'FRIVOLOUS'

Periodically there are serious challenges at the whole basis and structure of bellringing and the Church's use of bells. One such incident took place at Sunderland, where the Chancellor for Durham Diocese, Mr. R. G. S. Bankes, held a Consistory Court to hear a petition from Mr. Friend, a schoolmaster, that no faculty be given for the installation of a ring of ten bells in the tower of Roker Parish Church. The contention of Mr. Friend was that 'the noise of bellringing will destroy one of the most valuable amenities of the area.'

The Chancellor overruled the petition. Mr. Arthur Greaves, who appeared for the Vicar of St. Andrew's, Roker, asked for costs, pointing out that the delay caused by this 'frivolous objection' had already penalised the parish to the extent of £500 on account of the increased cost of material and labour. The Chancellor ordered Mr. Friend to pay five guineas Court costs.

We have not before us a full copy of the Chancellor's judgment, but he could not have ruled otherwise. A bell, or bells, is an essential part of the equipment of a church, and in common law the ringing of church bells has never been construed as a nuisance or an offence against the community at large. The society formed for the abatement of noise also does not regard church bells as coming within the category of its objections. Indeed, the society has admitted the Central Council of Church Bellringers to corporate membership, and the relationship between the two bodies has been most friendly.

Thus bellringers, both ecclesiastically and in common law, are upheld in their avocation. There is a sacredness about the trust; and while the great advance in our art came about by the secular development of ringing, as is so admirably told by Mr. Trollope in his book, 'College Youths,' the alliance between ringers and the Church is very real. Sunday ringing to the great majority of ringers is performed as an act of worship, and we commend the beautiful prayer composed specially for the ringers of Hull which appears in our issue.

The Epistle for last Sunday contains lines which we ringers should study: 'Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about seeking whom he may devour; whom resist steadfast in the faith.' The days of the association of ringers with insobriety have long been dead; there are other matters which require vigilance. Our president is constant in his appeal to the Exercise for good striking, and it is a

matter for congratulation that a number of reports reaching us point to a marked improvement in this respect. Not all are satisfactory. A few weeks ago we published a letter which commended the striking in a country tower. Before us we have a letter dealing with the ringing at the same tower during the performance of a peal: 'At times the bells were in a heap and firing,' was the comment. Peal enthusiasts should always consider two things —the outside public and the 5,000 true changes. 'Your adversary . . .' may well be inside as outside the belfry. So be vigilant.

Consecration of New Bells at Lija, Malta

BY THE REV. MALCOLM MELVILLE.

The announcement that a remote country village on the island of Malta has a new chime of five bells would have little interest for English ringers but for the fact that these bells have been cast in England. For centuries Malta has had her bells from Italy or from the Malta has had her bells from Italy or from the Low Countries, and many of great age and beauty can be found within her churches. The recent consignment of English bells is thus a break with tradition, and these flat-topped bells have been critically examined and compared with the domed bells from the Continent.

Five of the new arrivals were for Lija Parish Church and the writer was privileged in seeing not only the enthusiastic reception the bells had when they arrived in the village, but also their beautiful and solemn consecration a few

days later.
Their journey from the dockside to the church was accompanied by all the wild enthusiasm and colour with which the Maltese are capable. Five gaily decorated lorries were provided and lots were drawn for the honour of driving the biggest bell. The fact that this monster of four and a quarter tons hap-pened to be on the smallest lorry was an unfortunate coincidence, but a doubly great honour, and both lorry and driver rose to the occa-

On the outskirts of the village they were met by the village band, and together with hundreds of joyous villagers and many more envious onlookers from far and near they made their triumphal way through the bedecked streets. A procession in Malta really is a procession, and nothing is spared to make it a magnificent spectacle. This one must have been equal to any that had preceded it, both for the numbers taking part and the length of time taken to cover the 3-mile through the village.

However, after three hours or so, and as darkness fell, the procession came in sight of the church. What a scene it was! The Square thronged with cheering people, the church illuminated with myriads of coloured lights, and what must have been one of the greatest displays of fireworks for many a year, formed a glorious background for their reception. As we left Lija that evening we wondered what these five strangers, if they could have spoken, thought of it all, as they stood there, majestically overshadowing the scene around, and having arrived at last at their journey's end.


The consecration of the bells took place in the evening of the Feast of Corpus Christi. Stone columns had been erected before the church, and the five bells hung between the columns with their mouths about 7ft. from the ground. The columns were draped in flags and arched with damask decorated with plants and flowers. The square was thronged with the people of Lija and with others from many towns and villages; flags fluttered from the roof-tops, among which could be seen the Union Jack, the Papal Flag, and the Flag of Malta.

The ceremony, which was performed by His Grace Mgr. Michael Gonzi, the Archbishop of Malta, took the form of the beautiful centuries old service of consecration used in the Roman Catholic Church, and with which many of our pre-Reformation bells in England must have been consecrated.

After preliminary blessings of water, oil and salt, each bell was sprinkled with the bap-

tismal water by His Grace. While psalms tismal water by His Grace. While pealms were being sung priests then proceeded with the ceremonial washing of each bell inside and out. His Grace the Archbishop then, ascending an elevated platform, anointed each bell in turn with Holy Oil. After more psalms the Archbishop reascended the platform and anointed each bell with eleven crosses, seven evenly spaced around the lip, and four more on the inside. on the inside.

Fires of incense were then lit and placed below the bells while the Gospel was sung. Then came the climax, the moment for which all had been waiting, the ringing of the bells. Accompanied by loud clapping from the people and fireworks from neighbouring houses, each bell was rung, first by His Grace the Arch-

bishop, and then by their own sponsors and donors. Lady Strickland, the wife of a former Governor of Malta, who had given the third bell, gallantly rang hers, and produced further applause from the assembly.

Afterwards the bells were rung all at the same time, as is the custom in Malta, and it was noticeable how the harmonics of each bell blended together. His Grace concluded the ceremony by giving the Pastoral Benediction to the assembled people.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Film Studio Ringing

Dear Sir, — Mr. Goodenough and other readers may be interested in a 'ringing job' carried out a year or two ago in the studios

at Denham, in connection with the picture called 'A Canterbury Tale.'

In the picture a peal of bells in motion had to be shown, and the expert technicians at Denham made a ministure set of ten, hung in a wooden frame. The bells were modelled in plaster (the largest 1ft. 7in. in diameter), accurately shaped and fitted with beautifully accurately shaped and fitted with beautifully made wheels in correct proportion. Having got so far, I suppose they found that nobody knew how they should be rung.

The advice of our conductor at St. Paul's, Mr. Herbert Langdon, was sought, and at his request I went to Denham to see what could be done. I found that sully send one or

found that pulleys and one or two other details were missing, but deficiencies were soon made good, and sashcord ropes provided. The clappers were of india rubber and pers were of india rubber and bounced around in all directions. I arranged for the bells most prominent in the picture to be fitted with balanced clappers, which worked perfectly.

The frame was about 12ft. off the floor and ringing was done from a confined space.

done from a confined space under a platform, so the ringers did not appear in the picture. After a little experimenting, unobtrusively doading some of the wheels with lead, etc., I found it possible to raise and set the bells at will, except for two which for an obscure reason had only half wheels.

The arrangements com-pleted, we assembled a mixed pleted, we assembled a mixed company of ringers, represent-ing College Youths and Cum-berlands, with three from Denham, and after one or two

practices were able to give the film people what they required—needless to say, these tiny bells called for very careful handling, as even a mild 'wallop' on the stay would cause loss of control.

As our proficiency increased, we were able to make a show at synchronising the movement of the back bells with the record used, which was of Grandsire Caters from St. Margaret's, Westminster. The small bells didn't matter so much—they were kept going as well as possible to give plenty of movement in the nicture.

picture.

The effect on the whole was good, and I have since spoken to one or two practical ringers, who thought they had seen a full-scale peal of bells on the screen—they did not scale peal of bells on the screen—they did not perhaps notice one or two peculiarities in the design of the frame. Personally, I got quite a 'kick' out of the experience. The studio people are very resourceful, and I found them excellent collaborators. I don't think even Hollywood could have done it better!—Yours faithfully.



Dear Sir, — Rule 11, (v) (e) of the Truro Diocesan Guild says: 'No member shall for-ward to the Press any communication reflectward to the Press any communication reflecting upon any band in union with the Guild or upon any member. In case of 'any disagreement or complaint, the matter shall be laid before the General Committee through the secretary.' I fear that our Diocesan Ringing Master has disregarded this rule in saying that the conductor of the peal, Mr. C. E. Lanxon, misled the Dean and Chapter. This is a grave reflection. The suggestion that the rest of the band may be neglectful in Sunday service ringing is also a strange insinuation. Their names are far too well known to the Ringing Exercise generally for this to sink very deep.

The facts are these: The peal was suggested last November when a few enthusiasts agreed

it was time a peal of Royal was rung for the Guild. Easter Monday was chosen and application for the bells and application for the bels was made in the same way as for 11 successful peals which I personally arranged from 1926 to 1936. This time Mr. Lauxon made the application. This attempt lasted nearly two hours, and before leaving the tower everyone was eager to make a further attempt. May 17th was fixed as the May 17th was fixed as the date provided we could meet again and the bells would be available. All was well and the peal rung. This being the diamond jubilee year of the Cathedral, we decided that the peal should be rung in commenceration of this. If in commemoration of this. If there had been the slightest suggestion that the Cathedral band wanted to ring a peal I think we would have all bowed graciously and withdrawn, and certainly we would not have honoured our Mother Church in the way we did if the local band wished to perform such an

honour.

I cannot believe that the Dean and Chapter have handed over their authority over the bells, which they have properly retained for the past 37 years, to an uncertain number of persons, 37 years, to an uncertain number of persons, of whom only three have rung a peal, in order that they may be a kind of clearing house over the names submitted for their judgment. This cuts at the very roots of the aims and ideals of each and every ringing association, of which when one is a member that should be sufficient. It is such unfortunate publicity as this that makes for bad feeling, debars progress in an area where method ringing is as elementary as it can be, and depresses the enthusiast so much that he feels like giving up in despair. up in despair.

For love of my old tower where I learnt to ring I offer the local band every good wish for success, and also an open invitation to come to my tower to ring what they like without any reservation whatsoever.—Yours faithfully,
