

COMMENT ONE PLUS ONE = ? By PHILIP GRAY

PEAL totals are puzzling. The idea of adding peals of Royal to peals of Minor, good peals to bad peals, Spliced peals to single method peals, long lengths to 5,000's or peals on heavy bells to peals on light bells always makes me think of my first arithmetic lessons. "You can't add apples to oranges." said the teacher. She had something, that lady; apples and oranges don't add up, they simply sit side by side and look at each other Sometimes you eat an apple, other times you prefer an orange, but you don't make a notch on the fruit bowl for each fruit eaten. At least, I don't. Yet we ringers notch up our peals with complete disregard for the rules of arithmetic and the asterisks and league tables spell out peals per year, 100th peal, 1,000th peal and almost every other combination you can think of.

Do our fellow musicians, the orchestral conductors, record somewhere their 100th per-formance of a symphony? Or do the concert formance of a symphony? Or do the concert pianists add up the number of pieces they have played in a year? Perhaps they do, but at least their public is spared having to read about this in the programme notes or the about this in the programme notes of the newspaper reviews. A peal, too, is a performance, is it not? It is a culmination of many years' training, a test of skill and endurance and an expression of pleasure in sound. It has to be planned, achieved, and may be savoured afterwards. So too, for that matter, a quarter peal or touch is a performance. In over 20 years as a ringer I have never known two performances the same and I bet you have not, either. We rarely feel I bet you have not, either. We rarely feel that any performance was as good as we would have liked it to be; that is the reaction of the artist, not the statistician. Ringers are artists, but they do get into the habit of behaving

Recently a front page leader pleaded for shorter lengths than 5,000 on the grounds of the nuisance to the public. Surely if the ringing of a peal is annoying to those living around the church because the bells are too loud the remedy is to make the bells less noisy, not to cut down the time of ringing. Three not to cut down the time of ringing. Three hours is not all that long. As it is, our Church is on the air much fewer hours each week than Radio Caroline. Even Birmingham Cathedral must have over 160 hours of silence most

No, I don't see that we have to be apologetic about ringing for three hours if that is what the performance requires. But the stipulation that a peal must have at least 5,000 changes, if nothing else, does seem to me to be an unnecessary straight-jacket. Who could deny that it would be sacrilege to ring anything but the whole 5,040 changes of Parker's wonderful 12-part of Grandsire Triples, but why should convention condemn us to plough through 5,056 of Middleton's Cambridge when through 5,056 of Middleton's Cambridge when the thing can be painlessly shortened to 2,880? Imagine a composer of a symphony trying to work to a requirement that it should have a minimum number of bars regardless of merit.

Come on you composers, show a little more courage and be less hide-bound. Concentrate on the music you are writing, not its length. We are the music-makers. Begone dull statis-

OUR PICTURE

LLANDAFF CATHEDRAL

SINCE the Central Council met at Cardiff In 1962 there has been a great interest in Llandaff Cathedral and its ringers. Indeed, the Llandaff and Monmouth Association holds an Ltandati and Monmouth Association holds an honoured place in the Exercise and the contribution of South Wales to the art of change ringing is one greatly treasured. It is not inappropriate that we should go to the Principality for the second of our front page pictures.

Nevil James has written a helpful booklet on the bells of Llandaff Cathedral, and from this account we learn that in the 13th century this account we learn that in the 13th century there was a campanile which contained one of the largest bells of that time—six ton "Great Peter." In 1484 this huge bell was taken to Exeter Cathedral in exchange for five smaller bells. "Great Peter" seems to have been rechristened "Great Tom" of Exeter. Probably John Scott can confirm, but there appears to be no record of the five bells arriving at Llandaff arriving at Llandaff,

THREE BELLS

Three bells were cast for Llandaff Cathedral in 1628, and in 1660 the Cathedral authorities approved of the payment to James Jones of "40s. for his pains to keep the dogs out of the Cathedral at prayer time, and 20s, more for ringing the bells on Sundays and Holy Days so that the sexton the better might attend other necessary services." other necessary services.

There appears to have been a "great bell" in 1736, which was cracked while the sexton was tolling for evening prayers, and the bell was recast in 1739. According -to the Cole Manuscript, this bell weighed 2,000 pounds and in 1782 it was recast by Thomas Rudhall of Gloucester, and this tenor of 20 cwt 1 qr. still rings out today.

Since 1879 Llandaff has had a ring of eight, the additional seven bells being cast by Mears and Stainbank. These bells were dedicated as a memorial to Dean Thomas Wil-

VICTORY AUGMENTATION

Two more bells cast by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank were given by John Thomas Duncan of Llandaff in 1919 as a thank-offering for peace and victory. These two bells are hung above the older eight and are rather more difficult to ring on that account.

During the 1939-45 war it was forbidden to sound church bells, except as a warning of invasion, and the war damage to the Cathedral was of such a character that it was considered unwise to ring the bells. Thus it was that from 1945 to 1952 the bells were only chimed on Sundays. Sundays.

Early in 1952 the bells were removed to the Whitechapel Foundry for quarter turning and retuning. They were rehung on ball bearings as part of the 53rd (Welsh) Infantry Division War Memorial, which also includes St. Iltud's Chapel below the tower. This rehanging was completed on March 11th, 1953, but the problem of finding trained riggers was very real. completed on March 11th, 1953, but the prob-lem of finding trained ringers was very real. Chiming for services prevailed until Christmas Day, 1953, when the bells rang out for ser-vices for the first time since 1939. It was, however, possible to find a team from sur-rounding towers to ring on the Coronation Day of Queen Elizabeth II. Today this Cathedral and Parish Church of SS, Peter and Paul has a thriving band of young ringers, and our peal columns this week are testimony to the prowess of some of its members. prowess of some of its members. IT was a cold and frosty morning when six ringers and an umpire met in Marple belfry on December 24th shortly after 8.15 a.m. The start of the attempt was delayed until a little before 9 a.m. by a newspaper reporter and an accompanying photographer from the "Manchester Evening News," who said that it would make a good Christmas story.

According to the umpire's checking sheet we went into changes at 8.53 a.m. and each half of the peal took 3 hours and 3 minutes. half of the pear took 3 hours and 3 hinders. From halfway the umpire added on 264 changes at the end of each course and, I am pleased to say, arrived at the correct total of 10,032 changes of Plain Bob Maximus at the end of the peal.

It is interesting to note that the previous long peals of Maximus on handbells—quite a number of them—were all 5,280 changes. This means that four of the band broke the old record twice in one week, as they rang 5,376 Kent Treble Bob Maximus on handbells at Marple on the Thursday following.

The report of the attempt in the "Manchester Evening News" appeared under the heading "They re on the eve of a record" and was accompanied by two photographs (one of the umpire and one of the band with the umpire). In the "Stop Press" of the football paper the same evening the success of the peal was given above the football results!

Biographical details of the band are as

1-2.—Alan McFall (Marple), First long peal on handbells. Handbell total about 50, including nine of Maximus.

3-4.—Brian J. Woodruffe (Buxton). Now the only ringer who has rung over 10,000 changes of Minor, Major, Royal and Maximus on handbells.

5-6.—Robert B Smith (Marple). Fourth handbell peal of over 10,000 changes, but has yet to ring 10,000 plus of Minor on handbells.

RINGS OF FOUR BELLS IN HUNTINGDONSHIRE

BRINGTON.—The lightest ring of four bells in the county, with a tenor of 5½ cwt. The bells were cast by C. and G. Mears in 1845 and are one of the only two complete rings in Huntingdonshire by the Whitechapel Foundry. The wheels have rotted away and the bells are swing-chimed by girders attached to the headstocks The are sounded in this manner regularly and are well kept, with a new set of ropes recently provided.

BROUGHTON. — An exceptionally heavy four, in fact the heaviest ringable four in the county, the tenor being 17 cwt., note F. The second and tenor were cast in 1616 and 1661 respectively by Thomas Norris. The treble is by Haulsey (1624) and the third by Joseph Eayre (1748). The tenor is of thick metal, with a beautiful tone. There is a large difference of weight between the second and third (61-11 cwt.), which does not make ringing ference or weight between the second and third (6\frac{1}{2}-11 cwt.), which does not make ringing easier. The bells were rehung in 1902 in a metal frame, and the treble recast. They go extremely well if one considers their weight.

At present there is a regular card-change band of eight ringers. There has been one quarter peal on the bells, on February 5th,

BYTHORN.—The tenor here weighs 11 cwt, and was cast by Thomas Norris in 1674. Toby Norris cast the third in 1620. The treble was cast by Henry Bagley (1682) and the second by Henry Penn (1711). The bells are hung in two tiers and are completely unringable, with most of the fittings decayed or missing. There is no question of the bells ever being rung again, as the tower has walls only nine inches thick, and part of the spire has already collapsed.

catworth. — These are another very heavy four (tenor 17½ cwt.) The treble has a unique inscription: "Vox mea plene dulces laudes det magdalene." Robert Oldfield cast this bell. The third is by Watts, and the second by George Mears (1863). The tenor was cast by Robert Newcombe (1585). The second and third have the same note, whilst the tenor is a semitone flat of them! All four wheels are decayed, and the safety of the tower is questionable

tower is questionable

There is a record on the tower wall of a "peal" rung after the first world war, although there are no Association records, and it is doubtful whether this was even method ringing. Whatever it was, two men were needed to ring the tenor.

COLNE.—These bells have a tenor of 82 cwt. cast by Draper in 1607 along with the treble Miles Graye cast the third in 1700. The bells had been unsafe and blocked-up for many years when, in 1892, the back three were placed on the church floor. The whole building colleged in 1896 ing collapsed in 1896.

The new church was built in 1900, and the bells hung dead with an Ellacombe chiming apparatus..

EASTON.—Here the tower and bells are in a very unsafe condition, and it is thought to be dangerous even to chime. The second and tenor are by Newcombe. The tenor, which weighs 11½ cwt., must have a very poor tone, for the soundbow is honeycombed with air-bubbles. The treble is a Penn bell (1718) and the third was cast by Robert Taylor in 1821.

ELLINGTON.—The tenor weighs 8½ cwt., cast by Robert Taylor in 1788. The treble was cast in 1699 by R. Chandler, of Drayton Pars-The second and third are both by John ave. They are quite pleasant in tone,

and are hung in a very substantial oak frame.
Unfortunately the churchwardens are rather anxious about the state of the tower, which appears to be sagging and bulging, and ringing cannot be allowed, although the bells are in fairly good order.

It would be helpful if District secretaries put this question on their agendas to invite comments and forward them to you. I cannot remember the last time "The Ringing World" was discussed at a ringers' meeting. My own reaction to the "Mancroft" issue was one of complete satisfaction and I hope it will be found possible to delight us with more of these. more of these.

It was with some surprise that I read of the suggestion from the St Martin's Guild, Birmingham, that greater prominence should be given to 12-bell peals. I hope this will not provoke another round of correspondence supporting the importance of the five-, six- and eight-bell peals. We have had so much of this over the years that we all ought to judge the value of any peal on its merits and not on the number of bells involved.

I would be among the first to congratulate the ringers of a peal of Doubles, Minor or Triples where there were one or two "firsts" rather than a peal of Maximus with no footnotes. There must be pioneers in every field and we must recognise them all.

I was sorry to read of the passing of Ernest Bartram, of Melton Mowbray. His father and four brothers rang several peals together. They rang a peal of Doubles in two methods at Harby in 1924 on the ring of five. and Ernest rang with his father in the four fathers and four sons peal at Belgrave in May, 1927. and four sons peal at Belgrave in May, 1927.
They were Ernest and J. Morris, Charles and Richard Belton, Richard and John Grant, and Richard and Ernest Bartram, The only two survivors of this peal are Richard Belton and Richard Grant.

Finally, may I thank all Guild secretaries and others who sent copies of their Guild and Association service sheets to me early in 1966 as a guide for the Leicester Guild, which celebrates its 21st birthday this year. POINTS FROM PEALS

Dear Sir,—The first peal of Bedminster Surprise Royal was rung at Southgate on December 14th, 1963, and 1 am afraid that the method named Bedminster in the recent peal of Spliced will require renaming as the two methods bear no relation to each other. There would also appear to be a small error in the place notation for Lambourn on page 762: presumably there should be no full stop between 12 and 58.

The first peal of Wycombe Surprise Maximus was rung in 1962, and the method rung to the recent peal is the parent method, of which the Maximus method is the correct extension. Mr. Dear Sir.—The first peal of Bedminster Sur-

Maximus method is the correct extension. Mr. Williams is quite wrong in saying that there is already a method called Wycombe Surprise Major usually rung under its alternative name of Yiewsley. That method when first rung to a peal was renamed because it was not the parent method of the Maximus.

In the issue of March 25th, Mr. W. Barton queries a composition for Lincolnshire, which has never been cleared up. In the issue for December 30th, page 861, there is another peal of Lincolnshire, this time rung to a 27-course block reduced. There are only 24 true courses to Lincolnshire with the tenors together, and therefore I would suggest that further informatherefore I would suggest that further informa-

tion is required about the composition used, and also the one to which Mr. Barton refers. Finally I would like to point out the duplication of a peal rung at Crawley, and published on pages 613 and 676, and of a peal rung recently at Eltham, published on pages 830 and 10 (1967).—Yours sincerely,

These ringers probably had to be dragged through their first peal by an experienced band, yet they are not prepared to do the same for others.

There also appears to be a new "Association" called the grape-vine; its aim is not to promote better ringing or even more peals of Surprise Major, but to spread idle gossip or

rumours.

In my opinion all these things are doing a great deal of harm to the Exercise. If we are to increase membership of the Exercise and flourish surely we must foster comradeship and encourage learners.—Yours faithfully,

During 1966 14,000 people, including many from abroad, visited the unique Bell Museum, in Apolda, East Germany (G.D.R.), where the many famous chimes recorded on tape include Big Ben, the Kremlin bells of Moscow, the Gloriosa of Erfurt Cathedral in East Germany and the Sibelius tune from the Church of the Mount in Helsingfors Finland Mount in Helsingfors, Finland.

A Much-Alive Midland Tower

By GEOFFREY M. COX (Deputy Ringing Master, Knowle Tower)

DINGERS in the Midlands area will have DINGERS in the Midlands area will have probably been pleased to see on the B.B.C. television programme "Midlands Today" the handbell ringers of Knowle Church, who performed the carol "Mary's Boy Child" on the Christmas edition on December 23rd. This broadcast represented the climax of over a year's work in the field of tune ringing on handbells by the young band of Knowle ringers.

Seventy-five years ago the Knowle Parish Magazine recorded: "The handbell ringers have been disbanded, but the Vicar sincerely hopes that those who have been accustomed to subscribe annually at Christmas to the fund for which they collected when going round with the handbells, for the church ringers, will continue their subscriptions."

Since that time and the present day many ringers have revived the old tradition of handbell ringing in Knowle, the most notable of which was that of Anthony Upton about six of which was that of Anthony Opton about six years ago. However, when Anthony left to join the Church (he is now the Rev. A. A Upton, author of the book "A History of the Knowle Collegiate Church of SS. John the Baptist, Lawrence and Anne"), with him went the driving force behind handbell ringing, and again the bells fell into disuse.

Just under two years ago, after a shor? article in the Knowle magazine, which was later reproduced in the local "Solihull News" by the Rev. L. B. Hutchings, himself a ringer at Solihull Church, the Knowle tower was "invaded" by an unprecedented number of interested people who wished to learn the art of bellringing on the tower bells, at one time numbering 3 regular attenders! Two extra ringing nights were arranged (the bells were "tied" to help the local residents' nerves!) to teach the learners, who ages ranged from 11 to "over 21"!! (In fact at one time a mother and her two daughters were interested, the to "over 21" !! (In fact at one time a mother and her two daughters were interested, the two daughters being the more athletic survivors of the rigours of ringing.) In order to help the ringers in understanding "rounds" and "plain hunting" the handbells were taken out and used by the learners.

Also, about this time, a group of about ten "experienced" ringers and "learners" decided to make use of the handbells to ring at Christmas Copies of music were procured, and the group embarked on the perfection of and the group embarked on the perfection of the art of tune ringing. After considerable practice the group toured the village and played carols to the delight of young and old alike. This part of the activity was to have been conducted in a non-profit making manner, although four of the older members of the band elected to play one night in a local nearby public house with such success that on later nights a tour of local "houses" was conducted, donations being taken for the bell fund.

conducted, donations being taken for the bell fund.

It was realised that the bells were in poor condition, and the immediate reaction was to take the set to the John Taylor foundry at Loughborough to be retuned, recast and restrapped where necessary. The cost of over £80 had been foreseen, and the problem of raising the money was soon under discussion. The Parochial Church Council offered to help with the payment by loaning the complete sum, and only taking half back in payment. This still meant a sum of £40 being raised, but this has now been completed within the year by two methods—firstly, the ringers decided to pass on 4s. of the money received

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for wedding ringing into the fund and, secondly, it was decided to make use of the bells by ringing at Christmas, 1966, and other functions to raise the rest of the money.

Thirty-six bells were reconditioned, 12 being hung in the chamber for "method" ringing, and 24 being used for the "tune" ringing. Since the time of the recovery of the bells a team of ringers has regularly given up Sunday afternoons to practise on 12- and 15-bell tunes, and during the year the standard of ringing has improved enormously, culminating in the appearance on television, which was mentioned before tioned before.

The previous number of 33 learners has now dropped to about 15 regulars (the tower size is small, and it is often that at the Thursday in the control of the night practice we cannot accommodate all the ringers in the ringing chamber at once, there being about 20 to 25 of our own ringers and visitors for the eight bells!). The handbell team is now almost entirely made up of these younger ringers, and the eight who ap-peared on television were all between the ages of 12 and 18, the "older" members "re-tiring" during the year.

Unfortunately there have been formed in the tower two distinctive schools of thought as to how the bells should be rung. The present leader, Tim Kedge, is of the opinion that the bells should be rung slowly, so that each note sounds clear, while I feel that the tune sounds better if the bells are rung quickly to bring out the resonance of the bells. (It has been likened to picking out a tune on the piano and playing it faster so that the notes run into each other.) I would therefore be pleased to hear from anyone who has views be pleased to hear from anyone who has views on this subject and especially from other handbell teams.

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Tower Captaincy Without Tears

(The third of four articles by Osram.) PART II

Scientific tower captaincy has no room for tears. That was the theme continued in the last instalment of this series, when recognition of the non-attendance and wastage factors was discussed, together with the importance of recruiting youth and of making the most of available time. The last three principles are now to be put before you.

PRINCIPLE 7. KEEPING THE PLATES SPINNING

Were you one of those schoolchildren who were brilliant at reading French but who fumed and fretted every French lesson because the teacher always got the dullards to read (to improve them), and never gave you a chance to show your virtue? He was a bad teacher, of course—he didn't cater for every pupil's needs. Have you sometimes noticed teacher, of course—ne didn't cater for every pupil's needs. Have you sometimes noticed how, a perfectly usable new stretch of road can't be opened because one bridge on it still has to be competed, and they're still waiting for a girder? A badly organised job of course—not everything was progressed to come to fruition together. come to fruition together.

When a juggler has thrown the first of six plates in the air, he doesn't forget it as the second goes into orbit—he supervises the progress of each plate in its different orbit all the time until his act is complete. You might agree that every good leader is, amongst other things, a good plate-spinner—he keeps all things going along a broad front, not letting any aspect of his province stagnate accidentally. If you do agree then as a ringing leader you will cater for everyone's needs in your team. You have 17 learning to handle, when who can into your do allow the control of the true who can be control plus two who can ring rounds, plus three plain hunting, plus one ringing Bob Minor. So you don't let the Bob Minor ringer stagnate in plain don't let the Bob Minor ringer stagnate in plain hunting Sunday in, practice night out, do you? You make certain that regularly (you decide—and stick to it—how regularly) he rings Bob Minor and progresses to Bob Major or whatever, in due course. You would have left that French class if you had been able, wouldn't you, through frustration? Those road-building contractors would have paid a forfeit to the Ministry of Transport, wouldn't they? So is your bright young Rob Minor. they? So is your bright young Bob Minor ringer going to stay with you when you ring rounds all the time "because that's all our band can do and we never get any visitors on practice night," and Middle Wallop's tower captain has promised him progress if he

Consider all your team all the timethey all progressing. or is one of them stagnating? How are you going to get that plae back into orbit? Perhaps by temporarily devoting a little extra effort to it, to the others' temporary detriment. Perhaps by taking him to a neighbouring practice? Perhaps by arranging for the requisite number of neighbouring ringers to come to your team's practice?

There is, of course, one important qualifica-tion. Some people don't want to progress They have reached their level and they are They have reached their level and they are content to be useful members of society at that level. You will quickly spot them. You arrange their Bob Minor by organising the requisite number of visitors on your practice night—and your protégés don't feel like catching hold. Just relax again, and don't organise any more visitors for them. They're happy, and useful for training learners coming up behind them. Why should you worry?

Recognise the plate-spinning principle. You're spinning the rest of your life on plates—i.e. you lead a full life. Why not spin the belfry on plates, too?

PRINCIPLE 8. WALKING AND RUNNING

When you go somewhere on foot, you walk normally, because it's comfortable and gets you there economically of effort. On occasions you have been seen to run—because the last bus is just pulling out and it will save you

an hour's walk if you sprint for six seconds and spend five minutes panting discomfort in

Why be different in the belfry, when you're handling a band of people just like you—people who, wanting to go places on foot, normally walk there, but run for specific reasons at odd times?

Recognise that progress is made most com-fortably and economically by "walking"; by ringing well within the capabilities of the band and not disheartening people by fire-ups This is quite consistent with some one person Inis is quite consistent with some one person in the band doing something for the first time (i.e. with progress being made); but why not let it normally be something just a little advanced over his past experience and supported by a first-class band for that particular exercise? The result—both advancement (another plate further into its orbit) and pleasure all round because of the reasonable striking.

Let that be the norm; but when should you make the band run? Perhaps never—you can judge your team best But possibly you sense a need to throw caution aside one Sunday evening. Three Grandsire Triples ringers have turned up on a once-off visit to your tower; and you've got a learner who hasn't rung more than Grandsire Doubles "inside" before, plus three of your own ringers who know Grandside. than Grandsire Doubles "inside" before, plus three of your own ringers who know Grandsire Triples. He's the sort of man who you think might rise to the occasion, and you feel like risking it. Why not risk it? It might come off and give everyone a boost. These "running" sessions may admittedly be subjectively undertaken by you on the spur of the moment; but if you're not the best judge of that, who is? And why isn't he tower captain?

Recognise the basic principle of the balance between the walking and the occasional run for specific reasons. This is part of your responsibility for creative leadership.

PRINCIPLE 9. DELEGATION.

Do you try to do everything yourself all the time? Or do you let your wife buy the food, the bus driver drive you to town, the policeman catch your burglar? You direct policeman catch your buiglar? You direct your own life, don't you, taking advantage of the various services that various experts can render you? Well. why do you take on tower captaincy and then yourself train all learners, do all the tower correspondence, oil the bells, keep the finances straight, organize the bells, keep the finances straight, organise annual outings? Is it because you "know" that no one can do any of these things as well as you, and that therefore "I must do it myself"?

it myself "?

This isn't plate-spinning, is it? This is clay-mining, pottery, box-office management, plate-spinning and washing-up afterwards! Why not do what you're there for? Why not direct? A good managing director is quite busy enough directing without getting his hands dirty every day on the production line, or servicing customers. There are grave disadvantages in doing it all yourself. First, it starts your wife off. Secondly, you get a martyr complex, Thirdly, your team isn't learning to gel by taking responsibility for each other's well-being in various ways. Fourthly, what would happen if you fell under a bus? What service have you rendered to your tower if you leave it to collapse for lack of someone to take your place? lack of someone to take your place?

How can learners and youngsters possibly be secretaries, treasurers or steeplekeepers? Of course they can. They will make mistakes and they won't do it as well as you. They might even waste more of your time in supervision than if you'd done the job yourself—for a time. But it won't always be like that Prod them, guide them, praise them, and soon they'll be doing your work-load to leave you free to do the ivory tower thinking and practical directing.

"Brian's only 15, and he's only been ringing two years. How could be possibly train someone else?" If you say that of a competent ringer you have yourself taught to ring, you may well be condemning yourself. Why

haven't you trained Brian to train? You might be surprised how intelligent people rise to responsibility. With 17 learners to teach, might be surprised now intelligent people to responsibility. With 17 learners to teach, you've got to choose between thrusting responsibility on suitable people after suitably preparing them, or being in the belfry three nights a week—a compulsive martyr. And you're reading this article because you wish to avoid just that, in order to keep a broad

view of life.

Recognise the vital principle of delegation in the belfry. You might decide to train learners yourself to set an example to your other teachers in the band. But recognise that, if other teachers in the band. But recognise that, if you do that you're putting on an operative's hat, and that you've at least temporarily ceased to direct, ceased to plan, progress, ceased to spin the plates. Do it if you must, deliberately—not on the "there's nobody else principle. Get or train somebody else, and you'll be able to do your proper job better. [In the final article the aspects of planning and keeping to the plan will be touched on as factors in painless belfry leadership.]
