MOST Guilds and Associations hold their annual meetings in the early part of the year, Easter Monday being a particularly favoured date. This year a question is being addressed to each Guild by the Central Council to ascertain before the meeting of the governing body the measure of support that would be forthcoming for the holding of the Central Council meeting for 1949 at Dublin.

The matter was ventilated by the new Master of the Cumberlands, who wisely pointed out that the factor of cost could not be ignored. There are a number of wealthy Associations who meet the whole of the expenses of delegates and would probably be in a position to continue this policy despite the added expenses. On the other hand, some of the struggling organisations expect their representatives to pay their own expenses, and the added cost of a trip to Dublin might mean the absence of familiar faces. Against this, the counter-attraction of ringing in Ireland will make a strong appeal.

While it is true that no man is indispensable, a small attendance would mitigate against a representative opinion being obtained. The value of a Central Council meeting is not limited to the conference hall. The informal discussions between members are of great importance, frequently leading to the formation of policy and mutual understanding. Thus when a decision has to be made regarding the cordial invitation of Mr. Dukes, the enthusiastic secretary of the Irish Association, members should be able to vote with the knowledge that it would or would not be possible for their Guild or Association to be represented.

So far no indication has been received as to the opinion of Guilds on this somewhat expensive meeting. The Cumberlands hoped to test their members' opinion by a resolution for the payment of £10 towards the expenses of their Central Council members. The debate was abruptly concluded by a reminder from one of the senior members that only members who had paid 2s. in steepleage during the year were entitled to vote on a financial matter. Thus probably a little coterie of a dozen or fifteen can dictate the policy of a national society. Membership, however, in the eyes of the Central Council is not based on these few but on the multitude who find pleasure and satisfaction in belonging to an honourable society, who incidentally have no voice in deciding yea or nay to their delegates' suggested trip to Dublin. It will, indeed, be a rocky road to Dublin.

Change of Mastership

BIG INFLUX OF NEW MEMBERS.

The Society of Royal Cumberland Youths decided at their annual meeting on February 14th on a change in the Mastership. Mr. G. H. Cross, who has held office for the past 13 years, was defeated in a ballot by Mr. Walter Ayre. The reason advanced for the change was that for the Cumberlands to progress as a national body it was advisable that the Master should not necessarily be associated with the Church of St. Martin-in-the-Fields. The meeting was largely attended. The new Vicar (the Rev. L. M. Charles-Edwards) conducted the service and there was a company of over 100 at tea.

Mr. G. H. Cross presided at the business meeting, supported by the secretary (Mr. G. W. Steere). The statement of accounts showed that the balance from 1946 of £48 8s. 4d. had been increased to £69 7s. 3d.

The secretary's report stated that the past year, marking as it did the 200th anniversary of the formation of the Society, had been one of continued prosperity. Seventy-one new members had joined, the majority of whom were young ringers on the threshold of their ringing careers. Such an influx augured well for the Society's future prospects.

The 12 peals rung during the year covered a wide range from Bob Minor to Stedman Cinques and were rung in 12 different churches, under nine conductors. Two handbell peals had also been recorded—both at St. Martin's-in-the-Fields—but again with different conductors.

The report recorded the meetings held and the bicentenary dinner, and concluded with a vote of thanks to Mr. W. Ayre for presenting a chairman's gavel to the Society.

The Chairman congratulated the Society and gave additional details of the peals, in which 68 members participated. The secretary announced that four peals were already 'in the bag' for this year.

Mr. Steere was thanked for his services on the proposition of Mr. W. Ayre.

Apologies for absence were received from Messrs. Robert Heazel (Essex Association), George Dawson and J. Bailey. The meeting heard with regret that Mr. Bailey had been ordered to bed for three months, and the secretary was asked to write to him expressing the Society's wishes for a speedy recovery.

The Chairman congratulated Mr. Frank Knight on securing so many new members.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

There were five nominations for the post of Master, and a ballot resulted as follows: W. Ayre 32, G. H. Cross 27, F. E. Hawthorne 10, T. Sevan 5, C. J. Matthews 4.

Assuming the chair amid applause, Mr. Ayre said it was an honour he had never anticipated. He owed his knowledge of 12 bell ringing to a former Master, Mr. Matthews' father, and he was also indebted to him for his first peal on handbells and first peal on 12 bells.

He asked each member to regard himself as a cell for the Society from which other members would sprout so that their Society would bloom.

Other officers elected were: Senior steward, Mr. T. Bevan; junior steward, Mr. F. E. Hawthorne; trustees, Mr. C. J. Matthews and Mr. W. R. Winterton; hon. secretary and treasurer, Mr. G. W. Steere; hon. auditors, Messrs. G. H. Cross and A. H. Pulling; Central Council representatives, Messrs. G. W. Steere, G. H. Cross, Frank C. W. Knight and Tom Francis.

Mr. Rowe expressed the hope that at future annual meetings an eight-bell tower would be also available.

The Chairman said that owing to the kindness of the senior steward, a party did visit Hampstead and Gospel Oak.

A member: Why was it not announced in 'The Ringing World'?

Mr. Steere replied that he received notice too late and notified Mr. Ayre and certain other members.

The Chairman promised that at future annual meetings opportunity would be provided for eight-bell ringing.

CENTRAL COUNCIL AND IRELAND.

Mr. A. H. Pulling said that the next Central Council meeting the holding of the 1949 meeting in Ireland would be discussed. It would be an expensive journey and he would like to move that £10 he voted towards the travelling expenses of Council representatives.

The Chairman said he understood that a circular letter was being sent out by the Central Council asking the different Guilds whether they would support a meeting in Dublin. The matter would come before the next Council meeting, and it was felt that the Guilds or Associations should consult the members first.

Mr. C. Matthews said according to the rules no member was entitled to take part in any discussion on finance unless he had paid 2s. in steepenage fees the previous year. He proposed that the matter be shelved until the next meeting as under that rule he doubted whether there were two dozen members entitled to vote.

It was decided to adjourn the matter to the next annual meeting.

A vote of thanks to the retiring Master was proposed by Mr. Geoffrey Carter, seconded by Mr. Frank Knight and endorsed by the chairman.

Thanking the members, Mr. Cross said he started to ring when he was 14. It was then either a case of taking a hiding from his elder brother or ringing. He preferred ringing.

Mr. T. Bevan raised the question of holding a dinner, and Mr. Cross supported such a venture. After discussion it was decided to hold a dinner, and the meeting fixed as a tentative date Saturday, October 9th.

Quarterly meetings suggested were Chislehurst, April 10th; Dunstable, June 19th; and Guildford, September 18th.

The thanks of the Society to the new Vicar were voiced by Mr. Frank Hawthorne. Mr. Cross stated that a peal was rung for his induction and afterwards the Vicar and his wife came into the belfry to congratulate the ringers. They both expressed a wish to climb the steeple and see the bells.

Last year a new ring was installed at Carlton-juxta-Snaith, Yorks. The first of the band of learners recruited for the tower to ring a peal is Miss Margaret R. Graves (aged 16). The peal was in memory of the two sons of Dr. and Mrs. J. B. McGranahan (the donors of three of the new six bells).

A Note on Fourths Place Bobs in Double Norwich

BY NOLAN GOLDEN.

In spite of its interest and possibilities in the realm of composition, few ringers seem to have paid 'court' to the queen of plain major methods with fourths place bobs. One advantage of the use of this bob is that peals of 5,000 changes, composed entirely of five-lead courses with 4, 5 and 6 only in 6th's place at course-ends may be produced—an impossibility with the 6ths place bob.

Bobs and singles made at the first treble lead are as under:—

It will be seen that the calls produce a bob and single lead of Hereward Bob.

The calling positions, keeping the tenors together, are: (a) In and Fifths (bobs at leads 1 and 2); (b) In and Fifth's and Before (1, 2 and 4); (c) Middle (3); (d) Middle and Before (3 and 4); (e) Home (5); and (f) Before (6).

The following specimen compositions give some idea of the possibilities of the 4ths place bob. Each contains 60 course-ends with all the combinations of 4-5-6 in 5-6. The four-part contains, in addition, the 6th the extent in 5-6, while the six and three-parts have 4-5-6 only in 6ths.

A regular service ringer at St. Leonard's Church, Aldington, Sussex, for close on 50 years, Mr. Frederick F. Trusler died on Feb. 5th after a brief illness. He was in his 80th year.

Steele (cond.) 5, H. Brown 6.
