GREAT PAUL
' CHE question raised by Mr. J. E. Bailey as to the occasions on which 'Great Paul,' the massive bell in St. Paul's Cathedral weighing $16_{3}^{3}$ tons and which was cast by John Taylor and Co. in 1881, is rung has brought: forth a number of interesting replies. Twenty tons of metal were melted down and the bell cost $£ 3,000$.

Mr. A. B. Peck, the secretary of the Ancient Society of College Youths, writes: "The bell is rung every day except Sunday at $1 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. for about four minutes. It is rung frame high and then lowered gradually. Great Tom is tolled or clocked once a minute for two hours on the death of a Monarch. Great Paul weighs 16 tons and Tom 5 tons. The last named is the hour bell.'

Mr. R. F. Deal, of East Ham, adds this interesting information: "This bell may be heard on week-days (except two or three days in the ycar) at one o'clock, It is raised about half-way up by four members of the Cathedral staff, who time their pulling with great precision, the first stroke of Great Paul being heard within a second or two of the clock striking. The clock bell is tolled for a death in the Royal Family, for a Bishup of London, the Lord Mayor, or the Dean. This bell, by Richard Phelps, 1716, weighs 92 cwt. 14 lbs. With the two big bells in the south tower are two quarter bells of about $12 \frac{1}{2}$ and $24 \frac{1}{2}$ cwt. by Phelps, 1707, and hanging above the twelve in the North Tower is the Five Minutes' or Service Bell (about 22 cwt.) by Philip Wightman, 1700-seventeen bells in all.'

Mr. E. M. Atkins finds an inspiration in (ireat Paul. His letter states: ' (ireat Paul is rung every day at 1 o'elock. When I hear it from my office, which is about half a mile away, I am reminded of its inscription : "Woe is me il I preach not the Gospel," and it is an inspiring thought that this message is sent out day by day to the multitudes working within earshot. On the great festivals, like Ascension Day, the 12 bells are rung earlier in the morning, and I have been able to do my little bit by explaining when asked why the bells are ringing.'

The concluding note is from the Rev. F. Ll. Edwards, of Kington Magna, who confirms that the bell is rung daily at 1 o'clock for five minutes, and gives this footnote: ' I have on one occasion-with a party of three Dorset boys-taken part in ringing it myself.' An experience truly memorable, and which would rejoice the heart of any young ringer.

## AN ORPINGTON EXPERIMENT

## Dear Sir.-I note with great inlerest that

 Mr. T. S. Williams, of Kingsland Grange Preparalory School, Shrewsbury, has formed a ringers' guild from a number of his young pupils. May 1 take this opportunity, througli the medium of your columns, to wish him every success in what wi!! prove a verv difficult task. It is very gratifying to hear that such an interest is being taken in these young boys. Mr. Williams' efforts are bound to prove invaluable to the Exercise in later years, but in the meantime he musi expect many disappointments.Although not in exactly the same position as Mr. Williams, I am a schoolmaster and teach in a school containing 630 boys. whose ages range from 11-17 years. My subject is music and I invariably inslude some elementary cam. panology in certain of my lessons. This' sideline' certainly has proved popular with the majority of the classes. So much so that I decided five months ago to recruit a dozen or so of the boys (average age 12 rears) and teach them the art. Fortunately I had recently heard that a certain tower in the neighbourhood contained a fine ring of eight bells bs Taylor, tenor 20 cwt ., which had been silent for some years through lack of ringers. This was an opportunity not to be missed, and on approaching the Vicar we were welcomed with open arms. In five months these boys have inarned to handle their bells and to ring rounds and 'stoney' with reasonably good striking. We are now just starting on Grandsire. Handbells have played an important part in learning method ringing. Grandsire and Plain Boh have been mastered reasonably well by most of the band on these, and by next Eaater I feel sure all the bovs will be capable of ringing a six-score and a 720 on tower bells. Sundav ringing takes place regularly each week.
I am happr to be able to include among mp campanologist friends a number of schoolmasters, who, I'm sure, would find it very interesting and very useful to the Exercise to erubark upon a similar venture even if only as an experiment.
If ever Mr. Williams is down this way I should be very happv to make his acquaintance and perhaps to ring in a peal with him.-Yours very truly.
