GUILD OF CLERICAL RINGERS

LAST week we recorded two peals rung by the Guild of Derical Ringers during their annual week from April 25th to April 29th, centred on Taunton, headquarters being within a few yards of the great tower of St. Mary Magdalene. The party of 23 resident members and two wives of members was the largest yet assembled. Three members joined for one day only, and Mrs. Powell accompanied the party for three of the days. As to ages, the oldest was ordained 52 years ago and another only last year.

Tuesday began with a corporate Communion at St. Mary's. A peal band set out for Kent T.B. Major and modestly ascribed the failure to inability to ring the method. Meanwhile the remainder began at West Monkton their acquaintance with bell towers and 'ton' tenors, which was a feature of the week. Next came Weston Zoyland, where the defeated peal band had already arrived, and Bridgwater, where a crowd of sighseers were astonished at the spectacle of such clever and muscular clergy! Enmore, set among its trees and beside its castle, and Kingston, another tall and ornate tower, were visited.

Wednesday was occupied with an excursion into Devonshire, calling first at Bradford-on-Towe, a remarkable ring of six, with two mediæval 'Jesus' bells, and Rockwell Green. Ringing at Cullompton, an excellent ten, was followed by welcome hospitality from Mr. and Mrs. Sellwood. At Uffculme, the first touch of London for the Guild was rung, and Culmstock's noisy bells inside the tower required a shouter to amplify the conductor's orders. Here the Rev. W. M. K. Warren most liberally entertained his fellow-members to tea. At Hemyock, the last Devonshire tower to be visited, St. Clement's was among the methods rung on the heavy six.

On the Thursday, ringing at Norton Fitzwarren and a peal of Cambridge at Milverton started simultaneously, the non-pealers going on through tortuous lanes to Hill Farrance, a massive tower, and then to Halse, a fascinating church which contained treasures of every age. Even narrower lanes led on to Fitzhead where, in the intervals of ringing, Scouts brought the glad news that Milverton bells were still ringing. The peal, brought round in one minute under three hours, was the first of Cambridge by a band of clergy and the first Surprise peal by them since 1912.

After lunch the party moved to Wiveliscombe, where the Guild apparently made history by pulling up the tenor in peal single-handed. The narrowest of all lanes led to Ash Priors, where Roger Semson cast his glorious bells 400 years ago. After tea came ringing at Bishop's Lydeard, and in the evening a recording was made for the B.B.C. on the bells of St. James', Taunton. At the annual meeting the Rev. C. C. Cox and Preb. E. V. Cox were re-elected president and secretary respectively and Chester chosen as the centre for the next tour.

Drayton was the first tower on Friday, the party waiting for a peal band to start for Kent T.B. Major. One of the band who was missing came in with a story of a lamb with two heads and a turkey with four legs, which no one believed. He was shown an apt notice in the tower which read, 'Someone is bound to be last, but he need not he late.' The peal was the Rev. C. C. Cox's 50th as conductor, and the first for the Guild by a clergyman of the Church of Wales (the Rev. S. J. Richards). Lunch was taken at the Rectory of Shepton Beauchamp, and after Ilminster, with its glorious eight, the party hurried back to Taunton to hear themselves in the 'Week in the West' feature, but alas, the repairing of the Whiteball tunnel and the return to Devoport of a frigate proved for the time being to have more news value than clerical ringers. A visit to Trull, the 31st and last tower of the week, was followed by farewell to Mr. W. G. Gigg, who had given invaluable help in arranging the tour. Here also the Rev. and Mrs. C. W. Trevelyan provided generous hospitality to clerical and local ringers. All who took part in this tour would wish to express their gratitude.

OBITUARY

MR. E. B. HARTLEY. By the tragic death of Eric Hartley, of 43, Grendon Gardens, Wembley Park, at the early age of 35 years the Exercise has lost a ringer of outstanding merit. Those of us who knew him best found beneath his reserve quali-Those of us who ties of a sterling character, and in him I have had a close and staunch friend for many years. As a ringer he had reached a high standard, both in methods and striking, and in 1947 rang his 100th peal. He had rung in over 800 different towers and with the writer he was one of the foundation members of the N.U.T.S., who had many happy cycle tours before the

Whilst on his way to Aldenham for a peal last November he sustained a compound fracture of the leg when his motor-cycle collided with a stationary car in the fog. Since then he had been confined to bed and was apparently

progressing well, but last Sunday morning he died suddenly without any warning.

At the inquest held on Thursday last, it was learnt that his death was due to a clot of blood formed as result of the accident. His interest in ringing never waned, and during his illness he was engaged in compiling a complete list of the rings of bells in the British

The first part of his funeral service was conducted by the writer at St. Augustine's Church, Wembley Park, where he was a server and church worker, and the interment took place on Saturday at Southport in the family grave.

To his father and fiancee we extend our deep sympathy and thoughts. Although he is parted from our sight, his influence will live on in many towers and in the lives of those who knew him. May he rest in peace. K. C. D.

MR. W. H. YOUNG. Readers will regret to hear of the passing on April 23rd, after a long illness patiently borne, of Mr. William Henry (Harry) Young, of Thruxton, Allensmore, Hereford, aged 81 years. His connection with ringing extended over 65 years. Never spectacular, he worked in a quiet way and kept no records of peals rung.

He was with the Worcestershire Association during the first part of his ringing years and joined the Hereford Diocesan Guild in the days when change ringing in the county was considered quite a feat. For many years he acted as instructor to the Hereford Guild, attending as instructor to the Heretord Guild, attending belfries (in those days travelling by bicycle) teaching the art of change ringing. His main work, however, was regular ringing for Sunday services, teaching and encouraging young ringers. For several years a ringer at Hereford Cathedral, he held office as conductor and foreman at Allensmore Church for 40 years. The last time he rang was in two six-scores of Grandsire Doubles at Kingstone Church on the occasion of the birth of Prince Charles.

The funeral took place at Thruxton Church on April 26th. During the evening the bells were rung half-muffled by the local band at Kingstone Church. The band also rang a half-muffled quarter-peal on the Sunday.

STOKE-UNDER-HAM, SOMERSET

DISCUSSION ON 'THE RINGING WORLD.'

The amount of space devoted to peals in 'The Ringing World' was heatedly discussed at the annual meeting of the Guildford Diocesan Guild, held at Guildford on May 7th. Mr. George L. Grover, the secretary, reported that the executive committee were of the opinion that too much space was devoted to the recording of neals and auticinating the

the opinion that too much space was devoted to the recording of peals, and, anticipating the support of the Guild, had forwarded the fol-lowing motion to the Central Council: 'That in the opinion of this Guild too much of the available space in "The Ringing World" is

available space in "The Ringing World 's devoted to peal ringing.'
Since the beginning of the year, said Mr. Grover, there had been 220 pages of 'The Ringing World.' Of these 74 had been for the recording of peals, 12 for quarter-peals, 43 for news, letters and articles of general interest, 10 pages for technical articles, 81 for adverticements, paties and the leader. That meant

10 pages for technical articles, 81 for advertisements, notices and the leader. That meant that one-third of the paper was devoted to the interests of about a tenth of the Exercise.

Mr. H. V. Young said that at least annual meetings and other meetings concerning business of importance should be reported in 'The Ringing World,' so that people who had not attended could read what had been said. He considered that more rested on the ordinary matters of the Exercise throughout the country than on peals. He did not want to do away with some record of peals in the paper, but he thought the peal ringers were having more than their fair share: than their fair share:

The amount of space given to peals in 'The Ringing World,' said Mr. A. C. Hazelden, was giving a false picture of the Exercise as a whole, because the bulk of the ringers were those whose names never appeared in 'The Ringing World.'

Mr. F. E. Hawthorne reminded the meeting that they became bellringers for the purpose of ringing for Sunday services, and that a corv.

that they became bellringers for the purpose of ringing for Sunday services, and that every association in its rules and regulations had the clause that the prime duty of the association was to foster bellringing for Sunday services. He suggested that peals in 'The Ringing World' were not omitted, but that they were printed smaller and in three columns. The Chairman, the Rev. K. C. Davis,

Hawley, also stressed this side of ringing, that it was primarily for the glory of God, and that ringers were church workers. Mr. J. Euston said that in his experience it was the peal ringers who were at church on Sundays.

Mr. Hawthorne proposed that the Guild's representatives on the Central Council be asked to do the best they could to see whether a change could be made with regard to the printing of peals in 'The Ringing World,' and the meeting expressed agreement.

GODALMING'S BELLS.

The annual report of the executive committee drew attention to bells in the Guild's area in need of restoration and repair. At Godalming it was suggested that it was high time a ring worthy of the borough was installed. Seven only out of the eight were ringable, and these had not good musical qualities. The light six at Puttenham when in action 'make a row suggestive of the tower roof bouncing up and down,' and those at Ockley Ranmore, Crondall, East Molesey and Frensham were in need

During the year 47 peals were rung by the Guild, 40 of them on tower bells. Twenty members scored their first peal. The accounts, presented by Mr. L. C. W. Hunter in the absence of the treasurer. Mr. J. Corbett, showed a balance of £73 18s., compared with £59 2s. 11d the previous very

A report on the Guild library was given by
Mr. A. C. Hazelden, and the Library Committee were re-elected. The Guild officers were

also re-elected. Prior to the meeting a service was held at Holy Trinity Cathedral Church, at which the Provost of Guildford, the Rev. R. S. B. Sinclair, preached.

GEORGE WILLIAMS COMMEMORATION DINNER

Decision of Bournemouth Ringers' Rally

A decision that the Bournemouth ringers' rally shall in future be known as 'The George Williams Commemoration Dinner' was agreed to at the third annual dinner, held at Christchurch on May 7th. The gathering, which took place on the late George Williams' birthday, was highly successful.

The Rev. R. P. Price, Vicar of Christchurch,

presided and the guests of honour included the Mayors and Mayoresses of Bournemouth and Christchurch and the Bishop-designate of Peterborough (Canon Spencer Leeson, Vicar of Southampton and the Rural Dean of Bourne-

The Chairman read apologies from the Bishop of Winchester, who was in the Channel Islands, the Bishop of Southampton, Mr. Phillips, Mr. J. York-Bramble and a telegram from Miss Mary Davies wishing the rally every success. He spoke of the debt of the clergy to bell-ringers and regarded them as partners. 'We

ringers and regarded them as partners. 'We clergy raise our rather ineffectual voices in the Church, but the bells carry the music of the gospel far and wide.

In his welcome, the chairman had a special word for Mr. Albert Walker, Master of the St. Martin's Guild, and they had guests with them from Oxford, Stourbridge, Dunstable, Birmingham, Shepton Mallet, Alford (Lincs), Guildford and Sutton Valence.

The toast of 'The Church and State' was proposed by Mr. W. B. Cartwright (Birming-ham). He said if the individual's relationship with the Church was all right, then his relationship with the State would be good. He deplored that ringers went to church on a Sunday, but did not stop to the services they rang for. If ringers did the right thing they would stay to the service. Ringers owed everything to the Church-thev used the Church's instruments. If the bells belonged to the State could they imagine permission being given to ring a peal? Ringers should look more closely into these things and endeavour to improve

their relationship.

Canon Spencer Leeson, who replied, said: 'I am certain that the devil was asleep when church bells were made. We scored a point on him, and we did the same when Christmas

carols were invented.

'Occasionally you hear it said that the Church is down and out. All of us know it is not the case. We know this country is waiting for the message that only the Church can give, and it is our task, if we have the care of hells, to proclaim that Gospel by word and example and leave the rest to the Almighty Father we are all proud to serve.'
The toast of 'The Rorough of Christchurch'

was an occasion for domestic politics in view of the prospect of Christchurch's incorporation with Bournemouth. The Mayor and Rural Dean of Bournemouth proposed the toast and the Mayor of Christchurch replied.

QUALITIES OF CITIZENSHIP

'The Bells and Bellringers' was submitted by Mr. H. C. Galton (churchwarden of Christ-church) and replied to by the Rev. K. W. H. Felstead, Vicar of St. Michael's, Southampton. As a ringing parson, he would like to say on behalf of the ringers in general and of his own Guild (the Winchester and Portsmouth Diocesan Guild) that the relationship between ringers and clergy was a very good one indeed, and also to his knowledge the great majority of churches had loval ringers, not only in the ringing of the bells, but as churchmen and churchwomen.

Ringing was something that needed a sense of rhythm and those qualities desired in a good citizen. He was sure the way in which ringers had to concentrate and work together as a team was of benefit in their relationship with the Church and the State.

The Chairman announced that last year they

had with them their old friend Mr. George Williams, who had since passed to his rest. It was proposed that the ringers' rally and dinner should be known as the George Williams

Commemoration Dinner, and he asked Mr. George Pullinger to make the proposition.

Mr. George Pullinger described Mr. George Williams as a friend of all ringers, and said he was probably more closely associated with him in recent years than any other ringer. He first met Mr. Williams at Wickham in 1908, but there were others present who had known him longer—Mr. Preston, Mr. Martin Stewart and Mr. Albert Walker.

Mr. George Williams was ringing before the Winchester Diocesan Guild was formed. He

had told him many stories of those early days how he cycled on a 'penny farthing Droxford to Southampton to ring the bells of Holy Rood half-muffled when Livingstone's body was brought ashore on its journey to its last resting place in Westminster Abbey.

'THE OLD REV.' Mr. Williams could tell many stories of the late Rev. F. E. Robinson, the ringer who first rang 1,000 people. Mr. Williams always referred to him as the 'Old Rev.' They were ringing a peal at Romsey Abbey and the tenor did not go too well, and the 'Old Rev.' who was ringing the tenor, let Mr. Williams, who was on the seventh, know that he could not go on, so they decided to change over at back stroke. They both stepped off their boxes together and missed the back strokes and another peal was lost!

Coming to that dinner last year, Mr. Williams met the Bishop of Salisbury, and, to the great amusement of the people in the carriage, started talking of old times. The story was told of a Bishop of Exeter (Lord story was told of a Bishop of Exeter (Lord Cecil), who was a very forgetful man. He was travelling in Hampshire with a young curate, and the curate in conversation said, 'I lived in your diocese at one time, my lord,' and added, 'It was in the parish of Beer and, strange to relate, my name is also Beer.' They chatted on and as the curate left the train the Bishop said, 'Good afternoon, Mr. Guinness!' Guinness

Mr. Williams was a great ringer. He not only rang a great many peals, but rang them only rang a great many peals, but rang them at a time when peals were worth getting; as he said at one of these dinners, he had to scour the diocese to get a band of ringers. His long list was, therefore, all the more creditable. He did his full share of teaching and instruction and most of the ringers in the diocese owed what they knew to him. In addition, he was a great Sunday service ringer; he never neglected Sunday service ringing.

He understood the local committee had decided to call the function in future the 'George Williams Commemoration Dinner' on the same lines as the Henry Johnson dinner at Birmingham. In the words of Mr. Davies, in some ways Mr. Williams did more for ringing than Henry Johnson. In addition, he was known to a far greater circle of ringers than Henry Johnson. Mr. Pullinger then submitted the proposition, which was accepted by those pre-sent saying 'Aye.'

MEMORIAL SUGGESTED.

The concluding toast, 'The Ringing World,' was given by Mr. Albert Walker. Commenting on the proposition to commemorate George Williams with the dinner in future, he described it as an excellent idea. He had known George Williams for about 40 years. 'I use to call him "Dad" and he called me "Pop. ' I used We rang many peals together and you are doing well to commemorate the name of George Williams in your annual function. George Williams was one of the early pioneers and, of course, his greatest work was in Hampshire.
'I do not know if it is wise to make a comparison between Henry Johnson and George Williams. I hope as the ringers of England put up a headstone in Aston Churchyard to Henry Johnson that this Guild will do something to mark the resting place of George Williams.

He congratulated the committee and Mr. Arthur Davis on the excellent arrangements made for the visitors and on the splendid coach outing.

In a reference to 'The Ringing World,' he said he was in favour of a 4d. paper of 16 pages.

The Editor replied and mentioned that in weeks' time the 2,000th issue would be published.

The entertainment programme was of a high standard. There were songs by Mr. Alan Gray, some Spliced Major on bandbells by Mrs. F. J. Marshallsay, R. Hurst, W. G. Young and D. T. Matkin, and tune ringing on handbells by the St. John's (Surrey Road) band (a very fine effort).

Mr. Arthur V. Davis writes, as hon secretary of the organising committee, expressing thanks to the Vicar of Christchurch for his sustained interest and magnificent leadership as chairman; to Mr. W. E. Cheater, District Ringing Master, who so ably conducted the coach tour, and to Mr. F. Hart (Wimborne Minster) and Mr. George Preston (Christchurch He also expresses thanks to Mr. A. Martin Stewart for the beautiful flowers which adorned the tables, and to those who contributed to the programme. Next year's 'George Williams Commemoration Dinner' will be at Bournemouth on May 6th.

TWO DEBATABLE POINTS

Dear Sir,-The question of 4ths and 6ths place Bobs seems to be exercising the minds of some of our leading ringers. One fails to understand why, when as one correspondent states—6ths place is all right—no objection—4ths place is the recognised one. Both are right, but to-gether they are wrong! That's the first time I ever knew two rights. ever knew two rights to be wrong.

If the Council decide to debar such peals, then they must also debar Spliced London, Cambridge, Superlative and Bristol, where if in the latter method 4ths place Bobs are used, for in such peals you have Bobs altering the work of three bells, also others altering the work of five bells. If it is all right for one type of peal, then it must be right for the other.

So much for that—now another matter. 'Libra' in last week's issue suggests that our '5 hell friends' should amend method names. Why?

In the Council's own publication of Minor methods, which they named themselves, scores of the methods are identical. Places may be made in lieu of a dodge or vice versa to make a different method and given a different name. Also whole leads of many methods are identical and at the lead head or end a different place is made and it becomes a new method with a new name.

In Major, particularly the 'Surprise' class, we have identical methods with, in one say, 7th place made, in another 2nd, in another maybe both, yet they are given different names. Similarly lots of these 'Surprises' are one method above the treble and another below, but we do not say it is 'Spliced So-and-so'; it becomes

another method and given a different name.

Therefore, our five bell friends should have the same facility, remembering always that before ever there were sight or eight bells in 90 per cent. of towers there were five bells. It is definitely harder physically to ring a peal on five bells even if not mentally. They are limited in numbers, why limit them in methods? Each variation should be given a different name as in the case of higher numbers.
