## THE VALUE OF THE PEALS ANALYSIS

The analysis of peals rung in the year 1933 is published to-day, and once again ringers will aumire the painstaking labours of that little committee of the Central Council who week in, week out, carefully record and tabulate the peal ringing activities of the Exercise. It is a monumental task, the size of which is only known to those who do the work, and involves infinite care. This tabulated record of the ycar's peal ringing is weicomed with interest by the majority of ringers, whether they are themselves peal ringers or not, because it gives a valuable indication of the progress of the art in one of the principle directions in which progress can be measured.
And in this connection our readers may be reminded that one of the best ways of measuring advance is by the number of ringers who ring their first peal or their first in a new method and the number who foin the ranks of the conductors. These are important marks of progress, but they lose their walue if they are not accurate. In the past

 cast in England. some of the returns have suffered through the omission of particulars of this kind, and it is to urge those responsible for peal reports to make them complete in essential details that a resolution is to come before the next meeting of the Council. The details which the Analysis Conmittee are at so mucls trouble to extract lose force if they, from any cause, lack accuracy, and while the committee can only compile the statistics recorded, it is up to every conductor to see that the things that matter are duly noted. It may not be warth mentioning that a peal was rung on the birthiday of somebody's aunt, because the ringing happened to coincide with that event, or even that the band want to thank somebody for opening the belfry door for them-that sort of the thing can be done with much better grace if it is done at the time and personally-but if the object of the analyses is to be achieved and the tables and the accompanying report are to become not only of present interest, but of historical value, then those details which actualisy indicate progress not only deserve but require to be placed on record.From the tables which appear this week, it will be found, as "The Ringing World, recorded some weeks ago, that there was a further falling of in the number of peals rung, compared with the preceding, year. The actual number rung in 1934 was 1,784, against a total in 1933 of 1,833 . This difference is far less marked than in the comparison of the two previous years, in which 1933 showed a drop of 369 against 1932, and a difference of less than fifty could be accounted for in many way's other than a slackening of interest or encleavour. There are, however, other factors which give food for thought, and with these we must deal in another article.

Dear Sir,-I linvo just reccived a copy of the new book on Triples, and am very pleased with it, but I feel it would haye been advantageous if the muthors had included the manner in which Mr. Davies' fire-parts and other peais on that plan can be converted into irregular ten-parts. I enclose a specimen to indicate the manner in which it can be done, as I feel that young conduators may find them useful.
In the first edition of 'Grandsire' Mr. Dnvies pointed out by means of 'stars' and 'daggers' how the singled-in threb-lead tags could be insertcd in enother place, but he did not mention the result if we inserted the singles in both places.
In the copy of Davies five-part given in the new book the singles can be inserted at the places that I have marked with a * and omittorl where they arc placed. But if we insert them in both places the peal can be split up into two five-part blocks, which can be joined into one by dropping a couple of singles. In tho peal that I enclose I begin the calling of the first part at the first *. I have aiso left out the shunting bob, marked with a $t$, as it is no longer required.
The calling of the second portion, after onitting the $S$, commences at the second * and ends at the firgt.

＇hlue service was held at Sf．Botolph＇s Chmel，Bishopsgate，mad was conducted by the Rev．P．Wilton Vale．The scmon was preached by tho Archdeacon of London，who reminded his learers of the Jubilec，and said that the first thought in all our minds was tho appropriateness of such a meeting on such a day as this．＇On the wiy heve，proceeded the Archdeacon，＇I saw हigns and tokens of love and loyalty to the King and Queen，At St．Panl＇s Gathedral were throngs of people，such enormous numbers that they could hardy move，people visiting the spot where the King and Queen will worship on Monday．This day and time is full of thanksgiving for the blessings bestowed upon us．So let us pray that this may be a great time in the history of our conntry．We have to thank God for the last 25 fears，durinc whith time our King has been a power for the good all of us．
We realise，＇went on the Archdeacon，＇that you wha belong to this association have a prond task，that it falls to your lot to give alfect to the nation＇s joy．You have the privilege of representing bine nadion＇s thongits and expressions of love and loyalty．We do thank God for you and your work，a work that other people cannot do．The message I give you to taka away with you this afternoon is this：

The ringing of the betls slould be an expression of faith and a tribute of love，one faith in Jesus Christe and our love for Him．＂So when you yo back to your bells，keep that in your thoughts．＇

Aiter the service tea was servea to some 140 members and friends at the Express Driry Co．＇s Depot，Formwool Strcet．The Arehdeacon stayed during part of this meal，and before leaving expressed lis sreat pleasure at meeting the mombers，and wished them success in their wark．
th the commencement of the business meefiug， $3[$ ．J．A．Trallope （wiec－president），who was in the chair，extended a hearty welcone to the several visitors fron the provinces and wislici then a happy time in London．A telegram from the president（the Rev．W．$P$ ． Colesheane）was read，exprussing regret at lis absence，due to im－ portatut Jubilee functions in Twickenliam．

MR PYE＇S GREAT WORK FOR THE ASSOCIATION
Sr．C．T．Coles（joint hon．secretary）referred to the death of their Master，Wr．Willinn Pre，and moved a resolation of sympathy in the followirg words：We are met together to－day under the shadow of a great loss，the loss by death of our Ringing Master，Willian Pye． Much has been said during the past few weeks about this remarkable man，but mo praise las been given him that las been toa ligh．Mi． Pye joined this association in 1899；he was elected Pinging Master is Ocfober，1910，and thus held office for nearly 25 years．During that period of tume he cidd an inmense amount of work，which has had the effect of greatly improving the standard of ringing throughout the county；fndced，one might say throughout the country．To ring with him was not only privilege and a plensure，it was an education in itself，and many good ringers of the present day owe Mr－Pye a great debt for the oncourascment he gave to them，and to the slimulating infucnce lae imparted．It was impossible to do anything else but put one＇s best inte ringing whea Mr．Pye was in the baud， and this has done very nany ringers a great deal of good．Mry．Pye＇s peal performances for the association constituite a record that tit will be difficut tor hny mager to surpass．He rang li，ith peats，of which these：I will content myself with mentioning the 15,264 Bristol Surpoge Major rung a屯 Hornchureh in 1912；the 7,392 Cambridge Surprise Maximus at St．Mary－le－Bow，Cheapside，on a 53 cwt．Lenbr，in 1925 ， and the serics of Spliced Sumprise Major peals in all number of methods from three to twelve which lie conducted a fow years ago at willesden nond elsewhere．There were also the first peals of London Surprise Major ever rung double－landed，and the only peals of Bristol Surprise Major so rung，besides the very remarkable performance of Stednan Cinues on hathells when he called a short－course peal in this method from a pair of non－observation bells exacily 21 years ago to－day．At the funeral on March 16th the association was represented by several of its officers and members；the Central Gouncil was repre－ sented by the president（Mr．E．F．Lewis）and the hon．secretary（Mr， G．W．Fetcher）．Many ohter ringing societics were reprosented，and a large rumber of Mr．Pye＇s old ringing friends were present． Anongst many foral tributes was a wreath from this ascocinlion． Mr．Coles went an to mention that he had received many letters of sympatly with the association from the secretarice of other gocieties，as wall as from many well－known members of the Excreise， and lo added：＇Our Master has gone on，he lias left the association much stronger than he found it，and ib will be our duty to carry on the work to the utmost of our ability．A year ago he was with וus at ontr ammal meeting，which wis the last meeting he attended．I
our late Master，aud to show our sympathy with those whom he has leit to mourn him．＂

The resolution was carricd in silence．

## FOR BEGINNERS.

## FINTS ON CONDUCIING

Erery conductor shonld aim at being able to call a touch or peal from gay bell and not be tied to ringing the observation bell. There are occasions, perhaps, when it is well that he should ring the obscrvation bell, but as a general zule it is an advantage to ring one of tha 'warking' bells. For instance, in almost any method, if the conductor is ringing one of these bells, he is eliminating one of the risks' of the human slmont. He knows (or is presumed to know) where the limed bells are (that is, the bells which follow an unbroken course, as the 6 th does in the 720 of Bob Minor which we have been using for our purpose), and if he has one of the movable bells on his own hards there is one less risk of someone else going wrong. It has other advantages. If Ze is among the bob-making bells it is much casier to see what the rest are doing than if he has to look at them ' from afar,' as it were, and it is also easier to watch the continually changing coursiof oriers.
It is only a metfer of practice to know exactly where your boll will be at the next bob, as long as yrou kegp close contaet with the pasitions all the way along. You may not be able to tell with certainty If you 'Wake ujs' in tho middle of a course without any recollection of what hass gone by or ynur relationship with the observation bell. You must cancentrate sufficiently to keep track of all your calling places.
Suppose you start with the 3rd, in Bob MEinor, as suggested last week, for a touch. If you are in $3-4$ up in one lead (where the 3ril starts), or, which is the same thing, liave run 'out' at a boh, you will run out again if a bob is called the next lead. You also run in ' at a bob if you trave been in 3-4 down or liaverun in at a bob in the previous lead. If you make a tob at one lead you come into 5-6 down at the next, hob or no bob. A bob at the lead after 5-6 in brings the bell to mako 4th's.
'The 'Wrong, Rirght and Wrong' of thlo 720, which has been previously used as an illustration, if the 6th is the observation bell, means a bob at tho firet lead, and Ehis will cause the 3 rd to run out. Prick out the lead ends on paper, and you will see that this puts the 3 rd in coursing order behind the 6th. The next two calling places are thus made easy to know. With the 6th Riglit, the bell following it will be "Wrong," and when in the next lean the 6th is called 'Wrong,' the bell that has followed it must make the bob (or 4th's). There is then one bell coursing between this bell and the eth. Therefore, when the plain lead course cad comes up the 3rd will nake gecord's place.

The bob at the next lead 'Wrong ' causes the second's place belt to run ' In.' and an examination of the figares will show that this transposes it to be third's place bell which will make the bob at the 'Thight, and bring the 3rd into coursing order in front of the 6 th So that it will be dodging "Right ' when the 6th is called "Wrong" and at the plain lead course end will be in 4th's place.
Once nore, therefore, the bell you are ringing will dodge ' Thight, when the 8 tl is called 'Wrong ' and continue to courge in front of the Gth, until the 6th is bobbed "Right," when the 3rd will ruan "In" and do the same at the next lead-the bob "Wrong' for the Sth. This brings the hells into the plain course.
To turm it into 720, a Single has to be called at the end. This puts the 3 rd into 4 th's place, and a little investigation will show the young conductor where he picks up the thread which ran through the first half. It will be good practice to trace this out from what has been written abovesnd then go into the tower alld call the whole thing.

## JOY BELLS FOR THE KING'S JUBILEE.

## RINGERS' ACTIVITIES THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY

It is safe to say that never in history have so many peals been rung for any public celebration as were rung for the sitver Jubilee of their Majesties King George V. and Queen Mary, The records already' published or received at the office of 'The Ringing World' number 163, and there may be others to come. In addition ringing took place in thousands of other church towers and some of the events of interest are recorded below
Reports of Jubilee peals have revealed many interesting facts, not the least being the considerable number of ringers who have scored their first peal, many at the first attempt, on this auspicious occasion. In many places, too, our suggestion that a royal salute of twenty-one shots' should be fired, was acted upon.
A peal was rume on the bells of the Curfew Tower, Windsor Caslie, the first in this iistoric buildiug for many years. It was the firsi poal of Major on the bells.
At Tinsbury, in Somerset, the combluctor of a peal of Doubles, Mr. filbert M. Hasell, was nable to take part in the ringing, as he is nly just recavering from a broken leg.
The peal at Wigston Magna was the first in the tower by an entire undry service band, and the peal was worthy of the occasion-it was he first of Buckiugham Surprise Major ever runs.
At Woodford, Eesex, the commemorative peal, rung on Sunday, lay 5 th, was the first on the belis since their augmentation to eight, They were made into an octave in 1931.
Four ringers al. Ibsiock, Leicestershine, vang their first peal at the rab nttempt, and put up a splendid performaice, too.
Fiyht out of the ten ringers in the peal of Plails Bob at Dalton-inl'urness rang their first peal of Royal.

## A JUBILEE PEAL AT 79,

Mr. John Hollows, of Middleton, Lancs, rang the treble to a jeal

## ST. ALBANS CATHEDRAL BELLS <br> RJNG $\triangle$ UGMENTED TO TWELVE.

The dedication of the four new bells and the recast filth by the Lard Bishop of St. Albans took place, as briefly intimeted in our last issue, on Monday, May 6th, immediately after the 8 o'elock celebrafion of the Foty Gommunion. Although somewhat early for most people, a geadly number assembled at the dedication service.
it the cmelusim of the Gelebration, the Bishop, acompanied by his ohaplain and the Dean, came down from the high altar and proceeded to the spaee under the tower, where Dr. S. J. Madge, who with Mrs. Madge is the donor of the treble bell, handed the rope to the Dean and asked hime to aceept the bell in lowing memory of their son, Eruest Vincent Wilmer Madge.
Mr, Walter Ayre, president af Fine Hertford County Association, presenterl the rope of the second bell, and, 'in commemoration of the jubilee of the Herliford Connty Association of Change Ringers and in memory of our late president, Edward Percy Dehenliam; asked the Dean to accept the bell.
Mr. E. R. Mitchell, representing Mr. W. W. Worthington, donor of the third bell, asked the Doan to accept it as a thankoffering.

The Mayor of St. Albans presented the rope of the fourth hell with the words: "Mr. Dean, on belialf of the general public who have sulscribed towards the cost, I ask you to aceept this bell to complete the peal of twelve in the tower of this ancient and illustrious Church of St. Albans.

Similarly Mr. F. Goodenougl, conductor of the Catliedral ringers, presented tho rope of the recast bell on behalf of the Cathedial Socicty of Change Ringers and the Abbey congregation, and asked the Dean to accept the bell, 'which has been recast and so made a move worthy instrument for the honour and glory of God.'
The Dean then handed the five ropes to the Bishop, saying: 'As Dean of this Cathedral Church and president of the Cathedral Society of Ghange Ringers, I pray you to dedicate these hells to the glory and praise of God, in memory of those departed, as a thankoffering of the living and in commemoration of the jubilee of the Onthedral Saciety and the Hertford County Association of Cliange Ringers, and the Silver Jutilee of Fis Majesty King George the Fifth."
Solemnly then. "in the Faitli of Jesus Christ," the Lotd Bishop findicated the bells 'to the glory of God for use in this Cathedral and Abbey Church of 5t. Alhans." Tollowed the customary prayers and then the full peal of twelve, ring by the Cathedral ringers, sounded ont over the ancient city, whose ronts go back into Rounan history.

## A TOOVELY PEAL

In addition, the tourists rang peals at Hobart, Ballarat and Sydrey, and handbell peals on the Meditervanean, the Arabian Sea, the Jndian Ocean, the Iacific Ocean and the Red Sea.
Other notable performances were the peal of London Surprise Major 'in hand ' by the Fertford Comity Association, the peal of Bob Major by a band whose average age was 15 , and a peal of Doubles by a band whose avergus age was 14 years and 7 monthis.
