## BELLS AND THE PUBLIC.

The public attitude towards church bells was touched upon by at least three speakers at the Henry Johnson dinner at Birmingham on Saturday. They approached the subject from different angles, but all led to the same focal point. 'Good bells rung with skill and restraint: and with consideration for other people still make a unique appeal, in spite of the somewhat jaundiced utterances which occasionally gain publicity, said the Vicar of Aston, who added that evidence from diverse and unexpected sources had shown him that bellringing has still a hold upon the public. The hon. secretary of the Salisbury Diocesan Guild uttered a warning against the insidious and undemocratic powers by which a Minister of the Crown might, by a stroke of the pen, prohibit church bellringing through a Departmental Order. Upon this matter it behoves ringers to keep a constant watch. The third reference was made by Mr. J. F. Smallwood, who, speaking of the importance to ringing of a sympathetic Press, advocated a voluntary limitation of peal ringing in populous areas.
These three points all direct attention to the core of the subject. In these days we cannot afford entirely to ignore public feeling. Church bells, when one gets down to real bedrock, have a place of affection in the hearts of the majority of the people of this country, but in a wortd distracted by the noises of its own creation and dizzy with the turmoil of its own making, where panic action is taken to stay the penalties which are the inevitable corollary of the so-called progress of mankind, there are forces at work which might conceivably deal a staggering blow at our art and even at the age-long usages of the Church itself, not because, in itself, the ringing of church bells offends the ear or shatters the nerves, but because all sounds are ' noise' to certain people. The zeal of reformers of this type is always directed at the other man's pursuits or pleasures, but this does not alter the fact that these peopile, usually few in number, are able to pull the strings which put their pet views into operation, and the vast majority of the public know nothing of it until it is too late to counteract the regulations which have been made.

Sound advice will be observed in all the speeches referred to. 'Good bells rung with skill and restraint and with consideration for other people.' It comes from a non-ringer. It emphasises that the striking should be good. That is the first essential. Good bells are a most desirable possession, but even poor bells can be made to sound less disagreeable as the ringing of them improves. Good striking is one of the best ways of showing con-

sideration for the public, but there is another very innportant way in which this consideration can be exhibited in the case of very noisy towers. The effective stoppingup of the louvre windows, which can easily be done and, usually, at little cost, will make a vast difference to the comfort of the people living in the surrounding houses. It is a matter of constant surprise to us to come across towers where the amount of ringing has been curtailed to a minimum and peals absolutely prohibited because of annoyance to the neighbours, and to find that no attempt whatever has been made to reduce the volume of sound outside the church, when ready and inexpensive means of doing so are available. Ringers everywhere should take this matter up with their Church authorities and remove any cause there may be for legitimate complaint, before some departmental action, at the instance of a handfui of busybodies, steals a marefi upon us and leaves us manacled, gagged and helpiess.

## ST. ALBANS ABBEY BELLS.

OLD RING GO BACK TO THE FOUNDRY.
The work of augmenting the ring of eight at St. Albans Abbey into a paal of twelve is now in lull swing, and on Mondry and Theschay, Fobruary 25 th and 266 h , the old bells were lowered into the church below. Many people gathered in thre clurech ou Tucstlay to see tho tenor braught down, after lemging in the tower with tho 3red, 4th and 7 th since 1699. The listory of casting and recasting may ho summarised thus with the names of tho founders:-Treble.-l'loclips, 1730 . Briant, 1792. Mears, 1845, 1901
end.-Phelps, 1730. Mears, 1845, 1901.
3rd.-Wiglitman, 1699.
4th. -Wightman. 1699.

6th.-Wightman, 1699. Lester and Pack, 1758.
7th.-Wightmatr, 1699.
Teuor,-Wighiman, 1699.
It will be noticed that the present ring nall cane from the same foundry, which has been in existence from 1570, and now belougs to Messrs. Mears and Staiubank, who are successors to Wightann and other founders.
Immediately upon reaching the floor below tho bell was weigked, and turned the scale at. 24 cwt 1 qr .2 lb . Tlace bell weighed considorably moro before the camons werc removed some years mgo, when it was guarter-turned and relung. It is still an excellent belt, its note having dropped barcly a semi-tone from the original note of E flat, when it was cast in 1699.
On Thursday, Februnty 28the, the bells wera taken to the Whitechapel Foundry to be cloaned and tuned and the fifth recost (lativing been found to be cracked), after an absence of 236 years for some of them. Upon the fifth lias bean found an incised design of 'Father Time,' with hour glass and sickle, a fact which lins neerer bean chronicled beforo. It is believed this design is rare, and pertaps maybe the only occurrence of the samo upon a bell. Pertaps my readers mey substantiate this, or otherwise; it would be jnteresting.
The augerntation is in tho linnds of a reputable firm, and we have overy confdence that Mr. Hughes will see that we have a peal werthy of the noble pilo they are to occupy, as well as a fitting memorint of the jubilee of the FIertford Cotnty Association.
Tlug association is raising money for one bell to commemorate its jubilee and to the memery of the late Mr. F. P. Detenhan. So once amain, in due time, a peal of twelve will send forth their music in St. A'bans.
But the rehanging costs moncy, and the mency is wanted quickly, so that when the bells ara ming for the Silver Jubiles of our beloved King and Queen, we want every penny in hand to pay for the worls dome. Many, I believe, inteud to send something, but keap putting it off. To those who have sent, rgain I would say 'Thank you,' and to all who are yet to sead, especially those in our own county area, let me say, 'Do it at once.' I shali be happy to see a heavy post bag next week. The bells will sound sweeter to your ears if you have given something towards making them sweet.

## A NEW TAYLOR CHIME.

INTERESTLNG INSCRIPTIONS.
Tho cumination of au effort spread over roany years was seen at Stannington, Narthumberland, on Sunday, February 24th, when the Bishop of Newcastie dedicated a chime of eight bells. The bells have some interesting inscriptious:-
The tenor, weighing over 30 evt., is dedicated to the momory of the late Vicar, the Rev. A. G. Dodderidge, M.A., R.N.V.R., who worked assiduously to complete the work. The bell is inscribed with the full name of the deceased Vicar on one sids and on the reverse simply 'Dodije, a familiar name by which he was known.

Tho second boll, given by the parishioners of Stannington, is inscribad, 'Whenever the sweet bell rings o'er hill and dale must $J$ esus Christ be praised.' A third bell is in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Leech, who, says in the jnscription, "in adversity were to friends like a providence.
The fourbl is interesting and forges another link in the association between Stamnington Church and Jesmond Parish Church. It is dedjcated to the Jesmond ehoir and lias been purchased from the proceeds of the many services they gave at Stannington. The fifth is in memory of 14 -year-old Hunter Stead Ellis, of Gosforth, and was given by his parents.
The gixth bell is in memory of James Winter Parish, "who loved the peace of this place, and the seventh and eighth bells purclased from the carillon fund hear the inscriptions, 'Ring out the false, ring in the true' and 'I ring true; do you ?'
The cluerch was crowded when the procession of clergy andi others enterod, preceded by the wardens with wands, Mr. Carnegie, people's warden, Mrs. Lyons, Vicar's warden, and Mr. R. Wood, deputsing for Lord Ridley.
Tho Bislop was accompanied by Oanou Knyvett, his chaplain; Canon Davies, Morpeth; and the Vicar, the Roy. Charles Hudson, late of Spittal and Scotswaod.
Jesmond Parish Church choir, under Dr. Hutchinson, and the Stannington choir, under Mr. Watson, the organist, sang special music for the day.

Aftor the Bishop had pronounced the benntiful words of the dedicafion, the new belle were chimed as the clergy and choir retarned from tha belfry in procession down the aisle.
Tho bells have been made by Messrs. Taylar and Co., of Loughhocough, who were represented at the opening by Mr. J. P. Mider. Many members of the congregation went specially to Mr. Fidler to express their appreciation of the beautiful tonal quality of the bells and to say how glad they wern that such an fine chime had been installed

## A BROKEN ROPE-BUT TWO 'FIRSTS.

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BELL ROPES! MUFFLES, \&c.

Only a generation ago tho man who had rung a hundred peals had done sumething he could 'talk about,' even if it had taken him nearly a lifetime. There are plenty of men in these days who knock off a century about every two years. Thus has the practice of peal ringing grown.

Last Saturday, Mr. Trank Bennett, of Brichton, now approachag the 'old war herse' stage, scorcd his $1,300 \mathrm{~h}$ peal! It has taken him 46 yaars to do it, but an average of 30 peals a yeal for netrly half a century is zot bad going, Il neede an unfagging enthusiasm to keep it up for that lenctin of time.
When four-fgure totals are mentioned, atyiling less is largely ovarshadowed, but when a man has accumulated 500 he roaches a notable landmark in his ringing career. Congratulatious, therefore, to the popular hon. sectetary of the Bath and Wells Diocesan Associntion, Mr. J. T. Dyke, upon ringing his E00th peal last Saturday.
And what of Mr. George Ades, of Brightan. Fast week ho called a parl of Grandsire Triples. Fis first pasa as conductor for over 40 years! It doesn"t seem so long since those cajoyable days at Waldron, does it, George? And yet, alas, it is.
Another peal of Landon on handibells! The clevel Ftertfordshire band have repented their performance.
Ringers from England, Ireland, Wrles and Scotland, to say inothing of Australia, were present at the Fenry Johnson dinner at Birmingham oi Saturday, whth shows how widely representative the campany was. This dinner is not just an evening affair-it's a week-end. And that is why so many ringers from afite retum to it yetr after year.
OP the twelve peals of Maximus rung in 1934, sis, and all of them in Surprise methods, were rung at St, Mary-Ie-Tower Ohurch, Ipswich.

Mies Phyllis 'C'illett's performance last weet in ringing an inside bell to Superlative Surprise Maximus was a specially maritorious performance. Sho is only 16, but she rang bath her bell and the method splendidly.

## THE ESSEX ASSOCIATION'S REFERENDUM. <br> BISHOP OF CHELMSFORD'S VIEWS.

The referendum which is being taken on the suggested cliauge in the title of the Fseex Associntion closes next Friday, and all voting cards must be in the liands of the hon. secrefary by that date,
The views of the Bishop of Cholnsford on the subject were expressed in 'Tha Bishop's Letter' in a recunt issue of the "Cliemoford Diocesan Chronicle, and wera fully in favour of the adoption of a diocesan title. His lordahip wrote:
"I uaderstand that the Essex Association of Chance Ringers is taking an referendum of its nembers on the advisability of changing the titte of the association. Members are asked to fote whether they would prefer to retain the old title or to alter the titile to the "Chelmaford Diocesan Guild of Change Ringers." I hope, as prosident of the society, I shall nof be regarded as using the dignity of my office improperly in expressing an opinion on this mather. If so, I hope I may be forgiven. I have no doubt that, hed the socieby been formed at a time when Esex whs coterminons with the diceeso in which it was situated, the saciely would lave faeen called by the name oi the diocese, but in 1879 the County of Essex was part of the Diocgse of St. Albans, which included the County of Hertiordshire, and, therefore, the county title was preferred. But now that the county and diocese are tha same in area, and, seeing that this gociaty is a church sociefy, I think it is obvious that the best title is "The Chelnsford Diocesan Guile of Ohange Ringers,"

A happy recognition of the invaluable services rendered to riuging generally aud to St．Martin＇s Guild in partioular by Mr．Albert Walker was made al．Birminglam on Saturuay，whan presentations were made to him and 立rs．Walker at the Tenty Johason Com－ memoration Dimmer．Mr．Walker has recently retired from the Tinging Mastership of the Guild，an office which he beld for 18 years and unoficially fillod for a period before that．During that，ime he helped materially to lift the Guild to a foremost place among ringing societies，and throughont this long period received the active help and encouragenent of hiss wife．
The dinmer was，as winal，the occasion of a latgo gatharing of the elans＇from far and meay，and it was moteworthy that wlif the four kingloms of the British fsles were represented，whilo the presence of some of the tourists who receutly wisited Australia added a link with that distant part of the limpire．I＇here was the usual ringimg at the famous church in the Bull Ring and at other Birmingham churches in the aitermoon，and a company of 150 gathered at the Imperial Fiotel in the evening．Canon IT．Guy Rogers，\＄3．D．，M．C．， Rector of Birminglam，presided．He was acemmpanied by Mrs．Guy Rogers and suppurted lyy Alderman J．S．Priteliett（Master of the

GAREFUL WATCH ON LEGSLATION NEEDED．
After the loyal toast had heen honoured，the Rev．F．Jal．Fowards propcsed＇Church and the State．＂It was extremely iwportant he said，thet Church and State should work well together．When 拢符 saw in so many parts of the world the many disruptive forces that threatened 䬺ood govemment and order and，more still，the libertics of the fudividual citizen，they could see the importance of havigg in thit ceuntry strong forces to vesist aly intrusion upon theit traditions of good order，mingled with liberty．Even in our own eduntry they fonnd sinister influences at wark attemptimg to undermine the re－ ligious faitl of the people，hostility to the established usages of the Church，to her theology and her forms of worship，and tryigg to subvert the most fundamental and elementary principles of moratity which had beer built up in this country through centuries of Christian influence upon Oliristian foundations．That made it all the more imperative that Church and State should co－operate in the work of keeping this coundry a Christian country and a stronglold of liberty and order（applausa）．To those who had been watehing the caurse of cuents it was impressive to remark low the Church had been making lier infuence felt in the counsels of the State．The Church

lad taken pert prominently in official ank unoficial ways in endeapour－ ing to cope with the dificulf．problems of unemployment and the proper housing of tlae population，and just recently they learmed that the Archbishop of York Jiad been appointel to the important post of adviser to the B．B．C．，while the Arehbishop of Canterbury had long been taking part in the preparation of the Government of India Bill whicl had just come beiorn the House of Commons．In this way it had bean observed that the Church，especially through her Arch－ bishops，liad heen exerting considerable influence in the counsels of the State．There were，however，two points on whith thers was some danger of Church and State coming into，conllict．One was tho matier of education．For centuries the Clurch was the only agent of education in this country before the State began to wake op and tata a hand in it．Now there was a tendency for the State to take the whole hand and not leave the Church any roon at all．They wanted to be very careful to ensure tlat 50 far as they could the maintenance of all the Ghurch Schoals should remain in a state of eficiency aud that they should maintain their treining colleges to ensure Christian teabing in Christian sohbols（applause）．Another matter wes in the use of bells．Thera was great danger at this time of a very insidjous character．Plere was an anti－noise caupaign abroad in the land and there was no knowing when chnch bells miglit be brought within its sphere．Legislation jn these drys some tines took the insidious form of conferring powers upor a Ministrr to make such orders as le thought fit，and，therefore，riagers and those who hat the contiol of bells must keep a very careful watcla on any legislation，whether it was of a local or national character．

The Chainman，who responded to tho tonst，aid thet in these times what they really needed was a certain amount of tradition，but they certainly tulst move with the times．Dnfortuluately，he thought same states moved $a$ jittle ton violently with the fimes，and they got dictatorships which did not know their business properly．On the other hamd，the Chmeln was a little too much rooted in tradthon．He
rocognised that the Clurch bad much to laarg. It needed to manifest its unity in a way that it liad not done get and to wituess for Christ far more powerfally than il did at the moment. It slould be prepared to take a more independent line wher necessary to gafeguard tte moral conscienca of the gation, and if the time sloould come that to safeguard the moral couscience of the nation brought tham into canfiet with the State, they must be prepsred to let their establishment go in order that they might be perfectly free. Thank God that had rat been necessary ju this country yet, and, please God, it never would be.
The Rector mentioned that the next day was the tenth annifersayy of his arrivil in Birmingham, and reminded his hearers that be celebrated tis arrival by breaking a bell rope when he liad to chime the bell. He had intended to ring it ten or twenty times to iudicate, according to trabition, the number of years he was likely to stay, but it seemed as if tlie populace wanted him gone quickly (laughter). He had, however, refused to take tho lint, and the hoped in a emall way he had established sufficient grouuds to be allowed to remain a little longer (applanse). He had the best of relationshipg with his ringers. He was a welcome visitor to the tower, and be knew a goon deal about the ringers' diffculties and their' joys and happiness, as well as abont their domestic nffairs, as he was always called apon to merry the bellringers' danghters when the occasions alrived (laughter and applayse). He would like to say, he added, low much he whlued the long service of the ontroing Ringing Master and how be welcomed his successor. He hoped that their happy relations would long continus (applause).

## FTMNRY JOHNSON.

In provosing the toast of the evening, "Tbe Menory of Fenry Jolinson, Mr. Harry Mason took his heavers back to the first gethering of the kind which he attended, the dinner in 1889. which was held in celebration of Henrs Tolnson's 80th birthday. That function, he said, lingered in lis memory. It was the nost interesting and important occasion that bad oceurned in his envly ringing life. He had the honour-and it was no small honour-of being futrodnced to Hedry Johnsob, and lis sponsor was Mr. Sam Reeves, fsther of their present hon. sectetary. Mr. Arthur Heywood (aftarwards Sir Arthur) inangurnted the gathering and took the chair, and a marrellons gathering it was. The speches were full of life and interest in the subject whose menory thop ware honouring that night. Henry Johnson, as they had many times herad, was a very agreeable man in personality and charm, and the quotation on their programme, relating th the toast, was so very true that they could maderstand Why, after all these years, St. Martia's Guik continued to honour his men-ary:

We that had loved him so, followed him, honoured him,
Made him our pattern to live and die."
In tho world of composition he knew of 10 one who ranked higher than Henry Jolnson. He was not only a good ringer but a good churchman, a man of good repmbe and was held in high respect, not onfy among ringers ite Birmingham, hut throughout the country. Heary Tohnson was present at the celebration of his $80 t$ b birtliday, lut befove the gext anyiversary came round he had passed away, There whs a tremendons gathering of ringers at his funeral, ant was a fitting tribnte to one who was honoured so much. Carred upon the memorin] were these words: This stane was arected by the ingers of England in grateful memory of Frenry Johrson, to whose

Hf rendered Then thep had also sustatned a great loss by the cieath of Mr Geofye Martineau, of Solilull, who took a profound interest is every im-
portant aspect of the Guild's activities, who never tired of instructing young ringers and was a regular attendant at every mecting iu connection with the Guid. They learned to honour and respect him as they wand do his memory. Contimuing, Alderman Pritchett said they were pleased to sce among them that evening most of their old friends, and they would specially lika to honour on that occasion a son of Henry Johnson-Mr. Joseph Johnson, who was himself now a very aged man (hear, hegr). They also bad with them, adcled the speaker, Mr. James George, who liad now rung 1,232 poals and was still continuing to ring them despite his move than four score ygars (applause).
During the year 1934, said the Master, the progross of the Guild had been in every way satisfactory; iu other words, its prosperity Had continued. The peals Mad aumbered 16 , and comprised Triples, Major, Caters, Royal and Cinques. They were rung by 53 ringers in ten lowers with nine conductors. He especially called their atiention to the mine conductors, as it showed the mount of ringing ability at present included in the membership of the Diacesan Guid. It was sitisfactary to have nime gentlemen capable of couducting a peal amongs their members. His only regret was that no lady was included among the conductors. He did not remember that a lady had ever conducted a peal for the Guild, but this was a progressive age and no doubt this omission would soon be rectifled.

## THE NEW RINGING MASTETR

As they all linew, Mr. Albert Walker had recently resignod wo office of Winging Wiaster, and he invited them to wolcome his successor, Mr. Frank Haynes (applause). Mr. Haynes, in addition to being it ringer of great distinction, was a man colebrated in other walks of life. He was a graduate of Cambridge, elassical matser in a echool at West Bromwich, and one whom they were glad to have amongsi. them ins leader. Fio would, following on the lines af an illustrious predecessor, so doubt add to the continued prosperity of the Guild. St. Hartin's Guild had had in its rauts many distinguished rimers, and one of the most distinguished was he whose raewory they were commenorating that night. Mr. Haytues would no doubt be inspirci by the cxamplo he set and would try to emmlato those who had followed Mr. Jolnson as a leader in their bellinging. He hae no doabt that Mr. Ifaynes would have a distinguished career and thal bo wonld have the full support of every member of the Guild, ana that under him the prosperity of the Guild would not only continue, butt wonld be greatly enlanced (applause). Contimuing, Alderman Pritchett said le was glad to learn that the recasting and rehanging of Astou belis was shortly to be accomplished (epplause). Many of them first learned to ring seriously at aston and had pleasant recollections of ringilug in that tower. It would be open again very shortly for the benefit of the mombers of the Guild, and he hoped it would remain so for many years in the futme (applatse). Alderman Pritchett ceupled with the toast the name of the efficient and enthusiastic hos, secretary, Mr. Thomes Reeves.
The ters was drunk with enthusiago, and Mr. Roeves, in replying, first thanked those who liad contributed to the evening's progranme, especially Mr. Arthur Smith, Mrs. Hughes and those old frients of the Guild, St. Martin's Quartetto. Proceding, Mr. Reeves mentioned that he Jiad that evening received on hehalf of the Guild from Mr. James Gcorge a framed fashlight picture taken in St. Martin's beliry of the jingers who rang out the old vear. They would be very pleased to lang this pictore in St. Martin's belfyy, and they thanked Mr. Gcorge very much for his gift. Adverting to A|derman Pritclete'g statement that no lindy had yet conduched a peal in St. Mertin's Lower, Mr. Reeves said while it was true that no local lady hed done $\mathrm{so}_{\mathrm{D}}$, there was ane lady who had called a peal thare-Miss Edith Parker, as she then was, now Mrs, Fletcher. She called a peal of Stedman Cinques at St. Martin"s some years ago. Continuing, Mr Recves said he thonglat they need have no fear for the continued prosperity of St. Martin's Guild. During Mr. Walker's mastership tle Guild liad progressed from strengtle to strength, and he left offieg with the abilities of the members very greatly advanced compared with what they were when he became Mastru. At fhat time there were very few bob callers. Last year they liad nine members who conducted peals. Their neq Riaging Master came among them as a their man fall of enthusissm, and he was sure ther would all do theil best to support Mr. Faynes in overy way possible (applanse) Under hif gudance he felt sure the Gutal wharld continue to prospet (applanse).

There was, however, a capital issue, and this peal is safely banked. Congratulationg, therefore, to these 'men of money" (other people's money they will probably tell you) upon tilieir success.
They believe it to bo the first peal rung by ringers all being members of the banking prolession. It is ono of the oldest professions, havilag degcended, we believe, from the money changers of the Temple (but w lhis we are probably all wronsh, and it was, therefore, again appropriate that it should liave been rung for the Ancient Society of College Yontis, the oldest ringing sacicty, whose ancestry goes back indirectly to the days of the bell and the pomegranate. (In this we are sure we nre wrong.
Howneve, the bankers had a wery enjownble time together. They were welcomed to London by Mr, 0. A. Hammond, of the City office of Eloyds Rank, who is himself a ringer, and who photograplied the band before the penl. After its completion, the ringers fittingly celebratad the cocnsion by a dinner at whe Strand Palace Hotel. Five different banks were represented in the peal, and it fs hoped to make it an annual event.

## RAISING AND FALLING IN PEAL

## MORE BANDS SHOULD 'HAVE A OUT AT IT.'

Sir,-Four recent article on 'Rising and Felling' in peal will, it is to be hoped, receive the attention that it certainly deseryes. In this immediate vicinity, as soon as a beginner can hendle fairly well in rounds, le is at once put on to learn to 'Rise and Fall," firat in correct manner, as to taking up rope, etc., by himself, and then 'in peal." By that means all the ringers attached to the tower can 'Rise nnd Fall' in peal at least as well, or as badly, as they can do auy other ringing. I hape many times visited towers and taken part in the ringing for service where they were most particular that the striking should be good, as it was for service, and then, just at the end and when the congregation were assembling, they wowd haul the bells down in some indiscriminate, noisy manner, one or two at a time, and entirely spoil the effect of all the previous studied "good striking," and I have thought what an awful pity it was.

I have formed the opinion that in very many towers the chief reason why 'Rising and Falling' in peal is not more geaerally prac tiscd-on practice nights, I mean-is because the ringers constituting the band, instead of all turning up to time, assemble in ones and twos, and consequently there is a lot of time wasted waiting for the stragglers, nid the early arrivals proceed to 'get them up.' I am sorry to say that I have found such conditions existing in very many instances. Obviously, under such conditions there is no opportunity for practising 'Rising in peal.' However, in a good few such cases I have noticed that tire company could and did 'Fall' the bells in peal, a different question, however, to 'rifing' in peal. We at Cranleigh ring our bells up and down in peal on every occasion that we meet (Lwice on Sundays), and as all our band are able to do so (not, of course, by any means perfectly) we do not ever proceed to "get them un, unless there are enough ringers in the tower to po on with the ringizg.
I, however, do not quife agree when you say that if it were insisted upon there would be fewer bad and indiferent strikers amodg change ringers." I am not going to say that a bad striker cannot be improved, but a good striker is 'born, not made," and it is often a ringer's misfortune, rather than his fault, that he is an indiferent striker. I also want to take exception to your alleged West Country ringer's reproach 'that change ringers canob "Rise and Fall "bells in peal." That statement, in my opinion, wants qualify ing, and I eay that there are most certainly a lot of change ringers who can, and do, 'Rise and Fail' in peal, some, of course, much better then athers, but in exactly the samo ratio ass their other strik. ing varies. If each recruit, as soon as be reaches fafr competence in rounds is then pat on to 'Rising and Falling,' the band will thus keep a "Rise and Fall" company, but it certainly is a dificult and almost impossible job for a whole six, and more particularly an cight-hell company to tackle at first, altogether. I hope, howerer, more bands will decide to brve a "cut" at it
