## THE CASE FOR JUDGMENT.

There is a remarkable divergence of opinion among ringers on the topic which has become known as "the Minor controversy' and to which the Central Council will be called upon to devote some of its time at the meeting on Whitsun Tuesday. The divergence is two-lold. First, there is the difference of view on the technical side. There are those, on the one hand, who bold strongly that nothing but the pure, unadulterated, conventional 'true and complete 720 changes ' shall be admitted in the constitution of a peal of Minor and those who, on the other, contend that a peal of Minor can be equally true and complete if, in practice, far wider limits are given to its conditions. That is the case upon which judgment has to be given. If the Council find in favout of those who ask that the old conventions shall be broken down and fresh standards erected, then they have to decide further how far beyond the old barriers they recommend ringers to draw the new line.

The points at issue are not easy to settle, but that would be no reason for dismissing the question by blindly refusing to admit anything except the ancient definition merely because it may appear to be the simplest way out. The issue has now resolved itself into this: The Council is asked to decide whether a peal of 5040 of Minor shall consist of
(1) Seven true and complete round blocks of 720 changes and that alone; or
(2) These same 720's ; or, as a special exception, compositions on the Bankes' James Cambridge Minor plan, because of their unusual merits and qualities; or
(3) These same '720's, or, for exceptional reasons, any compositions which produces the 720 changes not more or less than seven times.

There is a fourth alternative, viz., to leave the definition of a peal of Minor in the terms in which it now stands on the Council's minate book at this moment: 'That peals of Minor consist of at least seven trie and complete 720's rung without interval and without "rounds" or any other row being included or rung more than once in any 720.' This, in our opinion, is in substance, if nol in theory, what is asked for by (2) above.

The second divergence of view among ringers, to which we referred, is not a technical one, but as to whether the Minor controversy is worth the time and ink spent upon it. Those who think the discussion of the question is just a waste of effort, are, we are afraid, mostly those who have no interest in Minor ringing. They seldom, if ever, ring a six-bell peal, and therefore do not fully realise that the men who rarely ring on any higher number are just as anxious to have their peals defined as eigh-bell (Continued on page 890.)

ringers would be, if, for mstance, here was any question as to what should constitute a peal of Major. The practice of a couple of hundred years has settled this for the eight-bell ringers, but what is now proposed with regard to a six-bell peal is an uphcaval of the conceptions of generations. To the six-bell ringers, therefore, it is a matter of importance, and while the ofd argument still stands that you canot compel anyone to obey a ruling on this or any other subject connected with ringing, it is nevertheless a fact that the decisions of the Council do permeate among the rank and hie, who look to the Council for a lead and who more and more in the future may be expected to accept these rulings, which their own associations, in the majority of cases, have undertaken loyally to recognise.

NINF SURPRISE METHODS BUT ONLY ONE OF GRANDSIRE
The commitilee's report was as follows:
The year 1932 shaws a marked advancement in the ringing of higher methods, peals of no less than nine different Surprise Major methods baving been ruing diring the year, and a peal of Spliced Cambridge and Superlative Surprise Major. At the same time only one peal of Grandsire TripIes was rutge, and the committee hope that this does not show a lack of enthusiasm upon the part of fresh fingers but is due to progression towards mote advanced methods. Fitty peals lave been riagg, 26 in the North-Western District and 24 in the Southern Distriet, being an increase of 15 upon the previous years. This is probably slue to the remission of the peal boaking fee. Set against this, howerer, is the increase in nomher of towers where peal ringing las beon stopped or severely curtailed through complaints by warishoners, and it 15 loped that, in these cases, the work of boarding up the lourres, thas modifying the sound in the near vicinity of the Lowers, willz be carried nut, thus enabling the associafion to have the same facilities for ringing as in the past. Friends in North Notts should remember that six bella are more masieal than five, and eight more than six. When ringing hells we are aflling people together to worsitip in the church, and I think the more music we cen produce From the tower the mope efiect it will have outside.
The association, ithink, is not making progress, but we are not declining. May I ask young ringers, and persons willing to ring, what is more pleasani and enjoyable than to be ringing bells for Sunday service, and at the same time laving an interestigg jastime? A good sunday sarvice band are mostly good change ringers, and good elange ringers are denerally pood churchmen. So please try to improve botly in the service to Corl and iu the art of change ringing. At the meoting efferwards, it was reporied inat the Guild had rluring the masi yeat for the first time rung uver 100 penls in ibe I welpe months. The secretary said that titey might weil be pround of the face that they lod over 1,000 members on their books, and hat got into three figures with their peals. They were, therefore, among Ibe select hatnd of Guilds who hed dono this-a small number almost to be counted on the fingers of otte hankl. Moreover, the athers wovered eilher mare then one diorese or more than one county, while thoy in Suffolk were confined to one diovese aud part only of one county.

The officers and committer were all re-elected with the ntwition of Rer. R . Sinker ns wiee-president and Mr. Laurence Poulson, of Lavenham, an tillo committee.
