OUR COVER PICTURE

BUSHEY PARISH CHURCH

TT is more than just probable that the church was established in Bushey before William the Conqueror was responsible for his famous survey, The Domesday Book. The Manor of Bushey was granted to the Abbey of St. Albans by King Offa at the end of the seventh or beginning of the eighth century. Possibly in pre-Norman times the church may have been a simple wooden structure. The earliest part of our present building is the chancel which dates from the thirteenth century.

The tower itself is in the Perpendicular style of the beginning of the fifteenth century. The church has many interesting features and not least of its attractions is its fine hammer-beam roof which dates from about 1480. Our ring of eight bells is interesting. A tradition states:--

"There is a saying current here, 'worse and worse, like the parson of Bushey,' which is said to have had its origin in this way-Bushey formerly had but one bell, which dealt forth a dull 'tom-tom-tom,' much to the annoyance of the rector. He thereupon had another bell added. But the people declared that the two bells were shaming him, for they called out 'Tomfool, tom-fool.' So he added a third bell but this made matters even worse, for the bells now sounded like 'Tom-fool-still' and have done so ever since." (A History of Bushey by G. Montague Hall, formerly

There is one old bell still with us (the seventh) which dates from 1452. In the 1552 inventory of church goods, there were stated to be "iii belles in the steple." This seems to contradict the above assertion. Two bells bear the date of 1664 and were pro-bably recast in 1664 by William Eldridge the elder from two of the old bells.

The bells are inscribed as follows:-

Treble: Name of makers, "Laus Deo Semper" (Praise be to God always). This bell was presented by Sir Hubert Herkomer,

Second: Name of makers, "Gloriam Dei semper sonabo." (I will always ring out the glory of God). Charles Edward Keyser.

Third: Name of makers, "Mary Dorothy Burchell-Herne gave me." Tewkesbury Henry Kynaston, rector.

Fourth: Name of makers, "Charles Edward Keyser, churchwarden, presented me, 1887."

Fifth and Sixth: William + Eldridge + made + mee + 1664 + H + K + W + B Ch. Wardens.

Seventh: Sancta Trinitas Unus Deus miserere nobis (Holy Trinity, One God, have mercy upon us). This is the old fifteenth century bell still being rung as part of the ring.

Tenor: Name of makers, Jubilee 1887. Tewkesbury Henry Kynaston, rector.

Numbers 1, 2, 3, 4 and 8 were cast by Messrs. John Warner & Sons, at their Cripplegate foundry.

Our Parish Church has of course benefited from (or suffered from!) successive restorations, the last being a major one in 1870-71 under the supervision of Sir Giles Gilbert-Scott when the south aisle was added. Our pulpit dates from 1636. Queen Anne's arms are emblazoned over the chancel beam. We have a fine early eighteenth century brass candelabra hanging in the chancel. Our reredos is a gorgeous example of Victorian ecclesiastical furnishing (1871) which would delight the heart of John Betjeman and other enthusiasts.

For some years now we have been very concerned about the state of weathering and decay of the stone-work of the tower, the limestone used in its construction (called in these parts "clunch") having flaked away in some instances to a depth of several inches. In addition the parapet at the top of the tower and lead roof is in urgent need of attention. Then again our ring of eight bells has had little money spent on it since 1887. There are obvious signs that the frame in which the bells were placed at that time needs attention, since there is a certain amount of movement, and needs refixing. The bells themselves have become far from easy to ring and it is our intention to have them lowered and completely overhauled and new wheels and bearings put on.

As may be well imagined this whole operation is going to prove most costly (£1,500 for tower fabric, £1,500 for work on bells) and this at a time when the parish has in the last eight years spent some thousands on necessary work in restoring the fabric of its ancient Parish Church. In effect our plans for the tower and bells are the completion of a long process of restoration. We are therefore inviting people from outside the Parish to help us over this last hurdle by sending a donation. I should particularly like to appeal to members of the Ringing fraternity through the pages of "The Ringing World" to give us some assistance. 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SUFFOLK GUILD'S CONTINUED RISE

Mr. GEORGE PIPE RETIRES AS MASTER

MR. GEORGE PIPE, who since 1964 has been Master of the Suffolk Guild, has retired from this office. To the annual meeting at Bury St. Edmunds, on April 12th, he sent his apology as he had injured his foot in an accident. During his mastership, Guild membership has increased by 37 per cent. His successor is Mr. Howard Egglestone.

Some 15 towers en route to Bury St. Edmunds were open during the afternoon. The service in the Cathedral at 4.15 p.m. was conducted by the Provost, who also gave an address and joined the members at tea in the Silver Jubilee Boys' School.

The chairman, Mr. J. W. Blythe, opened the meeting by welcoming visitors from other counties.

Arising from the minutes of the last annual general meeting, the secretary commented that the grant promised towards the restoration of Bungay bells, which were being dedicated that very day, would shortly be due for payment, but during the year the committee had implemented the suggestion to make payment of grants conditional on completed work being approved by the technical adviser and the Ringing Master.

The meeting stood in silence to the memory of members and friends who had died during the past year. These were Walter D. Bailey (Stratford St. Mary), Charles E. Fisher (Ufford), Alfred R. King (Brome), Peter Laflin (formerly of Debenham), Rev. W. Fayle-Parr (Benhall), Alfred J. Peter (Barking), Frederick A. Poulson (Long Melford), Rev. G. M. Sykes (Ipswich), Russell Ward (Cotton) and Oliver G. Barnard (Stowmarket).

OFFICERS' REPORTS

In the absence of the Ringing Master, the chairman read his report. The Master noted with satisfaction the continued rise in membership (37 per cent, since 1964) and hoped that the Guild's increased resources would be used to increase Sunday service ringing and to promote the restoration of the 95 rings in the diocese which needed attention.

He strongly urged members to offer their services for their local P.C.C.'s and hoped that the more experienced members would encourage young conductors and try to revive towers which were at present silent. He asked

every member to attend the Sudbury Mammoth Olde Tyme Rallye on June 28th/29th, and praised Mr. Leslie Mills for his organisation of the Guild's part in this event. He once again appealed to members to support "The Ringing World" and the St. Mary-le-Tower restoration appeal, Mr. Pipe felt that after five years as Ringing Master he would like to stand down and commended the name of Howard Egglestone as his successor.

The hon, secretary and treasurer, the Rev. Lawrence R. Pizzey, stressed that part of his printed report which appealed for tolerance and help for younger and less experienced members. He thanked the committee for their hard and loyal work. Turning to the accounts, he said that, allowing for a slight loss on the year's working due largely to replenishing the stock of Guild badges, the accounts were very satisfactory. Grants totalling £35 had been awarded to Halesworth and Woolpit.

The technical adviser (Mr. Ranald W. M.

The technical adviser (Mr. Ranald W. M. Clouston) said that the two bells requiring attention at Stonham Aspal had now received the same, but warned that the other eight bells would soon need similar attention. Kearsey was appealing for money to restore its famous tower, but this would be very expensive as it was a rubble one. Mr. Leslie Mills hoped that the Guild would liaise over the proposed restoration of St. Peter's Sudbury, and of rings in the Stour valley generally.

Dr. S. G. C. Harrison, one of the Pearson handbells trustees, reported that the set of 13 by Warner had been at the foundry and he had been advised that their restoration would cost £50. He voiced the trustees' concern that the set of 16 by Shaw and the 26 by Taylor, which had been in use pretty well throughout the year, would soon require at-

tention. The committee thought that if £50 was to be spent it would be better spent on the Shaw bells than on those by Warner. Dr. Harrison thought that the bells were now under-insured, and the committee was instructed to consider raising the cover.

All these reports were adopted, with thanks to the respective officers.

OFFICERS FOR 1969-70.

These are: Chairman, Mr. J. W. Blythe; Ringing Master, Mr. Howard W. Egglestone (the chairman expressed the Guild's appreciation of everything George Pipe had done for the Guild during his period of office, and the secretary was instructed to convey the Guild's thanks to him); secretary and treasurer, the Rev. Lawrence R. Pizzey; report editor, Mr. Alan R. Bridges; technical adviser, Mr. Ranald W. M. Clouston; Pearson handbells trustees, Mr. George Pipe, Mr. Hubert Mitson and Mr. Leonard Last (Dr. S. G. C. Harrison retired); auditor, Mr. J. W. H. Praestner.

The vice-presidents were re-elected en bloc, together with Mr. George Pipe. Central Council representatives, Messrs. T. N. J. Bailey, H. W. Egglestone, C. W. Pipe and the Rev. L. R. Pizzey The chairman reminded members of the Guild Peal Week in September. The annual general meeting for 1970 was fixed for April 4th at Ipswich, Mr. Leslie Mills explained the Guild's part in the Sudbury Olde Tyme Rallye and answered questions on arrangements for ringing in the Expobelfry. The secretary gave notice of a general meeting at Otley and Clopton on September 13th to consider a proposal to change the constitution so that the Pearson handbells trustees should become ex officio members of the committee. The chairman closed the meeting by thanking the Provost and Cathedral staff, all incumbents for the use of bells, and above all Mrs. Muriel Page and all the lady members who had helped in providing the splendid tea all had enjoyed.

Ringing took place after the meeting at four towers on the outskirts of Bury St.

FIRST DINNER BY THE W. & P. GUILD

THE Bishops of Portsmouth and Southampton were present at the first annual dinner of the Winchester and Portsmouth Guild held at the Royal Hotel, Southampton, on March 22nd. All the 98 tickets available were sold, and about 30 people were disappointed. The Bishop of Portsmouth, joint president of the Guild, was in the chair.

The toast of "The Church" was given by Mr. Arthur Davis, which he said headed the list at various Guild dinners. Was the toast just a selfish thing to keep the clergy happy, or an apology for the ringers of a bygone age? He thought it was because ringers and ringing were an integral part of the Church. Today ringers served the Church in a diversity of ways, from the humble P.C.C. to the Church Assembly.

In the past bells had exercised a strong influence over the community. Two of the bells in his own church, Christchurch Priory, had proclaimed the Christian message since 1370, and in spite of the noise of the motor car and the jet plane their message got through today.

A reply, in which humour was mingled with sincerity, came from the Bishop of Southampton. The laity were as much the

Church as the clergy, he said, and if they thought the clergy were a rum lot it was because they came from the laity! Despite difficulties, the Church was in very good heart; more and more of its activities were becoming less parochial, and he was glad to see that their Guild spanned two dioceses. The Winchester Diocese had been going strong for 1.300 years, and was broken up in 1927 with the formation of Portsmouth and the "Gin and Jaguar" diocese of Guildford, which had its own association.

A course of Grandsire Caters followed, the band being R. R. Savory 1-2, T. H. Francis 3-4, K. C. Croft 5-6, D. J. Forder 7-8, M. J. Butler 9-10.

The toast of "The Guild" was proposed by Mr. Frank Darby, Master of the Surrey Association, who brought fraternal greetings from his committee. In the 1968 Christmas bells, he commented, how well the W. and P. had been represented by Eling. A recent event which created some sort of a record was when the Guild Master and general secretary, with the aid of their wives, produced daughters within two days of each other!

In reminiscent vein he recalled the valuable work to the Exercise of the Guild's Immediate Past Master. Canon Felstead, as one of their leading historians and statis-

ticians, and the work of George Wilhems and Fred Rogers.

Coupled with the toast was the name of Canon Felstead, who said that much had been achieved in the 90 years of the Guild's existence. The first peal was not rung until two or three years after its formation. In 1879 there were no rings of 12: now there were two and five tens. Last year, for the first time, 100 peals were rung for the Guild. George Williams, who was Master for 30 years, was the first to conduct 1,000 peals on tower bells.

The toast of "The Visitors" was drunk on the call of the Master (Mr. Roger Savory), and Mr. Alan Carveth, president of the Truro Diocesan Guild, in response, said visiting was the life blood of the Exercise, and an active interchange between belfries was the only way to further their art.

This concluded the formal proceedings. The encouraging support portends that the dinner should certainly become one of the Guild's major annual events.

MIDDLESEX HONOURS SENIOR MEMBERS

ALLEGATIONS OF COLOUR BAR

A number of members who had rendered long and distinguished service to the Middlesex County Association were honoured with life membership at the 72nd A.G.M. held at St. Matthew's, Upper Clapton, on April 19th. These were Messrs. A. Cutler, G. W. Fletcher, G. R. Goodship, J. R. Mayne, W. H. Coles, F. W. Goodfellow, T. Price, C. W. Roberts and T. J. Lock.

Before the meeting there was ringing at Clerkenwell, St. John-at-Hackney and Upper Clapton. Officiating at the service at St. Matthew's, Upper Clapton, were Father R. A. Gould (Vicar), who gave the address, and Father Alan White. Mrs. Steele and helpers provided an excellent tea.

The President (Rev. G. G. Taylor) presided at the meeting supported by the Master (Mr. W. S. Deason), the hon. secretary (Mr. T. J. Lock), the hon. treasurer (Mr. F. W. Goodfellow) and the assistant hon. secretary (Miss R. M. Foreman).

The meeting stood in silence when the following members lost through death were remembered—A. W. Coles (North Mymms), Lady Juliet S. Craig (Hillingdon), Miss P. M. Gearing (Hendon), W. H. Johnson (Ripon), and W. J. Langley (Monken Hadley).

MASTER'S REPORT

The Master's report recorded that 55 new members had been elected, but attendance at the 42 meetings and practices was spasmodic. Sunday service ringing was being maintained at most towers. Efforts had been made to get a local band together at St. Stephen's, Ealing, where C. Mays held regular Friday practices. Mrs. M. A. May was trying hard to teach new learners at Harmondsworth. Special practices for beginners were still being arranged by Miss A. Horsford and C. Stevenson, and much good work had been done at Stanwell by D. G. Pickett, where new bearings had been fitted to the clappers.

Appreciation was expressed to F. T. Blagrove in giving members opportunities to ring peals; Mr. R. A. Gage for maintaining ringing at mid-week lunch hour services at St. Giles-in-the-Fields, and T. G. Hawkins, who took over in his absence. C. W. Ward was congratulated on completing 50 years' service to ringing.

The loss of two tower affiliations—Finchley and Barnet—was regretted, and St. Andrew's, Uxbridge, was losing its affiliation through inactivity in the belfry. A return of 115 quarter peals showed them to have been rung in 30 towers, the methods ranging from Doubles to Surprise Royal. Hillingdon recorded most with 21,

Fifty-one peals were rung for the Association (62 in 1967). There had been five first peals and two firsts as conductor. Seven methods were rung to peals for the first time, and seven others as first for the Association. A record was made by a band conducted by J. S. N. Porter at St. Ann's, Stamford Hill, of a peal of Spliced Surprise Major in 25 methods, which was the greatest number of methods used with all the bells doing all the work of each method.

HON. SECRETARY'S THREE EVENTS

The hon, secretary reached three totals of note during the year—his 1,000th peal, his 500th for the Association and his 300th on the bells of St. Mary's, Willesden, H. G. Hart rang his 100th peal on the bells of All Saints', Harrow Weald,

Restoration work had been completed at St. Mary's, Twickenham; the six bells at St. Lawrence's, Brentford, had been classified as redundant and were for disposal.

The accounts, presented by Mr. F. W. Goodfellow, showed a balance of £193 at the end of the year on the central fund and a balance of £145 on the bell restoration fund.

All the officers were re-elected, but there was a change in the Central Council representation. Miss R. M. Foreman retired and Mr. C. H. Rogers was elected in her place. Other members are Messrs. F. T. Blagrove, G. W. Critchley and T. J. Lock.

A new rule governing grants from the bell restoration fund was passed. Applications for grants are to be made to either District secretaries giving details of the work to be carried out and an estimate of the total cost. The size of the grant shall be agreed by a general meeting of the Association.

RESTORATIONS AND REDUNDANCIES

A grant of £30 to Stanwell was approved and Mr. Goodfellow mentioned that another claim would be forthcoming for the restoration at St. 'Mary's, Hayes. The restoration would probably cost £2,500 as the old six bells were being recast into a light eight. The Venn family had done a tremendous amount of work and given £1,000 towards the cost.

The President said it was put to him that the bells of Clapham Park, which are no longer required, might be put in St. Gilesin-the-Field. He would not think of parting with his bells, which were rung for the Restoration of Charles II.

Miss Horsford said that there was a proposal for these bells to go to Kingston.

The Secretary said that as an Association they were not directly involved in Clapham Park.

When the meeting was considering lifemembership Mr. Blagrove called attention to Mrs. Gladys Barker having completed 50 years' membership and Mr. William Henley 60 years', The honour is to be conferred on them.

The congratulations of the meeting to Mr. Tom Lock on ringing his 1,000th peal were voiced by Mr. A. Cutler and seconded by Mr. E. H. Kilby, who said he had known Tom from the early 1920s when he first came to London. He was always a Sunday service ringer.

Mr. Cutler recalled Mr. Lock's long connection with the Middlesex Association, having joined in 1927. For 18 years he was a District secretary and on the death of Mr. Ernest Turner was elected general secretary.

Thanking the members, Mr. Lock said he regarded himself as an Association man. He thought the organisation of ringing throughout the country was dependent on the Associations. One other thing that gave him pleasure was that he was elected to life membership while in office.

Hillingdon was elected as the venue for the next annual meeting and a committee was appointed to prepare the design for a new members' badge.

COLOURED RINGERS

There was a long discussion on a matter raised by Mr. W. G. Knight why two applications he had made for Gospel Oak to be in union with the Association had been turned down.

The Master, who was then in the chair, answered that being "in union" depended on the number of members and Mr. Knight was the only member from Gospel Oak.

Mr. Knight replied that there were other towers in union with only one member. "One thing was put to me," he said, "was that I would not get application as long as I was teaching coloured people. I feel that this is something I cannot ignore. Fifty per cent of our congregation are coloured and I am very proud to be a member of that congregation."

The Master replied that the Association had given grants to a number of towers, including Gospel Oak, who were not in union. They gave a grant to Kilifi.

Mr. Knight said he wanted help in training and affiliation would help.

Miss Horsford said she was just making a plea for a tower in a similar position to be given better assistance.

Mr. Knight replied that an independent tower was not likely to get help. Thirtytwo kids had learned to handle a bell and he wanted help.

The matter then dropped.

REDEDICATION

St. Mary's, Bungay, Suffolk

April 12th was a red-letter day for ringing in Suffolk, for as well as the date of its A.G.M. at Bury St. Edmunds it was also the occasion of rededication of the bells at the Priory Church of St. Mary, Bungay.

The ring of eight (tenor 16 cwt.), cast by Thomas Mears II at Whitechapel in 1820, had been silent for about three years, and while the Church Council had spent a considerable sum on structural repairs to the tower fabric to render it safe the townspeople raised almost £3,000 for the restoration of the bells. These have been quarter-turned, tuned and hung in an iron frame with new fittings, and equipped with Ellacombe chiming apparatus by John Taylor and Son, who have done an excellent job.

The rededication service was conducted by the Archdeacon of Suffolk (Ven. C. S. Scott) assisted by the Vicar (Rev. G. J. Tarris) and was attended by a very large congregation. The Suffolk Guild was represented by a small group who felt justified in missing the A.G.M. for such a special occasion.

At the conclusion of the service the first touch was rung by local ringers, after which the few visitors took part in general ringing, which concluded with a quarter peal of 1.264 Plain Bob Major by Rev. P. N. Bond 1, J. B. Pickup (cond.) 2, F. Gunton 3, M. Parker 4, T. Brock 5, W. Flatt 6, R. W. Bickers 7, E. R. Goate 8, E. R. G.

WORCESTERSHIRE & DISTRICTS ASSOCIATION

MOST IMPORTANT AND BUSY YEAR REVIEWED

WA/ORCESTER on Easter Monday is the traditional venue for the A.G.M. of the Worcestershire and Districts Association and the sunny holiday weather attracted a large number of ringers to the afternoon's ringing programme. In the morning, the annual service was held at All Saints' and was conducted by the chaplain, Rev. H. L. Davies. During the service a course of Grandshe Triples was rung on handbells by D. G. Franklin 1-2, L. J. Haines 3-4, R. G. Morris 5-6, G. Bagley 7-8.

The A.G.M. followed, being held in the Cathedral Chapter House. As the Dean-elect of Worcester had not yet been installed, the Association was still without a president and so the Chair was taken by a vice-president, Rev. L. J. Birch.

FROM THE ANNUAL REPORT

The Master: We have just passed through one of the most important and busy years of our existence, most of the activities centring around the visit of the Central Council. Those of our members who attended a Council meeting for the first time found something to interest them even if it were only to wonder how some of the weird and wonderful speeches on Doubles method construction and the like would affect their own Sunday service ringing even if they understood what the speakers were talking about!

The General Secretary: I am sure that the Council members and visitors went away with a first-class impression of our Association. It was a great pleasure to receive and read many letters of appreciation afterwards and it gave the committee who made the arrangements great satisfaction to know that their efforts had been so successful

On branch reorganisation the General Secretary wrote: "The problem facing the appointed committee is that of three large

branches, large both in the number of towers they contain and in the distances between the extremes, and no easy solution is apparent."

Regarding ringing courses on an Association level, Mr. Beacham wrote that he would be pleased to hear from members able to help. "Such ventures as this will only 'get off the ground' if they have the drive and enthusiasm of one or two people who are not only concerned about ringing training, but also have time and energy to give to it."

MEMBERSHIP JUMP

A note on membership stated that paidup ringing members numbered 530, which very nearly equalled the record of 537 in 1953, and it was gratifying to see this increase on last year's figure of 507.

When the accounts were considered, the treasurer (Mr. G. Westwood) was able to point out that since the end of the year nearly £100 had been received in donations towards the expenses of last year's Central Council meeting, thus restoring the general

fund to a healthy position.

A question was asked regarding the membership of peal bands when peals were rung for the Association. The General Secre-tary said that the Peal Secretary (who was absent) did check on the membership of bands at the end of the year and if a peal had been rung with a non-member in the

band every effort was made to obtain a subscription. However, it was primarily the conductor's job to see that the rules were complied with and he wished more care was given to this as the situation seemed to be getting worse.

POSITION AT IPSLEY

The Report of the recent Central Committee meeting was read out by the General Secretary. One of the most interesting points was the promise of a grant from the belfry repairs fund of £25 towards a scheme to rehang the three old bells at lpsley in a new 6-bell frame. This country church would soon be in the centre of the New Town at Redditch and the Rector was very keen to have the bells ready to call his new parishioners. It was hoped to add the three extra bells later and the Association had intimated its fullest support in raising funds for these when the time came.

There was one change in Association ficers. The peal secretary, Mr. G. L. officers. Bowen, did not wish to be re-elected as he was expecting to move out of the county. Mr. D. G. Franklin was elected to succeed him. All other officers were re-elected, namely: Rev. L. J. Birch, Messrs. W. B. Cartwright and J. D. Johnson, vice-presidents; Mr. W. B. Cartwright, Master; Mr. D. Hereford Three-Day Ringing Course

As on previous occasions, the course was surrounded by a general air of friendliness and enthusiasm. Some 19 towers were made available for ringing purposes and students generally owe their appreciation to incumbents and to Mr. George Cousins on whom the arrangements had fallen for this part of the course, as in previous years.

The course concluded with a practical session on Sunday afternoon and students dispersed after tea at the College, each returning with increased enthusiasm and a burning desire to progress still further in

We are all grateful to Mr. Moreton and his band and now look forward to the 1970 L M. B. COUFSE.

THE LAST OF THE DEVON **SHEPHERDS**

The Shepherd family of Exeter became well known in the 19th century, and though I cannot go back to the 1820s, when my grandparents were born, I can remember the four brothers Shepherd who were ringers in Exeter when I came in 1883.

My dad was born in 1857, my Uncle Edwin in 1862, and Francis, Richard and Alfred passed on as young men, a great loss for change-ringing in the city of Exeter. My dad was the one who boasted three sons—Ferris John in 1882, myself in 1883 and my younger brother, Arthur Francis, in 1891. A young man who was learning ringing with me in the early 1890s was William Temple, who (like his father) rose to become Archbishop of Canterbury.

My dad and Edwin were the mainstays of ringing not only in Exeter but also in Devon and neighbouring counties. It was uphill work and peals were few. Plymouth helped with the Devon Guild and I well remember E. Taylor and G. H. Myers as two good leaders. Major ringing was unknown in the county, but early in the 20th century it became more popular.

Ferris John, my brother, left Exeter for London in 1899 and I, who was in the Devon county education offices 1897–1900, also left for London at the later date, but the two brothers Ferris and Edwin carried on the building business opposite St. Sid-well's Church until 1903, when dad under-took a seven-year job at Arklow in Ireland near where J. W. Washbrook was verger and bellringer at the C. of I. Church. Before leaving Exeter I rang four peals in 1900 and toured Devon not only for

educational work but change-ringing, when the place had a ring of bells; the Rev. Maitland Kelly remembered me for special events in connection with the Devon Guild. In 1902 I moved into Surrey, and brother F. J. soon joined me. In 1909 our parents joined us in Hersham and early in 1910 four Shepherds rang the first handbell peal

for the Devon Guild.

My young brother, Arthur, was a great help and in 1912 he and I rang not only in a 14.031 Stedman Caters "in hand" but also a 19.738 of the same method "in hand" at Guildford in 9 hours and 32 minutes. Arthur's health became unsettled in 1916 and he died at the case 25 that same year. and he died at the age of 25 that same year.
My dad died in 1921 at the age of 64 and F. J. moved to Southwick in Sussex and I to Addlestone in 1926.

My Uncle Edwin lived in Exeter until his death in 1946 at the age of 84. F. J. died in Brighton Hospital in 1961, aged 78, and Yours truly, who is 85½, cannot ring because of Paget's disease of bones over a period of 16 years. When the weather is warmer I hope to be taken out in an invalid chair. but I cannot get to any meetings, etc. It is a pleasure to see W. H. Coles, J. W. Euston, Len Stillwell and William Simmonds when they call here to see me, for am the last of the Exeter Shepherds. My brother's two boys—F. H. Shepherd at Bournemouth and A. F. Shepherd at Maidenhead—are both ringers.

OBITUARY

MR. GEORGE PYE

Mr. George Pye, the oldest serving member of the Manchester Cathedral band, was called to higher service on March 18th, at the age of 80, after a very short illnessthe first time he had been confined to bed in 30 years.

George was not one of the prolific peal ringers, but he was a faithful and dedicated service ringer. His standards for attendance and punctuality were exceptionally high, and could not be equalled. Rather than be five minutes late for ringing, he would be half an hour early.

His dedication to the Church lay in other fields as well. After ringing each Sunday for morning service at the Cathedral, George would take a bus to Collyhurst to play the organ at St. Oswald's Church, where he was officially deputy organist. Being one of the poorer parishes of the city, there was no other organist at the church, so George was the official organist. His commitments at St. Oswald's prevented him from ringing at the Cathedral for Evensong on a Sunday, but he always made himself available to ring for Sunday afternoon services and mid-week evening services, as and when required.

George had been retired for over 25 years after serving in the Manchester City Constabulary, and, like his brother, the late William Pye, was also a member of the police band who ring at Manchester Town Hall. He was a member of the National Police Guild and a life member of the Lancashire Association which he joined in 1911 when a member of the Newchurch (Warrington) band.

The funeral service was at St. Mary's, Prestwich (where his son is the organist), and was conducted by the Vicar of St. Oswald's. Collyhurst, followed by interment at Blackley Cemetery. The service was attended by close friends, relatives and members of the National Police Guild and the Lancashire Association.

On the following Sunday evening, a halfmuffled quarter peal was rung on the Cathedral bells fellowed by another quarter on the following Wednesday evening in place of the weekly practice. A peal was also rung at the Cathedral on April 12th.

George will not only be missed by the Cathedral and Town Hall bands, but also by the many visiting peal bands to the Town Hall whom he met and made most

It was a pleasure to have known him, and our sorrows are turned into joy by the memories of his company. He was a true friend and companion to all who rang with him. May he rest in peace. A. W.

ST. MARGARET'S, WORMHILL, DERBYSHIRE

In spite of the obvious disadvantages of trying to ring bells with a tenor of 11 cwt. without any ropes, it was decided some nine months ago to try to restore the six bells of St. Margaret's Church, Wormhill, to ringing order. The Vicar was approached, and he agreed to let us ring if we could overcome the problem of obtaining ropes which had to be light enough for the bells. The bells were inspected, and it was found that, although they had not been rung for some time, they were in good order, and, apart from the second, all had their stays intact.

Our energies were then devoted to obtaining new ropes, which we decided had to be made by ourselves. We contacted a Sheffield rope works, who kindly gave us 300 ft. of 3-strand rope. We then proceeded to make sallies as follows: The two ends of the rope were spliced together to form a splice of about twelve inches in length. Each loop of the splice was pegged with a number of pieces of rug wool. This produced a reasonably thick sally. The rope was then cut at the required length each side of the newly made sally.

The ropes were eventually fitted just before the winter, but it was not until Saturday. April 19th, that the bells were rung. At first we found them difficult to handle, and this was not helped by the cramped conditions in the ringing chamber. However, after a poor start, a reasonable peal of Plain Bob Minor was rung in 2 hours and 12 minutes. It is hoped to ring the bells more frequently in future, although there seems little possibility of raising a local band owing to the sparse population and the isolation of the small village.
