

## NOTTINGHAM'S FINE EXAMPLE.

There have been many evidences of late that the leading bell founders of this country are well employed, and that, with the reviving prosperity which is slowly coming about, bell restorations are being taken in hand in many places. It is, indeed, often a matter for astonishment that so much new bell work and so many schemes of restoration are possible. It is not only an indication of recovery in prosperity, but also another evidence of the real love which the majority of people have for their church bells. Unless church bells were very near to tise hearts of Englishmen, they would be among the last things for which money would be provided, for we cannot ignore the fact that they are in some respects a luxury. But the restoration of bells is going on apace all over the country and despite the often heard complaint, ' We have no money,' in some mysterious way sooner or later it scems forthcoming where bells are concerned.
This year has seen the completion of some important augmentations and restorations, St. Albans, Kidderminster, Aston, Chislehurst and Worsley among them, and now a complete rejuvenation of the belis at St. Mary's, Nottingham, bells with a history of 350 years behind them. This restoration was an instance of the seemingly impossible being accumplished, despite the depression of the times. Nottingham has suffered as badly as most cities in recent years, but that has not prevented its citizens from rising to a great and pressing demand for the saving of their fine old parish church and its belis. No less than $£ 12,000$ was needed for the restoration of the age old roof and tower walls and a complete renewal of what the tower contained-floors, bells and frame. Despite the times, no less than $£ 10,000$ has already been raised and there is little anxiety about the balance. It is a wonderful example of what can be done by energy and determination, coupled with faith-not only faith in God, but faith in one's fellow men to respond to a call when it is made in a cause so near to many hearts as the preservation of a great heritage.

The example of what has been done in Nottingham should be an encouragement to other if smaller places faced with a heavy demand for the preservation of church or bells. There are still many parishes where bells are badly in need of attention and where the nightmare of lack of means is ever present to scare off attempts to effect improvement. Indeed, the fear of financial failure has caused the indefinite postponement of many schemes of church improvement, apart from bells. Where restoration work is really necessary we commend the courageous example of Nottingham; we share their faith in lovers (Oontinued on page 710.)

## DEDICATION SERVICE IN RINGING ROOM. <br> Tenor Box as Pulpit.

The aneient Church of St. Mary, Nottingham, is uudorgoing extensive renovation, and the fret part of the fl2,000 scleme las been completed by the dedication of a recast ring of tan bells. For years pest the bells had been in bad going condition, and the ringerg had had a most discoutaging task. Nothing by way of repair scemed likely until at last it became apparent that acsperate remedies were needed. An examivation then revealecl that the great foundation beams of oak, which for centuries had carried the bell frame, had bcell eaten away by the death-watcls beetle, until, in places, fittlo but a shell was left. The discovery was made only just in time. Similar ravages were found in the roof timbers of the church, and, under the energetic gudance of the Right Rev. Bishop Neville S. Talbot (Vicar), a comprehersive scheme of restoration was set on foot. The repair to the church roof aud the renovation of the exterior face of the great cantral towar are still in hand, but, the bells and the interior of the tower have bean completed, and this worl was dedicated on Saturvaty at a servica which the Yicar specially wade a ringerge fathering
beneath which a new ferro-concrete floor las been laid. A new floor has been put in the ringing chamber, the walls of which jave beers thoroughly eleaued and the appartment made worthy of the church. Interesting inscriptions in Latin have been reproduced on the now bells, with the addition of the intimation that they weve recagt by Qilleit and Johnston, 1935. The treble was vecast in 1856, aud the next three bear tho name of the Rey. Scrope Beardmore, Ficar, the 2nd 'Raised' by subscription, 1761,' the 3re 'Nottingham Friends of Music restored me,' and the 4th 'Untouchen I silent am, Etrive and I sweetly sing.' The two latter bear the names of the churchwardena of 1765 . The 5th was an Oldfield bell witli the date 1699: 'When my' voice, is lifted up, do Thou, O Josu, direct pius souls. O come lee ui sing.'
The sixilh was another Oldfield bell, cast 1673, and the 7th was from the same fouldry 1690, with the inseription, 'May this bell be consecrated by the Blessed Trinity.' Henry Oldield, jun., cast the 8th im 1605, with the hascription: ' In the name of Jesus Chirist let every kue bruw, of things in Heaven, of things in Earth, nurd of just mens.
Thic nintit is ath antiquarian treasure, and has three rows of dencrafors and dently cakl lettering. If. beats four impressions of quens


ST. MARY'S CHURCH, NOTTINGHAM.

The bell ronlact has been splendinly carrict out by Messrs. Giilett and Jolinston. A clean sweep of all tha appurtenances of the beliry was necessary. Plo old patehce up wooden frame has gone, and in its place a massive iton A frame, supporteal hy huge steel girders, has beon erected. The farge dimensions of the tower euabled this to be planmed diagonally across the tower, so that the greatest stresses are taken on the cerners of tho buildimg, where great strength lies in its buttreenes. The fundations of the frame are braced with fi substantial grillage, and the bells tutal, of contse, on ball bearings.
Of the bells themselves, wille worc recast, the ofd nintl, a bell cast in 1595 by Henry oldfield, being retanim. It is of fino tomal quality and an excellent specimen of the founder's craft. It was felt to bo worthy of a place with tho new peal, althougla it seems hardly powerful cnangh for its new companious. At 21 cest it is scarcely heavy enough to enual in proportion the very fine 35 cwt. tenor inc. Būt for pll hat, St. Mary's lias got a clorious ring, of which nay city might be prond.

A GREAZ TRANSFORMATION.
In the arrangements of the iower there lias also been a grent transformation. Thin arailable space in tho ringing roont lans been enlarged by the building of a moro compact stainway leading to the bells,

It was led by tho Bishop, as Vicar, and the unacompanied singing was very heartily joined ins The dedicabion was performoll by the Bhistope at the request of one of his churchwardols, intul le lleni, ins Yicat, rfoeived the ropes from the lazads of the Arvadenters al Noltinglata, who commited the bells to his care as it sacred irust. I'lie ropes were then passed to the Ringing Master Mr. Aluert Coppocky, and tho bells were rung in a few rounds by St. Mary's ringers. 'I'lis was followed by the Dovology and specinl proyers.

## BTB,C. AND BELL BROADCASTS

NEWCASTLE ANNOUNCEMENT: MORE DETALIED THAN

## USUAL.

Tho protest wade to the B.B.C, ly Mr. T. Groombridge, jun. (published mour last issue), against stiperiaposing amouncements when bells are being broadeast prior to relighons services, has aronsed considerable interest.
Mr. Groombridge has received the following reply from the B.I.C.
We thank you loo your letter of Detober 27th, and we ave very soryy to note your crilicism. Normally all unr anuouncements befre church services are very short, and as a genural rule we do uot think that fou shonkd have much canse for complaint. In this particular case, however, we quite agree that ihy annomeement was far more detailed than usnal, and we lave alreaty taken the matter no wita those concerned.'
In acknowledging this letter, Mr. Groombridge suid:-
"I would like to say in reply that: the reasonable tone therein is a pleasant change from my previous experience, when I was bluntiy informed that "Wo consider the effect of the superimposed anouncement to be very pleasing." That, loweyer, wha a few years ago, and possibly clanges in stali and ideas wove taken place since then,
' I would, however, like to put the whole case before you from a ringer's poink of view, if possible, although this is somewhat diffirnli: by this means, as the mysteries fir chunge ringing require at wey lengthy explanation to those mancynaintod with the art, and, as far os I man ambe, there are no ringers on your staft to give you personal explanation.
© Briffy, Whe position ts this: an experienced ringer can, from in short brondcast touch of a few minates ${ }^{*}$ unbroken duration, determin the method being rung, the calling used to produce these particulns clanges, the characteristies and quality of the hells; in short, hir can "read the message of the bells," which is a closed book to all but practical change ringers, and. ns ringers often travel 「ar and wide in the exercise of thefr art, there is a very deep fascination in following these short touches, sometimes from towers in which we have ourselves rung (in this case I have very pleasant memories of my wisit to Neweastle Cathedral), others from towers with noted peais of bells therein. To illustrate this puint further; you gave a broadcast gome considerable time back fron Leytonstone. At the timp. there was great achivity at this tower int the adranced and intrictu-six-bell methods, and I know a goom many ringers tumed in to hear what Lextonstone were going to "put on the air." In this casc your annourcer wns brief and concise, but about a dozon or so clanges had been inug before the announcement was superimposed, and blit " listening vinger" was conpletely cul. wat until the speech was finished, by which time ho lad lititle chance of detecting the methor hoing ring; in fact, I lave been unalife ta find one who was successful.
'I hope I. have succeeded in wonveying to you that, as far as ringers are concerned, the broadrask. fines not commence until the amouncer retires, and he hears the hells without intcyruption

While I hesitate te presume by telling you how to arrange magranmes, I would like to convey to you the altemative, which is not only my idea, hutf that of scores nf my ensociates.

Where, as is often tho oase, there is an interval from 7.45 p . m . until the broadcast service, would it not be possible to make inuammouncements, say, at 7.50 p.un., and let us lave uninterrupted ringing after, तud, just one final request: can we not learn from thi "Radio Thimes," as in davs of yore, which stations are broadeastiny holls? This especially applies to those who have not the adrantages of single knob tuailig, who find London Regional hroadcasting un orgen voluntary, find the kidind doing ditto, gnd finally get the last few changes from the Northern Regrional-rather annowing when wo get, on the average, about inve minutes per fortnight

RINGERS BACKING WANTED.
In sending us the nbove consespondence for publication, Mr. Gomanbridge says: 'T hase alrealy lreard from others, who are of the opinion that this protest shond be supported by ringers generall: T filly realise that we cannot dictate to the B. B.C., but I do thiuls that we are antitled to a little more consideration over a broadeasi which rans ont to about five minutes a fortuight. I would ask fumy latest regust to receive sobue befing from ringers gencrally,
The following comment comes from 'J. D.' :
'Why don't lymadeasting bands take a portable wireless set into the beffry, and, the monent the announcer barges in, pack up? I have been eight years withent a sct, becanse of this sort of thing, so the B.B.C. is 54 down on that account.'
