#### NOMENCLATURE: II

A FERTILE cause of unsuitable names is the obsession of method constructors with so-called 'extensions,' about which Mr. H. G. Cashmore wrote some weeks ago. Few indeed are the Royal or Maximus Surprise methods which do not purport to be enlarged versions of existing eight-bell methods, though the resemblance is usually only apparent to the fond eyes of their inventors. There are already six 'London Royals' before the Exercise, with an equal number of Bristols—not one of them generally accepted. It is reasonably certain that the refusal of the Central Council to recognise one of the London extensions would be interpreted to embrace all of them if the matter was ever forced to a decision.

There have been many acrimonious discussions about principles of extension which leave the average Surprise ringer cold. He knows that, apart from the Cambridge family, no principle is likely to give him a recognisable Royal or Maximus from any Major he is able to ring. But the chief disadvantage of the obsession with extensions is its cramping effect upon composers. As was pointed out in 'The Ringing World' during the war years, there are some true extensions from combinations or Majors in the Cambridge family which will not fit on eight bells. Two of them have since been rung—Albanian and Prittlewell. How many more methods of greater than eight-bell scope might not our experts have given us if they had thrown off the shackles of Major?

In collecting Royal and Maximus Surprise methods for my next

In collecting Royal and Maximus Surprise methods for my next publication I have come across some data which indicate the cramping effect on method construction that I have just referred to. In a perfectly extensible method, Cambridge Maximus, there are 60 places perfectly extensible method, Cambridge Maximus, there are 60 places made in each lead which are distributed as follows: 1st, 13; 2nd, 3; 3rd to 10th, 4 each; 11th, 1; 12th, 11. Yorkshire Maximum has 56 places: 1st, 13; 2nd, 5; 3rd, 4; 4th, 2; 5th-8th, 4 each; 9th, 2; 10th, 2; 11th, 1; 12th, 11. Now let us take Clacton Surprise. The Major has 44 places in a lead: 1st, 11; 3rd, 4; 4th, 10; 5th, 7; 6th, 2; 8th, 10. Lindoff's own extension of Clacton to Maximus has 68 places: 1st, 19; 3rd, 4; 4th, 18; 5th, 11; 6th, 2; 12th, 14. In other words, the places are all made in the same six positions as in Major, no place ever being made in 2nd, 7th, 8th, 9th, 10th or 11th.

The same is true of other composers. Here is the analysis of 14
Surprise Maximus extensions taken from my notes. Total places made in one lead each from the 14 methods, 860, distributed as follows: 1st, 252; 2nd, 36; 3rd, 82; 4th, 199; 5th, 100; 6th, 20; 7th, 0; 8th, 0; 9th, 0; 10th, 0; 11th, 1; 12th, 170. Of these 14 methods, 10 have all their places in 6 positions and 4 have them in 7 positions. No less than almost half the total places are made in 3rd, 4th and 5th; indeed, there are four-fifths as many made in 4th as in 1st. What sort of recognisable 'extension' can possibly arise from such an absurd and lopsided treatment of the place-making? It can only give snippets of the Major work strung together with dodging hunt or plain hunt across six positions in the rows.

A saner attitude towards extensions would enable us to effect two

A saner attitude towards extensions would enable us to effect two epochal revolutions in 10- and 12-bell Surprise ringing. It would give us Royal and Maximus methods with a wider scope than is attainable so long as we insist upon squeezing 10 and 12 bells into an 8-bell mould. From the astronomical number of right-place Surprise Royal and Maximus methods awaiting discovery we might abolish backhanders on the higher numbers. Places wrong are forced upon us by our retermination to imitate the limitations of Major in 10-and 12-bell methods. Moreover, this change for the better would abolish a lot of our present misnomers.

Note to Correspondents.-The remarks in this column apply to Surprise methods only. They are not to be interpreted as suggesting, for example, the abolition of the characteristic Kent places wrong in Treble Bob Royal and Maximus.

#### SOCIETY FOR THE ARCHDEACONRY OF STAFFORD

THE history of the above Society began with a preliminary meeting of clergymen and ringers of the City of Lichfield on Thursday, May 17th, 1883, held in the home of Archdeacon Iles, in the Close, to consider the desirability of forming a Society for the Archdeaconry of Stafford. It was then unanimously agreed that such should be formed, having for its objects. for its objects:—

(a) The recognition of the position of

ringers as church workers.
(b) The promotion of the art of change

(c) Belfry reform.

It was further decided that a meeting should be held forthwith for the purpose of constitut-

ing such a society.

A meeting of change ringers was accordingly held on June 2nd in the Cathedral belfry, the Ven. Archdeacon Iles in the chair. Members of the chief ringing bands in the Archdeaconry were present, and it was unanimously resolved to form the Society and a draft of the rules was drawn up.

was drawn up.

The first general meeting was held at Lichfield on June 30th, at which the rules were approved and the officers and committee for the ensuing year elected. It was decided that the year should run from midsummer to midsummer, and that the annual meeting should be held on the Saturday nearest to Midsummer than the content of the saturday are avenued and Day. Quarterly meetings were arranged and the following places chosen: West Bromwich, Wolverhampton and Walsall. It was felt that Wolverhampton and Walsall. It was felt that these quarterly meetings would do much to awaken an interest in the art of change ringing in various centres, and also to set forth to ringers the real nature of their work as to be done to the glory of God.

Officers for the first year were: President, the Ven. the Archdeacon of Stafford; hon. treasurer, the Rev. J. J. Serjeantson; hon. secretaries, the Rev. J. B. Keble and Mr. W. A. Wood; committee, Col. Bagnall, the Rev. R. Hodgson, the Rev. H. E. Butler, Messrs. F. Cope, B. Dalton, S. Reeves and G. Robinson.

Dear Sir,—With reference to the weight of the tenor, I have turned back the pages of the Kent Report for many years and find they all give the weight as 30 cwt. in C.

I should like to explain my view on this. On many occasions I had conversation with Canon F. J. O. Helmore, for many years the president of the Association. He appeared to have a peculiarity (like many ringers) about the weight of a bell, and I firmly believe that if he formed an opinion that the tenor at Canterbury was 30 cwt. in C, nothing would alter it. I have no doubt that into the report it would go, and, having been once inserted, it was copied year after year. Nobody would good ground to stand on.

The question has been reopened, and Mr. Bert Luck has given the particulars shown in the belfry as 34 cwt., while Mr. Peter Small has given them 33 cwt. These particulars need a slight correction, but must not be ignored as it is of the utmost importance for the future of those ringing at the Cathedral. If the particulars stated are shown in the belfry they are the authority of those who

If the particulars stated are shown in the belfry they are the authority of those who cast the bells, and it is unwise for any individual ringer (no matter what opinion he has) to interfere with those particulars now they have been established. CHARLES TURNER.

#### THE CARILLON

Dear Sir,—There is an unfortunate tendency to apply the term 'carillon' loosely to all chimes of bells, irrespective of their range or chimes of bells, irrespective of their range or the method employed to sound them. A typical example of this occurred with the memorial chime at St. Mary's, Taunton, when the local reporters came out with the headline, 'Taunton's New Carillon.' In actual fact there are, I believe, three semi-tone bells added to the ring of twelve, the whole merely hammering out melodies, as expressive as a child haltingly playing a piano with one finger. Such ignorance is excusable in the popular press, but one does not expect 'The Ringing World' freely to employ the words 'chime' and 'carillon' as thought they were synonymous.

mous.

The appellation 'carillon' is reserved for a minimum of 25 bells, chromatically tuned, and played from a clavier; there may be a mechanical playing device as well, but that is immaterial. The installation at All Hallows', Barking, may have a keyboard, but it only has 18 bells, and should, therefore, be referred to as a chime. Carillon music as understood by the Mechlin School cannot be performed on it.—Yours faithfully,

#### The Aldbourne Foundry

Dear Sir, - With reference to recent cor-Dear Sir, — With reference to recent correspondence regarding the Cors of Aldbourne, Wiltshire, and other local bellfounders. In January, 1942, I gave some account in 'The Ringing World' of the Aldbourne foundry and its production of musical handbells. For the benefit of new readers, however, a brief list of its owners is appended, together with totals of the approximate number of tower bells cast by them, and their earliest and latest known dates:—

A bell at Houghton, Hampshire, by W. and R Cor is dated 1742, but this is an error for 1724. Edne Witts, of Aldbourne, cast the sanctus bell at Culham, Oxfordshire, in 1774.

The business was sold by James Wells in 1826 to Thomas Mears II., of London, and James Bridgman, who had been Wells' assistant, worked with Mears at the White-chapel foundry for about three years, after which he returned to Aldbourne and started business on his own account. To him was apprenticed Henry Bond, who succeeded to the business circa 1851 and moved first to Westcot and later to Burford Oxfordships where the and later to Burford, Oxfordshire where the foundry was worked by his son, Mr. Thomas Bond, until his death last year.

Numerous handbells cast by the Cors, the Wells and by James Bridgeman exist to-day, and the majority of these bear the founder's initials on the inside. The Cors used one size alphabet- and the Wells family two sizes for inscriptions on their handbells, and, in addition, the Cors frequently used a founder's mark depicting a duck. The earlier Cor handbells have cast-in type crown staples similar to those in 17th century tower bells, and were fitted with clappers having heads of the hook type; they often had wooden handles, and sometimes clappers with the striking portion formed like a three-point star. Later Cor handbells have staples formed of two cast-in metal plates enabling clappers of modern type to be used. All the musical handbells by members of the Wells family that I have seen have independent clapper staples; these again have independent clapper staples; these again are of two types, the earlier being keyed into a slot in the crown of the handbell, and the later ones threaded. The later Wells handbells are numbered in sizes.

The 'R.B.' referred to by one correspondent is probably Robert Beconsall, and 'I.W.' are probably the initials of John Wallis.

#### Hampshire Records

Dear Sir,—In reply to Mr. J. A. Hill regarding the I.W. found on bells in Hants. The founder was John Wallis, the first Salisbury bell founder, who cast many bells between 1578 and 1624. He was fond of short religious exhortations for his inscriptions, and would richly ornament many of his bells.

The R.B. 1589 bell at Bishopstoke is inscribed 'In God is my hope,' and this founder, whose identity is still undiscovered, cast quite a few bells in Hants and neighbouring counties.

identity is still undiscovered, cast quite a few bells in Hants and neighbouring counties. Spelling was not one of his strong points, and he was probably one of the travelling founders who toured Sussex Hants, Wilts, etc., during the latter part of the 16th and the beginning of the 17th centuries. The tenor at St. Maurice's, Winchester, dated 1610, was also cast by this founder.
