose did not necessarily mean method ringing. 'Better to have good rounds than bad changes when ringing for service ' was one of the maxims which he unceasingly urged-it is one which all ringers would do well to adopt.

In the Oxford Diocesan Guild Mr. Jenkyn will be sorely missed. He had built up, upon the love and esteem of the members, a position unique in the Guild. He had no easy task before him when in 1909 he succeeded the late Rev. F. E. Robinson, who, master front the foundation of the Guild, had done so much by ringing performances to build up the fame of the society. Mr. Jenkyn made no attempt to copy the ways of his predecessor. He had the courage to set his course in other directions, in which, as he himself said, he could offer to the Guild and diocese just those gifts which he felt he had and which he wanted to use in the right way. It was not a simple natter, but how well he succeeded the wronderful progress of the Oxford Diocesan Guild has shown. Mr. Jenkyn never spared himself and he kindied an enthusiasn in others which was infectious. His services were ever at the call of the branches, and, if need be, of the in dividual towers, and only those in close contact with him know the time, the patience and the skill he devoted to furthering the art in that great diocese of Oxford which covers three counties.

It is for others to speak of him as a pricst of the Church, but his devotion to his work is well known to all those most nearly associated with hirs. In addition to filling his appointment as Chaplain of St. Anne's College, he gave his help in many churches in the diocese, and his Sundays were as full as those of any parish (Conlinucit on page 258.)

If every riager could be imbued with something of his keenness and cnthusiasm to give of his best in the interests of the art, ringing would reach a far higher standard, and ringers themselves becone a more catnest body than they are at present; apathy and indifference would disappear, and the Exercise would take a new lease of life.

I'le sub-comnittes appointed by the Ceatral Council to cunsider the new schedule of thles has now reported, and these linve bempuhtishost in 'The Ringing Worta.' As they will come up for disenssion at tho Contral Gouncil's anninal general meeting al Whitsutas, it may ho well to mention the three thaita ehnages sugerested:-
(1) Tite conslitution is changed in principle from a Council of individuals to a Councif of affilated societies;
(2) Reprosentabion of tervitoriat and diocsan sacieties will be in Fnturo on a definite limited mamerical besis of membership; and
(3) Succicties affiliation fees will he hased on membersinip and not upon the number of rejresentalives elected to the Gouncil.
The first alteration will place the Contrai Council in the position of being the central and representutive organisation of all ringing tesenciations, thentire which will shertgthen tho whole body of ringing asmocintions.
Thu gecond deals with the lasis of membership in connection with copresentation. This rute presents dificulties which are not, however, insurmountable, aind can be adjusted in course of time if becessary: I!to difficulty is in dual membership, but this ean be overcome, prohably, if the membership is based upon county or divcesarn residential allalifiention.
The third point is in connection with representalives. Hitherto an association, although entitled to seud more than one representative, foed anty sead one, and pay for that one anly. It is now proposed that whiber yous send your full grota of representatives to the ammal general raceting or not, the fec for each will lazwo to be paid. The incentive of every association will be, 1 trust, to send its full romplemens of representatives, but although this may be an impassibility to sarme by reason of expense, probably representatives may be found willing to go at their own chatges.
Contiming. the report referrent to "The Ringing World ': At the meefing of tise Central Council at Plymouth last year, a resolution was passed calling uponall afiliated associations to use their best endeavours to ineremse the circtation of our journal. In endeavouring to carry out this suggestion, a circular wes sent to all towers in the county, signed by onl president and myself. urging defnite action in earrying out the resolution. If the appeal meets with the ilesired stincess, the Editor has promised not olkly a better, but a larger journal. Way I appen for your support of our jourmal. [or a larger arculation would mean grenter interest arouned and definite
progress in our art. Personally, I think the chief difficulty for mary years has bean in the price of the paper. Under present circumstances it cannot be lowered in faimess to the proprietor. Might I suggest, bowever, that each Ieader of a tower personally appromehes his band upon the question, and forward the result of his enquities to the Etlitor. If concerted action could be taken, and the leader becane the dianributing agent for bis tower, I believe the circulation could be inerensed and also maintained if a reduction in price could be made possible.

THE BENEVOLENT FUND.
Bellfounders have been busy during the past year in relanging and renovating various peals. At Tring, Miss Bright, in memory of her parents, has caused the peal to be reltung in ball bearings, and the frame and other appurtenances thoroughly overhauled. ## CLOCK CHIMES.

## To the Eiditor

Sir, - I was rery glad to read in your issue of last weok that the bells of Merton College, Oxford, ave to be used for the clock chimes, and hope that this is the precursor of more ringing of these bells.

The chimes of the Oxforl clocks are many and varied, the most remarkable being those of Magdalen and the old St. Martin's tower at Carfax, the latter being a very clever adaptation of the first live bells of a ring of six, the tenor being used for striking the hour only.

But the Westminster chimes are hoard in Oxford in the old Saxon tower of St. Michael's, where there is an unringable peal of six, and are also atbempted on a set of tubes hurg in the campanile of another charch.

I quite agree that it is a pity that the Westminster or Cambridgu chimes (beautiful as they are) are so frequenlly used. In Trure, for instance, the Cathadral and the town clocks, situated quite close to ench other, each strike the Westminster chimes in a diferent kev The Cathedral lost an apportunity, I think, when its clock was installed, not to have found somenne to have composed special chimos for it, I rather welcome the old 'ting titng,' or as it strikes on the clock of the Community of the Epiphany in my parish on three little bells. Or again, what could be finer ihan those two glorious notes which sund each quarter from the south-west tower of St. Paul's?

## FUNERAL OF THE REV．C．W．O．JENKYN

 IMPRESSIVE SERVICE AT VILIAGE CHURCH．The funeral of the Rev．C．W．O．Jenkyn，at East Garston，on Friday，was a remarkable demonstration of the love and esteern in which the Master of the Oxford Diocesan Guild was held．Ringers came from many parts of England，and in such nombers that the little chureh could not seat all the congregation．
The tiny rillage of Eust Garston lies amid the Berkshive Downs， and fie contral towar of is anciont thurch rises like a proteching linlwark over the littio cluster of cottages．It was liere than the Rev．C．W．O．Jonkyn was born，and in Clis church he was baptised． Here lie tirst leamed to ving a bell and，remarkable coincidence，it wis to this church lie came on the very ray of his death．On the moming after lisater Day le visited the plate of his ehildhood and the spot which held for him so many Lallowed memories．It was hore that his hody was laid to rest，liere in the peace of the country－ side that many of his friends took farewell of lim for a time，and here，foo，wo lhink，many of those who are left to carry oll the work which he liad so long and so ably guided must have tielermined that for his salte there mash be no sluckening of effort and no dinamity of endinasastr．
Those who camo to pay their last tribute of resped assembled to the somnd of moffled bells，the little peal of gix having only the temor open at back stroke．The ehureh rapidly filted by flie eonstant stream of arrivals，who took their seats while sof music from the organ stole though the building，which still bore its Enster decora－ tions．＇Then the dhoir and clergy，Canon（ $\hat{i}$ ．F．Coleridge and J3ishop Shaw，of Oxford，in the rear of the mrocession，passed from the vestry to the matrance to mect the funeral cortoge．They re－enteret the church while the opening sentences of tha barial office were recited，and then the first hymn，＇Jesus lives！＇struck the keynote of the service．It，was a rembler of life and not of death．Bishop Shaw read the lesbon from Cormhinals xx，and tho 23tel Pallon was sumg．The other hymns wore Alleluia！Alleluia！Fearts to Reare＇n aud voices raise，and＇Praise to the Holiest in the lapight．＂Prayers were offered lyy the Rector，and lafore the cortege left the churels the＇Nunc Dimittis＇was chanted

J. Corbeth and the hon. secretary (hr. I. S. Goldsmilh). There wevo ringers present from Altersliol, Bagshot, Beddington, Crauleigln, Cruytion, Chiddingfold, Cohana, Dorking, Esher, Farnlems, Guildford (Catherdral and S. Nicolan'), Godnlrang, Haslemere, Lundon, Leatherhead, Oxford, Ottershaw, Pirbright, Seale, Shalford, Wiudsor", Witley, West Clandon, Wonersh, Woking, Worplesdon, e, e. Previous to considering the agenda the Chairman expressed itae regret of the Guild at the dealla of Admiral I'. $\boldsymbol{\Gamma}$. Walker, the late hon. reasurer. "We lonked on him, said Mr. Havrison, 'as the father of the Guidd. The meetings did nat seen the same without him. He was one of the most perfect examples of a goed old Engryst gentlemme' The meeting stoarl it silence in his memory-

Major Hesse referred to the loss to the Exercise by the death of the Rev. C. W. O. Jenkyn. FALLING-OFF IN PLALE
The anmual report referved to the opening of the Guild library in the helfry of S. Nicolas' Charch, Guthford, and stated that chief among the improvements effected in the beffries in tho diotese during the year was the completion of the scheme to add two treble belle to complete tho octave at West Chandon. Egham and OLtershaw Bells were rehung on ball bearings lyy Mesars, Gillett and Johuston, and similar work was earried out at Ashtead by Messrs. Mears and Stainlatuk. A programme of 23 diatrict meetings was carried out. It was a matter of regret that conditions in the Loalherlhead District wero hampering the work of the fiultel in that area. An amendment of the rules, recommented by the executive committee, that compounding members outside the diocose shoulia have no vote at meetings of the Guild, neither should they have the right to propose or second any motion, was defeated.

## NLW CATHEDRAL BELLS FUND SCHEME

The Hon. Secretary said, as the members all knew, it was proposed to provide at some date a new Cathedral for the diocese. The architect's plans had been prepared, and in them was provision for a peal of bells. When the buiking of the Cathedral would begin was problematicul, and whon it would be finished was more so, and the tower and bells might never he fmished in their lifetime. The executive committec suggasted that the Guild should help to provide the bells. In the course of the years that must necessarily clapse they could raise a considerable sum by puttiug awsy an annual amouni, and if they rid something towards meeting the cost of the bells might encourage other diocesan organisations to do something of the same kind for the new Cathedral. The proposal was that they should set aside a sam of money each ycar, so that when the time came for the provision of the bells thay conld say, 'Here is a sum of money for one or 'two bells.' In addition it would, he hoped, enable them to be consulted when the time came to provide the bells. An appropriato resolution had beem prepared by Mr. Grover, whicis he asked the members to adopt. This provided that the Guild should depresit ammally one guinea towards suell a trust funt, kept under the control of the Guild, and pernitted the ammal contrifitution to be varied according to circumstances.
The Clairman, in commending the scheme to the members, said it was not so much the amount of money, hut the hought lochind such an action. As time went on whey mirght be able to provide one, two or three bells. They would have sufficient funds at their command to say to the nuthorities, 'We want to see that it is done properly.
Mr. Molville seconted the resolution, which the described as a firstrate scheme, and the proposal was carricd unanimousty.
The agenda of the Contral Council was discussed, and it was decided to offer no oljection to the proposocl new rules.
There was diversity of apinion on the Minor question, hut eventually a resolution was passed by a majority that the Guild's representatives should oppose both the motions except the portion whielt proFided that a peal should consist of seven irue and complete 720 's.
The menting exprossed a tesire to continue the anuual dinners.
Major Fesse proposed a wote of thanks to the Trovost for the uass of the Cathedral ausl the bells, and to the Rector of S . Nicolas for the use of his bells. A vote of thanks was also accorded Mr. Harrison for presiding.
