## CO-ORDINATED INSTRUCTION.

It is refreshing sometines to have in the pulpit at a ringers' meeting a parson who is himself a ringer and understands the difficulties of ringers and their failings as well. Most of the reproaches which the clergy in general were, and some of them still are, wont to level at ringers have been removed. There is now no need to urge reverent behaviour in the belfry. The conduct of ringers in the tower is as seemly as that of the choir in the vestry. Neither is there the same ground that there used to be for chiding ringers upon their lack of churcligoing; although there are some preachers who have not yet realised that the old order of things has been greatly changed, and it is still common to hear this made the chief if not the whole point of the address at ringers; meetings. But if the causes for reproach have gone, there are still certain failings among ringers and certain directions in which they could do more than is sometimes done to foster the art and improve the standard of ringing, of which it is as well they should be reminded.

The Rev. R. F. Wilkinson, a vice-president of the North Notts Association and its representative on the Central Council, did not laesitate to offer some frank but kindly criticism when preaching the other day at the association's annual meeting. He was referring more particularly to the position of aflairs in his own association, but his words are true of many other parts of the country. The need of to-day is men who can teach others the art of ringing. He urged special meetings for the benefit of those who were willing to become instructors, and said there were many glorious peals of bells in England which were not rung or in danger of not being rung because there were not the men to ring the bells. What was needed was more enthusiasm for teaching among those who had the qualifications.

The Rector of Ordsall has good ground for all that he said, and he touched a further truth when he said that officials worked hard in carrying on the association, but they coulch not go into the towers and make good bands of ringers. This subject of instructors is no new one, but it is more pressing than ever. It seems to us that there is real need almost everywhere for new plans for extending the art. Tuition of ringers in the past has been much too casual to do any lasting good in other than exceptional cases. The system of instruction requires overhauling; it needs to be put on fresh footing; to every tower in which the ringers are unable to make progecss on their own account, whether it is to break from rounds into change ringing or to advance from plain to higher methods, qualified instructors ouglit to be available so (Continned on prys 27.4

that proper tuition can be given. It needs organising and it might mean expense to the associations, but it would be money well spent. Essentially it demands that the instructors should be efficiently trained and the lines upon which this could best be done might well be a matter for consideration by the Central Council. At present there is no co-ordinated scheme in existence that we have heard of for training instructors. It seems to us that there is great scope here for uscful work, which in time would give a ten-fold return. We would like to see the Council turn its serious attertion to the subject.

## BOW TENOR RECAST.

## FIFTH OF A FAMOUS LINE.

Acknowledged to be the most famous peals of bells in the world, the bells of St. Mary-le-Bow, Cheapside, London, associated by tradition with Dick Whittington, are nearing complete restoration at the Croydon Bell Foundry, and on Wednesday of last weck the tenor was recast in the presence of a distinguished company. For some years Bow Bells had becn left unrung, owing to the dilapidated condition of their fittings, and, while money was coming in for the restoration of the church and steeple, the repair of the bells themselves scemed to be doomed to long delay, until Mr. Gordon Selfridge made his generous offer to liave the work done.
At the Consistory Court, when the applicalion was made for the faculty, before the dismantling of the bells had taken place, the recasting of two, or. possibly three bells, was all that was thought

mecessary. After the bells teached the foundry, however, other hells, including the tenor, were found to be cracked, and five of them have now been recast for this reason. The three irebles lave also been recast, and the whole peal corrected jn tune. The old hells rewaining are the 4th1, 5th, 9tla and 11th.
All the bells are heing fitted with iron headstocks, hall bearings, specially designed clappers, etc., and while the old oak frame lias been retained it has been immensely sitengtlened. A massive srillage " of girders and hracing, weighing $3 \frac{1}{2}$ tons, has been fixed immediately heneath the wood framo nud scourely muchored to the tower. The frame itself has been strengthened with comer brackets in all directions, and has been altered on one side so as to improve the circle of ropes.
The tenor bell, the last to go through the furnace, is the fifth in line of suctession of 'great' bells of Bow. John Donne, a citizen, left two houses in 1472 for the maintenance of the great bell. William Copland, one of the churchwardeus in 1515-16, preseuted a great bell to complete a ring of five. Dame Dyoris Williamsom, nf Norfolk, gave $£ 2,000$ towards rebuilding the chareh and furnishing it with bells after its destruction in the Great Fire of 1666 . A smanll commitite was formed to revise and hring up to dute the rules of the assoutation.
At the ted which followed some 107 ringers and friends sat down, and tho nssociation was well represented by members from each of the cight districis: Burtoa, Derby, Chesterield, Leicestier, Loughborough, Nouingham, Peak and Hinekley, and fricode fram ns fur aficla as Bushey, Herts, London, Sheffield, Norihampten, Coventry and Devor were also weltomed.
The general meeting was presided over hy Mr. F. Denison Taylor (president), supporled by Mr. Willinm Willson (vies-president), Mr. Wme E. Whito (hon. trasurem, Mr. Emest Morris (general hanz. sceretary), Rev. Alan Chapliu (Reclor oî Colgrave, Notes), and Rev, 1R. P. Fitrow (Rector of Stoney Stantan).
The President said how pleased he was to sco such a good company prosent, aud trusted all had enjoyed their visit to Notlingham. He reviewerl the work of the mast quarter, and noted that 24 peals had been ring, which, although less than usual in number, covered a variety of methods from Donbles to Royal. They had losi four memhers by foulh-W. H. Mundy, of Lefeester, and E. Rohlins, of Bolsorer, both resident members, and W. Walmsley, of Macelesfield, and J. A. Gofton, of Whitley Bay, life members. Bishop of Ihensington (formerly the Rectar of Stepany) was the Bishop of
The Bishop preached from the lext, "They were of the same eraft." He referred to tho assuciation of Abulial and Bezaleel in the construction of the lahernaele-men of outstandiag ability at their craft, whose anames in the Ole Testament never oecturred separately. of all the links in life that of sharing the same joh was, said the Bistrop, ono of the oldest. In modem life brotherhoods of the same occupation were created through the trade unions. They had precisely the same thing within the Clburch. The Church was one great brotherhool, which had certain erafi, brotherhoods as well. Thse ringers were a hrotherhood within this bigger hrotherhood, brothers of the same ergit within the Clameh itself. Theirs was a religfous comradeship; hley were brothers of the same eraft. He wondered how many of lherr finest friendships had been made within the circle of that craft? He would like tirem to pay tribute to it that afternoon, as to the friendsinips it hat givos them in the course of their lifc. The Whishop went on to refer to the death of the Rev. C. W. O. Jenkyn, whom he lad known as claplain of his daughter's school, and had met bit ringers' gatherings in London. He spokn of his admiration of the skill which ringers exercised in their craft, in which crery person contributed his proper slare. There were certain jobs, be suid, whero it did not matter if people asserted themselves, but there werc gertain things iu which any self-zstertion just cuined the whole job. It. was true more or less of a chorr; it was truer still in the case of ringing. Was that not what life absolutely called for? Everyong paying his proper contribition to the best of his ability? Would it not be marvellons if the whele world became nationally and interonlionaly a sort of ringing team? The world cried aloud for ceam spirit. Let therr ulways, as ringers, remember their main objective. They were a brotherhood of ndvertisers of the Clautch. Let them try to do it in simple sound from the tower, but there was nothing bike influelre and persomality and character and help to bring ibe people back.
After the semmon the Iymm. "On lhe Regampetian morning, was sung, baving been specially chosen in remembrance of the Rev. C. W. O. Jenky. The serviee coneladed with an organ recital given hy Mr, Basil Ridenux, which was much appreciated.

After referring to the various bell restorations in the associationss area, the repori weat an to say that the venture of the South and West District in holding a supper and sacial at Heston on tanuary 14th of the prosent rear met with success, some 75 members and fricuds atterding. It was monfidently hoped that this function would be the lirst of many such gatherings.
3Ir. W. Weble, of the St. Mary's, Finclay, band, liad completed 57 years as a winger at that chureh, and Mr. F. Pratt bad been a ringer at St. Mary's, Eendon, for 54 yrars. Bolh these gentlemen appeared in the first 'eport of the old Middlesex Assoctation, dated 1890 , ant lind had an unbroken line of mmbership. The serviee of the assaciation was held in the Churels of St. Nicholas at noon, and was conducted by the Rector, the Rev. Dr. O. Hard man, who in his address said that every time they heard the bells, whether nournful or joyful, they were ringing out the Claristian message $A$ collection in aid of the Benevolent Fund amounted to玉I 14s. id.
The luncheon followed in the Fillage Holl, presided over by Mr. E. H. Lewis, president of the Central Council, supported by the Rector and the Rev. F. W. Hassard-Shorl, Viear of St. Luke's, Bronley, and the offeers of the association. Among the many apologies for absence was one from the late hon. seeretary, Canon F. J. O. Helmore, and the secretary was asked to coutcy, the best wishes and isindly affection of the members to Canon Helmore.
After ilse loyal toast had heen duly honoured, Mr. F. White submitted 'The Archbishop and Clergy.' He said ii was one which it was always a delight io honour nis churchmen and women and as hellringers, because from the clergy they did get such wonderful help, both from the way in which they were allowed the use of the bells for their meetings and praclices and from the services when visiting the churches. Ee ihanked the incumbents of the various iowers who hath allowed their towers to be openeit that day, and counpled with the toast the mame of the Rev. Dr. O. Hardman.
Dr. Hardman, in replyiug, welcomed the association to Chislehurst, and assured them that the clergy in the county were not only glad to welcome than to the towers for rimging the bells, but looked upon them as most raiuable assistants its the ministry of the Clurch by the service whicit they rendered. Bells were a part of the whole tradition of Churels life in the Churel of England.

Mf. F. Mitchell, lon. secretary and treasurer, presented tho ennual report and balance sheet, which showed the association to be in $\pi$ distinctly flourishing conclition.

## OVER 9900 IN HAND.

The report showed that in spite of the conditions prevailing in the country ibe association whs steadily carrying on its work and maintaining its efficiency, as was evidenced by its growth of members anal financial resources. Tho meetings, 32 of which had been held in various parts of the county during the past yent, were well attended, and it was distinctly encouraging to sec that younger members were taking up the art, and a kepmer interest in the affairs of the association. They had 112 towers in union, an increase of two over the previous seat, and the membership had increased from 1,371 to 1,411 . Feals of 5,040 and over had totalled 147. and had been rung in 61 towers. Grants from the Belfry Fond had been made to the extent of $£ 11$ to Sandhurst, Litile Chait and Woolwich. Three grants of $£ 5$ each had been woted from the Bonevulent Funds to aged and deserving members during dise year. Losses by cicath liad robbed them of two valuable menthers, Messrs. E. Barnett and E. Buesden, among many others. Mr. Barnctt had bees a member for 44 years, a meme ber of the committee for 40 yenrs, and represented the associntion on the Central Council simee 1902. The racancy on the Benevolent Committee eauserd ly his didath had been filled by the election to the committee of Mr. W. J. Jeffries. Mr. Bucsiden was at one time secretary of the Canterbury District nutl leader of the ringers at Canterbury Cathedral. To the bereaved of all who had been called to ligher service they offereal their sympathy.
The financial report and balance sheets were submitice. The halance in the Gemeral Fund was 239 13s. 7d., a slight decrease on the previous year. Altogether Mr. Player hat rung 293 peals, of which he had conducted 37.
