## THE COUNCIL MEETING.

When the Central Council meet on Tuesday week they intend to honour the ringers who made the trip to Australia and New Zealand last autumn, and by the official reception which will be given will formally mark the recognition by the Exercise of a great and successful undertaking of outstanding historical interest. We feel quite sure that the gesture of the Council will meet with the approval of ringers generally, for nothing in connection with ringing has stirred the imagination so greatly as did this tour to the other side of the globe. It had a two-fold object-the fraternisation of ringers from the homeland with those of Australia in celebrating the centenary of Melbourne and the State of Victoria, and the revival of interest in bells and bellringing in the Commonweaith. In both these things the visit proved a highly successful venture, and, just as the expedition set off with the good wishes of the Council, so the welcome to be extended at its conclusion is a fitting culmination to a remarkable tour.

Apart from this special event in connection with the proceedings, the meeting at Shrewsbury promises to be not only interesting to the members of the Council, but of importance to ringers generally and, judging by the agenda, the debates are not likely to be without liveliness. There is, at any rate, material for animated discussion, and the subject of separating the categories of spliced peals is not unlikely to show up a sharp division of opinion. There is unquestionally, among those who have had anything to do with the ringing of peals with constant changes of method, a decided opinion that these compositions should be provided with a distinctive term to define them. There certainly can be no two views that these peais are in a qotally different class to those in which just two or three methods are joined up in long lengths, and to such extreme and inelegant examples as joining half a peal of Grandsire Caters and half a peal of Bob Royal. The dificulty in this matter is, however, where shall the dividing line be drawn? In any case, it has got to be an arbitrary line, and it will be for the Council to settle where this division of the classes shall come.
There is one other point abour the forthcoraing Council meeting that is worth noting. It will be the last under the old constitution. The new rules adopted two years ago come into full force and effect after the Shrewsbury meeting, and the various associations and guilds will henceforth stand on a different footing in relation to the Council. The tie between the Council will be made definite by an act of affiliation, and the Council will be-

come an organisation of which the associations are themselves an integral part. For the first time the actual basis of calculating the representation will be laid down for territorial organisations, and all affiliated societies will be required to subscribe an affiliation fee for the full number of members they are entitled to elect, as well as to undertake loyally to abide by the rules and decisions of the Council. After Shrewsbury the Council will no longer represent a body of individual opinion but will be officially the voice of organised ringiag throughout the British Isles.

Tomplsins, of Chichester, whose father was the fitst treasurer of the association and whe succeuded him in that oflice, later to become Master of the association, a position he held for many years. Another wis Mr. Charies Thler, of Henficld, who was also in the first peal rung by the assacialion, and, years after, conducted the only peal of fledman Cinques ever rung in the county and by the association. 'lhis was on handlalls, for there is yet no ring of twelve bells in Sussex. Despite his advancing years, Mr. Tyler is training e company
of boys at Herfield, and three of them, scarcely in their teens, were present with him on Satuday and took part in some round ringing. The lwn ather foundation members present weve Mr. B. Hobbs, who, elecled with the waldron band, has been at Eastbontne now for many years, and Mr. W. E. Mitchell, of Cuckfield, who began as a ringer, hut is now an honorary member.
There were many present whose comnection with the association lied exterded ovel 40 years, and who have served it faithfully and well in a variety of ways. The reunion of these old frieuds, several wid whom came from outive the county, wins not the least happy part If the successful proceedings, Ringing took place in the afternoon threg churcheg, S't. ## TEE MASTER'S RESIGNATION.

The Master said those who were present at the annual meeting last year would remember that he foreshadowed a position which be was now compelled to arrive at, in deference to advice he could not ionore. He could not offer himself far reelection as Master. He was move greteful than le could express for the kindness which the association had shown to him during the years he had held office, and he would always cherish that memozy in bis heart. NH. F. R. Butcher had been approached by tire committee and had kiudly consented to fill the office, and he (Mr. Rickmant lad pleasure in proposing him as Master. Mr. A. C. Pankhurst seconded, and the motion was carried. The President, in the name of the members, expressed gratitude to Mr. Rickman for his devoted services to the association, and Mr. F. B. Tomplime proposed that their appreciation flould be recorded on the minuties and that Mr. Rickman be elected a wice-presideut of the association (applause). Mrr. Butcher seconded the motion, which was unamimously carried and briofy ackuowledged by Mr. Rickman.
In succession to Mr. Butcher, Mu. F. W. Stokes, of Eastbourue, was elected hon treasurer, Mr. A. D. Stolle was ve-elected loousecretary, and, at his request, Mr. S. E. Armstrang was elented assistant hon. secretary. Mr. F. I. Hairs was re-elected peals secretary and Messrs. N. Elliott and w. C. Hart hon. auditors. The trustees were also re-elected.
When it was proposed to re-elect Mr. Oliver Sippetts as the Cential Council representative, Mr. Goldsmith pointed ont that this was unnecessary, as under the rules of the Council a member was elected for the triemmial period of the Cauncil, or such portion of the period as remained after his election. The present triennial period did not expire until nert year: -The President said that under these circumstances vo election was necessary.

Brighton was selected for the next amnal general meeting, receiving 30 wotes, against 30 given for Chichester

The meeting concluded with a vote of thanles, proposed by Mr. Rickman, to the Bishop for presiding and for the address whieh lie was later to give, the Bishop briefy roplying.

WORE OF NORILTTY AND MMSTERY
At the service subsequently held in St. Peter's Chureh, the singing was led by the choil and organ, and tine Bishop gave an interesting address based on the words, "Thou shalt use them for the calling of the congregation." He pointed out that from the earliest times musical instruments had been used for summonina the people to worship, and almost from the dawn of Christianity in Lngland beils had been used for the purpose. For hundreds of years in Sussex ilhe bells had rung from the church towers, amd the jubilee which they were celelarating that day, while it marked an epoch in the histary of their Comety Association, ailso formed a landmark int the much longer history of change ringing in the belfries of the Sustex churches in village and in tomn. It was a very lappy thing that they, who ropresented so many belfries in the countr, should assemble at that service on their jubilee day and give thanke to God, not only as individuals, but as a great society of those who raly ithe church bells throughout the county. He would lite to think that there in that serwice all the belfries of Sussex were invisibly presont, and that those not represented by their own ringers were witin them in spirit, so that on that day that service was a conmon act of jubilee of praise and thanksiving fon the imumerable belfries of susgex.

Hawing referred to the many public uses of bells, the Lishop went on to say that he knew from his experience at Canterbury how ringers regarded their worls is possessing a nobility and a mystcry all its onm. Ther looked upon ringing not only as a physical or athletic excroise, but as a mental experienca, so to spreak, which expressed semething which they found in their own bearts. The ringer of to-day had a sellse of strong responsibility about him, and the true rincer, who had grown for many years accustomed to the belfry, who valued the noystery of his att, ditl feel there was something sacred and something really religious about the work he did. No ringer, who remembered whint be was doms and where he was, could fail to recollect the main purpose of his calling and that he, tor, should play his part in the oflering of worsinj to God. That day ther thanked God for preserving the assaciation theagh its 50 years. They would thamk God, many of them, for calling them ats individuala to the work of ringing, and they would go back from that service, from their meeting and from their social gathering that wight with a new determination to be lopal to the great tradition of the chauge ringers of Sussex aud with a uew detrermination to perform their work as worslipping servants of Almigity God.

During the concluding hymin a collection was taken for the association's benevolent fund.
A dimer in colebration of the jubilee was held in the evening at the Old Slip Hotel, wheu IIr. J. I'. Ricknal presided over a eompany of mearly 120 and an interesting programme was cayried out. A report of the speeches will appear in our nest issue.

## AUGMENTATION COMPLETED.

## Ringers Take Part in Oponing Celebrations.

Kidderminster is now in proud possession of a ring of twelve bells at St. Mary's Church, and on Saturday, May 18 th , ringers from five connties laok part in celebrations for the completion of the project, which bas iacluded the taniag and relianging of the old eight bells. The work, which has been carried out in a higlily successful manner by Messers. Gillett and Joluston, of Groydon, forms part of a big restoration scheme, costing 23,000 , and including renovation of the stonework of the church and improvements to the organ
The towers represented at, the gathering included Stourbridge, Wollnston, Olent, St. Martin's Parish, Church, Birminglam, Bromsgrove, Coventry, Derby, Walsall, Claverley, Blakenliali, Wolverhampton, King's Norton, Selly Oals, Woreester, Evesham, Upton-on'serarn, Highley and elsewtrere.
Among the chief officers of the Worcestershire Association were the Rev. J. F. Hastings (Rechor of Martley), clerical secretary; Mr. *. D. Johnson (Evesham), lity secretary, ML. W. B. Cartwright, secretary of the Northern Branch; Mr. William Short (Cleat), Master; ML, John Weodberry, chaiman of St. Mary's Society; with Mr. Charles H. Woodherys, Ringing Master, and Mr. Keith Salter. A number of lady ringers were present.


## ST. MARY'S CHURCH, KIDDERMINSTER

Canon J. B. Sladen (Rector of Kidderminster and Rural Dean) whlcomed the visitors, all of whom had opportunity of ringing during the afternoon and evening. Various touches of Stedman Cinques, Grandsire Cinques, Stedman Caters and Grandsire Caters and Kent Treble Bot Maximus were brought round.

A short service was lield in the Parisll Church, and the address was given by the Rev. J. F. Hastings.

Ganou Sladen took the sevrice, and Mr. Alfied Chatfield, Mus.Bac, (Parish Chureh organist), acconpanicd on the nain organ. THE REV. J. F. HASTINGS' SERMON.
The Rev. J. F. Fastings spoke from Ps. 150 , vy. $3-5$, and in the course of his address said churches and their ormaments were a sign of the tate of religion in the land. Each generation must bring increased invention and art into God's bervice. During the last 50 years there had heen a great advance; more reverence, better singing, organs improved, nad church bells ham received greater attention. That revival of charch forces was in itself a huwark, and had been maning headway since tho Oxford Movement in the ' 40 's of the last, century. It was a privilege to como to St, Marys Parish Church, Kiddermingter, to see the improvements recently completed. The peal frad been jucreased from eight to twelve bells, and the work irpresented an enormous improvement. The tower and bells of a parish charel like St. Mary's were a great institution. The old stone tower pointed upward telling there of that higher life for which this
was a preparation. The bells were the outward voice of the church, appealing to the ear, as the tower appealed to the eye. Church towers and bells preached a sermon which reached all-af warning, thanksgiving, Christmas, Enster and messages of national rejoicings.

Having briefy traced the development and use of church bells, the preacher proceeded : 'Change ringing is an art of great fascination: it requires the accurate use of eye, ear, mind and muscle. It reguires arms, muscles and intellect," said the preacher. "A xinger must exercise most of the Christian Firtues if he is to be a useful member of the belfry. He must have perseverance, self-denial, clarity and lowing kindness.' He learnt to become a ringer at Areley Kinge, Stouport, when aine years old, and, speaking for himself, he knew of nothing that was bound to teach those moral qualities better than belonging to a baud of ringers, for they lad to practise those things which could only be learnt by practice. It required team work just the same as in the rowing crews of Oxford and Cambridge, which is regarded as the most strenuous form of team work, and be ewen more mechanical. But the reward was great. There could be ao greater pleasure than taking part in good ringing-in exercising all the faculties at the same time, swinging a mass of mefal rbythmically and making music with others, music that was periaps peculiar, but a most gatisfyjug form of musical melody.

HOW THE PEAL HAS GROWN.
Speaking from an expericuce of nearly 60 years, Mr. Hestings said he strongly recommended any young man who was willing to learn to join a band of ringers, and if lo persevered he would not only be helping tho church, but would provide himself with an engrossing pastime and art that be could follow to extreme old age.
The preacher paid fribute to the recent work of completing a peal of 12 in st. Mary's Church tower, and said 'it is perfectly splendid. He remembered what Tom Salter used to tell him about liaving a peal of 12 at Eidderminster. Tom Salter would have loved to lave been present to see what had been done in that tower. Those who came to take part in that veremony were also hououring the memory of their departed friend, Tom Salter, who loved that work.
Mr. Hastings passed an to speak of the additions made from time to time, from two or three bells until he believed that in 1754 they had a peal of cight bells. Charse ringing had now spread to other countries. He rcjoiced that at St. Mary's they now had 12 instead of the old octave of eight bells. The work was finjshed in the tower, and, so far as the bells were concerned, lie thought it would laste for generalions. He trusted the bells would be rung as they had been for a thousand rears, calling people to church, reminding them of the Christinu virtues of perseverance, self-denial and charity which should be the frujis and test of their Christian calling

The servioe closed with the hyma, 'Praise my soul,' and the blessing.
The company afterwards had tea with Canon Sladen in St. Mary's Parish Fall.

## FOR BEGINNERS.

## IN AND OUT OF COURSF.

A recent argument with regard to briaging Stedman Triples into rounds is a reminder of one of tire principles of clange ringing.

It las to do with certan mathematical laws as appliad to the construction of methods, and we will try to put il into simple language for the beginner.
Thera are, in ringing, two kinds of chantes-changes which keep the bells 'in course 'and changes which put the bells 'out-of-course.'
"Che bells are "in-charse' when the given change' has been produced by the changing of an even number of pairs of bells-as, in Donbles, changing 1 and 2 ; and 3 and 4 , producing 21435; and changing 1 and 4 , and 3 and 5 , producing 24153 .
The bells are "out-of-course' when the criven change has been produced by clanging an odd number of pairs of bells-as, in Triples, changing 1 and 2,3 and 4, and 5 und 6, producing 2143657
But while in Dotubles (or Caters) every row of figures thus sef down is "in-oourse, mati] a Siagle is made, in Triples the rows of figutes are altermately one 'out-of-course ' and one 'in-course.'
Tho reason is that all Doubles changes are even changes, and all Triples changes are odd changes, and two even numbers, is we know, prodnce mu oven number, and two odd numbers alsa produce an even number
Thus, in pure Triples, all handstrokes ate ont-of-course and ali backstrokes mre in-course
A 'Single, which in Triples is gencrally the eltange of two pais of belis only, changes the naturo of the rows, and all handstrokes becone "in-course' and all backstrokes "ott-of-consse.
Rounds is an 'in-course' or 'even' row, and can only be produced when the bells are in-course.

Unless a single has heen made, therefore, romds camot occur at handstroke, or' "odd' row.
Further, if a siugle has been made, the bells cannot be got round at backstroke by any combination of bobs.

## IF YOU DON'T, THEN

(1) The plain hunt (akready described iu these beginner's queries) is the passage of a bell, one step at a time, straiglit from front to back and from kack to front. A Treble Bob hund causes the bell to dodge in each pair of places, as 1.2, 3.4, 5.6, etc., both from front to back and back to front, with a whole pull between the dodyes belind and a whole pull at lead between the dodges in front. The process is like taking three steps forward and one back, instead of, as in plain hunting, walking steadily in one direction.
(2) The Ancient Society of Gollege Youths, established in 1637.
(3) Benjamin Annable lived in the first half of the 18th century Ho was a baker by trade. He joined the Coilege Youtlis in 1721, was Master in 1746 and died in 1756 . Of hint it was said, "Till his time ringing was only called an hrt, bat from the strength of his great Gonius he married it to the Mathematies, and "tis now a Science. This man of Trigures and Ringing was like ir Newton in Philosopliy, a Ratelife in Physic, a Hardwiek in Wisdons aud Law, a Handel in Music, a Shakespeare in Writing, a Garrick in Acting. O rare Ben. Needless to say, a man of such reputation was a great leaker in ringing thonght in those early days. In fact, like other great pioneers in selence, he was in advance of his times.
