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THE PRINCESS

Y ESTERDAY was a memorable occasion in the life of the British Commonwealth with the wedding of the Heiress Presumptive. It was not only at Westminster Abbey, where amid pageantry this solemn sacrament took place, that the bells rang out their message of felicitations, but also from all the great cathedrals of our land as well as the churches of our towns and villages. And the vibrant hum of the bell was not confined to this land; messages have reached us from Canada, Australia and South Africa telling of the plans to give expression to that devotion that in a remarkable manner has been displayed towards the House of Windsor.

This loyalty is almost a paradox, coming as it does in an era when men's minds are drifting towards communal ideas and objectives. Outlook has changed since the days when the first Elizabeth ascended the throne and the individuality of the Sovereign found expression in vigorous direction of the affairs of State. 'Have a care over my people,' she charged her judges. 'You have my people; do you that which I ought to do. See unto them; see unto them, for they are my charge.' To-day the great ties of the throne are by precept and example. The unity of this people has been brought about by the Christian example and the display of those homely virtues by the reigning sovereign and his family. They constitute a pattern for a great people, and while those virtues of truth, unweariness in duty, courtesy and consideration for others are revealed in our King and Queen, then will the traditional respect and homage knit the peoples of their dominions together.

The good wishes and blessings which have been showered on the young lovers from the hearts and minds of millions are not mere platitudes; they have been stimulated by the words of the Princess in her famous coming-of-age broadcast from South Africa. There was the sense of statesmanship of the first Elizabeth behind her message, which read: 'I declare before you all that my whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service and the great imperial family to which we all belong. I shall not have the strength to carry out this resolution unless you join in it with me.' That dedication of service is not reserved to the Princess. We humbler folk of the ringing chamber will surely accept the challenge and share kinship with her by performing whatever tasks are before us to the best of our might and skill.

The cost of the work has been defrayed out of a legacy by the late Mrs. A. E. Parsons, widow of a member of the original local band. Many of the older members of the ringing fraternity will remember Albert Parsons, who, with Alfred and Charles Bessano and Harry Mason, were well-known ringers in towers up

and down the country.

The bells were rededicated by the Lord
Bishop of Worcester on Sunday evening, Nov.
9th. Amongst eight or nine hundred worshippers were many ringers from local towers. Messrs. Gillett and Johnston were represented by Mr. Donovan Bradford, who presented the local ringers with photographs of the bells as local ringers with photographs of the bells as reassembled at the foundry. Dear Sir,—When your remarks on this subject appeared in Belfry Gossip it was obvious that someone was annoyed at the outcome of this attempt. I would, therefore, advise him to take the words of his popular song to heart, 'The way you do it,' counts for very much, especially among strangers, and while hoping that I shall one day ring a peal in his company, I would assure him that 'peal at all cost' methods will not be tolerated by—Yours faithfully,

OBITUARY

THE REV. J. H. HASTINGS.

A valued correspondent writes apropos the death of the Rev. J. H. Hastings that he rang in the first peal of the Oxford University Society—Stedman Triples at Drayton on Feb. 2nd, 1882. The first clerical peal (Stedman Triples) was also rung at Drayton two years later, but Mr. Hastings did not participate.

MR. WILLIAM HAYNES.

IN AFFILIATION WITH CENTRAL COUNCIL

EAST DERBYSHIRE AND NOTTS ASSN.

THE OBJECTS.

At the inaugural meeting the following were the four main objects of the Association :-

(1) The observance of good and peaceful behaviour in the belfries of our churches, as being an integral part of the Church, and therefore consecrated to the service of God; while the bells and ringers are intended to be exercised equally with the organ and choir, for His glory and worship.

(2) The refrain as far as possible from using the bells on the Lord's Day except for the services of the Church.

(3) To obtain full recognition of the Ringer's Office, as essentially a branch of the Church's work; that they and their services (which demand much time, skill and mental labour) may be leaved upon a true and advandance. placed upon a true and acknowledged

(4) To cultivate the art of change

(4) To cultivate the art of change ringing, by meetings in various centres for friendly peal ringing; and to provide, at a reasonable cost, instructors for those who may require them.

The first patron that can be traced is the Bishop of Southwell. Other officers elected at the inauguration of the Association were Canon Massey, the then Rector of South Normanton president; and the late Rev. J. B. Nodder, Rector of Ashover, as vice-president.

At its foundation the Association was confined to six towers, these being Clay Cross,

fined to six towers, these being Clay Cross, North Wingfield, Ashover, Brampton (Chester-field). Crich and South Normanton. From these, which were all six-bell towers, there were 46 ringing members.

Of these towers, Ashover, Crich and Brampton have ceased to be members, but the Association has increased its scope and has Association has increased its scope and has members at the following towers: Alfreton, Ault. Hucknall, Blackwell, Denby, Heath. Heanor, Mansfield, Mansfield Woodhouse, Morton, Pleasley, Ripley, Silston, Swanick, Suttonin-Ashfield, Shirland, Tibshelf and Warsop, with the original three. These towers are three eight-bell, five five-bell, one four-bell and the remainder six-bell. the remainder six-bell.

Clay Cross was the centre of the Association until 1902, annual meetings always being held in this tower. South Normanton was selected for the 1903 meeting, and since then meeting-have been held at different centres.

TWO ASSOCIATIONS.
