#### SYNTHETIC' BELLS FOR CHESTERFIELD?

It is not surprising that members of the Midland Counties Association, at their annual meeting, heard with some alarm that a proposal is on foot to use 'synthetic' bells at the Parish Church of Chesterfield. It seems almost incredible that a church with a ring of ten bells should toy with the idea of installing a gramophone and amplifiers in their place. Chesterfield is famed for its crooked spire, and it was once the centre of great ringing activity, when the late Arthur Knights had charge of the beifry. Then came doubts about the stability of the structure; the bells were stopped on the architect's advice, and, as far as ringing is concerned, have been silent for a number of years. A large sum was spent in the restoration of the tower, but still, apparently, consent to ring the bells is withheld. If, now, a gramophone is to be substituted, well may the people and friends of Chesterfield ask, 'Was it for this that we restored our tower?' It can hardly be imagined that when the structure was repaired it was not made safe for ringing, and why the bells are still silent seems to us something of a mystery when there are so many ringers in the district who are anxious to get them going again.

When the matter was discussed at the Midland Counties Association's meeting, the president expressed the opinion that the proposal was only a suggestion, in view of the known sympathy which the Vicar of Chesterfield has with ringers. We hope that this is all there is in it, and that it will not be for a moment entertained. The installation of the gramophone apparatus would probably be the end of all hopes of any early restarting of the celebrated peal, which have been the pride of Chesterfield. If there are still doubts in the mind of any of the responsible people about the stability of the tower, would it not be a wise plan to call in further advice before the bells are condemned to eternal silence and a 'tinned' substitute employed?

If there is a case for the use of a gramophone and amplifiers at churches which have no bells, there seems to us not the slightest excuse for installing the apparatus where a fine peal of bells already exists; and if the scheme is seriously put forward, it is to be hoped that it will be successfully opposed. It would be far better that Chesterfield's own bells should be merely chimed for the services than that alien bells, recorded on discs, should be broadcast from the church where the celebrated peal hangs mute. When the views of the Midland Counties ringers are put before the Vicar of Chesterfield, we trust they will prevail. What would be interesting to know is exactly why, now that the tower is restored, the bells

cannot be rung. Is it that the restoration has not been sufficiently extensive to make it safe to use the bells? Or is it for some other reason? In any case, it would be an extremely unfortunate happening if the suggestion to instal the gramophone, to replace Chesterfield's own bells, were allowed to materialise without the most determined opposition.

#### NORTH NOTTS ASSOCIATION.

#### A DIOCESAN GUILD FOR NOTTINGHAMSHIRE!

The 53rd annual meeting of the North Notts Association was held at Retford on Saturday, April 15th, when the bells of the three Retford towers were at the ringers' disposal during the afternoon and evening. Ringing commenced at 3 p.m. on the ten at the Parish Church and on the six at Ordsall, but West Retford was not visited until after tea. The striking was weak at first, but with the advent of more talent it improved and the variety of methods with it. There were about 35 members present and several visitors, including the Masters of three societies and the treasurer of one of the three.

A short service was held in East Retford Church, which the Vicar (the Rev. D. Jones) conducted, while the Rev. R. F. Wilkinson, of Ordsall, gave a short address. He chose the words, 'Be not weary in well doing,' for his text and mentioned the distractions and substitutions which are constantly being met with. He called for personal service for the courch, particularly in the tower where young men should be trained to ring and ring well. Not every tower flourished at any one time, each having its ups and downs; it was the association's duty to maintain the balance as evenly as possible.

Tea followed the service, in the Ebsworth Hall, which the Parish Church authorities kindly lent. At the meeting the Rev. D. James expressed his regret at not being able to stay and preside. The Rev. R. F. Wilkinson thereupon proposed a vote of thanks to him and took over the duties of chairman.

The balance sheet and report were passed. The sceretary explained

The balance sheet and report were passed. The sceretary explained certain items on the balance sheet and pointed out that the number of ringing members who had paid their subscription for 1938 had risen by seven to 136, and all expenses except for printing were down.

#### WORK SLOWED DOWN.

In his report, the sccretary said the association's work appeared to have slowed down somewhat during 1938. He had three reasons for making this statement, firstly the attendance at meetings had dropped, secondly the cup contest failed to materialise, owing to lack of support, and, lastly, fewer towers were having a regular practice night. He appreciated that everyone scemed to lead a busier life nowadays, particularly since the National Service schemes had come into operation, but it was regrettable that the art all over the country was on the wane. There were, in their own association, certain points to offset this, among others several towers had gained recruits, and was on the wane. There were, in their own association, certain points to offset this, among others several towers had gained recruits, and ringers had visited other towers to assist learners. However, to those who had not already done so, he recommended that (1) the interest, active if possible, of the clergy be obtained: (2) choirboys, when their services are no longer required as such (and only then), be recruited

as learners; (3) every ringer obtains a copy of 'Standard Methods' and learns how to read it; and (4) a regular practice be held and new methods attempted. The number of peals, the report added, was down to 16, of which 15 were of Minor and one of Triples. There were five conductors; the number of first peals was seven; and 21 members rang other 'firsts.' The secretary urged a larger attendance at meetings, expressed the hope of a good cup contest this year (it is to take place at Cuckney on June 10th), and concluded by thanking all who had helped him in the past year.

All the officers were re-elected en bloc for the year 1939-40, and ten new members were elected, eight from Worksop Priory, one from

Warsop and one from Sutton.

The Chairman referred to the question of a Diocesan Guild for the whole of Nottinghamshire. If such a guild were formed, the North Notts Association would form an excellent Northern District. However, no resolution was made as to the furtherance of the idea, and the position so far as the association is concerned remains as before.

The Chairman also referred to the sad loss Sutton-on-Trent has sustained in the passing of their popular Vicar, the Rev. W. C. Bates. The association's sympathy went out to the parishioners and ringers

of that village.

After the meeting ringing continued until 8.30 p.m. Minor and Doubles pealed out (almost as regularly as clockwork on occasions) from West Retford and Ordsall, while at East Retford Minor (on the back six) to Royal methods, such as Kent, Stedman, Grandsire, Cambridge, Double Norwich, Duffield, Little Bob and Plain Bob were rung. Only one touch failed to come into rounds at this tower during the afternoon and evening; two false starts were due to a misunderstanding, and, on the whole, the day's ringing was thoroughly standing enjoyable.

#### SCOTTISH ASSOCIATION.

The annual meeting was held at St. Paul's Cathedral, Dundee, on Saturday, April 15th. The ring of eight at St. Paul's has recently been relung by Messrs. Mears and Stainbauk. The great improvement in the 'go' of the bells was commented on by all present.

The meeting did not attract so many members as usual mainly owing to the long journey, but 30 were present. Touches of Grandsire, Stedman and Erin Triples and Kent Treble Bob were brought round. The Provost of the Cathedral, the Very Rev. Sutherland-Graeme, we comed the ringers and conducted the service.

At the business meeting which followed the ringers from England, Miss Kirton and Mr. E. W. Yates, formerly of Worsley, were elected members. After tea there was more ringing at the old steeple.

Mr. Stenhouse, of Liverpool, and Mr. Leach, of York, were visitors.

#### LEADING CONDUCTORS—68.

GEORGE E. FEIRN.

Some conductors are born and not made, and one such is surely Mt. George E. Feirn, now of Grasby, Lincoln, who, still only 25 years of age, has shown an aptitude that few can claim. He rang his first peal only a little over six years ago, but he has conducted peals of Minor with up to 53 methods in seven extents, in the tower, and up to 19 methods in hand, and also a peal in six spliced plain methods on handbells. These are performances which speak for themselves. He is another of the men who are putting Lincolnshire in the very forefront and one of those for

forefront and one of those for whom the most difficult of ring-ing tasks seem to be child's play. For example, the first peal of Original Major ever rung with fourth's place bobs he composed and called on handbells from an inside pair. And there were 720 bobs! Men who can do such things are rare.

things are rare.

Mr. Peirn was born at Bigby on April 10th, 1914, and took up ringing at Bigby tower towards the end of 1931. He rang his first peal on December 10th, 1932. This was four extents of the control of th Kent Treble Bob and three of

Plain Bob. His first peal as conductor was one of Bob Minor on handbells, rung on June 22nd, 1933, hells, rung on June 22nd, 1935, and his first in the tower was two days later at Bigby, when he called a peal in three methods. Now his peals, which range from Boh Minor to Stedman Cinques, number 143, of which 29 have been on handbells. He has conducted 62, of which 15 have been in hand, but, as will have been gathered. but, as will have been gathered from what has been mentioned above, many of them have been

outstanding performances.

Mr. Feirn rang in the first peal
of Winchester Bob Major for the Lincoln Guild and conducted the first peal of Wymondham Bob for Lincolu Guild, and conducted the lirst peal of Wymondiam Bob for the Guild, as well as the Original Major. He conducted the first peal of London Surprise Minor in the Northern Branch, and rang in the first peal of Little Bob Royal on handbells for the Guild, and the 'first ever' of St. Clement's Major on handbells. His first peals of Cambridge and London Surprise Major were rung on the same day, and the peal of Minor in 19 methods which he conducted is still the record number 'in hand.'

Association. Chesteriield was a famous tower not only for its unique crocked spire, but also for the record number of peals rung on the bells therein, especially during the time of the late Mr. Arthur Knights and his energetic band. The bells were silenced some years ago owing to the tower being deemed unsafe, but now that this defect had been remedied, surely some means could be brought about for the bells to be rung in a proper manner, and not to have this mechanical contrivance installed, winch was abhorrent to all real lovers of bells.

Mr. Sidney Palmer spoke at length on the matter, and said that as soon as he saw the article mentioned he had passed it on to the president of the Central Council and requested him to do all in his power to avert such a catastrophe. He urged all present to add all

power to avert such a catastrophe. He urged all present to add all their weight in as strong a profest as possible, and he would do all in his power to prevent this suggested scheme being put into action.

Mr. Hutchinson, of Sawley, also spoke in condemnation of such a

scheme.

Mr. W. E. White explained that a few years ago a committee of the M.C.A. had met the Archdeacon of Chesterfield and the churchwardens. Mr. E. H. Lewis had also taken up the matter with regard to having the bells restored, but as the thon architect had deemed the spire

the bells restored, but as the then architect had deemed the spire unsate for a swinging peal, nothing further had been done.

The President said he also saw the article mentioned, but put quite a different construction on the matter to that of the previous speakers. He promised to have a word personally with the Archdescon about it, because he knew him to be quite sympathetic with the bellringers and their side of the question, and that he was most anxious to have the bells rung. This not being, at the moment, deemed possible, he had simply suggested this scheme of gramophone records.

This concluded the meeting. The association handbells were then used to advantage, while further tower-bell ringing and a convivial afterwards terminated a very successful day's outing.

Oldham, of Loughborough) and members of the Kelham Theological College band. All districts of the association were represented, viz., Burton, Chesterfield, Derby, Hinckley, Leicester, Loughborough and Nottingham. Many non-resident members and friends were welcomed, including Mr. S. F. Palmer (hou, treasurer of Yorkshire Association), Mr. J. Brothwell and Miss Brothwell, with Mr. N. Chaddock, of the Sheffield District Society, and friends from Birmingham, Wolverhampton, Kettering, Burton Latimer and elsewhere. The members were also delighted to have with them the Rev. Canon H. E. Fitzherbert, of Derby, the Rev. W. R. Lloyd Jones, of West Hallam, and the Rev. A. W. Fothergill, of Sharnford, Hinckley.

The Rev. Canon H. E. Fitzherbert, of Derby, was unanimously elected president and was received with acclamation. ANNUAL MEETING IN THE CITY.

The City of London was the scene of the annual meeting of the Middlesex County Association and London Diocesan Guild on Saturday, and the focal point was St. Botolph's, Bishopagate. About a hundred members attended and there was no lack of ringing in the afternoon and evening. In addition to Bishopagate bells, the twelve at St. Giles', Cripplegate, and the eights at St. Lawrence Jewry and St. Olave's, Hart Street, were made full use of.

Service at St. Botolph's was conducted by the Rector (the Rev. P. D. Ellis), who gave a striking address based upon the symbolism of the spire and the tower. The president (Prebendary W. P. Cole Sheane) also took part in the service.

Later he presided at the business meeting, which followed tea, and was supported by the Rector of St. Botolph's, Mr. J. A. Trollope and Mr. G. W. Fletcher (vice-presidents), Mr. C. T. Coles (hon, secretary), Mr. W. H. Oram (hou, treasurer) and other officers of the association.

The president first thanked the Rector of St. Botolph's, who had to leave early, for the service and his address, and also for the use of the bells.

#### MEMBERSHIP DECREASE.

The annual report noted with satisfaction a considerable improvement in the attendances at meetings in both districts, and, referring to the joint meeting at Shoreditch in October with the Royal Cumberland Youths and the Essex Association, when some 80 ringers attended said it was the first occasion on which the association had co-operated in this way with one of the two oldest of the London societies, and the in this way with one of the two oldest of the London societies, and the success of the meeting gave much hope for the future. But while the increased support given to meetings caused some satisfaction, there was still considerable room for improvement. 'Too often,' said the report, 'it is only the "regulars" who attend, and it is quite apparent that some members never take that trouble. We repeat what we said last year, "If every member made a point of attending at least one meeting per year, what a difference it would make—especially to their own ringing." 'The report proceeded: 'Our membership again shows a decrease. We regret that three members have been lost by death, whilst again a large number have had to be deleted from the books through non-payment of subscriptions. Most of these occur in the South and West District, but us the balance sheet of that district actually shows an increase in income, it is to be hoped that we have reached the

payment of subscriptions. Most of these occur in the South and West District, but us the balance sheet of that district actually shows an increase in income, it is to be hoped that we have reached the stage when no further deletions need be made. Only by a great effort, however, on the part of all members, can this district again attain its former prosperity. The number of new members elected during the year was two honorary and 58 ringing members, and the total on the books at the end of the year was 856.

We are glad to report some progress at St. Matthew's, Upper Clapton, where an entirely new band has been formed, which is receiving instruction from Mr. G. A. Parsons. There has also been a considerable acquisition of members at Edmonton and Enfield (St. Many's). Several members of the St. Dunstan's, Stepney, band have joined us, and we give these talented ringers a sincere and hearty welcome to the association.

During 1938 exactly 50 peals were rung, an increase of 15 on the previous year. Of these, four were rung on handbells, and 46 on tower bells in 28 different towers. Eight members rang their first peals; four their first handbell peals; 68 their first peals in a new method or on a different number of bells; whilst 142 members in all took part in the peals. There were 17 conductors. There was a slight increase in the quarter-peals rung, but further improvement is still possible. The Southgate band again headed the list, both in numbers and in variety of methods, all these quarter-peals being rung for Sunday services. The Heston band, too, had done very well with twelve quarter-peals.

The report went on to express regret of the association at losing

quarter-peals. The report went on to express regret of the association at losing the valuable services of Mr. G. R. Goodship, who has left the county for business reasons. After a period of nine years as assistant hon, secretary, he became hon, secretary of the North and East District last year. He also did very good work at Harrow Weald, where he formed and taught a new band with much success. It was mainly through his efforts that the peal at that church was augmented to eight a few years ago. 'We desire,' said the report, 'to place on record our sincery appreciation of his services to the association, and record our sincere appreciation of his services to the association, and wish bim success in his new career.

#### CHANGES IN OFFICERS.

The report went on to refer to the various changes which had taken The report went on to refer to the various changes which had taken place among the officers, both in the districts and by the reorganisation of the association, and expressed thanks to those who had rendered valuable service in the past, including Mr. T. Collins and Mr. W. H. Oram, the district treasurers, whose offices have now lapsed. The report concluded: We have again to express our indebtedness to Mr. C. T. Coles for his services as honorary secretary. Mr. Coles' long term of office must, in the nature of things, he drawing to its close, but we hope to keep him for some time yet. The success of the association has depended very much on the work he has done for us, and its term of once must, in the nature of things, he drawing to its close, but we hope to keep him for some time yet. The success of the association has depended very much on the work he has done for us, and its continuance depends largely on our finding a successor who will carry on the work in the same spirit.

The report was adopted on the motion of the hon, secretary, who emphasised the utmost importance of the prompt payment of members' subscriptions.

The expenses amounted to £28 1s. 10d., leaving a balance in hand of £69 14s. 4d. In addition to this amount, the balance sheet showed other assets of £73 13s. 8d. 3½ per cent. War Loan Stock and £16 7s. 10d. in the Bell Restoration Fund transferred from the South and West District.

Mr. Coles, he said, had intimated that, as his work had taken him out of London, it was very difficult for him to attend to the affairs of the association. The Central Committee, therefore, felt with regret that they must accept the resignation, as it would not be fair to ask Mr. Coles to carry on under the circumstances. He had served the association as Master since 1935 and served them very well indeed. Before that he was District Master in the North and East District, and the members of that district knew full well the excellent work he did, including teaching bands at St. Giles-in-the-Fields and St. James', Clerkenwell. They were all grateful to Mr. Coles for the work he had done through so many years. They felt they could not let the apportunity go by without showing him they appreciated what he had done, and he (Mr. Fletcher) proposed that Mr. Coles be elected an honorary life member of the association (applause). That was the least they could do and it was the only thing they were permitted to do under the rules (applause). rules (applause).
