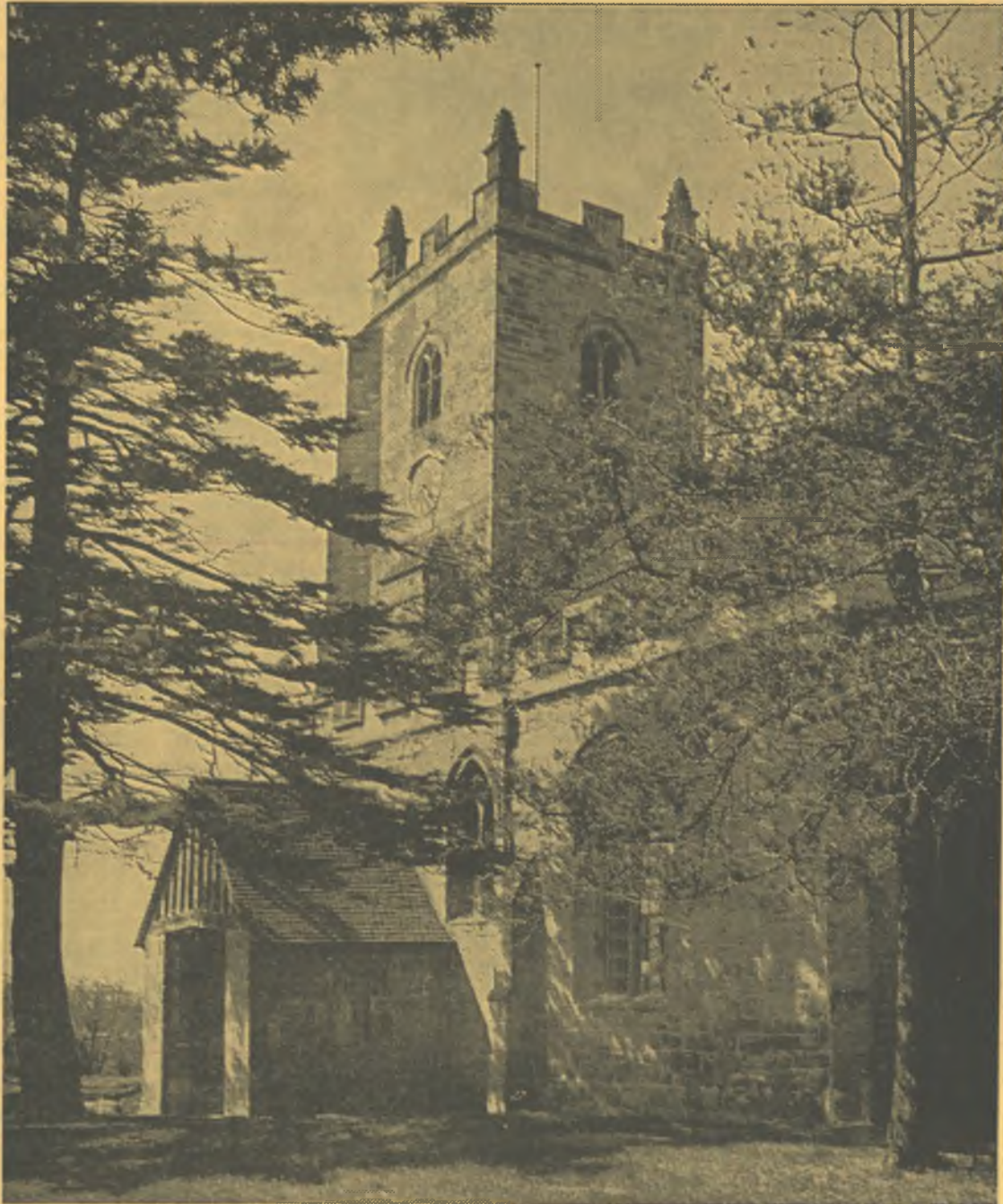

OUR COVER PICTURE

SS. Peter & Paul, Kingsbury, Warks.

KINGSBURY is a large parish situated between Tamworth and Coventry on the A423, the village only occupying part of the parish.

The church, which dates back to the 11th century, is built of grey sandstone and stands on high ground overlooking the River Tame and Bodymoor Heath Boating Lakes. In origin the church was Norman, but additions have been made through the centuries, the tower being built in the 14th century. In 1610 additions were made to the tower to accommodate a fifth bell. During the next 230 years one of the bells disappeared, the reasons for this being unknown.

In 1849 the remaining four bells were recast into five by John Taylor and Co. of Loughborough, the event being recorded by inscription on the tenor bell. It is interesting to note that the opening ringing was performed by the Stoney Stanton ringers, Leicestershire.

The bells were rehung on ball bearings in 1921 and immediately afterwards ringing ceased until tower repairs could be carried out. These were completed as recorded by the stone on the tower in 1928. Ringing was entirely call changes for festivals only. A curfew bell was rung until 1939, and for a short period after the war. This was a means of ringers learning to handle a bell at Kingsbury. Call change ringing continued after the war until 1948, when Walter, Gordon and Keith Lane were taught Doubles ringing by the late W. C. Rhodes and other ringers of Coleshill. The Lane family then taught method ringing at Kingsbury. The first peal was rung on December 17th, 1949, on the 100th anniversary of the casting of the tenor bell.

In 1950 the ringers saved all wedding fees to buy a set of 18 handbells, then used these at Christmastime to raise money, in addition to wedding fees, towards a new treble bell. This was dedicated in 1959, the cost of which was £362, paid for from the ringers' fund. The ringers then increased the set of handbells to 26, costing £56.

Ambition was still prevalent, the next project being eight tower bells. Estimates were obtained for tuning the old bells, and hanging in a new eight-bell frame a floor lower in the tower, separate estimates being given for two trebles. An all-out effort was made to raise the money by collecting scrap iron, travelling many miles with acetylene cutting equipment to fetch it in; collecting, sorting and counting paper farm food bags, at the rate of 200 plus a week, then transporting at 2,000 a time to a firm who bought them. Scrap paper was collected for a while, but storage was a problem. Scrap batteries were transported 50 at a time to Leicester. A few items were salvaged from the scrap, repaired and sold.

Tunes on handbells were rung at functions far and near; ringing carols at Christmas eight or ten nights without a

break, counting money one Christmas Eve until 2 a.m. Ringers past and present rang for weddings, and all fees went to the fund. Mr. Joseph Basford, ringer at Kingsbury since 1915, although unable to assist in the more strenuous efforts, was always ready to stand in for weddings. Various donations were received; a generous gift came from the Barron Bell Trust Fund and the late Mr. W. E. Davies, Churchwarden, bequeathed a sum of money also.

It was evident after about four years of this concentrated effort that it would be possible to recast the old bells, and add two trebles at the same time; the order was placed in 1967. The estimate was on the understanding that the local ringers removed and transported the bells to the foundry, brought the new bells, frame and fittings back, and assisted in their erection.

On Thursday, July 11th, 1968, the treble was dismantled from its frame and on Saturday, July 13th, the old five bells were rung for the last time at 2 p.m. for a wedding. By 11 p.m. all the bells were half-way down the tower. On Saturday, July 20th, the tenor bell was transported round the parish on a trailer for people to see, at the same time a "Guess the Weight Competition" taking place. On July 27th a crane was loaned from a local firm, Messrs. George Cohen, to load the bells on a lorry, also loaned by a local contractor, Mr. V. Alton, and the bells transported to Loughborough.

Whilst the tower was empty, all floors were removed and renewed by local labour and the bell frame was collected by another local transport contractor, Mr. E. Watts, on Thursday, April 3rd, 1969, and unloaded with the aid of a tractor loaned by a local farmer, Mr. B. Wathes. Ringers and other helpers worked part of Good Friday and all day Saturday to hoist up and position the frame, which was finished and ready for the bells. Mr. J. Walker the bell hanger came on the Wednesday to find everything done, but the bells were not ready at the foundry, so he returned to Loughborough to help in the preparation of the bells. Owing to delays the bells were not finished until April 28th. Mr. Walter Lane helped the bell hanger throughout, and others helped as their spare time would allow.

The ringers met Mr. T. Clayton from the bell foundry on May 22nd to try out the bells fully muffled, with the tower closed in, so that the bells would not be heard in the village. Details of the bells are as follows:

Treble.—John Taylor and Co., Founders, Loughborough, 1969. The gift of Gordon H. Lane to the memory of his father Howard A. Lane and Cousin Joyce Lane, both ringers at this church. Diameter 2ft. 4in. Weight 5 cwt. 0 qt. 9 lb. Note E.

Second.—John Taylor and Co., Founders, Loughborough, 1969. This ring was restored and augmented by the assistance of

the Barron Bell Trust and the bequest of Mr. W. E. Davies, Churchwarden, 1935-1964. Diameter 2ft. 5in. Weight 5 cwt. 1 qt. 16 lb. Note D sharp.

Third.—John Taylor and Co., Founders, Loughborough, 1959. I came by many "Lanes." Diameter 2ft. 6½in. Weight 5 cwt. 3 qt. 12 lb. Note C sharp.

Fourth.—John Taylor and Co., Founders, Loughborough, 1849. Recast 1969.

The names of the ringers here listed below, Raised most of the money for our music to flow.

Robert Farmer, Gordon H. Lane, Anthea C. Richards, Nigel W. Richards, D. Keith Lane, Walter G. Lane, Keith C. Richards. Diameter 2ft. 8½in. Weight 6 cwt. 2 qt. 10 lb. Note B.

Fifth.—John Taylor and Co., Founders, Loughborough, 1849. Recast 1969.

Ringers are taught, some don't stay, Some have been ringing for many a day, The kind who keep the art alive Raised to eight our previous five.

Diameter 2ft. 11in. Weight 7 cwt. 3 qt. 3 lb. Note A.

Sixth.—John Taylor and Co., Founders, Loughborough, 1849. Recast 1969.

The treble was added in '59, The old bells recast in '69.

Then two more trebles were hung alongside, To the glory of God we ring out with pride. Diameter 3ft. 1½in. Weight 9 cwt. 1 qt. 17 lb. Note G sharp.

Seventh.—John Taylor and Co., Founders, Loughborough, 1849. Recast 1969.

Kenneth E. Hood, Vicar. W. Herbert Davies and Albert E. Wright, Churchwardens.

Diameter 3ft. 5in. Weight 12 cwt. 1 qt. 15 lb. Note F sharp.

Tenor.—R. Glover and J. Clarkson, Churchwardens. The old four bells recast into five 1849. Taylors, Loughborough, recast 1969. "There must be the beginning of any great matter, but the continuing unto the end until it be thoroughly finished, yields the true glory." The bells dedicated by John W. Bennett, Vicar, 1953-1964. Diameter 3ft. 10in. Weight 17 cwt. 1 qt. Note E.

The dedication is on Saturday, June 28th, at 3 p.m. Sunday ringing will be 10.30 a.m. and 6 p.m. Practice, Fridays 8 p.m.-9.30 p.m.

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Research proves H. William Barrett a 1,000 Pealer

FOR the second time in its history the Norwich Diocesan Association extends heartiest congratulations to one of its members on having rung his 1,000th peal. Through many hours of careful researching by Mr. Leonard Stilwell, it has recently come to light that Mr. H. William Barrett scored his 1,000th peal as long ago as June 29th, 1968, when he rang the fifth, as conductor, to a peal of Grandsire and Plain Bob Doubles at Fornsett St. Peter, Norfolk.

Bill, as he is affectionately known throughout the Exercise, was born at Loddon on November 26th, 1905, and it was there he rang his first peal. This was a four methods Minor peal rung on October 2nd, 1923, and conducted by his tutor, Mr. F. A. Finch.

During the nineteen thirties and forties he lived at Tolworth, Surrey, and was attached to Kingston Parish Church where he was tower secretary. At this time he made many journeys to Guildford and Burnham on his bicycle to ring peals with Alfred H. Pulling and George Gilbert, and even after he had returned to his native village of Loddon it was not unusual to see him turn up at Burnham for a peal, after which he would cycle some forty miles to a convenient railway station where he could board a train for the remainder of the journey to Norfolk.

He is a member of the Central Council having represented his Association since 1954. He was Association Ringing Master from 1955 to 1962, when he became General Secretary, which office he holds to this day, assisted by his wife Evelyn. Although many hours have been taken up to ring a thousand peals, a great deal of his time has been devoted to teaching youngsters throughout Norfolk, including about 40 in one parish.

Apart from the war years he has been in the Civil Service, and is at present an Officer of the Ministry of Social Security in Norwich. He extends grateful thanks to Mr. Leonard Stilwell for compiling his list of peals as follows:

Dear Sir,—The "sponsored" peal attempt at Portsmouth Cathedral in aid of the D-Day Memorial Appeal was not successful. The attempt to ring 5,040 Grandsire Caters was lost after one hour seven minutes good ringing when there was a slight upset in the rhythm of the striking and two bells changed over. The breakdown occurred after ringing 1,612 changes.

The bells of Sampford Brett, Somerset (tenor 8 cwt. 1 qr. 24 lb.) have recently been rehung with a new treble added. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed ringing them, although one or two found them a little on the light side.

After the service, taken by the Master, the Rev. H. F. Warren, an excellent tea gave strength to get speedily through the business meeting. Several new members were welcomed, and Branch practices for the next quarter arranged. The weekly learners' practices were cut to once a fortnight until September, when it was felt there would be more time to spare for them.

The ringers then returned to the tower where various methods (some a little more "various" than others!) up to and including Cambridge Surprise were rung. At 9 p.m. the bells were lowered, and midges under the yews outside the ringing chamber were left replete!—P. T.

CENTRAL COUNCIL REFORM

Dear Sir,—The pace of change is increasing all the time and it is necessary therefore to be constantly examining the workings of any organisation to ensure that it is geared to the needs of the present time.

Now that the Central Council has agreed to its Standing Committee looking into its procedural rules we hope that it will meet to commence discussion at an early date so that they can have concrete proposals to put before the Council at its next meeting. Agreed it will be difficult to convene frequent meetings of such a large committee, so one hopes that they will divide themselves into small "Ad Hoc" sub-committees each to examine a specific section of the procedural rules with definite terms of reference and when they have got something to work on get down to examining the whole, for surely as one criticism of the Central Council is its size the Standing Committee should not leave itself open to the same comment.

In this matter the Standing Committee must surely go to the Exercise for suggestions so that it can ascertain what ringers in general feel is wrong with their Council, for if the Exercise decides that their Council is not working and is, in their opinion, a self-perpetuating body concerned only with its own glorification, and refusing to alter its constitution, then let us make no mistake

about it there will be, in their opinion, no need for the Central Council and it will die! A state of anarchy resulting.

If the Standing Committee refuses to make any changes or does not come up with any recommendations for improvement then it is tantamount to saying that the procedural rules of the Central Council and its constitution are perfect. However, it must be ensured that change is made only for the better and is not made for change's sake to appease the Exercise. It is the responsibility of the Central Council to consider very carefully the recommendations made to it. May it be suggested that more than one reading is given to any proposals put to it on this matter, so that due consideration can be given to any amendments brought up by the full Council without discussion having to be curtailed due to lack of time and in view of the great importance of this matter a short period be given for members to reflect upon the items to ensure that the Central Council does not make any rash decisions.—Yours faithfully,

RULES ON REPORTING WANTED

Dear Sir,—It seems to me that any attempt to tell ringers what they should ring is doomed to failure. Local traditions will persist obstinately in spite of any committee's activities, and ingenious composers will continue to discover methods and compositions not covered by rules and ones that obey the letter but not the spirit.

But what is very necessary is a nationally agreed vocabulary for describing methods and their structures, to avoid a "Tower of Babel" situation in which different composers use different names for the same thing or use the same name for different things. Unless we can achieve agreement on this, at least in official publications and "The Ringing World," confusion and muddles will continue. I therefore suggest that the most reasonable attitude would be "Ring what you like, but report it clearly according to standard rules." This will not prevent people ringing "rubbish" if they want to, but will ensure that it can be recognised as such when it is reported.

Emotion. I attitudes such as "Spliced Surprise; that's the fancy stuff the nobs ring." are quite out of place in technical descriptions. But the words "surprise" and "spliced" both seem useful and well-established technical terms. (Incidentally, it seems a pity that the suggestion I put forward at Worcester, to introduce the terms Plain Splice, Reverse Spliced and Double Spliced to denote the joining of methods at the lead-ends only, at the half-leads only and at both, did not find favour with the Committee.)

Ideally the rules should prevent ambiguity both ways; one composition and set of method names should lead to only one series of changes, and one series of changes should only be described in one way. The detailed working out of this principle would

be a long and complicated matter, and some arbitrary decisions would probably be needed. For example, a set of changes might be described as a lead of an asymmetrical method, or as two symmetrical methods spliced at the half-lead. A rule against asymmetry might therefore be needed; but to prevent ambiguity, not because asymmetry was thought inherently improper.

I do not know how far the Methods Committee or the Central Council as a whole would accept this attitude of "Rules on reporting, to avoid ambiguity and confusion," rather than attempting to lay down "Rules on what should or should not be rung." But if there appears to be enough support for the idea and no major snags I will probably propose a motion for the next meeting asking the Methods Committee to attempt to develop rules along these lines.—Yours faithfully,

Dear Sir,—I am sure that Mr. May has done the Exercise and the Council itself great service by successfully initiating an examination of constitution and procedure. All my natural inclinations are those of a traditionalist (i.e., "a reactionary"), but it does no harm to clear our collective minds, so that what is valuable—even if not new—may be retained, and what has served its turn may be discarded.

Having seen the Council at work but once—this year—I would be rash to offer any detailed suggestions. But one thing stood out a mile at St. Albans: the occupation of something over the first hour by ceremonial business. I do not agree with Mr. May's hint that much of this be done away with by not having a V.I.P. welcome. The Council fulfils ambassadorial functions as well as deliberate and executive ones, and I therefore consider this kind of ceremonial contact between hosts and guests is valuable.

Nevertheless, as one much occupied with meetings and procedure I am well aware that one hour before lunch is worth two in the afternoon when speaking in terms of productivity.

Could the Council not build upon the change which next year's hosts, the Yorkshire Association, have already announced? Let the Council proceedings open (for about an hour) on the previous evening for speeches of welcome, introduction of new members and other ceremonial or purely formal business. What could be more appropriate than an adjournment to a reception at which V.I.P.s, new members and old can all get together? Then bright and early next morning get straight into the committees' reports and other business requiring careful consideration, and often meriting debate.—Yours faithfully,

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More Letters to the Editor

METHOD NAMING

Dear Sir,—I see my "singular" namesake has joined battle on method naming. Yes, I admit the views expressed on the methods which are "Kent places" variations on Plain Bob are my own, but I am sure they are shared by a very great number of other ringers. A certain standard was set by the Central Council collection of Major methods, in which the methods chosen had "natural" or Plain Bob lead-heads, had no fewer than triple changes and only "coursing-pairs," the right way round, on the back. This last condition omitted any 7ths place without the treble behind. Of course there are many methods rung which are below this standard.

Perhaps the least important of the above conditions is "only coursing pairs" behind, as 68's and 48's can then be introduced to vary the music. Most ringers feel that certain combinations of bells behind at back-stroke should be avoided, particularly 28's and 87's. Aldermaston starts with the 7th place bell lying still one blow and the 8th place lying still two blows behind (i.e., giving 3 blows in 8ths), thus ensuring 87's at back, if the method stands on its own, as it should, without covering it up in spliced.

I have nothing against Reverse Canterbury Pleasure or Hunslet Bob Major. It is just that they can be improved a little by adding places in 56 and in 34 respectively when the treble is in 78. This would then give natural lead-ends without learning much extra work. The former would be called Brentford Bob incidentally. Also, Geoff, I believe Plain Bob Major with Kent places in 34 instead of dodging is called Reverse Canterbury Pleasure, the same as the Minor.

Oxford Bob can be called Single Oxford Minor or even, to cover all its features, Single Oxford College Bob Minor. Any of these will define it, from Double Oxford, Oxford Imperial Bob, Oxford Treble Bob and Old Oxford Delight.

With reference to the methods named in the Longparish peal, true the conductor is entitled to name methods rung for the first time, **providing** the name does not belong to another method in the same class. Winchester Bob Major bears no relation to the "Winchester Bob Minor" rung, so the latter must be renamed. This is not opinion, it is a Central Council requirement.

Lastly, providing confusion doesn't arise, I am pleased to see the old names being revived. Many of them had very attractive names.—Yours sincerely,

MARSTON ST. LAWRENCE, NORTHANTS

On Wednesday evening, June 11th, the five bells of the church of Marston St. Lawrence were rung after a silence of some 30 years. This was at the request and invitation of the architect responsible for the massive restoration work on the fabric, Mr. A. J. Frost, of Leighton Buzzard, who had asked ringers from the Daventry District to meet him and try the bells.

Very little attention was required in order to ring apart from grease on the bearings and the provision of one second-hand rope. The bells, tenor 12½ cwt., are a major five, the third being slightly out of tune with the others. After being raised singly, with Mr. Frost upstairs, several six-scores were rung without incident and too much difficulty. There is a fair amount of noise in the ringing room due to the bells being immediately overhead, but a little ingenuity could easily cure this.

It would appear from knowledge gleaned locally that ringing ceased in the 1930's due to tower oscillation, which in turn was caused by the near collapse of the whole length of the south aisle. This was shored up both inside and outside until recently. The south aisle has now been rebuilt, together with other restoration to the fabric and tower movement is not now apparent.

The village of Marston St. Lawrence, of under 200 people, has raised some £4,000 in the last 20 years, much of which has now been spent on immediate and temporary repairs. Another £10,000 is needed for further extensive fabric restoration work. Large or small donations will be most gratefully received by the Vicar, the Rev. Sir Clifford Wigram, Bart., Marston St. Lawrence Vicarage, Banbury.—K. R. H.

Dear Sir,—Mr. Cook's Little Minor method (page 402) does not appear in H. Chant's Index of Minor Methods. It seems unlikely that it has been rung before since it is very irregular, having both a bell striking 3 blows in one place (6ths) and 5ths place made without the treble in 6ths.

It will not splice with any regular Alliance method. In fact, any Alliance method splicing with it will need to have both the above mentioned properties. That is, at best, will start x 14.56.16 or x 14.56.36.—Yours faithfully,

A FALSE COMPOSITION OF
PLAIN BOB MAJOR

Dear Sir,—I regret that Mr. Len Martin's peal of Plain Bob Major on page 342 is false, even allowing for the curious course ends accompanying the composition. The use of a single Before is dangerous, for this effectively cancels our guarantee that only the back-strokes of course-heads need be checked to prove the peal. It is easily seen that a course-head 3254768 will produce rounds at the hand-stroke of the next treble-lead, and in fact the course rung from this course-head is identical with a plain-course, except that it is rung backwards, starting as it does from a back-stroke which is in fact the hand-stroke row of the first treble-lead of plain course. So although 24 courses are possible in the 678 position, and 24 in the 768 position, these will be the same courses, except that the latter group will be rung backwards from different starting points. Thus no extra music is gained by using the 768 position, but extra work at proving the peal is. In this case false-ness occurs between the first parts of the 3rd and 11th courses.

However, I agree that courses with the 7 in 6ths and the tenor home are unusual, and suggest that as we would wish to avoid 768 (although for curiosity's sake a composition with 12 courses each of 678 and 768 can be produced), we should use 748, which is in fact the titlums position and capable of good music, as well as producing a hand-stroke home effect.—Yours sincerely,

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CHURCH BELLS AND SUNDAY ENTERTAINMENT

The position of church bells under the Sunday Entertainment Bill, which is now in its final stages in the House of Commons, has given risen to anxiety. Mr. A. Purdom, of St. Mary's, Eastbourne, asks that the Central Council should make sure now that the Bill will have no adverse effect on the ringing of church bells for their intended function.

Lord Constantine, in a letter to "The Daily Telegraph," writes: "Many areas have their Sundays disturbed chiefly by church bells. In this age of the juke box and Concorde, noise is something which deserves investigation in its own right. The Sunday Entertainment Bill, by the way, has provisions for complaints on this score and does not free Sunday until 2 p.m."

WEST WICKHAM COURT

Wickham Court, the Manor House of West Wickham, which adjoins the Parish Church of St. John the Baptist, was built in the fifteenth century, and in 1952 was acquired by the Convent of the Ladies of Mary, Croydon, becoming Coloma College, a teachers' training establishment.

To celebrate the quinqucentenary, the College produced a performance of *Son et Lumiere* on the four evenings of May 28th-31st, outlining in this fascinating manner the history of Wickham Court. After each performance, the spectators were conducted along the yew avenue (one of the oldest and finest in England) and into the house to inspect the beautiful woodwork and heraldic stained glass in the banqueting hall and other rooms. The evenings were concluded by a recital of sixteenth century music, given in the library by students of the College.

Before each performance the bells of the Parish Church were rung by local and neighbouring ringers.
