## MAINTENANCE OF REGULAR RINGING

There was a strong point made by the Master of the College Youths in his recent speech at Sheffield, when he referred to the importance of maintaining regular service and practice ringing. His statement, that where this is done there is less objection among the public to the use of bells, is beyond challenge. It is in places where the ringing is only spasmodic that complaints are strongest, and it is round these towers, where the bells are only occasionally rung, that the chief opposition to the bells arises when peals are attempted. Where bells are regularly rung for service those members of the public who are so ready to voice dislike to them have little ground of complaint when the ringers practise, and peal ringing within reasonable limits finds a minimum of opposition.
This is one reason why ringers should make every effort to ring the beils for the two main services every Sunday, or, if that is out of the question, for at least one service every Sunday. There is, of course, another and a higher reason, namely, that the bells themselves are not only a call to worship, but are, as we have been so well reminded lately, by their voices directing attention to higher things-the one loud noise sounding out to God's honour and glory. That is the side of bellringing which every ringer should appreciate, and, perhaps, if it were more fully realised there would not be so many towers from which the bells are only chimed on Sundays for one or both the services. But the point we want to emphasise is that made by Mr. Duffield, that the ringers, even in their personal interests and the interests of the art of ringing itself, should not let the ringing for service and practice go by default.

When the public expect the bells to be rung and when the bells are heard regularly at the appointed times, they are accepted as a matter of course, and seldom is there any sedus objection to them. But where the bells break in at some unexpected time, after, perhaps, a long interval of silence, it is not unnatural that some members of the public should 'kick' at the unaccustomed disturbance of their peace. Moreover, it is in these towers where ringing seldom takes place that the least effort is made to modify the sound in the neighbourhood, and, because they are unused to hearing them, the enforced listeners think the bells are noisier and the periods of ringing longer than they really are. In preserving their Sunday service ringing and their regular practice nights, ringers are not only fulfilling the first claim upon them as churchworkers, but are maintaining their own rights and interests against interference from outside. It is not merely the ringers' own convenience that should be studied. Regular ringing is necessary for a two-fold reason.

## BELL BROADCASTS

A RINGER'S PROTEST TO THE B.B.C
The following is a copy of a letter addressed to the B.B.C. by Mr. T. Groombridge, jun., on the question of superimpesing anneuncewents on the broadeast of bells before Sunday evening services:-
Dear sins-1 have previously (some jears agoi approached you on the matfer of broadcastimg church ljells previous to a broadcast serwics protesting at your achion in fading the bels out for announcements, etc.
I feel compelled to tepeat this protest, as you gave a special example of this prior to the service at Nowcostle Cathedral this eveniag, the greater portion of the ringing being drowned by an exceptionally protracted reuital of matter alrendy printed iu "The Radio Times.' I would remind you that change ringing is an art which bas sts devotees in all parts of the kingdom, end your action in broadcasting the bells momentarily anly to fade them down to an accompaniment to the voice of the anouncer is little short of an insult to these interested, who can hear the bells in the far distance, but not clear enough to follow.
Had this not been brought to your notice before, one conld easily assume that you act in igoorance, not realising what a broadcast 'touch ' conveys to ringerg in various partis, but as this is continually repeated it becomes evjdents that the much waunted "proper behariour ' of the B.B.C. is a negligible quantity when the powers that be are not interesied. - Yours faithfully,

## FOR BEGINNERS.

## MORE MINOR METHODS.

A few weeks ago in this column we urged that six-bell ringers who hitherto had confined themselves to Bob Minor should make qua cffort to get out of the rul, and we andeavoured to show them how to make astart. We hope thab in the intervening weeks thoge to whon this particularly applied have made $\operatorname{some}$ effort to fo as we suggested. We now return to the subject again, to lako them, we hope, a step further on the way.
In the construction of many paiss of methods the rows which form the load-the lead in this case being the rowa which you write on paper from and including the shitial rounds, down to und including the first row of the treble's whale pull-can le identical. The dilference in the method is only in the connecting link betryeen the rows at the treble's handstroke lad and the backstroka lead. Here is au example of what we monn: Suppose, when the treble gets batek कo lead tho first time, the bells at the landstroke are rung in the order 146235, the backstroko lead of the treble can lave any one of three different rows (exchuding the question of singles). Thus:-

In the firet you have at 2ndis place 'liule, in the second you have a 6th's place 'link '; the third gives you a 4th's place "link." The first and the second provide bwa different ' nethods'; the tijurd is the 'bob' for both of them,
This may seem a little advanced for some berinuers, but in this article we are assuming that readers alteady know something about methods such as Bob Minor and Reverse Bob Minor, and that they havo studied what we had to say about Contt Bob and Oxtord Boh (vide August l6th issue). We wrote then of the close relationship between the fwo last-named methods, whith have the grme leads, but different comuecting 'links,' and, is we have said, there are many pairs of methods with similat clanacterisifics. Such a pair is St. Clement's Bob and Collemo Bob.

In both nuethads twa liclls dodge an the front throughout the whole lead, that is from the time the treble goes amay, until it returns. In both every other bell, when the treble is above it, gocs dowa to make 3rd's place and returns to the back.
In College Bob 6th's place is made when the treble leads; in St. Clement's, 2nd's is made; and therein lies ithe difference. In any method, End's phace when the troble leads causes all the bells abore to dodge in pairs, i.e, in Minor, iu 3-4, and 5-6. If 6th's place is made when the treble leads, there is 10 dodge.
Here are the fryures of the two wethols. We give them side by side, so that it can be seen that the only difference is the fgures is at the conmecting link. That difference, however, puts the work, lead by lead, in a diferent consecutive order, in addition, in the case of St. Clement's, to introducing a dodge cach time the treble ands.
Begimers should extend the lead to the full course, and then make as diagram of each, by drawing a line downward through one or other of the fisures:-

If, when you have completed your diagrams, you think you can ring your methods by memoriging it, do so, becanse later on you wild find that ringing by diagram is by fur the casiest way, when you want to put fresh methods into practice. But if at this stage you prefor to ring by a talule, here is the work of cacls method set out in that form :-

Pass troble in 5-6, lie whole pull bohind, kiodge $3-4$ down, dodge three times in I-2 dowi and lead.
That is the conscutive work, Lut in College Bob the treble is not meb in the same succession of positions.

## BELLS REOPENED AT EWELL

RESTORATION OF A SURREY PEAL.
Tho reopening of the bells at Ewell, Surrey, after rehanging took place un Saturdiay. The ring of eight has been put on ball beariugs in a reinforced frame, aud the fittings have also been restored. The work has been admivably carried out by Messrs. Gillett and Johuston, who have effected a great improvement in the 'go' of the bells, which for some time had given trouble. Effective steps have also hecr taken to minimise the amount of noise from the bells outside the church-a desirable action in any case, but particularly in this instance, since a new telephone exchange has been built on fle opposite side of the road, the main route from London to Worthing, which rulas past the charch. The louvies have been double mateh-boarded and tite cound of the bells outside is thus considerably modilied. This part of the work was carried out by Mr. C. Read, one of the local ringers, under the direction of the bellfounders.

There mas a considerable gathering of rivgers for the reopening seryice. The rededication was performed by the Rev. G. R. Patison Muir (Rural Dean of Epsom) and an appropriate address given by the Rev. E. C. Usherwood Rector of Belstead and unti] recently Vicar of Ewell, by whom the scheme for the bell restoration was started.
In the course of the service silent prayers were offered 'to ask God's blessing upon this church and its appurtenances.

The actual dedication took place in the belfy, where Mr. Cyril Johnston, rapresating the bellfounderg, handed the rope of the tenor bell to the churciwarden assing bim to receive the bells, which had been restored, that they might once more call God's people to His House of Prajer.
The churchwarden then banded the rope to the Rural Dean, requesting hin to rededicate the bells, which Canon Mur did, with the customary prayers. The bells were rung by a baud from the Leatherhead District of the Guildford Diocesan Guild while the procession returned to the church. The Rep. E. C. Usherwood gave the address, and the service finished with the hymn, 'Lifted ligh within the steeple,' and the Blessing.

Afterwards the visiting ringers from many towers wera entertained to tee, and were welcomed by the new Vicar (the Ref. C. G. Holland), who spoke of the work done to the bells as being the outcome of the effortis of the Rev. E. C. Usherwood. They were glad to hewe the bells once again in a satisfactory coudition, and he congratulated Messrs. Gillett and Johnston upon their work. He hoped the ringers from the Guild wruid pry them frequent vigits.

The subsequent ringing gave all the visitors the opportunity of tryiag the bells, and a great variety of methods was rung. The "go" of the bells delighted everyone.

Ewell belis have a somowhat unusual history. Originally there was a riug of six bells cast at Whitechapel in 1767 and lung in the tower of the old church. The fourth was recast in 1840 and the bells were removed to the new church. A restaration took place in 1890, when the tenors were recast and two trebles were added. Although these four bells were all cast in the same year, the trebles and the tenors bear the nemes of different churchwardens. The explanation is that ons urder was given before Easter and the other after Easter, when frosh clurchwardens had beeu appointed. Mr. John Beams, still one of the regular zingers at Ewell, is the only surviving nember of the band lhat raing for the opening of the eqglat bells.

Tlie old ing of five was hung in 1711, and the ring of eight placed in the new tower when the church was enlarged in 1895 . Ringing took place on both peals during the afternoon and eveaing
A short service was conducted by the Archdeacon of Coventry (the Ven. Brook), the recently appointed Rector of Rurby Parish Church. The organist, Mr. E. W. Groocock, F.R.C.O., A.R.C.M., very kindly played tha organ for the hymus and the pralm, and the lesson was read by Mr. M. Melville, seeretary of the Guild.
The Archdeacon opened his address with an few wards of welcome and went on to say that bellingers were worthy of an honoured place among churchworkers. They performed, ha said, a very impoitant duty Sunday by Sunday. He stressed the message which the bells delivered to the world and declared that the ringing of the bells on Sunday was the only survival of the old-fashioned Englists Sunday. The first experience he had af beltringing, he sati, was when lie was inducted to the living of Doncaster. He pulled the rope, but failed, try ns lie might, to get nay sound out of the bell. He made sure, at his induction at Rugby, that this shoutd not occur Egain, for he got the verger to start the bell for him boforo he took hold of the rope He was pleased, he continued, to see sa many young ringers at the meeting that day. He was of opinion that the difficulty in keeping young recruits was that young peoplo were very veluctant to do anything which they could not do well almost at once. As a result they became impationt and lost juterest; but to those who stuck to it would come the reward which comes to al! who have acquired skill in a diffeult art.
At the business meeting which followed tea, the Rev. J. A. B. Davies (Vicar of Chilvers Coton and presideat of the Guild) took the chair. He was supported by Mr. J. H. White (Ringing Mastor), Mr. T. W. Chapman, Mr. M. Melville (secretary) and other ringers and friends from Allesley, Nuneator, Bulkington, Chilwers Coton, Lillington, Monks Kirby, Stoke, Melton Mowbray and several of the local band
It was proposed to delay the November meeting a wedk so that it could take place on November 23 w , which is the actual date on which the Guild was founded 28 years ago. This meeting is to be held at Numeaton and Chilvers Coton, when it is hoped that several of the older and past members of the Guild will be present
The December meeting was arranged for Arley, and the quarterly meeting for Warwick in January.
It was unanimously agreed that Archdeacou Brook be made a vicepresident of the Guild, and to this he readily consented

The prosition now is that, a new Mayor is being elected and a proposal that the money be distributcd nomong kent hospitals is rumoured, but I lave been unable to confim this. ## ST. MARTIN'S GUILD, BIRMINGHAM.

## A STORY OF ASTON'S WEAPHEROOCK.

Althongh the quarterly meeting of St. Martin's Guild for the Diocese of Birminglatu hat to be postponed fron October 5 th until October 19th, between 40 and 50 members attended to hear and ring on the new peal of twelve bells at Aston Parish Church. There was a pal of eirht bolls there as far back as 1776 , and in 1814 these were augmented into a peal of ten, and on June 296 this ycar they were recrst and again augaented to make a peal of twelve by Jolm Taylor and Co., of Laughborough. Many famons peals have been rung on Aston bells, amonget the earliest being 10,080 Bob Major on Septennjer 294, 1788, in six hours and 23 minutes; and 15,360 Roly Wajor on October 1st, 1793, in viae hours 31 minutes.
Here it was that such old Birmingham worlhies as Femy Johnsou, Tom Russam, William Carter und William Kent used to ring, and it is recorded hat ou one occasion, whilst a peal was in progress, the wathercouk on top of the spire fell down. When the ringers came down to see what liad bappeued, Henry Johnson told then that if they opened the base of the weathercock they would find certain newspapers and coins in it. This was found to bo correct, and when asked how ho knew, said he saw them put in. Singularly enondt on the day the new peal of twelve were dedicated it was observed how erraticully the weathercock was oscillating, and on closer examination it, has been fonnd necessary for renew the slonework on top of the spire and reset the weathercock
Tho Guild's form of service was conducted by the curate, and a very interesting and helpful address was given by the Vicar, the liew. F. Mo,iownas. Au extellent tea had been provided by the local rangers' wives and [riends, and this was thoroughly enfoyed.
The business meeting was presided over hy Mr. Vper-President A. Tradon Smilh in the absonce of the Masber, Mr. Addennan J. S. Pritcluct, M.A, wha wrote regretting his inability to attend gwing to tho changod date. Apologios were also received from Mr. Farry Masan, Mrr. Tyinitys the tenor bell of which weighed 10 cht., that of St. David's would weigh 15 cwt.
The intertion of the late Miss Page, who had left money for 'a peal of bells, would ihus be more than fully carried out.
