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CRITICISM

ONE of the gratifying features about our readers is that their critical faculties are in no sense impaired by their enthusiasm for ringing. Healthy criticism is the life-blood of a journal, and a wise editor lends a sensitive ear to such observations.

Mr. Frank E. Haynes, at the annual dinner of the Ancient Society of College Youths, made three interesting points in his criticism of this journal, and it should be clearly understood that 'The Ringing World' is the collective property of every member of an affiliated Guild or Association of the Central Council. Mr. Haynes, however, like every other reader, has to share his proprietorial rights. The balance is held by the Editor, who is subject to the guidance of the Editorial Committee, elected by the Central Council and responsible to them.

The first point was that all Editorials should be written by the Editor. In the past the Editors of 'The Ringing World' have regarded this duty as their exclusive right, and with their wide knowledge of the subject have been in a position to give a lead to the Exercise. While on general grounds the present Editor does not doubt his competence, upon technical matters he recognises that he has many peers in ringing. This was made clear to the Editorial Committee on his appointment, and it was understood that this help would be forthcoming. Advantage has been taken from time to time of appropriate contributions. Another factor has been the pressure on space; this will from next year be remedied with a 'Ringing World' of 16 pages each week. So acute has been pressure in the past that news articles and comments have had to be disguised as editorials, a deception which we know has not escaped readers.

Mr. Haynes' second point was that there should be no anonymous contributors or letter writers. Anonymity has always been a features of the British Press. It does not disturb the Editor, for example, because he does not happen to know who is 'Spectator' of 'The Sunday Times' and scores of other well-known writers. Why should ringers be disturbed over the identity of Corn. R. Stone, or some of our other contributors whose names are well known to the Exercise at large? On the subject of letters to the Editor, we naturally prefer that the writer should sign his own name, and we trust that identities will generally be disclosed. The page of 'Letters to the Editor' invariably ranks high in general interest, and we trust that our correspondents will take a pride in its maintenance, but at the same time avoid the seeds of acrimony. We cannot promise to publish every letter submitted or the whole of its contents.

Lastly, Mr. Haynes was rather unhappy about the tendency 'to pander to youth.' We feel that it is the duty of 'The Ringing World' to give full encouragement to youth. While a true balance in all things has to be maintained, and older generations at times feel that youth's enthusiasm is apt to run to seed, we are conscious that each succeeding generation has a contribution to make. Youth must always remember that prodigies were not confined to one generation. Some of our elder statesmen did great things in their youth and met with the approbation of the Ringing Press of their day. Despite our faults we are pleased to state that 'The Ringing World' is progressing steadily in the matter of circulation and is now more than 50 per cent. ahead of the figure at the time the present Editor was appointed.

NEED OF RESERVES.

As they knew, they had no real resident population in the City of London and had few opportunities for training beginners. What they needed was ringers with a bit of training and a knowledge of heavy bells. About 80 years ago the Society undertook to ring for services on the heavy ring at St. Paul's Cathedral. This band was very much of a company of experts and needed a great force of reserves.

dral. This band was very much of a company of experts and needed a great force of reserves. Suppose 100 young men came into the City of London to learn to ring. At the end of the teaching period they probably would have 15 left, and of that number only two or three would be fit to ring at St. Paul's. Peal ringing was needed for a Society such as theirs. Peals were necessary because they provided an invaluable training ground for young ringers, but beyond that peals kept up the reputation of the Society, and it was only by keeping up that reputation that they could retain their members. He gave a special welcome to Roland, Ernest and Caleb Fenn, who had each completed 50 years of service to the Church and to the Society.

PUPIL OF LINDOFF.

The Rev. T. Smiley, priest in charge of St. Clement Danes', responded and said he was elected a member of St. Patrick's Society, Dublin, on June 10th, 1898, at the age of 18. He was taught by Gabriel Lindoff. When he was Vicar of Christ Church, Blackfriars, he had a band of 16 wingers, all keen men who Sunday by Sunday rang those bells for half an hour before the services. Then one night during the war they lost church, bells and all He had learnt a lot about bellringers and one thing was 'to mind my own business.' In ringing each had his place and was dependent on each other: team work was essential. Sometimes they rang for the wedding of a King's daughter; sometimes for a peasant's daughter, but it was the same bells and the same joy.

The toast of 'The Ancient Society' was honoured on the call of Mr. J. C. Mitchell, who had been a member of the Society for 64 years and was the oldest 'C.Y.' present. He deputised for Canon G. F. Coleridge and he asked that the greetings of the company should be sent to him.

The previous evening he was reading 'The Church Times' and saw in the Answers to Correspondents 'write for information to the Society of College Youths, c/o St. Paul's Cathedral.' Recently the Society had been 'on the air' and in television in connection with the Whittington celebrations at the church where the Society first started ringing in 1637.

Mr. Mitchell mentioned that he was a past master of the Worshipful Company of Coachbuilders, which was founded in 1667. The previous speaker had mentioned the fraternity of ringing that embraced peers and labourers. He knew something of Freemasonry, but he thought that the College Youths and other societies were very much more of a fraternity than the fraternity of Freemasons.

He started ringing in 1884 with the Cathedral

He started ringing in 1884 with the Cathedral band of St. Albans, was made a member of the Society in 1885 and called his first peal in

the Society in 1885 and called his first peal in 1886. A peal of which he was very proud was the ringing 'in hand' of Grandsire Triples (Holt's Original) in 1887. The umpires for that peal were the respective Masters of the Ancient Society and the Cumberlands.

The thing that amazed him about ringing to-day was the ease with which peals were rung. In the days he was talking about Surprise was a terrible thing. He recalled taking part in three touches of Superlative and a touch of London, but he never rang a peal of Surprise. To-day any tyro would ring a Surprise peal and it surprised him how it was done.

of that time. The auditor of the Excise was Sir Basil Dixwood. Mr. John Cooke was not in the Excise. After a great deal of research we found that John Cooke was secretary to the Secretary of State, and it was possible that Stedman served in that department under

him. I have not given up the question.'

'The Press' was proposed by Mr. F. E. Haynes, who in a reference to 'The Ringing World' deplored the presence of anonymous letters and articles in the journal. He also felt that the leading article should be penned by the Editor. Mr. Haynes also appealed to the Editor not to give too much stress to youth

Mr. T. W. White replied to the points raised. e said the circulation of 'The Ringing orld' had increased by 50 per cent. under his editorship and they had had more than 200 new subscribers since the York Council meeting. He took no credit for it, it was in his opinion a reflection on the greater interest in ringing. Many of the new readers knew little of the great tradition of the past and it was the duty of their Society and 'The Ringing World' to educate them.

The concluding toast was to the fragrant memory of the Masters of 100, 200 and 300 years ago. Mr. E. H. Lewis, who deputised for Mr. E. Alex. Young, said they had had a letter from Mr. Turner, who had searched Mr. Trollope's papers for information. The Master Trollope's papers for information. The Master in 1649 was Edmund Day, and unfortunately they knew practically nothing about him. The Master in 1749 was William Oram. He was elected a member in 1734 and seemed to be a friend of John Cundell, who was Master in 1753, for he subscribed for four copies of the broadsheet which Cundell brought out of Holt's commositions. John Merrin, who was Master in 1849, took part in 19 peals for the Society from 1825 to 1836.

Dear Sir,-In your issue of November 4th, an anonymous correspondent writes concerning the attempt for 17,152 Bristol at Gilmorton, 'Is it not high time we had an explanation in our columns as to why the record attempt was not made on that day?'

As Rector of Gilmorton and the person responsible for the cancellation, may I place the facts before you?

I was not aware, until after the notice appeared in your paper, that this peal was to be anything other than the usual three-hour peal. Our head ringer mentioned it to me in the ordinary way in the first place. He was not aware of the exceptional length of the peal. Apparently full details were to be sent to him, but he did not receive them.

In these circumstances I felt compelled to cancel the peal, and I sent at once a full explanation to Mr. Whitehead saying it was essential to know beforehand full details of such a, peal, and if that condition were ful-I hoped they would be able to make the attempt later. Permission had also been given for another peal that week, and in fairness to all concerned that was also cancelled. I would strongly urge that for any neal likely to exceed the usual three hours' ringing that in addition to any approach which may be made to the head ringer, the organiser should make personal contact with the incumbent. This would prevent any misunderstandings.

BELL FOUNDERS NOT TO BLAME

Dear Sir,-The clapper pin had a castle nut and split pin. The accident arose through dis-regard of the bellhangers' instructions, so that the fixing of responsibility for the mishap is purely the domestic affair of Leeds Parish

The bellhangers are accordingly exonerated from all liability and Mr. Overy's implications are, therefore, entirely without foundation.

A falling or breaking clapper is not a rare occurrence. It can and does happen to all bellhangers, but in this particular instance there is an element of real bad luck attached to the incident. The size of Leeds bells necessitated a tight job so far as space is concerned and the bells are cluttered up with every kind and the bells are cluttered up with every kind of encumbrance—clock hammers, carillon hammers and Ellacombe hammers, 45 hammers in all. It has now been established beyond all reasonable doubt that the heavy counterbalanced clapper became wedged against the Ellacombe hammer directly in the path of the bell, which struck the clapper with full force on the downward swing from backstroke, and was stopped dead.

The generally accepted theory is that the force of a swinging bell is ten times its dead weight, and if this is correct the bell was subjected to a shock of over 20 tons, which no headstock could be expected to withstand.

The many admirers of this grand bell will be glad to learn that she has since been raised and has been found to be unscathed.—Yours, etc., R. H. DOVE.

BELL ROPE MAINTENANCE

Dear Sir,—I fully agree with your leading article of November 4th.

When in the West Country in 1945 I suggested that we subscribe 1s. per head to the Bell Maintenance Fund of the church where a peal was rung or attempted. This was agreed to and we received letters of grateful thanks from the incumbents.

In Lincolnshire and Nottinghamshire I have also put forward this proposition, and it has now been made a rule at some of the churches

At Hevdour, a scattered country parish, it is difficult to maintain a band for service ringing, and the ropes have been worn far more by peals and attempts than by ringing for the church services.

The associations should, I think, sponsor this matter of upleep. In my opinion, no ringer should object to a fee of 1s. for the privilege of the use of bells for a real or attempt. After all, the church authorities place at our disposal, gratis, valuable instruments of music which, with their fittings, require care and maintenance, towards which peal ringers should contribute.—Yours faithfully,

Debunking the Disgruntled

Dear Sir,—I fully endorse the opinion expressed in the concluding paragraph of your leader of October 28th. Had there never been peal ringers there would now be no Central Council, no Guilds or Associations, no 'Ringing World,' books of instruction, collections of methods and compositions, but few ringers and fewer hells.

fewer bells.

Our 54 guilds and associations are computed to have 40,000 members. There are probably 6,000 towers within the Exercise. Perhaps 5,000 living ringers have rung peals. Probably 800 are to-day regular peal ringers. Therefore, 35,000 either do not wish or have not the ability to ring peals. But to say the 35,000 teach all the ringers and that they only attend services is grossly untrue. If proportionate figures were possible I have no doubt the result would be startlingly in favour of the neal would be startlingly in favour of the peal tingers. The fact is 50 per cent. of the 35,000 do not attend services, ring only from per-sonal motives to preserve their halo of religion amongst their immediate neighbours, think anything will do for Sunday so long as they only do the job. The majority lack zeal in the art.

Bigotry is the bane of the Christian Church.
Too many have taken unto themselves the right to stand as sentinels at the House of God to exclude those of whom they do not approve. By what right does 'Traveller' exclude an obviously desirable and probably Christian man from admission to the Exercise?

The 6,000 rings of bells have at some time or other cost probably £3,000,000. Only a small part of this came from regular churchgoers. All sorts of people, with no interest in the church whatever, subscribe to bells because they like them. Even staunch Nonconformists

they like them. Even staunch Nonconformists have been known voluntarily to defray the whole cost of a renovation. The church takes their money with alacrity, yet if they do not go to church 'Traveller' would deny them permission to learn to ring.

Bells, although installed in churches and primarily for church use, have also secular uses; they belong actually to the whole community. Those who pay have a right to enjoy. I have myself, with full permission of my Rector, taught boys to ring, who rang regularly for church services and then went along to their chapel. to their chapel.

Few ringers attain peal standard in their own towers. Often progress is deliberately debarred by one or more of their own company.

Naturally, the zealous go where they can progress. Towers do not rely on an influx of ready-made ringers, they help the enthusiast. Would 'Traveller' have them turned away? It seems to me that the successful ringer. like the successful detective, finds the most obstruction within his own ranks. A peal is not an incentive; it is an achievement, which only the incompetent devide. Achievement only the incompetent deride. Achievement surely is to be desired. 'Crack band' is the favourite sneer of the disgruntled or incapable

favourite sneer of the disgruntled or incapable. There is no such thing, although some folk think we are all 'cracked.'

He says, 'I have yet to hear of a church whose congregation suffers because the bells are not rung.' Neither would they if there was no organ, no choir, no parson, or even no building, were they true Christians. Most foll-prefer good music, good singing, an earnest parson, a beautiful building, good bells and good ringing, otherwise why spend money on the church?

I have no doubt 'Traveller' is himself a 'pretty good chap.' If I knew he walked two miles each way, twice each Sunday, hail, rain, snow or blow, to ring rounds on six: or travelled long distances regularly to assist learners at practice, as I. a neal ringer, regularly do, I should say he was indeed a 'pretty good chap.'
