## 'THIS MEANS YOU!'

In the notice of a meeting held last Saturday, the secretary of one of the branches of the Lancashire Association said: ' Please make this a good meeting by turning up. This means you.' Such a pointed invitation was not, we hope, without effect, in the district to which it was specially directed, but it could be applied with equal reason, we imagine, in many other associations, and in relation to many other things in ringing besides district meetings. Ringers, as a body, are notoriously apathetic and yet they expect others to be up and doing in order to keep the flag fiying and the organisation in proper trim. It is probable that in many areas not half the members attend a district meeting throughout the year, and the consistent loyalty of a small proportion saves many meetings from being a complete failure. It is true that the regular support of the stalwarts is a thing well worth having; it is the power which keeps the machine moving, and the loyal backing of these members makes any effort worth while, but the lukewarm ringers often fill the officials with dismay. Even the payment of an annual subscription ought not, in itself, to be considered a full discharge of one's obligations. What is of more value is a personal interest in the society's affairs, and support of its various activities.

But there are other directions in which a similar appeal might well be made to a large body of the ringers throughout the country. What about the Sunday service ringing, that has got slack, because of your unpunctuality? What about the neglected practices, which, for want of your attendance, wears down the enthusiasm of others, prevents their progress, and may even lead to abandonment of these weekly practices altogether? What about that fresh method which the others would like to ring, but which is impossible because of your indifference? And to get beyond your own tower, what about the work which is entailed upon honorary secretaries, because youy subscription to the association is not promptly paid? Or, the inconvenience that may be caused when, if you do attend a meeting, you fail to send the postcard that would facilitate the tea arrangements? And, if you are not a member of an association because you think you will not get anything out of it, have you ever thought that there is nothing worth having to be got out of anything unless you put something into it? 'This means you' is an excellent text for a sermon, and we hope that there are many ringers who will ponder upon it in its application to their own attitade to their own tower and association. We are quite sure that a little thought will show how much more successful both a local band and an association could be, if the apathetic ringers shed some of their lethargy and indifference.

We can well understand the feeling of annoyance created, among those responsible for the ringing at Stoke Parish Church, by what was probably a thoughtless action on the part of the members of the association who deserted the official for the unofficial tower. The ventilation of a very legitimate grievance will, we hope, prevent any similar occarrence in the future.

## To the Editor.

Dear Sir,-I feel that some comment should be mado concerning the after-ter attendance at St. Peter's beliry, Stoke-on-Trent, on the ocension of the North Staffs Association's annual meeting last Suinurday.
Seventy-three members (s record for this meeting) gat down to tea, which was generously provided by the Rector, and at 6.45 p.m., tea and lusinuess over, a few of us made our way to the belfry, which is less than one hnindred yards away from the tea room. However, we bad to wait matil 7.10 before a seratch band could get the bells going again to Crandsire Triples. No more than 16 ringers put in appearance for the after-tea ringing, the majority of whom cauld only ring Grandsire or call changes.

The greater reason which brought about this disgraceful state of affairs was, I believe, that an unmuthorised ringer had taken unto himself the privilege of having the Fentor Parish Ghurch tower open for Surprise ringers, and, to tha disgust of the few stalwarts who remaincl at the Stoke tower, they (who went there) paid their respects in this way to our annual meeting and to the donor of tho tea.

I have nttended many mectings in our om and other associations, but have never come across such nean conduct as this before.

## ALARMING ACCIDENT AT BEDFORDSHIRE MEETING. <br> OLAPPER FALLS THROUGF THREE FLOORS AND STRTKES RINGER.

An unusual and alarming accident, which resulted in injury to one of the ringers, ocenrred on Saturday, while a meeting was in progress at Old Warden, Bedfordshire.
The clapper of the tenor bell came out, dropped straigtt through two trap doors, which werc open, and througla fwo ladiders, before crashing on to a third trap doon and smashing its way to the botton of the tower.
The ringers, alarmed by the noise overhead, made to run away, but beforo he could get clear, Mr. Sydney Fox, of Sandy, who was ringing the treble, was struck on the side of the head by the falling clapper and sustained a masty wound. He received medical attertion and was then taken home.
That a clapper should fall as this one did, straight, through the open trap doors and reach the bottom of the tower, is an extraordinary event and one which can seldom have thappened before, Although Mr. Fox's injury was severe, the accident might have had even wrorse consequeaces. Everyone will wish Mr. Fox a speedy recovery.

## REDEDICAMION AT LEIGHTON BUZZARD.

Ringels from all parts of Hedfordshire and ths weighbouriug counties of Buckinghan, Hortford and Northampton attended the service of thanksgiving for the work done iu retuning aud rehanging the peal of ten bells at Al] Saints' Clurch, Leighton Buzzayd, on Saturday, November 30th. A laree corngregation, consisting chiefly of belmmgers, filled the nave of the church far the service, which was conducted by the Vical (the Rev. S. E. \$wanu), and at which the president of the Bedfordshire Association (the Rev. A. Rust) delivered a homely address to those present. Preaching from ist. Luke, xiv., 17 , 'Come, for all things are now readi," the preacher expressed his pleasure at being present at the reopening, and congratulated the rownspeople upon zestoring the bells, for, from what he had heard, it was about time they were pud into order. He had every confidence that the work had beer extremely well done, and he hoped for years they would be somewhere near perfection. Going about the countr'y he came into contaet with parishes in which the bells had been sadly neglected, and he hoped that such a state of affairs would not always contimue. Ringers were litie bells; they were not seen in prominent places, but were often lieard, and he intended to do everything in his power to see that they were treated as they should be, as officials of the Church. Riells were used on solemun and joyous occasions, and Gad seemed to use them as his wouthpiece. The bells were tine glory of our country, tund he thanked God for the work which had been done in the parish.
A company of 50 were entertamed to tea at the Albion Hotel, and the Rev. S. F. Swann offered a word of weleome to the visitors. When he first cane to the parish, he said, he thought what a fire peal of bells they had, but after hearing the views of some of their ringers and after officialing at one distriet mocting in the town and listenimg to the remarks passed, he began to have his doubls. A bountiful tea was served after the service in the Church Room, at which the Rev. Jagge presided, supported by his colleague, the Rev. B. A. Whitebead, and Mr. Colc, the organist. He was also voter to take the chair for the ensuing business mecting. After observing a silence to the memory of Mr. W. T. Waller, late churchwarden of St. Marfin's, Dorking, and an honorary member of the Guild, tile chicf business was the nomination of district officers for 1936, which resulted in all those reliring being renominated, with the pddition of Mr. H. V. Youngr, af Leatherliead, as ringing representative on Benevolent Fund followed, and it 'retirinet' collention was taken, amounting to 4 s . 6 d .
The committee's suggestion ns to the William Pye Memorial Fumal was also discussed, as was the question of combined practices.
As the Southern District of the Ladies Guild proposed to Irald a meeting at Leatherhead in Febramy, it was decided that they be asked to make it a joint meeting with the district's anmal meeting on February $15 t h$.

## FOR BEGINNERS.

## TEST YOUR SKILL.

We wander how many berimers took the trouble last week to write out the two sels of sixly clanges of Doubles, which we suggested they should dap At this stage of their ringing 'education,' they cannot do too much pencil and paper work. To study change ringing it is necessary to do more than merely 'read' and 'ring.' Fon muse write." You cannot really understand all that is involved unless you yourself put figures on paper. Presently you may get so interested In the subjeet that you will have diffenlty in keeping your penell from paper; you will be wanting to work out all sorts of litite or big problems; but, unless you have done some of this elementary work you will find the task a! the harder. Apart from that, however, it is very desirable that you shauld, to your present advantage, work out some of these things, which, in the scholastic sense, are "exercises.

For instance, here is something you might well try for yourselves just see iu how many ways you can build up Doubles, by applying certain simple rules. To help to jllustrate what we mean, let un put down the plain course of Original Doubles-that is, as many changes of Doubles as can be produced on this principle without bob or single.

In this method all the bells follow a plain hunting course; in other words, they go from front to back, or back to front, one step at a time withont deviating from their path by 'dodging; or pausing to make a ' place.' Dodging, for those who do not yet know the meaning of the term, is an internption of the onward path hy stepping back a place before goilg forward natain. 'Making a place' is striking two cousecutive blows in one position-marking time for a pace, as it were. Sometimes this results in the bell retracing its tops, instead of going on .

An we saw last week, this principle of producing changes can be extended by making 3rd's place at stated intervals, the making of the 3ri's place causing two other bells to dodge together.
Now what we should like beginners to do is to see in how many ways they can produce a plain course. They may make 3rd's place at any or as many places as they lite, as long as they do not interrupl the plain hunting of the treble, and no bell remains more than two blows in any one place; and as long as the places are produced at the corresponding changes in every lead, and at every change two pairs of bells aro moved. For instance, you can make the 3rd's place, is we showed you last week in Grandsire, at the firgt change. You can if you like, nake it at the sixth clange instead; or you can make 3rd's at both the first and the sixth change. There are a number of combinations; see how many you can find!

HOW STEDMAN DOUTBLES IS BUILT UP
And while we are on the subject of writing out Dioubles, let us go a step further. Most methods of Doubles have the treble continuously phan hunting-you conld lave any other bell if you wished it, but ever since the beginging of ringing, the general practice has been to make the weble the buat bell. But: there is one wonderful meftrod that has come down to us from the begiming of rimgiug history, known as Stedrann, in whiteh no boll does "plain humting, but alf do the same work.
'The 'work' of cwery method makes up a cycle, and eyery 'working bell ' in the phain course follows that cycle, beginning it at a different pince. In Grandsire Doubles, if you Examiae a plain conrse, you will see that two bells are plain hunting and that the other three are Hoing "tho work "whish malies the nethof. In Stedman all the bells do itl the wark.
Stedman, who wrote the first book on clange ringing, tells tis that it is founded on the 'sixes,' menning that the hasis of the method is the six changes which it is possible to get on three bells. Those of you who studied our article a fortnight ago will have learnt, something ubout prodncing the extent of changes on three bells. You enn do it in two ways, forward and backward.

Insfead, however, of coming into rounds at the end of the 'six, Gitedman pushed one bell out to dmige behind and brought one of the dodging bells to the front to work out another 'six with the two remaining bells. Then, by producing the sixes alternately forward and backward le was able to obtain all the sixty changes without nuy deviation from the plain course, such as is necessary in Grandsirn Doubles.

For a purpose of his own, perhaps to make the start like Grandsire Danbles, Stedman did not lave an whole six to start with, but began like this:-

Thus he continued, the sixes in front being pronuced alternately by forward and backward hunting.
From this try and build up the 60 changes, as Stednan built them, draw a contiuuons line from top to bottom over any one of the fimites and compare the path of each of the other bells with it Allowing for the different phaces of starting, fou will find it is exactly the same.

Bell News' on July 25th, 1914, urder the title of 'Bristol Surprise extended to treble double dodging,' by Mr. I. A. Trollope, together with a smilar nethod, entitled "Bristol Surprise extended to treble treble dodring.' Also in 'Bell News' on December 22nd, 1894, a treble 3-pull dodge method, Champiou Sur prise,' and rgain in the same paper on Fobuary 2nd, 1895, another 3-pull dodge method, 'Birninghan Surprise,' appenred, both by the late Mr. Joln Carter. In "Bell News, Sept. 27th, 1894, two methods with treble slouble cloclsing as in Wryri, entinled Somersetshire Treble Bob and Warwickslire Treble Elob, were published, both by Mr. D. Scholefield, who, in the same issue, latd wo other methods with lueble dedging twice ou front and rear, but only once in 3-4 and 5-6. These were entitled Devoushire and Derbyshire Treble Bols. Finally Worth Sutprise, ns you say, hy Mr. F'. Dench, was published in ' Rell News, July 30th, 1904. BERNARD H. WELLS.

In the presence of a large congrectation, two treble bells, presented to Redruth Parish Churel by Mr. E. C. Garvoldt, of Bogmor (a native of Redruth), were dedicated ins the ehurch on Sunday, November 24th, by the Archdeacon of Bodmin (the Ven. M. B. Willismsont).

The bells which were formally havded over to the church by the donar in memary of his late mother and wife, were, atter being dedicated, acoopted by the Rector (the Rev. W. R. Ladd Canney, who remarked that after eco years the octare of bells in the tower who remarked that aiter
The dedication rounds were performed by the local band, who also rang the bells as the congregation left the church.
It bis sermon Archeleacon Williamson remarked that the parishioners had now a new song in their aucient church tower to call them to worship or to remind them of the passing of some soul out of this world and into the next. The bells were also the symbol of loving service for God.

After the service the bells were at tho disposal of the visiting ringers, who were entertained to tea by Mir. P. R. C. Williams, one of the local band.
Best wishes for a successful opening were sent by Mr. Arthur S. Roberts, a prominent ringer of the district, who is now studying for Holy Ouders, and was unfortumately umable to attend.

Fingers were present from Truro Cathedral, Camborne, Tuckingmill, lllogan, St. Anstel and St. Newhy East, in addition to the local band. The bellfuunders were represented by Mr. C. F. Johmston, the principal of the well-known Croydon firm, who were responsible for rehanging the original six bells two months ago, aud had been commissioned to add the new trebles. Mr. F. E. Collins, the bellhanger, who had carried out the work in the tower on both occasious, was also present.
Visitors and ringers aliko were struck with the beauty and resonance of the two acw bells, and the perfect result of the tuning. They weigh respectively $4 \frac{1}{4}$ cuto and over $4 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{cwt}$, their notes being F sharp and $Q$, to match the ' $G$ ' tenor'. An eight-bell frame was already provided, and the new bells bave been supplied with cast-iron hendstocks, ball bearings, and the latest type of the firm's fittings.
It is possible that Redruti holds a record in the ammals of church bells, for only two months ago the original six bells, vehung by Messrs. Gillett and Johuston, were reopened by the Bishop of Truro, so that two similar cerenonies have occured in that short space of time.
Belind the brief mention of the donor's name lies the romance of one who has travelled far before returning to the scene of boyhood days. Mr. E. C. Carvoldt left Redruth as a very young man and has speut a lauge part of his life in South Afyica. He now resicles in Sussex, but receutly returned to Redruth, and has purchased the roo years ald Castle Brea, situated on a hill behind the church, which is now enriched by his gift to the belfry.

## RINGING AT KENI SCHOOL, U.S.A.

## DEATH OF ARKSEY RINGER.

## CHURCH LOSES A STEDFAST WORKER.

On Tuesd $\mathrm{O}_{\mathrm{a}}$ November $28 \mathrm{th}, \mathrm{Mr}$. Fiward Arram, an old member of the dll Saints' company, passed away in the Doncaster InfirmaryHis whole life, whilst resident in Arksey, had been spent in close connection with the church and chuweh work. For more than 30 years he had been a sidesiman and a ringet.
He was one of the oricinal change ringing compary which was furmed in this tower, and he was one of the most consistent men it was anyoue's prixilege to meet. He was always punctual, and had a standard of conduet which fainer him the respect of all who knew him. His whole life may be summed up in the words, 'Fe was at just and upright man.'
The interment took place on Thunsday, November $28 i h$, in the old Gemetery, and the bells were rung half-muffled on Saturday afternoon, when a well-struck quarler-peal of Grandsire Triples was byought round by R. Clark 1, G. Clark 2, F. Clark 3, E. Juee 4, W. Johnson S, E. Cooper (conductor) 6, T. Revill 7, B. Burkitt 8. The bells were again rung half-muffled on Sunday for the monning aud evening services.

Had Mr. Arrand lived till Christmas Day he would have reached his 76th birthday. He had not beem in very good health for some time, and had to retire from the belfy some three years ago. He fad been practically confined to the house for the past twelve months.

Ihis old tradition, with new methods, is being finely carried on by Mr. F. W. Townsend and a loyal band of chuteluncon, who can welcome wisitors to a ringing chamber as comfortably and tastefully furmished and decorated as any in the comntry, and invite them to join is Double Morwich and Cambridge, They will lenve, without taking fany whitewash with them-only memovies of a hearlvy welcone and a good practice.
