## THE ROLL

THERE is an intimate touch about ringing. The national character of the Exercise has produced its outstanding personalities who are known wherever ringers forgather. Some have gained renown by their prowess in peal ringing; we have our Hobbs and Sutcliffes, whose mastery of our art and feats of endurance have fired the imagination of young ringers. They have their special niche in ringing fame. Then there are the administrators of our art-men and women who guide the destinies of our Guilds and Associations. There is a place for them, too, on the roll.

It is right and proper that such service should be recognised, it is one of the duties of the Biographies Committee of the Central Council to see that they are not forgotten and that such material is available for the ringing historian of the future. There is another section whom the writer would like to see recorded on a roll of honour-those ringers who by their keenness and enthusiasm, have induced the public to subscribe large sums of money to provide bells.

An example to hand is the service rendered by Mr . F. Horsfield, hon. secretary of the Bell Fund at St. Peter's Church, Macclesfield. He was taught to ring by Mr. G. F. Woodhouse at Sedbergh, and has been a ringer successively at Barwell, Hinckley and West Bromwich. Four years ago he came to Macclesfield and was surprised to find that the fine tower of St. Peter's had only one bell. It was not long before he started to agitate for a ring of eight to commemorate the centenary of the church and as a memorial to those who fell in the war. In the space of 27 -months $£ 1,700$ was raised to meet the cost of bells and clock chimes.

Brief reference to this dedication was made in Belfry Gossip at the time, but pressure on our space prevented justice being done to the occasion. Mr. Horsfield also trained a team of local boys, with an average age of just under 15 years to ring the opening touch, and it is claimed that these are the youngest band to have opened a new ring. The Archdeacon of Macclesfield, who performed the dedication ceremony, had a special word of encouragement to the young life in the belfry. 'You could have chosen the easier course which other parishes have adopted from time to time and installed a mechanical ringing device,' he said, 'but you here had faith that there would always be men, and perhaps women too, who would come forward and ring from Sunday to Sunday.' As a body that faith is unshaken among ringers to-day; but it behoves us to be vigilant.

## LETTERS TO

Northamptonshire Bells
Dear Sir,-Readers will no doubt be told that the late Rev. E. S. Powell only gave approximate weights. I, for one, cannot understand how a 7 cwt . bell described as 15 cwt . can be regarded as approximate. Unfortunately the inventory is full of similar errors to that of Alderton. Here are a number of others:-
Cu!worth he describes as tenor $22 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{cwt}$. and $50 \frac{1}{2}$ in. A card in the belfry gives it 3 ft . 3 3in. and 12 cwt . 3 qr. 10 lb ., rehung, 1931 (only seven years before the Rev. Powell's inventory was written). St. Peter's, Northampton, is described as im a metal frame: it is a wood frame.
Hannington he states as having three bells; there are only two. Abington is mentioned as having three bells not hung for ringing; they are hung for ringing with wheels, headstocks, stays and sliders, but at the moment have no ropes.
Piddington tenor is described as 13 cwt . Its weight given to me by Taylor's is 11 cwt. 1 qr. 6 lb . Whiston, also described as 13 cwt ., is, according to Taylor's, 15 cwt . 4 lb ., and a peal board in the helfry at the time Mr. Powell wrote his inventory gives this weight. Newnham tenor is stated to be $14 \frac{1}{2}$ cwt. and measuring 44in. Tarlor's, who rehung these bells, give the weight of the tenor as 13 cwt I 1 lb . and $42 \frac{1}{2}$ in. Ecton tenor is deseribed as 41 in . In the company of five others recently I measured it and made it $45 \frac{1}{3}$ in.
Holcot is published as having four. bells with a St cwt. tenor measuring 31in. The bells are actually the first three of six with the fourth sounding the note of the tenor to six. The first three are chimed from levers and only the present fourth has a wheel. This is a $9 \frac{1}{2}$ cwt. bell; it is the third which measures 31 in . and is $5 \frac{1}{2}$ cwt. So Mr. Powell has got that all wrong! A peculiarity in this tower is that the clock plays the Westminster chimes the same as $i t$ would on the second, third, fourth and seventh of eight. The hour is struck on the 4th. Rushden has the same chimes on six. Holcot is the only tower with four bells I know of like it. I dare say there are others, but, if so, they are very rare and they would have to be tuned the same as the four bells at Holcot. Besides the weights of tenors Mr. Powell has got the history of a number of bells wrong.
I can only assume that where Mr. Powell received no reply to his circular sent to all the towers, he copied the particulars given by the late Mr. North, which gives Alderton tenor as 15 cwt . and 44 in . North's book, apart from being out of date, is full of errors, many of which I have proved. In some cases the diameter given has turned out to be the circumference round the waist, or taken over the bottom of the clapper and so on. P. AMOS.
