AST week a particularly encouraging announcement was received concerning the paper supply to 'The Ringing World.' Confirmation was to hand of an additional supply as from the beginning of November that will enable the journal to maintain a uniform 12-page issue and to increase the number of subscribers by 200. It is a case of 'first come, first served,' and would-be subscribers should write forthwith to Mrs. G. W. Fletcher, The White House, Caister-on-Sea, Norfolk. Subscription rates are 4s. 3d. per quarter or 17s. a year. Those who prefer to receive their 'Ringing World' through a newspectant cheath and the subscription that the case through the wholeseless. agent should ask him to apply through his wholesaler to the Rolls House Publishing Co., Ltd., Breams Buildings, London, E.C.4. Newsagents are not supplied from Guildford but direct through wholesalers by Rolls House Publishing Co. lishing Co.

Regarding notices, there are two things we wish to bring to the attention of Guild and District secretaries. To ensure insertion they should be received in Guildford on a Monday at the latest. 'The Ringing World' starts printing on Tuesday. Most weeks we receive notices too late for publication. The other point is in the matter of charging. The simplest way is to run a deposit account with Mrs. Fletcher, then there is no difficulty if the number of words and the remittance do not coincide. It is still a complicated task for some Guild secretaries to make these two synchronise. The charge is one penny a word-minimum 2s. As regards counting, 5 p.m. is not one word but two, and each initial of a name counts as one word. Thus 'T. W. White' would be three words. Economy could be effected by writing 'Tom White.' The title of the Guild or District is also charged for. We are sorry to bring these mundane things to the notice of readers, but it is only by watching pence that a journal such as ours can remain solvent.

We are indebted to the many contributors who keep us punctually and regularly informed of news of interest. At times it is necessary for us to sub-edit contents either on account of space or readability. Not everything sent in can be inserted. When the Editor is in doubt about the suitability of a contribution he takes advantage of the advice of the Editorial Committee. It is impossible to publish every quarterpeal received. Lately we have reserved two columns for quarters,' and we shall endeavour to maintain this space. It would be of great advantage if quarters were written in the uniform style employed. Priority is given to first performances.

Finally, it is our aim to present week by week a complete and accurate record of proceedings in the Exercise. To avoid mistakes in peals conductors are asked to write clearly. On our part we arrange for peals to be read twice so as to reduce errors. It is probable that in connection with the happy event in the Royal Family next month there will be a record number of peals. Footnotes must therefore be minimised to absolute essentials. A royal peal should not be bracketed with any other commemoration or the birthday of somebody's aunt.

OBITUARY OF THE WEEK

MR. T. W. LAST.

The death took place at his home, the Brick Kiln, Helmingham, Suffolk, of Mr. Thomas William Last.

Born at Helmingham on April 8th, 1879, he commenced to ring at an early age at Frams-den under that brilliant conductor, Mr. George Wightman. Since 1900 he had been a regular service ringer and a chorister at Helmingham. A man of kind heart, always agreeable and of an unselfish nature, it will be remembered that when St. Mary's company were making history he readily agreed to share in the conducting of the various Surprise methods that were being rung.

A brickmaker by trade, he had all his life been engaged in hard work and was never slow in tackling a bad going bell. A handy man with carpenter's tools, he well blacked man with carpenter's tools, he well blacked out the belfry so that practices could be held to keep the band together. He was also very neat with his pen and made a record of the 46 Surprise methods that were rung in his own handwriting. It is hoped that this framed record will permanently remain in the belfry beside the 7th that he loved so well.

Bill was always content to ring round the back end: this may be shown by the fact that he hadn't circled his own tower. Never any desire to ring above eight, although he had rung a few peals of Royal, he was always willing to go anywhere for any method. In all he had rung about 300 peals for the Norwich Association and Suffolk Guild. His record may perhaps be remembered in 'Leading Con-

ductors,' 1938.

He leaves a widow, six daughters and one son. At the funeral on October 16th the Suffolk Guild was represented by Mr. C. E. Fisher, vice-president, and Mr. C. W. Pipe, secretary. Immediately after the service the bells were rung half-nuffled by the local band. A regular service ringer and loyal churchman, his place will be hard to fill. L.G.B.

BELLS RINGING THE RINGERS

Dear Sir .- I was interested in the letter of Mr. Clift re weights of peals rung to Surprise Royal. As the collective weight of Southwark is 198 cwt. 2 qr. 7 lb., this still appears to hold the field! There is another aspect of judging performances on heavy bells, however, is seldom mentioned, and that is the

question of time.

There is no disgrace, of course, in ringing peals in slow time, but it makes all the difference in performance. Most of us know rings of bells of between 20 and 30 cwt., which requires smart work to ring a peal of Major in 3 hours or so, but become anybody's bells at 3.15 and upwards. For instance, the peals of Superlative and Cambridge Major on back circles of Compbill and Southwest 41 and 50 eights of Cornhill and Southwark, 41 and 50 cwt., respectively, were both 3 hours and 44 minutes, and the peal of London on back eight of Bow, tenor 53 cwt., was 4 hours, all smart performances. I never heard either of them, but would be quite satisfied as to their integrity from composition of bands.

When I see reports of various people who are continually ringing tenors, and always in

are continually ringing tenors, and always in slow time, I get the impression that the bells are ringing the ringers, and not vice versa. I again emphasise there is no fault to be found with a slow, well-struck peal, but it certainly counts when the value of heavy bell perform-

ances is in question.
