## NAMES THAT CARRY HISTORY.

What's in a name? Sometimes there is a great deal. Although Shakespeare added: "That which we call a rose by any other name would smell as sweet,' there are some names in tinging which would not sound half so sweet to the ringer's ear were they to be changed. Belf ringing, it has often been said, has a language of its own, and it is quite true that it employs common words in quite a special and unusual way. Where these terms have come down to us through centuries it would be almost sacrilege to change them. They may be quaint, like Grandsire, or curious, like Treble Bob, but no one, we imagine, would now dream of aitering them. In the same way, there are ringing societies which have continued through many generations; that lave filled a conspicuous place in ringing history. Their titles are a heritage from the past and their members to-day are only custodians. It will therefore strike the majority of ringers as strange that anyone should even call these names into question.

It takes all sorts of people to make a world, and there are some who, in the sacred name of progress and modernisation, would tear down everything that our predecessors built up, merely for the sake of change. We do not desire to attach importance to the letter of a correspondent, which appears in another column, because, to begin with, we are sure he is one of a very small minority, even if he is not the only one, who would like to see the titles of some of our old societies brought ' up-to-date.' It is not for that reason that we refer to it here. Mr. Amos shows a very confused idea - we might even go further and say complete ignorance-of the origin and status of the societies he particularly singles out, but we refer to the subject because it gives opportunity to remind ringers, and particularly young ringers, that in these titles history is writ large. To those who have studied ringing history there is a world of meaning in the titles of the Ancient Society of College Youths, the Society of Royal Cumberland Youths, and even of the St. Martin's Guild for the Diocese of Birmingham. The two former have come down to us unchanged from the early days of ringing, the last named perpetuates a connection which for nearly two hundred years has centred round the church that is still the core of the organisation which a few years ago was expanded to take in ringers in the diocese of Birmingham. To students of the past and to the majority of lovers of the present, a change would be unthinkable. The College Youths and the Cumberlands retain their ancient organisation and the former much of the ritual that has marked their proceedings for cen-

turies. 'St. Martin's' implies a whole volume of ringing history to those who know. Among the many diocesan and territorial societies that have grown up in the last half century or so, there are not the same traditions to be maintained, but the Exercise would lose one of its most precious possessions if, for the sake of mere modernisation, the identity of these old societies were lost in newfangled names. Even if our correspondent's arguments had any real foundation-which they have not, they are only misapprehensions-there would still be no reason why these names, which link us with the past even with the foundations of our art - should be cast aside just because they do not fit to-day's circumstances. There are many parallels which we conld quote, but the preservation of these old names needs no justification.

## FOR BEGINNERS.

## Writing out methods.

Many beginners, we are afraid, do not do as mucl pencil and paper work out of tho belfry as they ought to do if they want to master the first stages of change ringing. This is a mistake. You cumnot do too much study at home, nud a careful examination of changes expressed in figures is of immense assistance when it comes to practical application in the tower. An instuructor raay be as lucid as you will in his explanations, but all he tells you by word of mouth you lave to try and imagine in your brail, unless you can writo it down. 'To do this or that when you bogiu change ringing on verbal instructions alone is not as simple as following directions given by word of moutl when you seek to walk the contatryside from village to village. This is noti always an easy thing, unless you have been plainly directed, but to attempt to find your way through a maze of "pathis' in as method, with little more than split seconds in which to mako up your mind which step to take next, is to be asked to perfornz a very difficult task, unless you have investigated your' 'route' on a 'map' beforehand.
For this reason every beginner should bo made to sludy a method before he is allowed to take a bell in $i^{t}$, in the tower. His instructor should insist upou a pencil and paper lesson first. We have known begiuners aftempt to ring changes week arter week with nothing to go upon but the perfunctory explanations given them in the tower on practice night. Tliey have struggled valiantly hut vainly, and bave falled to 'see daylight.' We aro convinced that tho secret of the failure has been lack of study outside the tower.
A beginner may need some help in his furst attempts on paper, just as lie may ueed assisfance when he comes to the practical application, but he will understand the subject best if he males an offort unaidnd to build up the method he wants to ring. Herc is a way in which he may set about it.
Let him first begin with changes on three bells. If he writes ont the figures 1.2 .3 and is told that he may only change adjoining hells, ho will realise that, when he starts, his first change must be either 2.1.3 or $1,3,2$, aud, again, he will at once see, or eise he will immedintely find out, that whichever pair (the front or the back) he first changes, ha cannot chauge them next time, or he will be back where ho started. Therefore, the nest stap demands that the opposite pair shall be changed, and if he started with 2.1.3, he must next have 2.3.1. If he began with 1.3.2 he must next have 3.1.2, and so on, until, after six clanges, he returns again to 1.2.3.
The basis of 'clanges' is to change each time as many pairs of adjoining bells as possible. When you have only three bells, there is only one pair that cay be changed at a time. Ir you have four bells, there ere two pairs which can be changed the first time, but if you change two pairs of adjoining bells the next time, you will return to your starting point. Therefore, when writing out chauges on four belli, thay have to be formed by changing two pairs and one pair alternately. You cans see this in the following figures :-

If you continue to follow that phan, the eighti change will take you back to rounds, 1.2.3.4.
But there are 24 possible changes ou four bells. How are we to get the rest? At every eighth change, instead of moving the middle pair one or other of the other pairs is moved, and the two remaining hells, as it were, stand still. If we continue the figures above, we shall have after 4.3.2.1 the following:- $\quad 3412$

Then, instead of changing 3.2 , which would bring us bnck to rounds, we change 2.4, and leave 1.3 as they are, thus:-

And from that point you can continue to change the bells first withs two pairs and then with one pair, until at the eighth chinge again you change the back prir only. Pursuc this course and the bells come romed at the extent of the changes, that is 24 .
You can write out this 'course' if you like, but also try yout hand at some of the other ways of arrauging them. For instance, if at the fourth change, instead of the eighth, you chayge cither the frout or the back pair and allow the othor 'two to "lic still," as it is tecinically termed, then, by repating this at every cighth change sumeceding, you can still get 24 true changes. Morcover, it need not be the fourtin or the eighth change for tha first of thess ' shunting ' operations. It can just as well be dono at the second or the sisth. As long as the succeeding places are eight changes npart, rounds will turn up batisfactorily af inc 24 th change.
Now, try the experimont, will you, on paper, and see in how mauy waya you can get the 24 clamges? It may prove the foundation of quite a lot of knowledge.

But you wouldn't believe it, after the wey in which he reng the 9th at St. Magnus' Church, London Bridge, in a 'birthday ' peal on Saturday. He rang it as if he had been 22 all his life.
Joking apart, however, his performance shows how wonderfully preserved, mentally and physically, he is for this great age, and everyone will wish him still many years of health to enjoy the art of which he is so fond, and of which he is still so able an exponent.

Ladies and gentlemen, the toast is: "Many happy returns of the day to Mr. James George!'
Fifty years ago, on November l6ih, Jagper Whitfield Snowdon died aged 41. He was not only the founder of the Yorkshire Association, but his work for the art of ringing has laid the foundation of the knowledge of thousands of ringers who have succeeded him. He was buried in Hikley Ohurchyard, and in the church atained glass window is the nemorial of the ringers of Englend.

Dear Sir,-Some 18 months ago I wont ronnd Bunbury (Cheshire) Church with a London architect, who was interested in antiquarian matters, and had come to see some stone coffin lids placed in that сһитсh.

I temanked how well preserved they were, and my companion anid the reason was hecause "wrought iron resisted corrosion much betker than oast iron.

## TITLES.

## MR. AMOS WANTS TO CHANGE OLD NAMES.

 Fo the Editor.Sir,-During recent years there have been a number of clange ringing gnilds whose titles, having leen thought to be rather out of date, have been clanged to something more fitting with modern times. I have of ten wondered as the years roll by why this action has not been applied to the Ancient. Society of College Youfhs, whose present title seems to me ridiculous, and is thought to be curious by people outside ringmg when asking what the society consists of, and beng given the answer that it is made up af ringers of all agres, in all parts of the country, and that its headquarters are in London. Thoy ask, as I do, why use the word "Colfege' when not 5 per cent. of its members have ever been to a college, and why 'Youthe' when it consists of men of all ages, some of them over 80 years of age? Similariy they ask of the Cumberland Youths, why 'Youths and why 'Cumberland' if the society has no connection with Cumberland?
The "St. Martin's Guild for the Diocese of Birmingham" is another whose title seems obsolete and ridiculous. Why 'Str. Martin's' Guild if St. Martin's is not the Cathedral Church? Would not 'The Birmingham Diocesan Guild, sound much better? Five year's ago it was suggested splitting the Mifland Counties Association up into diocesan guilds. Who, then, would have suggested naming the Eeicester Diocese 'The St. Margarct's Guild for the Diocese of Leicester,' or the Derby Dincese "The St. Andrew's Guild for the Diocese of Derby '? Why, then, 'St. Martin's Guild for the Diocese of Birwingham '?

Believing that Mr. Amos would like fo know the feeling of the College Youths aljout his suggestion that the title of the Aucient Society should be changed, we showed lus letter to one of ils members and this wis the part of the comment which camo within the permitted scope of cold print:-
'There are many things in ringing besides the title of the Ancient, Socicty of Coltege Youths wheh have seemed vidiculaus to Mr. Percy Amos, and many other things in it thought to bo curious by people outside the Exercise. Horm they like to poke fun at us over our "Grandsires" and "Bold Majors" as they love to style them!

But why should Mr. Amus think the tithe of the College Youths so ridiculous? Presumably he has read the history of it-or hann't he? And, after all, is it so much of a misnomer as he wants to think it-is it any more a misnomer, for instance, than his own mame? He is not one of the prophets-the real prophets, I mean-but no one gays his name is ridiculous.
"Let us, however, just look at this title of "Ancient Society of College Youtbs." Seeing that the saciety is almost three hundred years old, you cannot get away from the fact that it is "ancient," can you? And most of the menbers to-day are youths; some are youths in years, some are youths in spirit, and still entitled, I think, to call themselves by that description. But what about that word College? That is where, I think, Mr. Amos has slipped up rather badly. I do not inagine that those who gave the society its uame had any intention of limiting the membership to college students or graduates. No, Mr. Amos has got hold of the wrong end of the stick. Tho society derived its name from the Coilege of the Holy Ghost and Hospital of God's House, founded by Dick Whitfington in 1424. This Callege was situnted upon the east side of College Hill, in the city of London, and adjoining it was the Church of St. Martin, where the College Youths first practised. This church was swept away in the Grent Fine. There is no College now on College Hill, but the thoroughfare yetains its name, and so have the College Youths, with as much justification as the city authorities retain the name of the street.
"But even if all this did not justify the retention of the old name of the society, it would still be an act of great presumption, if not impertinence, on the part of Mr. Anos to suggest that such a famons old title should be discarded.

Aud the same magy be said of his criticism of other societies. Mr. Amos should dead their history. The Cumberlagd Youtlis were never associated with the county of that name. Tlae title of "Cumberland" was conferred on the socicty as an act of favour by the Duke of Gumberland.
'As to St. Martin's Guild, the members can bo left to deal with Mr. Amos. If they do, the men of Birmingham can be trusted not to put too fine a point upon their langrage. St. Martin's bas been the centre of ringing in Birminghan for nearly 200 years, and the real trouble, if any, which Mr. Amos should seek to put right is not to chunge the title of the Guild, but to get the ecclesiastical authorities to charge the Cathedra!. It should be St. Martiu's and not St. Philip's.
'What a wouderful world we should lave, if Mr. Amos had his way!'
