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FOOTNOTES TO PEALS

HAT a vast change there is in the writing of footnotes for peals, a change which was certainly long overdue, not only because of their length but also on account of wording. Some ringers used to delight in writing lengthy footnotes, others preferred to abstain and leave readers to be the best judge of peals that were published, but to-day the general trend is brevity, due in some measure to our Editor exercising his discretion for our mutual benefit. One is especially pleased to see such footnotes as: 'Rung to commemorate 50 years' service by the captain of the local band,' and 'Rung by the Sunday service band,' both having appeared recently, but those of over 60 years ago should give some readers an insight into the days when peals were not so plentiful and there was no Central Council.

Bob Triples, that much discussed method of recent months, was popular with some bands even when they met one short, and the footnote tells us that 'the band meeting one short the second was left out and the tenor rung in.' The same footnote goes on to say that 'these bells have lately been rehung by Messrs. —, but the going of them is far from satisfactory.' In the next footnote speed seems to have been uppermost in the minds of those who rang. for we read: 'This is the second peal rung on these bells and was rung in twenty minutes less than the other. The tenor goes very badly and Mr. B. had to give up at the end of half an hour, and Mr. S. finished it.' Another way of dealing with a bad-going tenor is told thus: 'The ringer of the tenor after ringing two hours was obliged to set his bell owing to it going so badly; after a rest of half an hour, however, he again took her and rang to the end of the peal.' In the next instance we are left guessing as to the reason why a change over was made, for it simply states that 'E. K. rang the tenor the first hour of the peal, then J. H. rang tenor to the remainder of the peal.

A peal rung very early in the morning received the following footnote: 'This peal was finished just after seven o'clock in the morning.' Various comments were undoubtedly made on this peal even though it was rung on December 25th! Another unusual footnote is recorded underneath a peal of Stedman Triples, which says it was the 'first peal of Stedman rung by members of the Association without the aid of a professional conductor.' I

leave my readers to digest those last two words. Ringing a peal of Grandsire Triples by leaving out the treble is explained thus: 'Meeting one short, the treble was left out and the tenor rung in.'

Many footnotes used to commence with the words: 'It is worthy of notice,' and here is one which relates to a peal of over 10,000 changes: 'It is worthy of notice that the average age of the company was only 21 years, as well as being all single men. Also that one of the ringers was only 17 years old. And great credit is due to the tenor man for the able way in which he rang his bell, he being only 20 years old.' Another 'worthy of notice' footnote refers to a peal of Stedman Triples and states 'that Mr. F. had long desired to ring a peal in this method ere he departed this life. The ringers one and all congratulate themselves upon having the pleasure to accomplish it with him.'

My last extract relates to a peal of Grandsire Caters which must have delighted both ringers and listeners on account of continued good striking and success at the first attempt. It goes on to say that 'Mr. C. officiated as umpire, and he pronounced the peal to have been well rung, not a single "slip" of any moment occurring from beginning to finish, his opinion being endorsed by several ringing friends who heard the peal from the outside.'

A lot of space could be taken up on the subject of footnotes to peals, but the samples already given should suffice to show the difference in the set-up of Victorian days and those of to-day.

FORTY YEARS AGO

COLLEGE YOUTHS' NEW MASTER

If anyone were ever brought up among the bells, that description can be applied in truth to the new Master of the College Youths, for Mr. Albert A. Hughes, whose election we announced last week, first saw the light at the Whitechapel Foundry. Born in 1885, he first learned to handle a bell at a very early age, and used to practise on an old pre-Reformation bell which hangs on the roof of the foundry. At the age of 14 he began to accompany his father to St. Matthew's, Bethnal Green, where he received his first insight into ringing under the late Mr. Matthew Wood. . . .

[Mr. Hughes' first peal as conductor, in 1909, was the last by this famous old ringer, then in his 83rd year. Although his ringing has naturally been somewhat overshadowed by his work as head of Messrs. Mears and Stainbank, Mr. Hughes is a skilled practical ringer, and numbers among his accomplishments at least one peal on the tenor at St. Mary-le-Bow. Another feat of a different kind was during the 12,675 Stedman Cinques at Southwark in 1923, when Mr. Hughes four or five times went up among the bells and oiled all the bearings.]

SURPRISE MAJOR-A CHALLENGE

Dear Sir,—I read Mr. K. A. Roe's letter in 'The Ringing World' of November 19th with a good deal of interest, and I suppose I am one of those involved in the debasement of the term 'Major.' I would like to try and reply to some of his points.

Firstly, I would like to say that Messrs. Knights and Cashmore are not responsible for the methods Ufford and Olney, but only for the compositions. As originally submitted to you, sir, there was no ambiguity in this respect. I do not admit ownership of the figures of methods; once the basic principles have been grasped it is an elementary procedure for anyone to sit down and go on writing out Surprise Major methods more or less ad infinitum; no par-ticular skill is involved. Working out the false course ends is fairly simple, and in very many methods it is easy to say if a true peal can be produced.

I imagine Mr. Blagrove will not waste his time over the 'challenge'—here is a method which seems to meet it:—

Now we come to this 'debasement' business. I agree that the making of four places at a time is not in general a good thing; however, its use in a section is hallowed by the ancient example of Cambridge, which is 'fairly generally regarded as a very good method. Its use at a cross section seems to me rather more dea cross section seems to me rather more de-batable for reasons too involved to go into here. However, one thing I will say: the making of four places in Cambridge does not offend my rather insensitive ear, while the making of three adjacent places in New Cambridge can sound

Mr. Roe obviously believes in never having any but coursing pairs in 7-8. May I suggest he goes and rings a few peals in methods with the work of Superlative above the treble and with the 6th 12 full courses home; he will then realise that there is some good music which cannot be got if the bells behind are coursing pairs. Personally, I like a bit of variety in the music.

To condemn adjacent places out of hand is quite ridiculous. The late Armiger Trollope said that Cornwall is one of the most musical of methods; I most heartily agree. Methods with the New Gloucester work above the treble also produce some excellent music, and, with the careful attention to the composition used, are very much more worth ringing than some more popular methods.

Next we come to the old argument about the label 'Surprise.' Where are all these wonderful Treble Bob and Delight methods? Now and again I have tried scribbling out some. Treble Bob is useless. Delight has some possibilities but there just don't seem to be the interesting methods available; if there is just one cross methods available; if there is just one cross section with no internal places the number of possible sections on either side of this cross-section is very much reduced, and so the number of possible methods is reduced. The restriction of having coursing bells in 7-8 also very severely cuts down the number of these methods. If you want to avoid adjacent places as well, there are no Treble Bob methods available!

I think a great many speeds do the several decreases.

I think a great many people do care what they ring. Unfortunately I fear Mr. Roe looks at the figures, writes out the places, says 'What a horrible method!' and then forgets about it. I suggest he goes and rings a few of them and when I say 'ring,' I mean a peal—not just a rather poor plain course.—Yours sincerely,

SURPRISE MAJOR

Dear Sir,—I have noted with interest the recent correspondence in your columns concerning Surprise Major, and its classification into two categories, namely, 'good' and 'bad.' Mr. Roe's latest letter provokes me into making a reply.

My first point is this. It is ridiculous to make terminology the basis for any argument concerning relative merits. Let us assume that, at, a given change, four bells make places, and consequently only two pairs reverse. Then no amount of bandying the word 'Doubles' can alter the fact that the change-row so produced is a permutation on eight and must accordingly be classified 'Major.' Whether the musical qualities of the method suffer by the inclusion of such double changes is a different matter, and each individual case must be judged on its own merits.

Judged on its own merits.

There then arises the question of how we are to decide which method is and which is not worth ringing. Two bands could have very different views on the qualities of the same method. Whereas one band might vow never to ring 'that rubbish' again, the other band might decide to give it 'a good working over' in the future. Whose opinion do we accept? The answer is, of course, that we accept neither, but we try the method out ourselves and draw our own conclusions. Certainly no method should be condemned merely because it contains changes at which contiguous places are made—there are many of these methods which contain plenty of good music for those willing to listen for it.

I pass over Mr. Roe's challenge to Mr. Blagrove, except in so far as to connect a remark contained therein with an earlier remark con-cerning 'ownership.' Certainly anybody can write out a Surprise Major method, and that being so, where is the justification for calling any method 'all my own work'?

Lastly if we look up Mr. Roe's letter in 'The Ringing World' of July 16th, 1954, we find that he advocates the abolition of the term 'Surprise,' and proposes to divide Treble Bob methods into two classes, simple and difficult.
Consider the case of the two ringers A and B.
A finds that he has reached the limit of his power of concentration at Kent Treble Bob. ut it is well known that B could ring London Surprise standing on his head, if he could only manage his rope that way up. The futility of trying to make such a division should be immediately obvious.—Yours faithfully,
