#### SOLVENCY IS POSSIBLE!

('With ordinary talent and extraordinary perseverance all things are attainable.'-T. F. BUXTON)

UCH has been said and written about making 'The Ringing World' pay its way, but still it doesn't. Why? The basic point is that for running a paper on any particular activity there must be enough people interested in that activity and buying the paper, so as to create sufficient subscription-revenue and promote adequate 'circulation' appeal to potential advertisers in its columns.

Is the Exercise large enough to support a ringing paper? The answer being in the affirmative, why then is the problem one that has arisen with every ringing paper yet produced?

There is clearly something wrong, that is primary and fundamental. So let's face it! The fact is that the paper has not a sufficiently wide appeal. There are both towers and individual ringers who will say that is why they've stopped taking it, or wouldn't begin!

Now this is not a criticism of higher administration. The paper is not the property of some vague, remote 'they,' who can be conveniently blamed for any shortcomings. Indeed, as can be judged, all veniently blamed for any shortcomings. Indeed, as can be judged, all those concerned directly with its issue give 100 per cent. to the job, and more! And no doubt this has always been so. No! The paper is the property of the Exercise—the company of which you and I, through our Central Council, are its directors, so to speak; and this being so, if the paper now fails we have only ourselves to blame. How, then, can you and I aim to promote a wider appeal by this paper throughout the Exercise? And in so aiming what possible steps may be

Consider the facts:-

(1) Donations and voluntary peal-publication fees, generous though they are, remain but palliatives for the malady. To rely on them indefinitely would be thoroughly bad business.

(2) Wishful thinking, such as, 'If only each tower became a postal subscriber,' and the like, will get us nowhere. ACTION is needed

(3) It all boils down to this: We've got to widen the margin between, on the one hand, costs of production and distribution and, on the other, the revenue from subscribers and advertisers; and such widening depends primarily upon the APPEAL of the paper itself. Secondary factors, of course, must also be considered. (See below.)

As to the extent and nature of the appeal itself of the paper to As to the extent and nature of the appeal itself of the paper to potential subscribers, this will have been the earnest and careful consideration of the Editorial Committee and through them, of the Editor himself; and there is little doubt that their ideas and plans are many and various. But they can no more make bricks without straw than could the Israelites. They have not, for example, that same 'straw' as has a national daily newspaper. That has an organisation, costly and widespread, continually bringing in the MATERIAL, the very stuff of which the paper is made—its 'copy,' and its advertisements. Where is the parallel in our paper? The truth is, we have none.

Or should I say, 'have had none'? For the seed of a similar potential organisation, in miniature, has just been sown. The circular letter recently sent out to Guilds and Associations of the Central Council, by its secretary, Mr. E. A. Barnett, on this question, makes proposals the full implications of which are probably not generally

realised. Therein is the first-class suggestion of appointing 'representatives' of the journal in every District or Division of each Association. And some are already appointed and getting down to the job.

This honorary job can be one of the most important in the interests of the Exercise; the amount of good done being dependent on the ability, energy and enterprise of the individual taking it on. The work includes can vassing for subscribers, for copy and, indeed, where opportunity occurs, for advertisements. The material flowing into the editorial office through such channels should, in due time, be adequate for discharge of such above-noted plans for improving the paper; which, in turn, will assist the representatives in their drive for increased

What 'copy' can such a representative secure or stimulate? Well, what does a Press representative get? Reports; interviews; articles by local people of authority on matters of local interest in towers and ringing; accounts by those who have become experts in their own feelds—composing method-building conducting instructing tower and fields—composing, method-building, conducting, instructing, tower and belfry maintenance, tours and meetings organising, handbell ringing, beltry maintenance, tours and meetings organising, nandbell ringing, propaganda work, funds raising, public relations, recruiting and several other aspects of ringing activity and associated work. Material for some features comparatively new to our columns might be sent in—e.g., 'Answers to Correspondents,' 'Monthly Quiz,' Ringing Crosswords (competition or otherwise), 'Problems in Composition,' Biographies and, essentially, a 'Beginners' Corner.' BUT, all this material needs to be gathered or introduced. It certainly won't walk into the Editorial Office unaided!

Armed with a publication of much wider appeal and interest, the representative should be able to increase the circulation in his district in no small measure; indeed, in some cases he might well become a postal distributing centre, i.e., receiving the copies in bulk, and so cut out the losses through newsagents' commission.

Here are some key factors for consideration and action:-

- (a) Increasing circulation by direct contact with towers and individuals where the paper is unknown or unrecognised.
- (b) Proof of the advantages of being a postal subscriber, to both reader and paper.
- (c) Enlarging advertisement clientele—(Yes, apart from the bell founders eniarging advertisement clientele—(Yes, apart from the bell founders and rope-makers!), e.g., stationery, pens, pencils, etc., essential for students of paper-work, for secretaries, beginners, composers and others. Proprietary brands of anti-blister cream. Vendors of oils and greases. Car and coach hirers for outings. Further exploitation of the small-ad. columns. e.g., holiday accommodation, caterers and the like. The rates for small ads. might be slightly increased—they are below average. they are below average.
- (d) Issue of an 'official peals supplement' with the paper, instead of publishing all peals performances in the front pages, and entering in the supplement all peals to be officially recognised, under a serial registration number and for a small peal-publication fee.
- (e) Possible elimination of all newsagents' distribution of the paper.
- (f) Quarterly sales drives.
- (g) Last resorts: Increased price per copy. Reduction of issues to fort-nightly or monthly with slight 'bulk' price reduction.

But when all is said and done, the essential and primary thing rests upon us, namely, the promotion and maintenance of a flow of interesting and informative material to the Editorial Office, and then, with the more generally interesting paper, to double and treble its circulation. Every one of us can do something towards these ends, even if only by discussing some of the foregoing proposals to crystallise views for our Council representatives!

## AFTER 40 YEARS THE CENTRAL COUNCIL VISIT NEWCASTLE

MAMMOTH RINGING PROGRAMME COUPLED WITH WARM FRIENDSHIP AWAITS VISITORS

IT was the eighth Council that visited New-castle-upon-Tyne in June, 1913, for the 23rd annual meeting. Now the time draws very near for the visit of a new Council, the 22ndfor Newcastle-upon-Tyne in 1954 takes a year that used to be the London year—and prepara-tions for the 57th annual meeting approach completion. To use a well-worn expression, 'much water has flowed under the bridges' since Over the Tyne an additional bridge has been built in the interval, but it is believed that the main concern has been the traffic that would flow over it rather than the water that would flow underneath it!

The interval of 40 years has seen very many changes with the upheavals wrought by two world wars, and most of those who formed the eighth Council must by now have passed on. Many would doubtless fall in the Great War of 1914-18, which exacted a heavy toll of ringers in general and the Durham and Newcastle Diogram. cesan Association in particular, as can be gauged from the 41 names inscribed on the Association War Memorial in Newcastle Cathedral. Happily, when, in 1952, the additional tablet was erected for 1939-45 there were only ten names to be inscribed.

The writer was not born in those far-oft days and so he is unable to indulge in any comparisons of 1913 with 1954. There will be others who can, but their age will probably cause them to become nostalgic, shake their heads and bemoan the fact that 'things are not what they were.' What impressions were left Newcastle on the eighth Council are history, and our concern has been to try to make the visit of the 22nd Council a favourable and pleasant one, and some last-minute notes for the guidance of visitors may serve to assist in attaining that objective.

The ringing and sight-seeing trips have now been definitely fixed and all those who made inquiries or applications will have received an individual communication with the programme and booking slip. There may yet be some who, at the last moment, find that they could participate and it may be possible to accommodate them after arrival in Newcastle. Motorists who wish to accompany the bus will be welcome, but meals for them can be booked only with advance payment.

HADRIAN'S WALL

On Whit Sunday, leaving Newcastle after lunch, the route lies westward, following the military road and providing glimpses of Hadrian's Wall, built to keep out the invading Picts and Scots. The hopes of ringing at Hexham Abbey have not been fulfilled as service and baptisms clash with the time that had been selected. Rather than miss the scenic beauty on this route, afternoon ringing has been sacrificed and the route extended slightly to provide more interest including a closer inspection of part of the Wall, if time and weather permit. Rothbury provides a convenient place for tea be-fore ringing for Evensong at the Parish Church. The County Hotel, where high tea has been arranged, provides an excellent view. At Morpeth the bells hang in the Watch Tower and give rise to the couplet:-

'Hast' not seen the Morpeth wonder Church and Steeple a mile asunder?

The bells were recast and rehung by the citizens in commemoration of the Festival of Britain. The A1 road leads back to Newcastle, with the vast Town Moor between Gosforth and Newcastle, rather quieter at the beginning of June than it will be at the end.

Tyne to reach Hexham. Hexham is a very pleasant market town and its Abbey contains much of interest. The first ringing of the day takes place there. An attractive moorland run lies ahead before Stanhope is reached for lunch at the Phœnix Hotel. The scenery changes and it is in a softer countryside that Barnard Castle and Staindrop provide further ringing.

#### **DURHAM CATHEDRAL**

It is not long then before the industrial area is entered again but a visit to the northeast would not be complete without a visit to Durham Cathedral. Many will doubtless have seen the Cathedral dominating the Durham scene as they passed northwards by road or rail on the journey up. One cannot do justice to it in a few sentences and so it is left with just the assurance that it will not disappoint the visitor—unless perhaps he judges it solely by its bells! From the Cathedral of the present one passes to the Cathedral of the past, for Chester-le-Street held that proud position before Durham for over 100 years from 883, while burnam for over 100 years from 883, while the body of St. Cuthbert rested there. In contrast to Durham, Chester-le-Street will not disappoint, even if judged solely on its bells! The second ring only to be hung on ball bearings, the back six remain untouched by the bellfounder since 1911. As on Sunday, the ourney to Newcastle ends on A1, but this time from the south.

The ringing programme as published does not take in all the bells in the area by any means. To publish details of all the towers that have so generously been placed at our disposal would give a much longer list, but the result might well be chaos. When four or five towers are open simultaneously it can quite easily happen that 30 or 40 ringers can be dispersed over the area with no complete band at a single church. Towers outside the programme lie at greater distances from Newcastle. and those interested in special towers should contact Mr. K. Arthur, 29, Cherryburn Gardens, Newcastle 4, but in seeking to make arrangements they should themselves ensure sufficient for a band.

Information on how to get to the various towers will be available at headquarters, where a room has been set aside for the Council's use, but a few explanatory notes may be helpful

Ringing on Saturday may be had continually from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. except for the lunch break of two hours. For those newly arrived in the city, the Cathedral, St. Stephen's, St. John's and Gateshead are within a few minutes of the Central Station. For those already booked in a convenient tour can be made to take in Gosforth, Fenham and Benwell before returning to the city centre, where the final ringing is convenient for headquarters.

#### SUNDAY'S PROGRAMME

The service ringing on Sunday that is listed is practically all at churches where the local band will be able to accommodate even the odd visitor with change ringing. Sunday afternoon provides one of only two opportunities to ring at Durham Cathedral. Visitors should note that access to the tower is gained from the south transept and they should be there at 2.20 p.m. or 2.45 p.m. Chester-le-Street can be taken in on the return journey. Those interested in the seaside may care to visit South Shields from 9 to 9.30 a.m. and then cross the ferry to call at North Shields or Whitley Bay.

Monday presents some problems as many local ringers will be on annual outings and therefore out of the district. The ringing has consequently been planned only on a limited scale will be able to accommodate even the odd

sequently been planned only on a limited scale and for the most part takes place at those towers handy for the Central Station and new arrivals. Tuesday's ringing, following the civic reception, takes place at the central churches

At the time of writing it seems likely that peals will be attempted at Stockton, Sunderland and North Shields.

Well, there it is. The programme has been drawn up and we now await the guests. We hope that your visit will be a pleasant one and you will receive a welcome not only from fellow ringers but from the Church and the Civic Authority as well, for the Bishop of Newcastle and the Lord Mayor have promised to attend. Welcome then to Newcastle-upon-Tyne at Whitsun, 1954.

Dunkerley as ringing secretary when the positions become due for election next October. The committee were pleased to inform the members, however, that Mr. Peter Crook sen. and Mr. Stephen Ll. Parry were willing to allow their names to go forward as nominees for the respective posts. services of Mr. Peter Crook sen, were recorded. Mr. Crook has recently retired from the post of secretary of the Bolton Branch, a position he has held for 25 years.

The meeting stood in silence as a mark of

respect to the six members who had passed

away during the year.

During the year 83 new members joined the Association, making a total membership of 1,596 made up of 65 honorary life members, 507 non-resident members and 1,024 ringing members.

PEAL TOPICS

The attention of members was drawn to the fact that a few peals had been rung in which one or more of the ringers were in arrears with their subscriptions. The committee appealed to these members to amend their ways in fairness to the other members of the bands.

The ringing secretary reported that 136 peals The ringing secretary reported that 136 peals had been rung during the year, including the following 'first peals in the method':—Verulam, Langley, Watford and Ealing Surprise Major and Langley Surprise Royal, all conducted by Mr. J. Ridyard, also Southgate Surprise Major conducted by Mr. E. Jenkins. Many members rang their first peal, and two members their 'first as conductor.' Mr. A. Tomlinson again heads the list of conductors with 15 peals, whilst Mr. J. Ridyard conducted 14 peals.

Mr. Sandiford, the treasurer, read the balance

Mr. Sandiford, the treasurer, read the balance sheet, which showed the Association to be in a very healthy state financially. He hoped it would be kept so and stated that in his opinion the balance should be maintained.

A proposed alteration to Rule 7c by the Liverpool Branch. altering the system of ballot for the election of officers was rejected after discussion. An additional Rule proposed by the committee, that the president and general the committee, that the president and general secretary shall appoint a scrutineer after nominations have been received, was accepted unanimously.

Under any other business it was decided to have membership forms printed to be issued by the Branch secretaries. It was also decided that the general secretary should issue to each new member, free of charge, a membership scroll. These membership scrolls to be obtainable for existing members on application to the general secretary at a cost of one shilling, this procedure to continue until the stock of approximately 900 is exhausted.

It was arranged to hold the next annual meeting at Bolton.

The secretary reminded members that the half-yearly meeting would be held at South-port on October 9th.

The meeting closed with a vote of thanks. moved by the president (the Rev. R. D. St. John Smith) and seconded by Mr. E. R. Martin, to the Rector (the Rev. F. L. M. Bennett), the organist, Wigan Branch secretary (Mr. Farrimond) and the tower captains and local ringers.

It the member of the Council who has dug this rule up was a member in 1951-2, which he must have been, as this year is a new Council, he is as guilty of breaking the rule as those of us who have rung them, because he has allowed peals to be accepted which he knew were a breach of the rules.

If Plain Bob on odd numbers is to be barred I suggest it should start from 1955, to be fair to the youngsters.

May I add that we do not ring Bob Triples for the sake of ringing it, but as a stepping stone from Minor to Major. Those who have to teach learners and not get ringers readymade, will appreciate this point.—Yours sincerely,

#### THE ADVANCED BEGINNER

Dear Sir,—There must be a large number of ringers who, after reading Mr. Hazell's letter in 'The Ringing World,' are, like myself, feeling suitably humble this week-end. I had imagined that anyone capable of ringing Stedman and Grandsire Triples, Bob Major, etc. (the etc. presumably including Caters, Cinques, Double Norwich and Treble Bob), had left behind the chrysalis stage of the art.

I feel sure, however, that for many of us the greatest shock of this pronouncement will be the necessity of revising our estimates of many of the giants of the Exercise, to whom in the past we had looked up, and whose feats we attempted, with, however, little success, to emulate. Many of them had never struck a blow in Surprise methods, but were masters of the advanced beginners' syllabus enumerated above.

At the same time it would be interesting if an analysis could be made of the number of Surprise peals attempted in relation to those achieved, as against peals of Stedman Triples attempted and those brought round. I imagine the Surprise methods would have an overwhelming preponderance, which would express more than I can hope to condense into a short letter.—Yours faithfully,

#### CLERICAL RINGERS OF TO-DAY

Dear Sir,—In 1952, under the heading of 'Forty Years Ago,' you reported the peal of Superlative rung by a band of clerical ringers in 1912, and suggested that the ringing clergy of to-day would find it difficult to repeat that performance. This passed unchallenged in spite of the fact that in 1949 the Guild of Clerical Ringers had rung a peal of Cambridge.

Now, in a footnote to a report of the activities of the ringing clergy in 1913, you write: 'The clerical members of the Exercise at the present day would—unfortunately—have difficulty in equalling these performances.' This time I do not propose to permit your implication of the degeneration of clerical ringers to pass unchallenged, and would point out that the rare appearances of the clergy in peals is due to neither lack of ability nor lack of interest, but to lack of time, which is due to the increasing complexity of parochial life and to the grave shortage of clergy throughout the country.

I would suggest that in such men at the Revs. C. E. Wigg, K. W. H. Felstead and M. C. C. Melville we have ringers who, given the opportunity, would be fully capable of equalling or excelling the performances of any of those mentioned in your 1913 list.

#### THE ROYAL HOMECOMING

AT SOUTHWARK CATHEDRAL

On April 21st at the conclusion of the weekly practice Southwark Cathedral's 12 were rung to Queens and 'fired' as a birthday greeting to our Queen. This was a curtain raiser to May 15th, when 18 of the regular Cathedral ringers assembled to greet the Queen's homecoming. Some 15 visitors had taken their stand on top of the tower when the Tower Bridge opened, and shortly after the bells were up in Queens, and as the Royal yacht tied up were 'fired' in three bursts, followed by further Queens till 1.45.

A break for refreshments (and some rearrangements so that all had a chance in the day's ringing) and the 12 were going again in Queens and as the Royal yacht shot London Bridge the Queen was saluted by three prolonged bursts of 'firing.' With only a moment's hesitation, the ringer, who happened to be the conductor and steeple-keeper, called the bells to ring rounds. He nipped smartly up to the next floor, spliced the rope in under three minutes, adjusted the rope, dropped it back through the floor and went down and carried on with the ringing. While this was happening one of the youngsters had taken charge and called the bells to ring a few call changes so that the missing bell passed unnoticed, especially as the ringing had been with 9, 8, 10 covering.

#### PORTSMOUTH'S WELCOME

During the passage of the 'Britannia' through the Solent and Spithead a quarter peal of Stedman was rung at Portsmouth Cathedral. As the tower is close to the sea and the wind was off-shore, it is quite possible that they were heard by those on deck. The next day a peal of Yorkshire Surprise Major was rung on these bells and later in the day a peal of London Surprise Major at St. Mary's, Portsea.
